

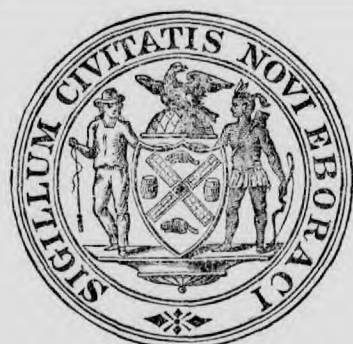
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AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Special Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, April 29, 1891, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon.
In the absence of the Secretary, Auditor J. C. Lulley acted as Secretary pro tem.
The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 6917 to 6933, inclusive, amounting to \$4,663.84.
On motion of Commissioner Scott, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.
The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following report, received from the Chief Engineer, and recommended that the same be spread in full on the minutes and filed:

NEW YORK, April 28, 1891.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—In addition to my statement made last week, and in accordance with your request, I submit the following account of the recent examination of the New Aqueduct.

You may remember that the emptying of the Aqueduct was suggested to me by the proposed action of the Department of Public Works to stop the flow of water in the Old Aqueduct, as expressed in the following note of Chief Engineer Birdsall to myself:

April 3, 1891.

A. FTELEY, Esq., Chief Engineer, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—After the 1st of May I would like to get to work on repairs to Old Aqueduct and connections, etc., to same which would necessitate the shutting off of the water flowing through same and depending entirely upon the New Aqueduct.

Has anything developed that will necessitate the shutting off of the New Aqueduct for the next six months?

Accordingly, on the 12th and 13th instants, the flow was increased for flushing purposes, and on the 14th the Aqueduct was emptied with the exception of the two siphons.

The whole of its length was examined with the result that at a few places a small amount of sand and gravel was found deposited in the gate-houses and at a few points on the line. It was removed from the gate-houses and from Section 6, near Shaft 12C. In other parts the amount of sand was too small to justify the time and expense necessary for its removal.

Two of the 48-inch stop-cock gates at Shaft 25 were found somewhat injured owing to a misplacement of parts during construction. They will have to be modified and replaced. This work can be done mostly by the foreman and machinists employed by the Aqueduct Commissioners, with an additional laborer.

With these exceptions the New Aqueduct has been found in excellent order. It remained open five days, and the flow was resumed on the 18th instant.

After refilling, the shafts under pressure were found as before, Shaft 25 showing a slight leakage, as heretofore recorded.

The cost of examination and of cleaning, outside of the pay of the regular employees, will be under \$75. In this amount is not included the cost of placing an iron grating at the bottom of Shaft 11A, which properly belongs to construction.

The New Aqueduct being in excellent condition and ready for continuous service, I have answered as follows the note of Chief Engineer Birdsall:

GEO. W. BIRDSALL, Esq., Chief Engineer, Croton Aqueduct:

DEAR SIR—In answer to your note of April 3, and in confirmation of my verbal statement made to you the following day in regard to it, I have to say that the New Aqueduct is in good working order and can be used continuously for the whole supply for the next six months or more.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the recommendation was approved, and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy of said report to the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Committee also presented the following report, received from the Chief Engineer, and recommended that the same be spread in full on the minutes and filed:

NEW YORK, April 28, 1891.

Schedule of the flow of water at Croton Dam into the New Aqueduct, as per request of Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct:

Since my last report, dated the 12th inst., the flow of water has continued at the rate of 84,000,000 gallons per twenty-four hours. Order was sent last night to decrease the flow to 74,000,000 gallons per twenty-four hours.

Resolved, That the action of the Chief Engineer in suspending William W. Bullis, Journeyman Machinist at Shaft No. 25 of the New Aqueduct, on the 27th instant, for cause, be and hereby is approved; and said Bullis is hereby discharged from the service of the Aqueduct Commissioners.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the action of the Chief Engineer in temporarily employing Michael Cusick as a Laborer at \$2 per day, for work around the office of Division Engineer Craven at Carmel, said employment commencing on the 24th instant, be and hereby is approved.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the action of the Chief Engineer in temporarily employing Thomas Foley as a Laborer under Division Engineer Craven, at South Yonkers, for work in connection with the examination of the New Aqueduct, and for other purposes, said employment beginning on the 22d instant, be and hereby is approved.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.

The Committee also presented the following communication, received from the Chief Engineer:

NEW YORK, April 28, 1891.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—On April 17, 1889, an appropriation of \$500 was made for the purpose of procuring lithographic prints of the maps of the Croton water-shed, made by W. E. Worthen, C. E. Of this appropriation the sum of \$280 has been expended for such maps, and the edition has been exhausted.

As there is a great demand for copies of the reduced size, I have caused a tracing to be made of the same, which can be photo-lithographed and printed in colors at an expense not exceeding \$135 for two hundred copies.

This is to ask you for authority to expend that sum of money for such purpose out of the balance of the appropriation of April 17, 1889.

—and recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That an appropriation of one hundred and thirty-five dollars is hereby made to cover the cost of photo-lithographing and printing two hundred copies of the maps of the Croton water-shed, made by W. E. Worthen, C. E., as set forth in the foregoing communication.

The report was approved and the resolution adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be and hereby is authorized and directed to produce fifty lithographic copies of the contract drawings of the record and storage building to be constructed at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue.

On motion of Commissioner Cannon, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the accompanying bill of Wilson Brothers for making models of the New Aqueduct, amounting to six hundred and seventy-one dollars and ninety-five cents, be and hereby is approved, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment; and an appropriation of said amount is hereby made to cover the cost thereof.

The same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The Committee also presented the resignation of Gaylord Thompson, Assistant Engineer, and recommended that the same be accepted, to take effect on May 1, 1891.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was accepted.

The Committee also presented the following:

The Construction or Executive Committee report:

That at a meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held on October 8, 1890, the following preamble and resolution, submitted by the Committee on Construction, was considered by the Commissioners:

"Whereas, The Chief Engineer has certified under date of September 10, 1890, that Heman Clark has completely performed and carried out the provisions of the contract made by him with this Commission, dated December 18, 1884, for constructing Section A of the New Aqueduct, and has stated from actual measurements the whole amount of work done and materials furnished under and according to the terms of said contract, and of the true value thereof; now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by Heman Clark under the contract made by him with this Commission on the 18th day of December, 1884, for constructing Section A of the New Aqueduct, and that a proper voucher for the final payment for work done and materials furnished under said agreement be approved by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and certified to the Comptroller for payment; and said Comptroller is hereby notified that the cost of superintending the repairs of defective work on said section amounts to nineteen thousand one hundred and seventy-nine dollars and eighteen cents, and he is hereby requested to take such action as may be necessary to protect the interests of the City owing to the deficit which appears in said final estimate."

The preamble and resolution and the subject-matter thereof were finally referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, with request to advise the Commissioners, first, whether in view of the fact that there is a deficiency on said section, the Commissioners should refuse to accept the same; second, whether, in case any other final estimate shall become due to the contractor for said section, the Commissioners have the right to deduct the amount of the deficiency on this estimate from the amount due on such other final estimate; and the Counsel to the Corporation, under date of April 21, 1891, having advised, first, that the work should be accepted; and, second, that the Comptroller should be notified of the deficiency, and requested to set off the amount thereof against any sum which may become due to the same contractor under other contracts, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by Heman Clark, under the contract made by him with this Commission on the 18th day of December, 1884, for constructing Section A, of the New Aqueduct, and that a proper voucher for the final payment for work done and materials furnished under said agreement be approved by the Aqueduct Commissioners and certified to the Comptroller for payment; and said Comptroller is hereby notified that the cost of superintending the repairs of defective work on said section amounts to nineteen thousand one hundred and seventy-nine dollars and eighteen cents; and he is hereby requested to set off a sum sufficient to make good the amount of said deficiency against any sum which may become due to Heman Clark, under his contract for the construction of Section B, of the New Aqueduct, in accordance with said opinion.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the report was approved and the resolution adopted.

On motion of Commissioner Cannon, the resolution adopted on March 19, 1891, appropriating \$750 to cover the cost of preparing models of Section 6 of the New Aqueduct, was reconsidered.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of Voucher No. 6935, being final estimate for work done on Section A of the New Aqueduct, amounting to \$742.28; also of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 6936 to 6950, inclusive, amounting to \$980.60.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following communication, received from the Deputy Chief Engineer, and recommended that the same be spread in full on the minutes and filed:

NEW YORK, May 4, 1891.

Schedule of the flow at Croton Dam into the New Aqueduct, as per request of the Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct:

At 9 A.M. of April 28, the flow of water was decreased from 84,000,000 to 74,000,000 gallons per twenty-four hours, and this latter rate was maintained until 10 A.M. of the 3d instant, when the flow was increased to 84,000,000 gallons per twenty-four hours.

The Committee also presented forms of contract, specifications and bond, received from the Commissioner of Public Works on May 6, 1891, to provide for building the record and storage building, and for grading, improving and fencing the grounds, near the One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Gate-house of the New Croton Aqueduct, and recommended the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the forms of contract, specifications and bond, submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works on May 6, 1891, and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation "as to form," for building the record and storage building, and for grading, improving and fencing the grounds, near the One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Gate-house of the New Croton Aqueduct, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted; and the Secretary is hereby directed to have triplicate copies thereof prepared for certification by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and filed in accordance with section 25, chapter 490, Laws of 1883.

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be and they are hereby directed to advertise in the CITY RECORD, New York "Recorder" and the New York "Daily News" a notice and advertisement inviting sealed bids or proposals for building the record and storage building, and for grading, improving and fencing the grounds, near the One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Gate-house of the New Croton Aqueduct, as provided in the contract and specifications this day approved and adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners.

The same were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

Negative—The Comptroller—1.

The Committee also presented forms of contract, specifications and bond, received from the Commissioner of Public Works on May 6, 1891, to provide for building the head-house and engine-room superstructure, etc., at Shaft No. 25, on Section No. 12 of the New Croton Aqueduct, and recommended the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the forms of contract, specifications and bond, submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works on May 6, 1891, and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation "as to form," for building the head-house and engine-room superstructure, etc., at Shaft No. 25, on Section No. 12 of the New Croton Aqueduct, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted; and the Secretary is hereby directed to have triplicate copies thereof prepared for certification by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and filed in accordance with section 25, chapter 490, Laws of 1883.

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be and they are hereby directed to advertise in the CITY RECORD, New York "World" and "Commercial Advertiser" a notice and advertisement inviting sealed bids or proposals for building the head-house and engine-room superstructure, etc., at Shaft No. 25, on Section No. 12 of the New Croton Aqueduct, as provided in the contract and specifications this day approved and adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners.

The same were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—5.

The Committee also presented the following opinion, received from the Counsel to the Corporation, and recommended that the same be spread in full on the minutes:

LAW DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, May 4, 1891.

Hon. THEODORE W. MYERS, Comptroller:

SIR—I have received your letter of the 20th instant, calling my attention to the claim of Washburn, Shaler & Washburn against the Aqueduct Commissioners, on account of alleged damage done to their work at Titicus Dam by the floods of January 11 and 22, 1891, which is now before the Aqueduct Commissioners upon a report of the Construction Committee in favor of paying the sum of \$1,909.40 in consideration of the waiver by the contractor of all claims for further damage on account of said floods.

The facts, as appear by the report, in relation to said claim made by Chief Engineer Fteley, presented to the Aqueduct Commissioners April 8, 1891, are as follows, namely:

1. The contractors having undertaken the construction of the dam in question, proposed a plan of protective work of a certain size and capacity.
2. The Engineer accepted the principle of the proposed protective work, but decided that the proposed size of the appliances which the contractors proposed to build was necessarily large, and the cost excessive; also that the size of the appliances proposed would interfere with the proper conduct of the work of constructing the dam.
3. The contractors, therefore, constructed said protective work and appliances upon a smaller scale.
4. Severe freshets occurred on the 11th of January and the 22d of January, 1891, and the protective work proved to be inadequate to save the dam from harm.
5. Damages were occasioned by such freshets which are estimated by the contractor to amount to \$2,346.
6. The contractors claim that if the protective work had been built of the size and capacity first proposed by them, such damage would not have occurred.
7. The contractors, therefore, claim that they should be paid such damage, and the Chief Engineer states that it is his opinion that it would be for the interests of the City to settle the claim for the sum of \$1,909.40.

The contract provides, section 29, "The contractor shall erect all necessary structures, and do all work needed to protect his work from water; he shall erect all temporary dams, coffer dams, sheet piling and other devices, take care of the river and of the water accumulated behind the temporary dam or dams or other structures, and shall be responsible for all damage that may be caused by the action of water, whether from negligence or any other cause. Such damage is to be repaired, and the work must be restored and maintained at his cost."

"Section 30. All * * * work, temporary or permanent, for the purpose of protecting the work from the river, provided that they are not objected to by the engineer as improper or unnecessary, are to be paid for at the price stipulated in this contract."

By these covenants the contractor has undertaken absolutely to protect his work from the water; to erect all necessary structures and devices to accomplish that object, and to bear all damage that may be caused by the action of the water.

The force of this covenant is such that the contractor was at liberty to erect the protective structure of as great size as in his judgment was necessary, and the objection of the engineer could not prevent him from making the protective devices of such size as in his judgment was necessary.

The contractor undertook all responsibility for damage to his work caused by water, and will not now be permitted to recover such damage from the City.

The provisions of section 30, above quoted, avail only to protect the City from any claim for the expense of constructing protective work except to the amount approved by the Engineer.

The result of the covenants taken together is that, 1st. The contractor was at liberty to construct just such protective work as he deemed necessary to construct to accomplish his undertaking, to preserve the work upon the dam from injury.

2d. The contractor, however, could be paid only for so much work as was approved by the Engineer.

The Engineer was the arbiter selected to determine what amount of protective work was proper and necessary and therefore to be paid for.

The contractor, however, was at liberty to build, at his own expense, as much more as he deemed necessary.

It follows from these considerations that the contractor has taken upon himself the risk of damage and has no legal claim to recover the same from the City.
