### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, Held Thursday, May 31, 1917, at 10.30 A. M.

Present: Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was called on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Tenement House Department," the title "Secretary to the Superintendent—The Bronx." The Secretary submitted a letter from the Tenement House Commissioner dated May 26 in connection with the proposed amendment.

There were no appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I., for the Department of Public Charities, under the sub-heading "City Institutions," the following:

Assistant Alienist, \$1,500 per annum, with maintenance.

Rudolph Schaefer, a clerk in the Department of Public Charities, appeared and suggested that the maximum compensation be fixed at an amount not to exceed \$1,800 per annum. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I., for Bellevue and Allied Hospitals the position of Assistant Alienist at a compensation not to exceed \$1,500 per annum, with maintenance. George O'Hanlon, General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, appeared in favor of the proposed

amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held May 2 were approved.

On motion it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same is hereby amended by striking from the exempt class, under the heading "Tenement House Department," the following:

"Secretary to the Superintendent—The Bronx."

On motion, the matter of increasing the compensation for the position of Assistant Alienist for the Department of Public Charities and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals should the same be placed in Part I. of the Non-Competitive Class for those departments was referred to the Advisory Board.

Frank Oliver, Chief Clerk in the City Magistrates' Courts, appeared in connection with the assignment of Court Attendants to the work of taking finger-prints. In this connection the Commission considered a communication dated May 30 from the Chief City Magistrate. The Commission ruled that the assignments were not in violation of the law, in view of the fact that only a comparatively small proportion of the time of Court Attendants was given to work in connection with the taking of finger-prints.

Haven Emerson, Commissioner of the Department of Health, appeared in connection with his request of May 10 that he be permitted to present reasons why certain employees in the lower grades of service, particularly in hospitals, should not be required to furnish a certificate of citizenship inasmuch as the department had great difficulty in securing employees for those positions under any circumstances. The Secretary was instructed to take the matter up with the Corporation Counsel.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the persons named therein:

Resolved, That the name of Max Whitelaw, 26 E. 116th st., Manhattan, be and the same hereby is removed from the eligible lists of Superintendent of Mortuary and Deputy Tax Commissioner under the provisions of clause 14 of Rule VII. and placed upon the list of persons disqualified for employment in the City Service.

David Reardon and Charles Otte failed to appear, as directed, in connection with their requests that their names be removed from the list of persons disqualified for employment in the City Service and the Secretary was instructed to summon them to appear at the next regular meeting of the Commission.

John J. Donahy failed to appear, as directed, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Superintendent of Mortuary and the Secretary was instructed to summon him to appear at the next regular meeting of the Commission.

The Commission granted the appeal of Joseph Musgnug of 2171 Grand Concourse, The Bronx, for a re-rating on experience in his examination for the position of Janitor, it appearing that the candidate was entitled to a higher rating than that given him by the examiners who rated the paper.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals, the appeal of Martin C. ### FIRE DEPARTMENT.

#### REPORT FOR QUARTER ENDED MARCH 31, 1917.

##### Financial.

The budget appropriations made to this Department in the several boroughs for the year 1917, aggregate \$9,440,421.70. Of this amount there was expended during the first quarter of the current year the sum of \$2,296,731.43, leaving a balance of \$7,143,690.27 for use during the remainder of the year.

##### Uniformed Force.

On March 31, 1917, the membership of the Uniformed Force in all boroughs was 5,038. Included in this number are 74 chief officers, 10 of whom are medical officers; there were also four Chaplains.

At the close of the quarter there were in-service 303 companies, assigned to 44 battalions. There has been no increase of companies as compared with the total in service at the close of the first quarter of 1916.

During the quarter, 4,415 alarms for fires were received, of which 483 were false or unnecessary. For actual fires, 3,932 were received. Of this number, 2,989 were confined to the point of starting, and 465 to the buildings in which they originated; 62 extended to other buildings; 378 occurred in places other than buildings or vessels, and 38 on vessels in the harbor. The estimated quantity of water used for fire extinguishing purposes was 38,862,022 gallons, 15,521,732 gallons being salt water.

During the quarter, 73 ununiformed Firemen having satisfactorily completed their probationary period of three months, were appointed 4th grade Firemen, and 18 appointments as ununiformed Firemen on probation were made.

Promotions in the uniformed force, 29 in all, were made during the quarter as follows:

Captain to Chief of Battalion, 2; Lieutenant to Captain, 6; Engineer of Steamer to Lieutenant, 5; Fireman, 1st Grade, to Lieutenant, 3; Fireman 1st Grade, to Pilot, 1; Fireman, 2nd Grade, to Pilot, 2; Fireman, 1st Grade, to Engineer of Steamer, 10.

The number of retirements, on application, was 21 on half pay. For disability there were 11 retirements; also on half pay. The aggregate number of retirements was 32, with a total pension allowance of \$28,975, as against 57 for the corresponding period of 1916; involving a yearly outlay of \$43,516.66.

There was one resignation, one dismissal and the reinstatements numbered five. There were nine deaths of men on the active list and 13 of retired officers and men.

There were 739 cases of illness and 176 cases of injury treated by the medical officers, 915 in all, and the time lost from each course was 9,802 and 3,178 days, respectively, a total of 12,980 days. The aggregate of these cases for the first quarter of 1916, was 946, and the time lost therefrom, 14,057 days.

The number of men examined as to their fitness for probationary appointment was 20, the number rejected, none; the number of members of the uniformed force examined as to their fitness to continue in the service, 15; the number of former Firemen examined as to fitness for reinstatement, 4.

##### Civilian Force.

The civilian force on March 31, 1917, numbered 822.

##### Fire Alarm Telegraph.

At the close of the first quarter, the fire alarm telegraph system in the various boroughs consisted in mileage of cable and conductors in subways and of aerial conductor and circuit mileage (the latter both underground and aerial) as follows:

During the first quarter, contracts were awarded for 1,500 distribution post terminal boxes; 1,250 fire alarm boxes, 1,400 twin posts, 161 upper parts of posts for installing subsidiary pipes and erecting posts for the entire Manhattan system; for installing subsidiary pipes to all apparatus houses, schools and public buildings from the Battery to 14th Street; for installing subsidiaries in the Rockaways and for furnishing and delivering the materials necessary to complete the Rockaway improvement. The total value of the contracts awarded during the quarter was \$258,604.30. The total value of all contracts awarded to date for the new Manhattan system is \$870,964.91.

During the quarter there were tested at factories 2,189,198 feet of bare, and 5,317,646 feet of insulated wire; also 318,662 feet of cable. Field test was made of 5,790,456 feet of conductor and 187,803 feet of cable.

##### Fire Prevention.

During the period covered by this report, 38,286 inspections were made by the various divisions of the Bureau of Fire Prevention, as against 41,390 for the corresponding period of 1916, a decrease of 3,104. Orders served or mailed, totalled 8,507, as against 6,629 for the first quarter of last year, an increase of 1,878. These orders covered 20,129 items, as against 17,726 for the like period of 1916, an increase of 2,403. Orders complied with during the first quarter of 1917, amounted to 3,674, as against 4,140 for the first quarter of 1916, a decrease of 466. The numbers of items of orders complied with, was 8,624, as against 8,557 for the first quarter of last year, an increase of 67.

##### Fire Appliances.

During the first quarter in this Division, 19,745 inspections were made, 1,992 orders were served or mailed, containing 3,251 items, and 2,225 orders were complied with containing 4,767 items. Plans, 181 in all, for the installation of standpipes, sprinklers, fire escapes, etc., were filed with this Division.

##### Labor.

In the Labor Division, during the first quarter of the current year, the total number of orders served and mailed was 4,797, of which 4,218 were issued by the State Labor Department and 579 by the Bureau of Fire Prevention. The total number of orders complied with was 324, of which 242 were issued by the State Labor Department and 82 by the Bureau of Fire Prevention.

The items of orders served and mailed by this Division totalled 8,732, of which 7,702 pertained to orders issued by the State Labor Department and 1,030 to orders issued by the Bureau of Fire Prevention. Items of orders complied with numbered 431, of which 331 related to orders issued by the State Labor Department and 100 to orders issued by the Bureau of Fire Prevention.

##### Places of Public Assembly.

The inspection force of this Division of Places of Public Assembly during the first quarter of the current year made 1,236 original inspections. The reinspections during the same period numbered 5,606, all of which were of motion picture shows.

The number of standee violations reported during the quarter was 35. Of this number 33 were forwarded to the Corporation Counsel for collection of the prescribed penalty and two to the Department of Licenses for special action.

The number of orders served or mailed during this quarter was 116, embracing 636 items. Orders to the number of 75 were complied with, covering 285 items.

##### Combustibles and Explosives.

In the Division of Combustibles, all boroughs, the amount of receipts for licenses and permits was \$56,172, as against \$43,825 for the first quarter of 1916, an increase of \$12,347. Blasting operations, to the extent of 4,037, were supervised by civilian inspectors of blasting attached to the Division, and in 6,635 instances by members of the uniformed force, an aggregate of 10,672. Orders totalling 1,602 were served or mailed, embracing 7,510 items.

Orders to the number of 1,050 were complied with, containing 3,141 items. Inspections totalling 11,699 were made. Permits, 7,297 in all, were issued.

In the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond during the first quarter there were 2,387 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$2,239,798, representing an average loss per fire of \$938.33. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens during the same period there were 1,545 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$1,197,170 and an average loss per fire of \$774.86.

The total estimated loss by fire for the first quarter of the current year was \$3,436,968. During the corresponding period of 1916 the total estimated loss was \$2,461,581. This shows an increase of \$975,387, as compared with the first quarter of 1916.

The total number of fires during the first quarter of 1917 was 3,932, as against 3,644 for the corresponding period of 1916, an increase of 288.

The average loss per fire for the first quarter of 1917 was \$874.10, as against \$675.52 for the like period of 1916.

##### Arson.

During the first quarter of the current year in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond there were 2 arrests for arson, which, with 7 pending from the preceding quarter, made the number to be disposed of 9. Of this number 1 was convicted and sentenced and in two cases the Grand Jury failed to indict. This left 6 cases pending at the close of the quarter.

In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens during the same period there were 14 arrests for arson, which, with five pending from the previous quarter, made 19 to be disposed of. Of this number 10 were convicted. This left 9 cases pending at the close of the quarter.

There were in all boroughs 16 arrests for arson during the first quarter of 1917, as against 18 during the like period of 1916, a decrease of 2. The number of convictions during the first quarter of 1917 was 11, as against 12 for the corresponding period of 1916, a decrease of 1.

##### Apparatus.

During the period covered by this report 32 pieces of motor apparatus were received, under contract, consisting of 25 runabouts for chief officers, 2 front drive tractors, 1 three-section 75 hook and ladder truck, 2 regulation auto hose wagons, 1 combination auto chemical and hose wagon and 1 Cadillac touring car.

##### Hose.

During the first quarter of the current year there were supplied to this Department, under contract, 10,000 feet of 2½-inch cotton fire hose.

##### Buildings, Etc.

During the first quarter proposed contracts were submitted for the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for alterations to quarters of Engine Cos. 207 and 265 and Hook and Ladder Cos. 13 and 122; for new heating system at quarters of Hook and Ladder Co. 107, for new plumbing system at house of Engine Co. 207, for new electric lighting systems at Brooklyn headquarters and at various company buildings, and for miscellaneous repairs at a number of firehouses—the estimated cost of all the work aggregating \$28,940.

Minor repair jobs, 223 in all, were done to buildings by Department mechanics, involving an expenditure of \$7,811.16, and five by open market orders, at an expense of \$160.50.

##### Horses.

There were 728 horses in the service at the close of the first quarter, a decrease of 101, as compared with the total for the corresponding period of 1916, due to the progressive motorization of fire apparatus.

##### Division of Stores.

During the period covered by this report 26 requisitions for furniture, lineoleum, bedding, rugs, window shades, office cabinets, etc., calling for an expenditure of \$396.17, were turned over to the Division of Stores for investigation, with a resulting saving of \$187.42. There were likewise investigated, preliminary to distribution to companies, of supplies, 306 requisitions, on which a saving was effected of \$4,216.43.

Supplies for the paid and volunteer systems were received during the quarter to the amount of \$9,315.58. The supplies distributed to these companies aggregated the sum of \$7,832.18.

Contracts executed for furnishing motor apparatus, fire alarm boxes, semi-bituminous coal for fireboats, fireboat repairs, supplies of various kinds, and for telephone service; also for delivering and installing subsidiary pipes and fire alarm posts amounted, during the first quarter, to \$530,590.45.

Joint contracts executed during the same period for fuel, forage, lubricating and kerosene oil, automobile equipment and other supplies of various kinds totalled for the same period \$68,375.39.

Contract orders to the number of 405 were issued in the gross sum of \$303,725.69. The number of open market orders issued during the same period was 503, repre-



sending an expenditure of \$34,567.15. For the corresponding period of 1916 there were 557 open market orders, at an outlay of \$71,464.71. There was thus a decrease, as compared with the first quarter of 1916, of 54 in the number of open market orders issued and of \$36,897.56 in the outlay therefor, or of 52 per cent.

**Bureau of Fire Extinguishment.**

During the quarter, 4,415 alarms were received, of which 483 were false or unnecessary. Alarms to the number of 3,932 were received for actual fires. Of those, 2,989 were confined to the point of starting; 465 were confined to the buildings in which they originated; 62 extended to other buildings; 38 on vessels in the harbor, and 378 in places other than buildings or vessels.

In the extinguishment of fires, 38,862,022 gallons of water were used, 15,521,732 of which were salt water.

On March 31, 1917, the Uniformed Force consisted of 5,038 members, assigned (with the exception of 74 Chief Officers, 10 of whom are Medical Officers) to the 303 companies of the 44 battalions. There were also 4 Chaplains.

**Engineering Division.**

During the quarter contracts were awarded for 1,500 distribution post terminal boxes, 1,250 fire alarm boxes, 1,400 twin posts, 161 upper parts of posts, for installing subsidiary pipes and erecting posts for the entire Manhattan system; for installing subsidiary pipes to all apparatus houses, schools and public buildings from Battery to 14th Street; for installing subsidiaries in the Rockaways and for the furnishing and delivering of the materials necessary to complete the Rockaways improvement. The total value of the contracts awarded during the quarter is \$258,604.03. The total value of all the contracts awarded to date for the new Manhattan system is \$870,964.91.

The following is a summary of the work done during the quarter on the various contracts:

**Contract 100—Southwest Feeders.** This contract includes the furnishing, delivering and installing of 112,286 feet of feeder cables in the southwest section of the Borough of Manhattan, south of 82d Street. The work included in this contract is completed except the installation of approximately 6,260 feet of cable which cannot be installed until the ducts of the subway company are restored at locations where they were removed to permit of the construction of rapid transit subways.

**Contract 101—Southeast Feeders.** This contract includes the furnishing, delivering and installing of 87,307 feet of feeder cables in the southeast section of Manhattan, south of 82d Street. The work included in this contract has been completed except the installation of approximately 1,630 feet of cable which cannot be installed until the ducts of the subway company are restored at locations where they were removed to permit of the construction of rapid transit subway.

**Contract 102—Northwest and Northeast Feeders.** This contract includes the furnishing, delivering and installing of 148,072 feet of feeder cables in the northwest and northeast sections of the Borough of Manhattan, north of 82d Street. During the quarter 55,400 feet of cable were installed; this contract is about 80 per cent. completed.

**Contract 105—1,500 Terminal Boxes.** This contract was awarded to Foote, Pierson & Co. on March 22, 1917, for \$22,250, and includes the furnishing, assembling and delivering of 1,500 terminal boxes. Preliminary work has been done on the making of patterns and the ordering of material; this contract is about 5 per cent. Completed.

**Contract 106—1,400 Twin Posts.** This contract was awarded to the J. L. Mott Iron Works on March 17, 1917, for \$36,708, and includes the furnishing and delivering of 1,400 twin posts. The work of furnishing models for the nine basic types of posts has proceeded rapidly and the contract is about 5 per cent. completed.

**Contract 107. 1,250 Fire Alarm Boxes.** This contract was awarded to the Gamewell Fire Alarm Co. on February 21, 1917, for \$65,000, and includes the furnishing,

assembling and delivering of 1,250 fire alarm boxes. Four sample boxes were submitted for approval during the quarter and they successfully passed the electrical and mechanical requirements of the specification. This contract is about 5 per cent. completed.

**Contract 108—161 Upper Parts of Posts.** This contract was awarded to the Ornamental Foundry Co. on March 17, 1917, for \$3,590.30, and includes the furnishing and delivering of 161 upper parts of posts. The work on this contract is 5 per cent. completed.

**Contract 109—Subsidiaries and Erection of Posts, Battery to 14th Street.**—This contract was awarded to the Hickey Contracting Co. on March 2, 1917, for \$43,127, for furnishing, delivering and installing subsidiaries and erecting fire alarm posts from Battery to 14th Street. Materials were submitted for approval and orders have been placed for same. The work is about 5 per cent. completed.

**Contract 110—Subsidiaries and Erection of Posts, 14th to 82d Sts.** This contract was awarded to the Hickey Contracting Co. on February 23, 1917, for \$31,881, for furnishing, delivering and installing subsidiaries and erecting fire alarm posts from 14th St. to 82d St. Materials were submitted for approval and orders have been placed for same. The work is about 5 per cent. completed.

**Contract 111. Subsidiaries and Erection of Posts, 82d St. to Fort George Ave.** This contract was awarded to the Thomas Crimmins Contracting Co. on March 13, 1917, for \$56,048 for furnishing, delivering and installing subsidiaries and erecting fire alarm posts from 82d St. to Fort George ave. Materials were submitted for approval and orders were placed for same. The work is about 5 per cent. completed.

**Contract 114—Distribution Cables South of 14th St.** This contract includes the furnishing, delivering and installing of 431,199 feet of lead covered cable south of 14th st. During the quarter approximately 62,850 feet of cable was installed and the contract is about 51 per cent. completed.

**Contract 115—Distribution Cables from 14th to 82d St.** This contract includes the furnishing, delivering and installing of 401,680 feet of lead covered cable from 14th to 82d st. This contract is approximately 5 per cent. completed.

**Contract 116—Distribution Cables from 82d St. to Fort George Ave.** This contract includes the furnishing, delivering and installing of 613,152 feet of lead covered cable from 82d st. to Fort George ave. During the quarter approximately 23 per cent. of the work was done and the contract is 35 per cent. completed.

## Comparison Between the First Quarters, Year 1916 and Year 1917.

During the quarter ended March 31, 1916, there were 1,148 fires in the Borough of Brooklyn and 212 fires in the Borough of Queens, making a total of 1,360 fires in both boroughs. During the same period in 1917 there were 1,271 fires in the Borough of Brooklyn and 274 fires in the Borough of Queens, making a total of 1,545 fires in both boroughs. The comparison shows an increase of 123 fires in the Borough of Brooklyn, and of 62 fires in the Borough of Queens, a total increase of 185 fires in both boroughs.

The total loss to buildings, vessels and their contents for the year 1916 in the Borough of Brooklyn was \$1,309,500, and in the Borough of Queens, \$135,535, making a total of \$1,445,035.

The total loss to buildings, vessels and their contents for the year 1917 in the Borough of Brooklyn was \$1,026,520, and in the Borough of Queens \$170,650, making a total of \$1,197,170.

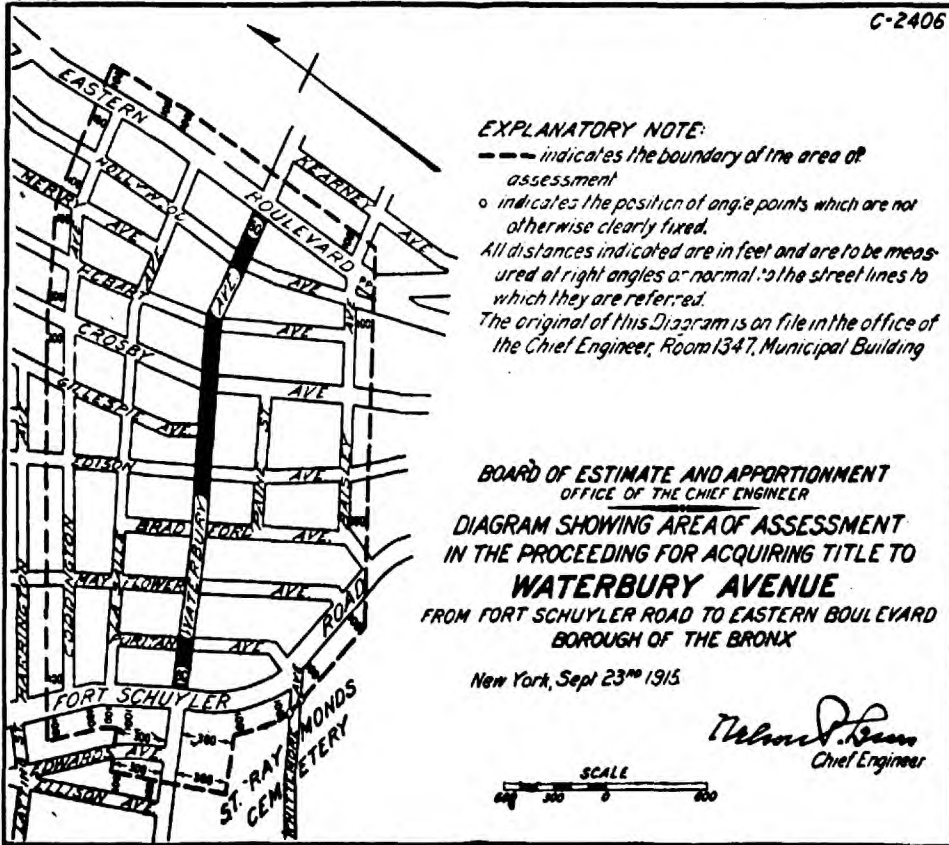

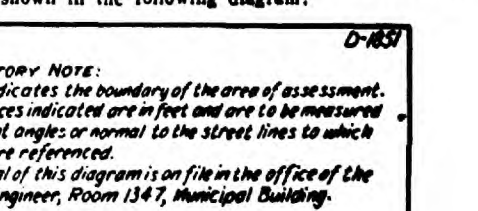

The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions, shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

#### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, endorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate. The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears in The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
