#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from President, Borough of Brooklyn:

Brooklyn, July 20, 1906.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I hereby request immediate consideration of the inclosed form of ordinance appropriating \$18,000 Special Revenue Bonds, the proceeds to be used by the President of the Borough for the purpose of making necessary alterations in the Kings County Court House. The need for this appropriation is immediate. The Legislature this last session enacted a law adding seven new Justices for those sitting in the Second Judicial Department of the State. If the purposes of the law are to be carried out and the administration of justice in the Department is to be expedited, some accommodation must be made in the Kings County Court House for the seven additional Justices. As they will take their seats on January 1 it is very desirable that a contract for the necessary alterations be executed at once.

I therefore request you to adopt the ordinance at your meeting on July 24, in order that the Board of Estimate may act upon your resolution at its first meeting in September.

Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—I would ask that the Board of Aldermen authorize the issuance of Revenue Bonds to the extent of \$20,000, to be placed to the credit of the President of the Borough of Richmond, Bureau of Engineering, Construction, Salaries and Supplies. The necessity for this action is as follows: There was asked for in the departmental estimate for this year the sum of \$35,000 for the above Bureau, of which \$30,000 was allowed. More would have been requested but for the expectation that a very large proportion of the engineering work could be charged to several assessment improvements, but as delays, for which we have not been responsible, have occurred before the authorization of these improvements, notably that for the St. George ferry approaches and for certain sewer systems, we had not been able to enter into the necessary contracts; consequently we were not permitted to charge against the Street Improvement Fund the engineering work done for even these specific improvements. Under a proper rule of the Department of Finance, no costs can be charged against the Street Improvement Fund until some contract which can be assessed has been entered into.

It has taken quite a large corps of high priced men to prepare the preliminary plans in some of these improvements; consequently, about five-sixths of the appropriation has necessarily been used up for the six months ending June 30. The second portion of this year will not show quite so serious a state of affairs, for a number of these men will be assigned to work in carrying out the construction in one or more large sewerage systems, so that pay-rolls can be properly charged against said work.

At the time the Budget was considered and approved it was supposed, as stated above, that a large part of these engineering charges could and would be met by assessment improvements for which the work was actually done; otherwise, there is no doubt larger provision would have originally been made to cover the needs of the case.

As our topographical work is almost entirely carried on from proceeds of Corporate Stock, it is not possible to make transfers of engineering moneys to the Construction Bureau, and my other Bureaus of Highways, Sewers, Street Cleaning, Public Buildings and Offices and Buildings are all inadequately supplied with funds for their necessary uses. I have no recourse, therefore, other than to present request for an issuance of Revenue Bonds, and would ask that same be authorized at the earliest possible date.

Brooklyn and Queens.

The attached table will show the number of precincts in numerical order in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, the population (estimated) of each precinct, the number of day and night posts in each precinct, the number of men required to patrol said posts, the deficiency in each of said precincts, the extra number of night posts actually needed, the number of bicycle, mounted and special posts in each precinct, the extra number of bicycle, special and mounted posts needed, the length of longest post in miles, as well as the number of posts in each precinct larger than one-half mile. The net deficiency in the patrol force in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens at the present time is 142. If the number of patrol posts are increased as are actually needed and set forth in attached table the deficiency would be about 1,000 men.

In all of said precincts the posts as now established are much too large in area to be properly covered by the Patrolmen, and while it is true that the Force has been increased since consolidation, it is also true that this increase has not been in proportion to the increase to the population. The Force in each and every precinct in these two boroughs should be increased sufficiently to at least properly cover the territory comprised within their borders.

The following figures will give some idea of the growth in population, buildings, etc., in these two boroughs, and will also show the large area, nearly all of which must be patrolled; the water front, the parks and parkways require the constant attention of the Police Force:

The park system of Brooklyn now comprises forty-eight parks, with an area of 1,613 acres; fourteen small parks, four playgrounds and twenty parkways, with a mileage of 44½ miles. In the near future seven new parks which are in process of acquirement must be added to the above figures.

In Queens the park system is not extensive at present, consisting of eight parks, mostly small ones, although Forest Park is very large and requires constant Police care. Seven new parks are in process of acquirement, however, condemnation proceedings having been authorized.

In the year 1905 permits for the erection of 8,663 new buildings were issued, and 5,357 buildings were completed during that year. Of these buildings completed 4,103 were built for dwelling houses and tenements.

In Queens 2,976 permits were issued, 2,600 of which were for dwellings and tenements.

This year building operations are going on at a still greater rate, and during the past three months 1,573 buildings have been completed, 1,300 of which were in the outlying districts.

The waterfront is most important in character, is very large, being 33 miles in extent. There are thirteen ferries between Brooklyn and Manhattan, four ferries between Queens and Manhattan, and there is one between Brooklyn and Jersey City, and two or three local ferries.

These figures will give some idea of the immense growth and the great necessity for the appointment of additional Patrolmen to properly guard and protect the inhabitants of the two boroughs.

Many of the precincts in Brooklyn, and nearly all in Queens, are much too large in area, and are now increasing in population so rapidly that many of them may have to be subdivided in the near future, and it might be advisable to acquire sites at the present time, for it is literally true that the value of property is advancing so rapidly that prices may become almost prohibitive. In a former report made by me I referred to the necessity of establishing a new precinct to be formed from portions of the Sixty-seventh, Sixty-eighth and Seventy-second precincts, and will say that if same increase in population continues in this territory, the new precinct will have to be established at an earlier date than anticipated.

It should also be taken into consideration that Brooklyn is in fact a very large city in itself, and growing larger. Its business interests are very great; the building of subways, improvement of the waterfront, the building up of its vacant territory and improved transportation facilities for the suburban districts must necessarily bring to it a still larger population, and the consequent necessity for the large increase in the patrol force of the two boroughs.

One thousand Patrolmen, at least, should be added to the present Force, and, while this increase may appear large, it will scarcely furnish sufficient Force to efficiently protect and guard the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, as now constituted.

At present there are forty-three precincts, two squads and five inspection districts in these boroughs, and the total number of Patrolmen amount to 2,577, which includes those who are detailed, sick, absent—in fact, it includes all the Patrolmen in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

That the Corporation Counsel expressed his inability to assign one of his assistants to the special work of this committee, because of the insufficiency of his office force, but that your committee has been assisted in all its work by an assistant from his office, Mr. William H. Doherty, who was assigned generally to this Board.

Your committee therefore recommends that this matter be placed on file as not requiring further consideration.

The Committee on Codification of Ordinances, to whom was referred on January 9, 1906, a communication from the City Clerk, transmitting a code of City ordinances, respectfully

## REPORTS:

The Committee on Codification of Ordinances hereby report that they have examined the entire subject of the ordinances of The City of New York, as well as the material in the proposed code of ordinances referred to this committee on the 9th day of January, 1906.

Your committee herewith present a compilation of all ordinances of The City of New York, including all such ordinances as are mentioned in sections 41 and 57 of the Greater New York Charter, together with all new ordinances and amendments of same, which have been adopted, and have become existing ordinances up to January 1, 1906.

Your committee have not reported anything as an existing ordinance, which has in it any new matter or has been revised in any manner whatsoever. Nor have this committee eliminated from their report any formerly existing ordinance, or part of an ordinance, which has not clearly been repealed by subsequent legislation or ordinance, or which has not been decided by the highest courts of this State to be of no force and effect.

In order to preserve certain well known ordinances, which have been repealed by the changes made necessary by the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, your committee have reported the same, not as existing ordinances, but as ordinances whose immediate reenactment by this Board, with the substitution of such words as are suggested in the committee's report, is recommended. Instances of such ordinances are to be found where the ordinance relates solely to some locality, such as the Borough of Manhattan, or the Borough of Brooklyn, and where the words formerly contained in such ordinance were "The City of New York," or "the City of Brooklyn," and where the duties of a designated office have devolved upon an official with a different title. In other words, the changes recommended are in cases where the name of some locality, or of some office, or the sense of the words, has been changed by the language of the Greater New York Charter, or of some State law.

Your committee, in its treatment and report of the existing ordinances, have considered only such acts as constitute the local laws of the City enacted by the Board of Aldermen, or similar body, and duly approved by the Mayor, or returned without his approval in such a manner that they have become ordinances by force of statute, and which are continuing in their nature, force and effect, and are either rules under which the Government of The City of New York is administered, or rules for the guidance or regulation of the conduct of the citizens of said City. This report contains only such acts of the Legislative body of this City as fall within the foregoing definition of an ordinance.

Your committee are not satisfied with the form or language of many of these ordinances, but a careful study of this subject has led the committee to believe that it is absolutely essential to adopt some code of ordinances that shall contain all the ordinances of this City, without reference to previously existing codes, in order that the code now adopted may be properly revised and corrected in the future; and your committee therefore ask this Board to refer this whole matter back to this committee for revision when the recommendations of this committee shall have been adopted.

For the purpose of clearing up a very confused state of affairs, your committee recommend that with the adoption of its report, this Board shall also adopt a general repealing clause, wiping out all ordinances that were in effect on January 1, 1906, and adopting anew the ordinances as presented in this report as the existing ordinances of The City of New York, up to the date of January 1, 1906, together with such ordinances in their corrected form as are herein recommended for reenactment.

For the purpose of carrying into effect the last preceding recommendation with greater clearness, this committee have stricken out the repealing clause of each ordinance, and also the clause designating when each ordinance shall take effect, for the reason that these clauses are now unnecessary. This is apparent from the fact that when this committee's report shall have been adopted, the ordinances herewith reported will supersede everything that has gone before, and will go into effect at the same instant of time that the repeal of all former ordinances, as herein suggested, will take place.

Your committee find that the ordinances herewith reported divide themselves into five general classes.

First—The general ordinances applying throughout the entire confines of The City of New York, together with such ordinances of a general character as are recommended for reenactment as general ordinances, including the Sanitary Code, the Building Code, and the Park Regulations.

Second—Local ordinances as amended to January 1, 1906, comprising such chapters and articles of the former revised ordinances as apply to the individual boroughs of said City, together with the local ordinances of the various towns, villages and localities now included within the Greater City of New York, and such as may be grouped together because their subject matter is related.

Third—Miscellaneous ordinances which refer to certain subjects that cannot be classified under a general heading, and which are grouped with those ordinances to which they are more specifically related.

Fourth—Obsolete ordinances, which relate to subjects that have no practical existence at the present time, and the immediate repeal of which is recommended.

Fifth—Ordinances that have been repealed by implication because of the fact that they referred to localities or officials, or to a condition of affairs not now existent, and the immediate re-enactment of which ordinances, with the suitable changes herein suggested, is hereby recommended. These ordinances have been reported in their proper places and connection.



As the policy of the framers of the Greater New York Charter and the interests of the City demand that the ordinances, so far as possible, shall be general, your Committee, in several instances, have recommended the adoption of a local ordinance as a general ordinance or as a part of the existing general ordinances. In each such instance your Committee have carefully indicated that such local ordinance, although inserted in the place it should occupy among the General Ordinances, is not a part of the General Ordinances, but is a local ordinance, and that its adoption as a General Ordinance is merely recommended.

Your Committee believe that in all cases the suggestions made by the Committee will strongly appeal to the common sense of the Board.

The system of corrections adopted by your Committee is as follows:

The corrections of all ordinances of the former City of New York and of the former City of Brooklyn, together with those in the general ordinances, are indicated by placing a parenthesis around such words as, in the opinion of your Committee, should be stricken out, and by indicating the change which your Committee suggests, in the margin opposite such parenthesis, the words suggested being underscored. The corrections of the ordinances of the former City of Long Island and the other smaller municipal corporations that are now comprised within the Greater City of New York have been indicated by placing the new matter suggested for adoption in parenthesis within the ordinance itself; the former language of the ordinance, which this Committee recommends should be stricken out, is placed in the margin and underscored.

Your Committee in presenting this report desire to express their thanks for the kind and valuable assistance rendered to it by the Hon. P. J. Scully, City Clerk, and his Deputies, Mr. Frank J. Martin and Mr. Charles R. Shopland, and also to the Assistant Corporation Counsel assigned to the Board, Mr. William H. Doherty, who is largely responsible for editing the ordinances of the smaller towns, villages and localities now incorporated in the Greater City of New York. As to these latter, your Committee have included in their report all such local ordinances as they have been enabled to obtain.

Your Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE adopting the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

That all ordinances of The City of New York which were in force on January 1, 1906, be and they hereby are repealed;

Be it further Ordained that the ordinances of The City of New York, excluding those ordinances designated as obsolete, which are herewith presented in the report of the Committee on Codification of Ordinances of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as the existing ordinances of said City up to the date of January 1, 1906, and all ordinances recommended in said Committee's report for re-enactment with the corrections as therein designated, be and they hereby are adopted and enacted as ordinances of The City of New York.

#### REPORTS:

This resolution was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in apparent conflict with its rule adopted at the request of the Board of Aldermen, providing that it would not consider applications for increases in salaries except in connection with the consideration of the annual Budget unless extraordinary cause were shown. Diligent inquiry by members of this committee has failed to show any reason for taking this case out of the rule. The Dock Commissioner said that he thought the rule did not apply to his Department inasmuch as it was not supported by appropriations in the Budget, but when his attention was called to the fact that the intention of the rule was for business reasons to limit consideration of salary questions to one period of the year, he could suggest nothing exceptional in this case. The committee has held the resolution for more than a month, and has considered the question of returning it to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It is manifest that that Board would simply repeat its former action, the only result of the course suggested being delay. While the committee, because of the rule, would not have considered this application had it had first jurisdiction over it, it believes that it is now its duty to examine the merits of the case.

The duties of the position of Superintendent of Docks are numerous and exacting. He is in charge of the dock masters, of the cleaning of the marginal streets and wharves, has charge of the eight recreation piers, and Pier "A," and the attendants, cleaners, sweepers, laborers, etc. He is required to visit the recreation piers every night and see that they are conducted in a proper and orderly manner, and that the rules of the Department are enforced. The incumbent, Charles A. Manly, is generally considered by those in touch with the Department, to be a competent and faithful

This Committee has carefully considered the communication from the District Attorney of New York County relative to the situation affecting the sale of ice in this City. Believing that the citizens are entitled to know whether or not the price charged for ice has been wrongfully maintained by those dealing in such commodity, and that if wrongdoing is made to appear all persons and corporations found guilty thereof should forthwith be prosecuted and punished, this Committee recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, This Board recently requested the District Attorney of New York County to commence an investigation of the books of the American Ice Company, and make every effort to obtain evidence, with the view of instituting criminal proceedings against said company if the facts should so warrant; and

Whereas, The said District Attorney, in a communication to this Board, in reply to said request, states in substance that as the matter now stands he has no power in the premises; and further states that under the provisions of the Statute of this State known as the "Anti Trust Law" the Attorney General of the State has the power of initiative to ascertain if the present condition as to the price at which ice is sold is the result of wrongdoing on the part of those controlling the ice business in this City; and suggests that this Board communicate with said Attorney General in relation thereto; and

Whereas, This Board is heartily in sympathy with any effective action having for its purpose the relief of the citizens of this City from unlawful and excessive charges for so necessary a commodity; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Attorney General of the State of New York be and he hereby is requested by this Board to examine the facts relative to the production, sale and price of ice in The City of New York, with the view to ascertain whether the Laws of this State are being violated in any of these respects by the American Ice Company or any other corporation or individual; and upon such examination to take such action in the premises as the facts may warrant.

#### REPORTS:

That the Committee held a well-attended public hearing, at which the introducer of the resolution, together with the Deputy Police Commissioner and many others, spoke, all urging that there be some form of relief. Police Commissioner Bingham has since expressed his approval of the idea.

Your Committee believe that, under the present system, a Doorman cannot properly perform his duties as Doorman, and Attendant and Prison Keeper, and also properly clean the four or five floors (including cells, cellars, windows and sidewalks) which constitute a police station house. The Doorman, under the rules, must attend to the prisoners and make a written report every half hour; he must answer the frequent calls of the Desk Sergeant and Captain, and must be in uniform and open the door to turn out every outgoing squad.

Your Committee feel that if the houses were better cleaned that a considerable saving would be made in the annual repair bill, and also in the permanent deterioration of the buildings. It is not, and cannot be reasonably completely done by the Doorman, and your Committee feel that he should have reasonable help in his work. There are eighty-five houses, and a male Cleaner for each, to be taken from the Civil Service list, at six hundred dollars a year, would be reasonable and necessary.

Your Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following substitute resolution:

#### (SUBSTITUTE.)

Resolved, That, in pursuance of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of twenty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$25,500), the proceeds whereof to be applied to pay salaries of male Cleaners to be employed by the Department of Police in police station houses in The City of New York at a salary not to exceed six hundred dollars per annum.

#### (ORIGINAL.)

Whereas, The conditions existing in the various station houses and prisons attached thereto are such as have called forth condemnation from numerous civic societies and

associations, interested not only in the betterment of the condition of the prisoners, but also in the station houses wherein the members of the Police Department sleep; and

Whereas, The Department of Health has severely censured the conditions in said station houses and prisons; and

Whereas, The duties of the Doormen of the Police Department are many and varied, onerous and exacting in the extreme; in addition to being prison keepers, they act as nurses, messengers, firemen, janitors, peace officers, etc., they are required to visit the male prisoners at intervals of not exceeding thirty minutes and summon an ambulance surgeon to care for those who may be sick, frequently they have cases of alcoholism, delirium tremens, despondent prisoners who are very liable to attempt suicide, and wounded prisoners who are very apt to tear off their bandages, and who might bleed to death unless closely watched; and

Whereas, Under the conditions set forth it has been clearly shown that the Doormen should be relieved of the duties of keeping the station houses clean in order that they may look after the prisoners whom they are required to care for at all hours of the day and night, and to properly attend to their other manifold duties;

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) annually to pay the salaries of one male Cleaner for each and every station house in the Greater New York at a compensation of six hundred dollars (\$600) per year.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the uniforming of employees of the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company, of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

First—Hereafter all male employees of the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company, whose duties require them to construct, erect, place, repair or inspect the wires or instruments of the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company, that have been placed or shall be placed or removed, inspected or repaired in the public streets and avenues in The City of New York, or in any dwelling house, apartment house, flat house, stores or other public places, such employees shall wear a uniform and cap and shield for the purpose of identification of such employee, said uniform, cap and shield shall be provided and selected in color and design by the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company.

Second—Each and every employee of the New York Telephone Company and the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company who violates section 1 of this ordinance while in the performance of his duty shall be guilty of misdemeanor, and on his conviction by a Court of competent jurisdiction he shall be fined the sum of ten dollars (\$10).

Third—Any person who wears the uniform, cap and shield, or either portion of said uniform, cap or shield, without authority of the New York Telephone Company and New York and New Jersey Telephone Company, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction by a Court of competent jurisdiction shall be fined the sum of fifty dollars (\$50); in default of the payment of said fine they shall be committed to jail for the period of fifty (50) days.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

No. 1069.

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the safety of persons who sail, row and navigate the waters within the confines and adjacent to The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

First—Hereafter all owners, lessees and renters of boats and persons who have boats for hire in The City of New York for the conveyance of passengers, or used for pleasure, shall be equipped with a life preserver for each and every person who occupies said boat.

Second—Said life preservers shall meet the test for safety and efficiency as required by the United States Government.

Third—The life preservers shall be in a convenient and safe place on such boat, or boats, at all times.

Fourth—The Department of the Board of Health of The City of New York in conjunction with the Police Department of The City of New York, shall enforce this ordinance.

Fifth—For each and every violation of this ordinance on the conviction of such offenders, or offender, by a Court of competent jurisdiction, he or they shall be fined the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100), and in default of payment of said fine shall be sentenced to the jail for one hundred (100) days.

Sixth—A violation of this ordinance is a misdemeanor.

Seventh—All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance is hereby repealed.

Eighth—This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, Starr street, in the said Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, between Irving and Wyckoff avenues, in the said Borough and City, at its intersection or crossing with the said railroad tracks, has been fenced off, thereby obstructing the uninterrupted traffic through said Starr street, and by reason thereof rendering the said Starr street unsafe for traffic and damaging adjacent owners by reason of said obstruction and the stoppage of traffic through said street, and rendering it unsafe for firemen or other persons in charge of fire engines, hook and ladders, hose carts, ambulances, patrol wagons and other vehicles while driving through said streets; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Manhattan Beach Railroad Company, or its successors or assigns or lessees, or such other company owning or operating the said railroad, or in control of the railroad bed, be required to elevate or grade the said tracks so owned by it, and upon which it operates its said railroad, up to the level of the said

Starr street, or any other crossing intersecting or crossing the said railroad track or road bed of the said railroad company, or its lessees or assigns, and for a violation of this ordinance the said Manhattan Beach Railroad Company, or its successors or assigns or lessees, or any other company or persons owning or operating cars in and upon said railroad or road bed running from Flushing avenue to Halsey street, between the said Irving and Wyckoff avenues, in said Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) therefor, and an action to recover the same may be brought by The City of New York or any person sustaining any damage thereby. But the said Manhattan Beach Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, lessees or other company or persons operating the said railroad, or in control of the said railroad bed, shall not be liable for any penalty therefor within sixty days of the date of the passage hereof.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Section 1. That the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company, operating surface cars over and upon what is known as the Myrtle avenue line of cars, in and upon Myrtle avenue, a public street in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, is hereby required to run all cars so operated by them on the said line, through, from the Borough of Manhattan, or other starting places or termini to Ridgewood Depot, situate at Ridgewood, in said Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, between the hours of 6 and 9 o'clock in the forenoon and between the hours of 5 and 7 o'clock in the afternoon on all days, excepting therefrom Sundays and legal holidays.

New York, June 27, 1906.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, June 27, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

All the Commissioners were present.

The minutes of the meeting held June 20 were approved.

After hearing Mr. Barry's statement, the commission informed him that it could not permit him to longer serve as a Monitor if he continued the work of preparing candidates for Civil Service examinations. He thereupon stated that he preferred to remain in the employ of the Commission, and asked for two weeks' time in which to finish his outside work, after which he would devote all his time to his duties as a Monitor at the Commission's examinations. His request was granted and the Chief Examiner was instructed not to employ Mr. Barry as a Monitor in the interim.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list for the position of Draughtsman's Helper be and the same hereby is established by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as of June 14, 1906, the rating of the papers having been completed on that date.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list for the position of Structural Steel Draughtsman be and the same hereby is established by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as of June 21, 1906, the rating of the papers having been completed on that date.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated June 19, in answer to the Commission's request for information as to whether he had continued the practice of examining experience papers of candidates before the identification slip was torn off, for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not in any case the identity of the candidate had been revealed in the body of such paper, stating that he had not "continued the practice of examining experience papers of candidates before the identification slip was torn off for the reason that he never employed the practice, being of the opinion that it was not a desirable procedure."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Chief Examiner be and he hereby is directed hereafter to have the experience papers of all candidates examined before the identification slip is torn off, in order to ascertain whether their identity has been revealed in the body of the paper.

The action of the Chief Examiner in rejecting the application of Thomas F. Duggan, of No. 2324 Bathgate avenue, for Inspector of Pipe Laying, Pipes and Hydrants, under Rule VII. of the Commission, for the reason that it was less than two years since he was dismissed from a position in the city service, was sustained.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated June 19, submitting with a request for instructions the records of two Clerks in the Police Department filled out on the blanks that were formerly in use for all positions and that are now used only in case of promotion in ungraded positions, and stating that claim had been made that no efficiency records had been kept in the Police Department of Brooklyn, and that it would therefore be difficult to rate said records on the same basis as the records of other Clerks that had been kept under the present regulations. The Secretary was instructed to direct the Chief Examiner to use his best efforts to rate the papers on the same basis as the records of the other clerks in the examination.

The Commission then considered a request of the Assistant Chief Examiner for instructions as to how much of the "duties" paper of candidate No. 961 for Attendant should be rated. It appeared that the candidate wrote three sheets, pages 2 and 3 of which were turned in in the regular order, and page 1 of which was found on the desk by a Monitor after the candidate had gone to luncheon. After a consideration of the matter the Assistant Chief Examiner was instructed to rate the three sheets of the candidate's "duties" paper and to place her name on the eligible list in accordance with her ascertained percentage.

A communication was presented from Dr. J. P. Warbasse, Medical Examiner, calling the Commission's attention to the fact that, under present conditions, it is possible for substitution to be practised in the examination of candidates for positions in the Police and Fire Departments, and submitting amended blank forms for use in the Department of the Medical Examiner with the recommendation that the same be adopted by the Commission. The matter was laid over.

A communication was presented from Dr. J. P. Warbasse, Medical Examiner, making application for an increase in salary from \$2,100 to \$2,500 per annum. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Dr. Warbasse and state that the Commission would make provision for the increase in salary requested by him in the Budget for the year 1907.

The communication which was received from the State Civil Service Commission, under date of June 2, and laid over by the Commission at its meeting of June 6, requesting information as to what action would be taken on the transfers that had been allowed since the decision of Justice Gaynor in the case of Hale vs. Worstell, in view of the fact that the Court of Appeals had affirmed the decision, was again considered. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the State Civil Service Commission and state that the Municipal Commission had arrived at no definite conclusion with regard to such transfers, and to inquire what the State Board intended to do with similar transfers, in order that it might have the benefit of such information.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the appointment of Chester Allen Booth, of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., as Office Boy in the Board of Water Supply, with salary at the rate of \$300 per annum, be and the same hereby is approved, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 7, it appearing that the services are to be rendered outside The City of New York, and that appointment from an eligible list is not practicable.

The leave of absence, without pay, granted Miss Ada M. Clarke, Nurse, in the Division of Communicable Diseases, Department of Health, from July 1 to September 15, 1906, was approved, it appearing from the certificate furnished that the said leave of absence was granted on account of illness.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated June 23, asking that all the Levelers in his office who had had less than the requisite ten years' experience be examined for promotion to the grade of Transitman, rather than that of Assistant Engineer, as originally requested, in view of the fact that the Department did not bear in mind in making such request that the Charter requires Assistant Engineers in its employ to have ten years' experience in civil engineering. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated June 19, requesting authority to employ Messrs. Hering & Fuller and John A. Vogelson, Esq., hydraulic engineers, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 6, with compensation, in the first case, at the rate of \$8,000 per annum jointly, and in the latter \$2,400 per annum. The Secretary was instructed to inform Commissioner Ellison that his communication did not contain sufficient information to warrant the granting of his request.

A report of the Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated May 31, was approved upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner.

A communication was presented from the Department of Public Charities, dated June 20, transmitting supplementary payrolls of Miss Louise Weeks for services rendered as Supervising Nurse, with compensation at the rate of \$850 per annum, during the month of May. The Secretary stated that Miss Weeks was a Trained Nurse in the Department of Public Charities; that on February 23, 1906, she was nominated for provisional appointment to the position of Supervising Nurse, pending the establishment of a list for that position; that on May 16 the list was established, Miss Weeks being No. 6 on same; that she was thereupon appointed by the Department, and her payroll for the month of May sent to the Commission, but that he had deducted her name for the reason that the promotion was not regular. It appearing, however, that all persons higher on the list than Miss Weeks had since declined the appointment to the position of Supervising Nurse on Randall's Island, the Secretary was instructed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the payroll and forward the same to the Finance Department for audit.

A communication was presented from the Department of Public Charities, requesting that the Commission conduct an open competitive examination for the position of Steward, in order that it might fill an existing vacancy at a salary of \$1,200 per annum. The matter was laid over.



A report of the Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class, Department of Public Charities, dated May 1, was approved upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner.

A report of the Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class, Board of Education, dated June 13, was approved upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner.

The reassignment to duty of John W. Hoeges, Watchman in the Department of Docks and Ferries, was approved, it appearing from the certificate furnished that he had been ill since April 16, 1906.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated June 20, stating that an appropriation had recently been made for the construction of an asphalt repair plant in the Borough of Brooklyn, and requesting that the position of Superintendent of said plant be exempted from examination. The Secretary was instructed to inform President Coler that it would be necessary for him to furnish more specific information on the subject, as the Commission could not see that he had advanced any reason for taking the position out of the competitive class.

A communication was presented from the Comptroller, dated June 21, requesting an amendment of the classification of positions in the exempt class in his Department by including therein the following:

"Supervising Statistician and Examiner."

A public hearing was ordered for Monday, July 2, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

A communication was presented from the Acting Mayor, dated June 27, requesting an amendment of the classification of positions in the exempt class, under the heading "Mayor's Office," by substituting for the title "Assistant Secretary" the following:

"Executive Secretary."

A public hearing was ordered for Monday, July 2, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

A communication was presented from the Superintendent of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, dated June 22, asking that the name of Frank A. McGrath, who was appointed as a Watchman by him, and who served eighteen days in that capacity, be restored to the list from which it was taken, for the reason that McGrath was not physically able to fill the strenuous position of Caretaker in that institution, and submitting the certificate of a physician to that effect. The request was granted.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the examination for promotion to the grade of Assistant Engineer in the Department of Bridges, which examination was ordered by the Commission on May 10, 1906, be and the same hereby is cancelled at the request of the Department.

The Secretary was directed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the payroll of Jeremiah Crowley in the amount of \$14.52, and that of Thomas F. O'Rourke in the amount of \$40.83, for back pay due them as Watchmen in the Department of Docks and Ferries, said payrolls having been forwarded to the Commission for its certification upon the recommendation of the Comptroller, and in accordance with the advice of the Acting Corporation Counsel.

The leave of absence, without pay, for three months from July 1, granted James C. Owen, Inspector of Sewers in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, was approved, it appearing from the certificate furnished that said leave of absence was granted on account of illness.

A communication was presented from the Supervisor of the City Record, dated June 20, stating that a leave of absence, without pay, from July 1 to October, 1906, had been granted Mr. Thomas Dwyer, Jr., an Examiner, on account of illness, and furnishing a certificate to that effect. The Secretary stated that Mr. Dwyer had been granted a leave of absence on January 1, 1906, which would expire July 1. He was directed to call the attention of the Department to the fact that it was the Commission's invariable rule not to allow prolonged leaves of absence, and that it would be necessary to drop Mr. Dwyer's name from the payroll at the expiration of the six months' leave of absence allowed him on January 1.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the appointment of J. H. Lanigan as Marine Engineer in the Department of Public Charities be and the same hereby is approved for a period of seven days from June 25, under the provisions of Rule XII, paragraph 4.

Resolved, That the Chief Examiner be and he hereby is directed to proceed with a non-competitive examination of the following named persons to qualify them for employment as Topographical Draughtsmen in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, with salary at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII, paragraph 3:

Resolved, That the appointment of Constant A. Benoit to the position of Chemist in the Department of Health, with salary at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, be and the same hereby is approved for a period of one week from June 26, under the provisions of Rule XII, paragraph 4.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Correction, dated June 26, transmitting, with a request for the Commission's approval of same, supplementary pay roll bearing the name of Miss Elizabeth Tynan as Clerk "with knowledge of stenography and typewriting," for services rendered from June 4 to June 30, at the rate of \$900 per annum. The Secretary stated that Miss Tynan had been appointed from the list of Stenographer and Book-Typewriter, but that as no such position had been created by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen for the Department of Correction, the Commissioner wished the Civil Service Commission to pass her pay roll under the title first stated. The request was denied, and the Secretary was instructed to inform the Commissioner of Correction that the Commission had altogether discontinued the use of dual titles, the same being, in its opinion, undesirable and improper.

The Secretary was directed to address a communication to the President of the Board of Education, with reference to his communication of the 15th inst., consenting to the transfer of Mr. F. B. Sherwin, Architectural Draughtsman, from his Department to the Board of Water Supply; and to state that, in view of the recent criticism of the Board of Education to the effect that the Civil Service Commission was unable to furnish names to enable it to appoint a sufficient number of Architectural Draughtsmen to do the work that it had on hand, his action in giving consent to such transfer seemed to call for some explanation; and to further call his attention to the fact that although his requisition under date of May 1 for names from which to appoint thirty Architectural Draughtsmen stated that the salaries to be paid such persons would range from \$1,500 to \$1,800 per annum, the candidates who were certified by the Commission informed it that the offer of appointment made to them was at the rate of \$17.50 a week, and to request that he inform the Commission of the reason for same.

The communication from Louis Wice, of No. 485 Smith street, Brooklyn, alleging a violation of the Civil Service Law and Rules in the Department of Docks and Ferries, and presenting specifications of such violation, which was ordered continued on the calendar at the Commission's meeting of June 20, was again considered. The Secretary was instructed to submit a copy of the communication to Commissioner Bensel, with a request that he report on the matter at the earliest possible date.

The request of Mrs. Maria Scannell, No. 244 East Fifty-first street, that her name be restored to the preferred list for Attendant, was granted, she having furnished the certificate of a physician to the effect that her reason for declining appointment in the Department of Docks and Ferries was illness.

The request of Ulysses S. Lutz, an employee of the Department of Finance, that the Commission's records be changed to show that he declined appointment to the position of Assistant Engineer in the Borough of The Bronx on the score of "insufficient compensation," rather than "location," was denied, he having originally declined on the former ground and later having appealed to the Commission to change its records, which was done.

A communication was presented from H. Bohn, Esq., business agent of the Copper-smiths' Union, dated June 19, requesting an amendment of the Commission's classification of labor positions by adding thereto the title "Coppersmith." The Secretary was instructed to state that if the request was renewed in the month of September the Commission would be very glad to give the matter careful consideration at that time.

The request of Charles Salsman, No. 1529 Avenue A., that his name be restored to the list for Axeman, was granted upon his statement that he declined appointment in

the Borough of Richmond because he had signified his willingness to accept an appointment in the Board of Water Supply, and expected to receive such appointment, which, however, did not materialize.

A communication was presented from Frank A. Acer, Esq., attorney for the People's Security Company, dated June 21, requesting on behalf of "an association of this City composed of the Engineers who are employed by The City of New York," that the title "Engineman" be changed to "Engineer." The Secretary was instructed to inform Mr. Acer that if he would renew his request in the month of September the Commission would be very glad to give the matter careful consideration at that time.

The request of Joseph J. Maher, No. 65 Housman street, Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the list of Patrolman, was denied, it appearing that the said name was dropped by the Commission at a meeting held November 29, 1905, for the reason that the candidate's application contained a misstatement as to his age, he being less than twenty-one, the minimum age fixed for the position of Patrolman.

The request of Fred Vollweiler, No. 696 Brunswick avenue, Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the list for Architectural Draughtsman, was granted upon his statement that the memorandum of the Board of Education, to the effect that he declined appointment in that Department on the ground that he had accepted employment in another Department, was incorrect.

A communication was presented from George C. Schreiber, No. 243 West One Hundred and Ninth street, dated June 6, stating that he was in St. Vincent's Hospital undergoing an operation at the time he was notified for a physical re-examination for Patrolman (he having been rejected by the Board of Police Surgeons for physical disability), and requesting that he be given another opportunity to prove his qualification for appointment. The request was denied.

A communication was presented from Messrs. August C. Seibert, Max McKenzie, John A. Oberle and William K. Jones, protesting against the certification of names from the list of Inspector of Light and Ventilation for appointment to the position of Sanitary Inspector in the Department of Health in the absence of a list for the latter position, and stating that, in their opinion, the most appropriate list from which to certify was that of Inspector of Plumbing. The communication was ordered filed.

The request of Patrick J. Murray, No. 514 West One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, that he be permitted to change the name on his applications for Fireman and Patrolman from Joseph P. Murray to Patrick Joseph Murray was granted, he having produced a satisfactory certificate from St. Elizabeth's Church, New York City, to the effect that the latter is the name under which he was baptized.

The request of Louis Furchtenicht, No. 200 West One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, that his name be restored to the list for Architectural Draughtsman was granted, on his statement that the memorandum from the Board of Education to the effect that he declined an appointment in that department for the reason that he had accepted employment in another department was incorrect, as his reason for declining the position offered him was insufficiency of the compensation offered.

A communication was presented from James McDade, No. 207 Freeman street, Brooklyn, dated June 17, requesting that his name be restored to the list for Patrolman. It appeared that the candidate was rejected by the Board of Police Surgeons on the score of physical disability, and that his name was therefore dropped from the list; that he was subsequently notified by the Commission to appear, with a number of other candidates, for a physical re-examination, in order to settle the disputed question of their qualification for appointment to the position of Patrolman, and that he failed to respond to such notice. The request was denied.

The resignation of Isaac T. Flatto, No. 170 East Ninety-fifth street, from the position of Monitor was accepted.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the fact that four Typewriting Copyists, who were receiving salary of \$600 per annum, had been dismissed from the Department of Health for "lack of work," that under the Civil Service Law and Rules the names of three of these persons, they having completed their probationary period, would be placed upon a preferred list for reappointment at the same salary, while the name of the fourth person would have to be restored to the eligible list from which she was appointed, for the reason that she had not completed her probationary period, and that she would therefore be eligible for reappointment from that list at a higher compensation, if offered, which would result in an injustice to the other three candidates. The Secretary was directed to certify the four names for appointment to the position of Typewriting Copyist, at \$750 per annum, a requisition having been made for eligibles for such appointment.

The Commission then adjourned, to meet Monday, July 2, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

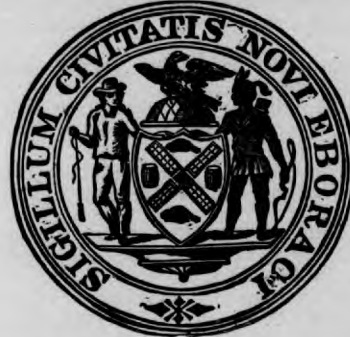

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any part of the profit thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
