PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 1194. S. G. Collins-Communication Regarding Elevator Safety Appliance Ordinance (No. 189).

503 Fifth Avenue, New York City, N. Y., Jan. 23, 1917.

The Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Referring to the Elevator Safety Appliance Ordinance, No. 189 (Introductory Number 1004), now pending before your Honorable body, I desire to call your attention to the favorable report made upon a revision of a similar ordinance by a former Committee on Buildings of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as shown by the issue of Dec. 22, 1914, of the CITY RECORD, part of which report is

That a careful consideration was given to section 10 (of ordinance 1071) providing that all passenger elevators must be equipped with some device that will automatically prevent the car from being moved while the shaft door at which the car is standing is unlocked, and fixing the times within which all existing elevators shall be equipped with such devices. An analysis of the Coroner's records for the years 1909 to 1911, inclusive, shows that there were 251 (fatal) accidents in connection with elevators which resulted in one or more fatalities. Of these accidents 119 were found to be in connection with passenger elevators. A study of the accidents themselves shows that in 85 per cent (95 in number) of the accidents the fatalities reported would probably not have resulted if devices of the kind required by this ordinance had been applied. It was further found that these fatal accidents were distributed as follows:

In stores

It is also found that these fatal accidents occur about as frequently in low rise as in high rise elevators, the figures being as follows:

A list of thirteen devices, some mechanical in operation and some electrical, was submitted as being sufficiently tried to indicate that they will probably meet the requirements of the ordinance. Of these seven have been found to be already in use, in the City of New York, and one now in process of installation. These devices, so far as applied in New York, are distributed in 25 buildings and represent from 75 to 100 elevators. It is also learned that similar devices are now in process of installation in seven buildings in addition to those referred to. Replies to inquiries of the owners, agents and superintendents of 19 of these buildings already equipped indicate that the devices have given satisfaction. Not one of these replies indicated that the devices did not serve their purpose. Some of these devices have been in use for a considerable time, those in the Metropolitan Building, for instance, having been installed seven years ago and in constant use. The following extracts from those who replied will indicate the general tenor of them:

Walter Stabler, Comptroller, Metropolitan Life Ins. Co., Nov. 4, 1914.

'I even believe the locking devices to be more necessary than speed safeties on the cars, as the accidents caused by breaking cables are much less likely than the shaft accidents.

'May I say, in addition, that in all buildings upon which this Company makes building loans, we require that the elevators shall be equipped with the interlocking car and door device, and we refuse to pass plans that did not provide for them.'

Starrett & Van Vleeck, architects for the Lord & Taylor Department Store. November 16, 1914:

'As to our judgment of the value of such an appliance generally on elevators, it seems to us that something of this sort must come. We are in favor of any good and successful device to enhance the safety of the elevator doors. John I. Downey, Inc., builders of the apartment house at 76th Street and Broadway, November 15, 1914:

'This device was installed by us after considerable investigation and we

believe will give satisfactory results." Bing & Bing, real estate operators, November 12, 1914:

'We believe that a device of this kind, to prevent a car from starting before the door to the elevator shaft is closed, is very desirable.'

Copeland Townshend, manager, Hotel Imperial, November 11, 1914: We have found them in the main very satisfactory, principally because it requires the boy to close the door of the car before starting.

Frank Case, Hotel Algonquin, November 9, 1914:

'We have had no difficulties with it, and I consider it a necessary part of a first class elevator equipment.' H. E. Morrell, Chief Engineer, Builders Exchange, Nov. 14, 1914:

There is absolutely no delay in the service rendered our tenants, as the operation of the cars is not retarded in the least by the elevator door safety system. The tenants are given better service since the installation of the elevator safety system, and are now absolutely protected against accidents. The prevention of elevator accidents insured by the safety appliances

removes the nervous strain that our operators were formerly subjected to.' Mark Eidlitz & Son, builders of the Altman Department Store, November 23, 1914:

'One reason for including such devices in the contract was that we felt the law would soon require such devices in all buildings of the Altman store

Based on these considerations, and after consultation with the Corporation Counsel's office, a substitute ordinance is herewith submitted and recommended

Your attention is also called to the letter from the City Club, which was printed in the CITY RECORD of February —, 1915, and the letter of the Citizens' Union, which was printed in the CITY RECORD of May 13th, 1915, both of which influential civic organizations urged that legislation be enacted requiring passenger elevators to be equipped with approved door safety appliances. Copies of the favorable report made by H. H. Murdock, expert, appointed by the Merchants' Association of New York City, and of the report made by the Wainright-Phillips Legislative Commission, recommending that the law be amended so as to require that automatic elevator door safety appliances be installed on all elevators in factories; also reports favoring the use of approved automatic elevator door safety appliance systems, signed by the chief inspectors or officials of the Casualty Company of America, Ocean Accident and Guarantee Co., General Accident Co., Globe Indemnity Co., Aetna Insurance Co., Travelers Insurance Co. and Standard Accident Co., have been heretofore filed with the Committee on Buildings. The marked improvements made in automatic elevator door safety systems during the past two years have made same absolutely reliable, efficient and dependable. Respectfully submitted. S. G. COLLINS.

Gentlemen-We hereby request your Honorable Board, under the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, to recommend to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of the position in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of Consultant, Health and Hospitals, for one incumbent, without salary.

The experience of the city government in dealing with the many phases of promoting and safeguarding the public health and caring for the sick has made it clearly evident that there is acute and urgent need for a closer co-ordination of the activities of those hospitals which are directly under city control, not only between the groups under separate departmental jurisdiction but with the large private hospitals of the city. It is also the belief of those who have given the subject earnest study that the city government should develop a closer relation than now exists with the great body of physicians who make up the medical and surgical profession in the city.

The pressing need for immediate action in these fields has been specifically demonstrated the past summer by the experience during the epidemic of infantile paralysis and by the subsequent problems having to do with the after care of the sufferers from that disease. It is also sharply illustrated by the growing needs of the Departments of Public Charities, Correction, Police and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for adequate and co-ordinated facilities for the care of atypical cases which become city charges. In the field of research there is obviously opportunity for far more important and beneficent results than have yet been obtained by increased co-operation among city departments and between them and private agencies.

It appears hardly necessary to multiply instances of the opportunities which exist for improvements in the present methods. The larger and more important of the things to be done must be brought about by intelligent action on the part of the appropriating body of the city, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It is for this reason that your Committee urges the creation of an official position as Consultant to this Board. Dr. S. S. Goldwater, formerly Commissioner of the Department of Health, is generally regarded as the foremost man in the field of hospital and health organization. At the urgent solicitation of the Mayor he has consented to come in the capacity of Consultant to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the remainder of the year 1917 without salary. The Committee feels that it would be neglecting a public duty if it failed to take advantage of Dr. Goldwater's

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen—On December 22, 1916, the COMMISSIONER OF DOCKS AND FERRIES presented a complaint from the Boilermakers of the Department that they were not receiving the prevaling rate of wages. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"The Boilermakers in the Department of Docks and Ferries, in a communication to the Commissioner, relate several attempts in the past to secure an increase

in rate above \$3.50 per diem, and conclude as follows: "'In May, 1916, the rate was increased to \$5 per day by the International

Brotherhood of Boilermakers. 'The justness of our claim will be appreciated when you consider the fact

that Helpers in all the skilled trades receive as much wages as we, who are skilled mechanics of from six to ten years' experience.' "The Mechanical Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries stated

as follows: "'Boilermakers make repairs to boilers on ferryboats and other boats of the department. They also make repairs on the iron structure of the boats. When not so engaged they do shop work.'

"Mr. H. C. Hunter, Secretary of the National Association of Metal Trades, stated as follows:

'There are few all-round Boilermakers in New York. The men here generally specialize as Riveters, Fitters, Chippers or Caulkers. Hundreds of these specialists are now employed in large marine concerns like the Robins Dry Dock Company, the Morse Dry Dock and Repair Company and the Staten Island Ship Building Company. The rate paid is \$3.75 per diem, an advance of 50 cents per diem since the outbreak of the European war.

'The men work eight hours a day and are paid double time for all overtime in the shop and two-and-a-half time for overtime work on board ship,

which is more exposed and arduous. "'The rate generally paid in "field work" is \$4 for Holders-on and Helpers and \$4.50 or \$5 for all-round Boilermakers employed at installing or repairing boilers in buildings.

"'With the present demand for workmen marine Boilermakers on overtime earn \$40 to \$60 a week on rushed jobs. The positions, of course, are not permanent, but the payrolls of marine concerns now show big earnings for a large proportion of their Boilermakers.'

'Certain firms pay a five per cent. bonus on marine work, in addition to the regular wage. There is no provision for overtime in City employ.

"Other employers stated to the examiner as follows:

"Craven's Steam Boiler Works, India Street, Brooklyn-'We pay all-round Boilermakers \$4.50 per diem, and specialists \$3.50. We employ four to six men.'

"James Shewan & Son, Twenty-seventh Street, Brooklyn"We employ 500 to 600 Marine Boilermakers, and pay them \$3.75 per day."

"Treadwell Engineering Company, Cedar Street, Manhattan—
"We pay Boilermarkers \$5 a day and Helpers \$4 on outside work. We

employ 20 to 25 men on the average.' "Roy Engineering and Iron Works, Bay Street, Brooklyn-

"'We employ 25 to 30 Boilermakers at stationary work, and pay \$4 a day to all-round men.

"Dover Boiler Works, Church Street, Manhattan-

"'We pay Boilermakers at stationary work \$5 a day, and Helpers \$4. We employ 25 men. "B. Franklin Hart, Jr., & Co., Church Street, Manhattan-

"We employ four or five Boilermakers, who instal boilers in buildings.

We pay them \$5 per diem. "D. M. Nichols Iron Works, Gouverneur Street, Manhattan-

"'We do marine work, and pay 25 Boilermakers \$3.50 to \$3.75 a day.'

"M. F. Dunne, West Street, Manhattan-"I pay \$4.25 to stationary and \$3.50 to Marine Boilermakers. I employ

10 men. "Alexander Reid & Company, Charles Street, Manhattan-

"We employ 15 to 20 Boilermakers, and pay them \$3.50 to \$3.75 a day." "Siemund & Wenzel, Broadway, Manhattan-

"'We do marine work only, and pay ten Boilermakers \$4 per diem.'
"Petroleum Iron Works Company, Church Street, Manhattan—

"'We have no job on at present. Three months ago we had 60 Boilermakers We paid Caulkers and Riveters \$4.50 a day, and Helpers \$3.75. 'The President of Boilermakers' Local No. 21 stated as follows:

"'As to the condition in the marine part of the trade, we have had much trouble with open shops doing work around the harbor, and have been unable to enforce the per diem scale paid by other employers. It is claimed that Marine Boilermakers are a separate class, and are paid a lower rate, for the reason that if the wages were increased, employers would lose much of their business, as owners of vessels would defer repairs to machinery now done here until their return to Europe, where low wages are paid to workmen. This was the condition before the European war that kept wages on ship work down. The situation is different now.

"We do not recognize classes among Boilermakers and Iron Ship Builders. In large shops work may be specialized, but not always. In general work in the trade a man cannot always be employed on boilers. If he had to depend upon boiler work he could not make a living. A man is employed on other iron work similar to the chipping and riveting done on boilers. Repairing boilers in buildings is the same class of work as repairing boilers on ships."

'It will be seen from the statements of the above employers taken at random from a list of 50 that Boilermakers of the different classes receive from \$3.75 to \$5 per diem, and some an additional bonus. Those receiving \$5 a day are in the 12th Floor, New York, January 16, 1917.

"In large marine establishments the work is specialized, and the lower rate paid to men employed at one specialty. The men in the Department of Docks may be classed as all-round marine Boilermakers and are qualified for riveting, chipping, fitting and caulking.

The union does not recognize a distinction as between marine workers and workmen in shops and buildings, while employers have been able to maintain a difference in rates.

"While the union has tried to enforce a uniform rate of \$5 per diem, it is apparent that a majority of Boilermakers in Greater New York do not receive that rate. However, in the present condition of the trade, largely owing to the European war, it would be fair and equitable to allow all-round Boilermakers in City employ a rate of \$4.50 per diem. Certain Helpers, or Specialists, are now

paid \$4 per diem.
"The annual cost for an increase of \$1.50 per diem requested for Boilermakers in the Department of Docks would be \$5,308.50. The proposed rate of \$4.50 the proposed dropping of Boilermakers during the year in this department, through the introduction of the Catskill water supply.

In view of the foregoing facts, we recommend that the attached resolutions approving a \$4.50 per diem rate for Boilermakers, and requesting the heads of City departments where these men are employed to provide for the increase, be adopted.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen-On December 27, 1916, the COMMISSIONER OF PLANT AND STRUCTURES transmitted a communication from the Business Representative of the United Housesmiths' and Bridgemen's Union No. 40, stating that the rate of wages for Structural Iron Workers would be \$5.50 per diem on and after January 1, 1917. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"The present rate for Housesmiths and Bridgemen in City departments is \$5.30 per diem. The anual cost for increase in wages of 20 cents per diem for those employees would be as follows:

"The Commissioner of the National Erectors' Association of Employers stated:

"'The National Erectors' Association voted an increase in the wages of structural iron workers for New York City and territory within 35 miles of the City Hall from 66 1-4 cents to 68 3-4 cents per hour for an eight-hour day, the increase to take effect January 1, 1917.

"'The Iron League Erectors' Association, composed of the majority of the large erecting concerns of the City, adopted the same wage increase. I am advised that following this increase by these associations the union adopted the rate of 683-4 cents an hour as the scale for the New York district.

'The great bulk of the work in this district is done by contractors who are members of either the Iron League Erector's Association or of the National Erectors' Association, so that the rate of 683-4 cents an hour would be the present prevailing rate in this district.'

"The Secretary of the Building Trades Employers' Association stated:
"Our records show that the rate of \$5.50 per diem of eight hours, or 683-4 cents per hour, is paid by our members, beginning with January 1, 1917, to outside iron workers, known as housesmiths, bridgemen or riveters. It is safe to estimate that 90 per cent. of the men employed in Greater New York are now receiving \$5.50 per diem. These men are employed on the construction of new buildings, bridge building or repairing, etc. The rate of \$5.30 paid to inside workers on iron stairways, railings, ornamental iron work, etc., will be increased to \$5.50 per diem on September 1, 1917.'

"Members of the above three organizations employ nearly all the structural iron workers in this district outside of City departments.

"It is evident from the statements of the official representatives of the employers that the prevailing rate of wages for the large majority of Housesmiths and Bridgemen in the City of New York at the present time is \$5.50 per diem.

In view of the above facts, we recommend that the attached resolutions, approving the \$5.50 per diem rate for Housesmiths and Brigemen, and requesting the heads of City departments to provide for the increased, be adopted. Respectfull

Fire Commissioner-Request for Authority to Place a Six-Cylinder Power Plant in a Hook and Ladder Truck Without Public Letting.

Fire Department of The City of New York, January 18, 1917. Hon. Frank L. Dawling, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir-As the result of an accident, collision with an elevated column, the aerial hook and ladder truck assigned to Hook and Ladder Company No. 132, in Brooklyn, had the power plant wrecked, and the apparatus is now out of service.

A complete six-cylinder power plant, costing \$1,450, is required to get this ap-

paratus back in service.

If proposals to furnish this power plant were advertised for, there could be only one bidder, and the City would be put to the expense of printing specifications, advertising in the CITY RECORD, and the contractor would unquestionably add the cost of security bond and disbursements to his bid, and probably take all the time allowed by the contract to make delivery, while a delivery will be made within ten days on an open market order. It is requested, therefore, that you grant perm to make this purchase in the open market without public letting, this being for the best interests of the City.

This aerial truck is now in the shops occupying valuable floor space and would hamper to some extent the work in the shops if a considerable number of apparatus came in for repairs at the same time, which frequently occurs at this season of the year. The importance of getting this piece of apparatus out of the shops and back in service at the earliest possible moment cannot be overstated. It is further requested therefore, that this matter be acted on at the next meeting of the Board of Aldermen. Respectfully, ROBERT ADAMSON, Fire Commissioner.

A permit, for a period not to exceed one year, to kindle, build, maintain and use a fire in or upon a [public] street for the purpose of conducting a trade

or business may be issued by the fire commissioner upon an application giving such

information as may be required by him, and upon receipt of a fee of \$2; except that no

§6. Street fires; permits required.

fee shall be required for permits issued for the kindling and maintaining of [such] fires for the sole purpose of destroying fallen leaves outside of the fire limits. A permit to kindle, build, maintain and use a fire within the fire limits for the burning of rubbish or fallen leaves may be issued upon the receipt of a fee of \$0.50 for each fire. Such a permit must be kept at all times at the location of the fire while the fire is burning. No permit shall be issued, however, to kindle, build, maintain or use a fire-

(a) Within 15 feet of a fire hydrant;(b) Within 2 feet of the surface of any stone pavement;

(c) On, or within 2 feet of the surface of any asphalt pavement, except for the purpose of repairing, removing or constructing the same.

A fire kindled, built and maintained under a permit, issued in conformity with the provisions of this section, shall be continuously under the care and direction of a competent person from the time it is kindled until it is extinguished.

No. 1004 (Ord. No. 189) Report of the Committee on Buildings in Favor of Filing an Ordinance to Amend

the Code of Ordinances Relating to "Elevators." The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on November 21, 1916 (Minutes, page 650), the annexed ordinance to amend article 27, chapter 5, of the Code of Ordinances, relating to elevators, by adding thereto a new section, respectfully

REPORTS: That a public hearing on this ordinance was held on January 19, 1917.

There appeared in support of the ordinance Alderman John F. McCourt, the introducer, and several representatives of interlocking device manufacturers. In opposition to the ordinance appeared representatives of several Real Estate

and Civic Associations, and individual Real Estate owners, who, while favoring any workable device that will safeguard the public using elevators, find, however, that none have been produced which will accomplish the purpose of this ordinance.

The Committee believes, in view of the facts presented, that the adoption of this ordinance will be a grave injustice to the owners of buildings having elevators. It further believes that action should be deferred until such time as a device can

be installed with assurance that it will operate under all conditions and have the approval of the authorities having jurisdiction. It, therefore, recommends that the accompanying ordinance be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 27, chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, relat-

ing to elevators, by adding thereto a new section. Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Article 27 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to elevators, is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section, to read as follows:

§ 569. Safety devices. Every clevator moving in a vertical shaft, used for carrying passengers, now this ordinance becomes effective, have placed thereon or attached thereto some mechanical or electro-mechanical interlocking device that will automatically prevent the elevator car from being moved in either direction until the shaft door or gate at which the elevator car is standing is safely closed and securely fastened.

The rules promulgated by the superintendent of buildings under the provisions of this ordinance shall fix the requirements for the devices prescribed by this section. The superintendent of buildings shall approve for use any device that may conform to the requirements of this section and the rules adopted thereunder, as soon as possible after such device or drawings of the same have been submitted to him, and no device shall be considered as meeting requirements until it has been approved by the superintendent of buildings, Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Many of the more dissatisfied employees, who were our oldest and best men, have left, to take positions elsewhere at higher pay, and as better wages are easily obtained outside the City service, other employees are threatening to leave.

It is very important that Street Cleaning work be carried on without interruption and with the utmost regularity, and how to do so is a very serious problem, in

view of our inability to hold the men.

We desire to remedy this situation by raising the wages of our poorer paid men, commencing January 1st, 1917, and for this purpose \$9,264 is required. Your Board is therefore respectfully requested to authorize the issuance of special revenue bonds in the amount named, \$9,264, to be used as follows: \$6,048 00 for increasing the wages of 126 sweepers from \$744 to \$792 per annum.

state as follows: On December 28th, 1916, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning to expend an additional amount not exceeding \$29,753.56 for temporary increases in

compensation for various employees, including Sweepers, Drivers and Hostlers, who are to receive pay at a minimum rate of \$792, \$840 and \$792, respectively. The reason for the above mentioned increases in compensation is due to the fact

that the Department of Street Cleaning is unable to maintain the uniformed force at full strength on account of the unusual conditions prevailing in the labor market at the present time.

Inasmuch as labor conditions in the Borough of Richmond are similar to those in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, I would recommend that funds to the amount of \$8,736 be provided to increase 126 Sweepers from \$744 to \$792; 50 Drivers, \$792 to \$840; 4 Drivers, \$768 to \$840. As Hostlers in the Borough of Richmond are provided at \$792, the same rate as authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for Manhattan, no increase is recommended in this case. AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 4 of section 149 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to stands within stoop lines and under elevated railway stations, effective July 13, 1916.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Subdivision 4 of section 149 of article 13 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

4. License fees; term. The annual license fee for a stand under the stairs of an elevated railroad station shall be \$10. All stands within the stoop line shall be classified, and the annual license fee therefor shall be fixed and collected as specified in the schedule following:

(a) Stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, \$5;

(b) Stands for the sale of fruits, or soda water or both, \$10;

(c) Stands for the sale of cigars, or cigarettes, or tobacco, or the three, \$5; (d) Stands for the sale of candies or confectionery articles, or both, \$5;

(e) Boot black stands, each chair, \$5.

A license may be issued in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this section, and in the discretion of the commissioner, covering the sale of any combination of the classes of goods mentioned above, to be sold, however, from only one stand not exceeding the legal size hereinafter prescribed in this section; except that where boot black chairs are included in the combination, the space hereinafter prescribed for boot black chairs may be allowed in addition to the stand for the sale of other articles. The fees to be paid for such combination licenses shall be calculated in accordance with the above schedule for each kind of article permitted to be sold, or for each boot black chair to be operated.

No license shall be required for stands within stoop lines for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, or both, in cases when such stands are conducted by dealers who are the owners or occupants of the premises or stores in front of which the same are situated. Licenses for stands within stoop lines or under the stairs of any elevated railway station shall be issued as of December 1, and shall expire on the 30th day of November next succeeding the date of issuance thereof [.], excepting that appliproceeds whereof to be used by the Board of Education for the purpose of cants for licenses in the interim between the license year shall be charged by fee in defraying cost of removal and re-erection of a school building in the Bronx. proportion to the months of occupancy, fractions of months, however, not to be taken

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on December 19, 1916 (Minutes, page 805), the annexed opinion of the Corporation Counsel relative to the power of the Board of Aldermen to investigate economic conditions relating to the cost of the necessaries of life, respectfully REPORTS:

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, December 18, 1916.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York: Sirs-I have received from the City Clerk a copy of a resolution adopted by your

Board which reads as follows:

"Whereas, Economic conditions relating to the cost of the necessaries of life prevailing in this city are of a nature indicating serious consequences in the near future, if permitted to continue or allowed to develop with impunity; be it

'Resolved. That the Committee on General Welfare be and it hereby is directed to report to this Board at as early a day as possible a practical plan for investigating such conditions, with a view of adopting such ordinances, recommending such legislation, or taking such steps as might be best calculated to remedy the evil; and be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Health be requested to report to this Board the storage condition existing in this city, relating to the storage of the necessaries of life, that the exact situation in this regard may be correctly knows: and be it further

'Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise this Board as to the extent of its power as a municipal legislative body, consistent with existing law, in connection with this general subject to the end that the threatened evil may be avoided by ordinances or speedy, well-considered recommendations to the proper authorities, Municipal, State and National."

The question thus submitted does not admit of a definite answer. It involves and imposes the necessity of first ascertaining the cause of the condition in order then to arrive at a conclusion as to whether particular legislation by you would come

within your powers. Your power to legislate is confined to purely municipal affairs and is circumscribed by the Charter and by the State and Federal Constitutions. The Charter does not expressly empower you to legislate upon the subject described in this resolution, so that if you have any power in that respect it must be referred to your general police powers under the commonly called General Welfare Clause of the Charter.

I am not advised what particular legislation you have in mind, either for adoption by your body or for recommendation to other authorities, but any ordinance which you might enact under your general police power may be upheld only if it should justly relate to the preservation of the health, morals or safety of the com-

If by "economic conditions relating to the costs of the necessaries of life," as those words are used in the resolution, you mean a condition resulting from the natural operation of the law of supply and demand, no remedial legislation within the scope of your jurisdiction suggests itself to me; if you mean an artificial condition produced by combinations in restraint of trade, or by contracts creating monopolies, the subject is already completely covered by general laws of the State inhibiting and punishing such acts.

The direct control of the price of a commodity is, in my opinion, beyond the

pale of your jurisdiction. Whatever your power, or the power of a Committee of your Board, with respect to the investigation of conditions, it is not an effective power—that is, one which may be enforced by compulsory process against witnesses-when invoked in aid of your legislative power, unless the subject before you is one upon which you have jurisdiction to legislate, and I find no authority for the exercise of such power as a basis for recommendation to other officers. Be It Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 1 of article 1 of chapter 11 of the Code of Ordinances, relating holders of stand licensees as to be almost negligible. Licenses issued for the purposes specified in this section shall expire one year from the date of issuance

When the 1916 budget was prepared, allowances were made for specific repairs to be made to the buildings of the above institutions together with those in the other institutions of the Department. Specifications for all of the repair work were made, and while there were insufficient funds to advertise and enter into contract for all of this work, an opening of bids was held for the repairs to be made in the City Home District.

The lowest of a number of bids was \$37,580. The next low bidder for this particular contract was \$51,236. It was found that the specifications upon which the low bidder based his estimate, were incorrect in that some fifteen pages were entirely omitted and fifteen other pages were duplicated by the printer in binding these specifications. There has been insufficient time between the cancellation of this award of contract and the expiration of the current year's appropriation, to proceed with advertising for new bids.

In order that these repairs may be made as was intended by the appropriating bodies when the funds were granted, it is the desire of the Department to do this work by open market orders. Several bids have been obtained for each particular item of work provided for. It is desired to award to the low bidders for each of these particular repair jobs, and issue open market orders.

Experience shows that by this method much cheaper prices can be obtained and work performed more expeditiously than by grouping all of the work in one large contract and requiring bidders to file bonds and sureties, and necessitating the printing of specifications for minor repair work of this nature.

Your early attention to this matter will be very much appreciated.

The Committee on Public Thoroughfares, to which was referred on December 23, 1916 (Minutes, page 844), the annexed ordinance to amend section 252 of article 18 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to streets and particularly relating to tan bark on streets, respectfully

REPORTS:

That having examined the subject, it believes the application of this section is obsolete in so far as it applied to members of the Board of Aldermen. The permission is seldom requested. The Police Department has ample jurisdiction, and it is to obviate a duplication of authority that this ordinance is introduced.

The Committee therefore recommends that the accompanying ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend Section 252 of Article 18 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Streets and Particularly Relating to Tan Bark on Streets.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 252 of article 18 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Streets and particularly relating to Tan Bark on Streets, as contained in the Code of Ordinances adopted June 20, 1916, and approved July 6, 1916, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 252. Tan bark on streets. The mayor or [any alderman,] the department of health, the police commissioner, or the inspector or captain of police assigned to the precinct in which the premises are situated, shall, upon application, grant permission to lay tan bark in the carriageway in front of any premises occupied by a sick or convalescent person, to the extent of 500 feet in any direction from said premises; providing all expense of placing and removing the bark shall be paid by the person making such application. The bark so placed in any street shall be removed, upon the order of the commissioner of street cleaning, within 5 days after the recovery or death of such sick or convalescent person, and, upon failure or neglect to comply with such order, then it shall be removed by the commissioner, who may sue for and recover the cost of such removal in the manner provided for the collection of penalties

the collection of penalties.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
