The Board proceeded to the opening of the bids for the interior work, equipping and finishing of the new Hall of Records.

The Deputy Comptroller presented a communication from the Department of Parks, June 27, 1901, requesting an appropriation of \$20,000 for 5,000 additional settees for Central Park and the various smaller parks; also, a report of the Engineer of the Finance Department relating thereto.

The Mayor moved that they be referred to the Municipal Assembly, with the request that they authorize the issue of bonds to the amount of \$20,000, under subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter.

In reply, I would report that the improvement proposed is a two-story frame building about 25 feet by 40 feet, to be erected on the side hill of Morningside Park, on the line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street. The lower story is to be arranged and used for a lavatory for ladies; the upper or second story is to be used for refreshments.

There is no ladies' cottage in this park, and I agree with the Commissioner that it is most urgently needed. The estimate, \$8,250, for the improvement, I consider a little high, but not excessive.

Therefore, I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$8,250, to erect a ladies' cottage and refreshment room in Morningside Park, on the steep hillside near Morningside Avenue, West, at the foot of One Hundred and Fourteenth street.

I would report that the improvement consists of taking up the present granite-block pavement, excavating and relaying the block to a lower grade; upon the granite blocks forming a foundation, an asphalt pavement is to be laid.

I have had the location examined, and it is reported to me that the granite blocks are in fair condition, but the pavement has settled badly in places.

Fifth Avenue, north and south of this Plaza, is paved with asphalt, and when Cathedral parkway (One Hundred and Tenth street) is improved, it will naturally be asphalted; hence, I consider this improvement advantageous, and would advise that it be allowed.

The estimate, \$17,000, is as nearly correct as can be made in advance; therefore I would recommend a compliance with the request of the Commissioner, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$17,000, to pave with asphalt on the present granite-block pavement the plaza at One Hundred and Tenth street and Fifth Avenue.

This improvement, doubtless, will add greatly to the park, the esplanade proposed presenting a very agreeable feature, being a handsome walk twenty-seven feet in width on the easterly side, and thirty-six feet on the northerly side, which will serve also as a playground for children.

The plan submitted, which under the law requires the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is all that is required, and the estimate is as nearly correct as it can be made in advance.

I would respectfully recommend a compliance with the request of the Commissioner, and, to provide the means for carrying out of the plan, that the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$14,500 be authorized, pursuant to the provisions of section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, as I am informed that the limit for the appropriation of small parks has been reached.

Sir—Under date of April 12, 1901, there was received at this office from the Secretary of Citizens' Fire Engine Company of Pleasant Plains, Fifth Ward, Borough of Richmond, a notice (a copy of which is inclosed), setting forth that said company was duly incorporated January 2 of this year; that it had procured proper apparatus for the extinguishing of fire and the preservation of property, and would from that date perform active duty in said ward and borough. The notice was referred to the Chief of Department, and under date of the 30th of April he forwarded a report from the Assistant Fire Marshal, Borough of Richmond, who is also Chief of the Edgewater Volunteer Fire Department, dated the preceding day, giving the facts in regard to the organization and equipment of said company, a copy of which was forwarded to its Secretary and a duplicate of which is herewith inclosed.

It would appear from the report of the Assistant Fire Marshal that the said company was organized January 2, 1901, as a bucket brigade, and that it has been using a hand fire engine since April 1 of the current year.

Under date of May 27, 1901, the president of the company, in a letter, a copy of which is inclosed, acknowledged receipt of the report and forwarded a certified copy of the certificate of incorporation (a duplicate of which is herewith inclosed), and requested that I make application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the allowance of the sum of \$1,200 for the maintenance of said company for the current year, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 612, Laws of 1899.

Sir—Pursuant to the instructions contained in your letter of the 15th instant, relative to Citizens' Fire Engine Company, located at Pleasant Plains, in the Borough of Richmond, I beg to report that I have investigated the matter and respectfully state, as follows:

First—That Pleasant Plains is a hamlet on the line of the Tottenville Division of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway, with a population of about eighteen hundred.

Second—That the said company was organized in January 2, 1901, as a bucket brigade, and is now using a hand fire engine, since April 1, 1901.

Third—That the company's apparatus is as follows; in good condition and equipped as follows:

- 1 engine, brakes for 15 men on either side; 2 six-inch pumps, with length of stream horizontal 100 feet, vertical 55 feet.
- 500 feet 2½-inch rubber-lined cotton hose.
- 27 feet of suction pipe, 2 lengths.
- 1 one-inch nozzle, and 1 seven-eighth-inch nozzle.
- 2 axes.
- 6 lanterns.

Fourth—That the company has thirty active members, and in addition to doing duty at Pleasant Plains covers the hamlets of Richmond Valley and Prince's Bay, all three hamlets together containing about two thousand five hundred inhabitants.

Fifth—That no water service exists at any of said places, water being obtained from wells and cisterns.

Sixth—That the company has not heretofore applied for an appropriation under chapter 612 of the Laws of 1899, for the reason that it did not until April, 1901, possess proper fire equipment. All of which is respectfully submitted.

We, the undersigned, citizens and residents of Pleasant Plains, in the said ward, county, borough, city and state, all being of full age and citizens of the United States, do hereby petition, certify and set forth, that we propose to form a fire-engine company pursuant to the statute in such case as is made and provided.

First—That the name and title of said company shall be as follows, to-wit:

Citizens' Fire Engine Company.

Second—That the business and object of said company shall be to assist in the extinction and protection of property in the said County of Richmond from loss by fire and from injury thereby.

Third—That said company proposes to act as aforesaid in the said County of Richmond, and particularly in the Fifth Ward of the said Borough of Richmond.

Fourth—The number of trustees who are to manage said company shall be five.

Fifth—The number of years said company shall exist shall be fifty years, unless limited hereafter by law.
