REPORT:

That they have had said resolutions under consideration, and that they have made a perso-nal inspection of several locations which have been offered for said purposes.

The Board of Aldermen have adopted a resolution to lease the premises of Messrs. W. T. & D. Blodgett, on One hundred and twenty-fifth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, for a term of five years from January 1, 1874, at the annual rent of eight thousand dollars.

The above premises are considered by your Committee the most eligible for the courts above named in location and the capacities of the building; the owner also proposes to put the same in proper condition for the use of the courts and for the accommodation of prisoners, at their expense.

Your Committee also state the premises can be leased at the rate of six thousand dollars per annum, which will be two thousand dollars less per annum than is proposed by the Board of Aldermen, and thus make a saving to the city of ten thousand dollars for the whole term of the

Your Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:
