STATED SESSION.

BOARD OF ASSISTANT ALDERMEN.

No. 16 CITY HALL,
MONDAY, January 5, 1874,
2 o'clock P. M.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment, in their chamber, No. 16, City Hall.

PETITIONS.

By Assistant Alderman Clancy—

To the Honorable the Assistant Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

We respectfully petition your Honorable Body to cause the bonds of the municipality of the city of New York to be issued in denominations of twenty dollars.

Your petitioners respectfully represent that the bonds will cause immediate relief by the circulation of money hoarded—

Will not increase but distribute the debt of the city among the citizens whose self-interest will strengthen good government—

Will enable the workingman as well as the capitalist to receive interest on unemployed earnings, and not subject them to loss incident to the withdrawal of deposits—

Would prevent runs on the Savings Banks which could distribute these acceptable securities when required.

Your petitioners further respectfully represent that in their belief, the introduction of these bonds will result in the practical reduction of the debt to the amount of one-half by their ultimate acceptance with three per cent interest.

We respectfully petition that in the awarding of the bonds preference be given to applications for small amounts, so that the poor may have opportunity with the rich.

A memorial from your Honorable Body would influence the Legislature to amend the laws requiring that bonds for the consolidated debt be issued in sums not less than five hundred dollars.

The immediate discussion of this question by your Honorable Body will be hailed with delight by the people who will gladly appear before any Committee that your Honorable Body may in its wisdom deem proper to appoint, and your petitioner is in his own behalf and in behalf of thousands of workingmen and retail dealers who anxiously await the determination of your Honorable Body, will ever pray.

Assistant Alderman Clancy moved that the Board resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, for the purpose of hearing a Committee of Workingmen, in relation to obtaining work for the unemployed.

Which was concurred in.

Whereupon the President called Assistant Alderman Simonson to the chair.

Assistant Alderman Simonson addressed the President as chairman of the Committee of the Whole, and made the following report—that they had considered the matter, and would communicate with the Commissioner of Public Works as to the best mode of giving employment to the unemployed of the city.

Assistant Alderman Clancy moved that the report be received, and that the same be adopted. Which was carried.

REPORTS.

G. O. 396.

The Committee on Law Department of the Board of Assistant Aldermen, to which has been referred sundry resolutions in relation to the leasing of premises in Harlem for the use and occupancy of the Ninth District Civil Court and the Fifth District Police Court, respectfully

REPORT:

That they have had said resolutions under consideration, and that they have made a personal inspection of several locations which have been offered for said purposes.

The Board of Aldermen have adopted a resolution to lease the premises of Messrs. W. T. & D. Blodgett, on One hundred and twenty-fifth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, for a term of five years from January 1, 1874, at the annual rent of eight thousand dollars.

The above premises are considered by your Committee the most eligible for the courts above named in location and the capacities of the building; the owner also proposes to put the same in proper condition for the use of the courts and for the accommodation of prisoners, at their expense.

Your Committee also state the premises can be leased at the rate of six thousand dollars per annum, which will be two thousand dollars less per annum than is proposed by the Board of Aldermen, and thus make a saving to the city of ten thousand dollars for the whole term of the lease.

Your Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Common Council of the City of New York, be authorized and directed to execute a lease on behalf of the City of New York, for so much of the premises situated on the north side of One hundred and twenty-fifth street, between Third and Fourth avenues in the City of New York, belonging to Messrs. W. T. and D. Blodgett, as may be necessary for the use of the Ninth District Civil Court, and the Fifth District Police Court, including prison accommodations, for a term of five years from the 1st day of January, 1874, at the annual rent of six thousand dollars, payable quarterly, on the usual quarter days, with a condition in the lease that the said premises, are to be put in proper condition for occupancy for said courts, and are to be fitted up with the necessary cells and accommodations for prisoners at the expense of the owners, according to the plans to be submitted subject to the approval of the said clerk and the Comptroller of the City of New York is hereby directed to pay said rent quarterly from the proper appropriation. The lease to contain a further condition, that immediate possession of the premises will be given to enable the courts to be held, but that no rent shall be charged for such occupancy, until the building shall have been put in thorough order and condition to hold court therein.
