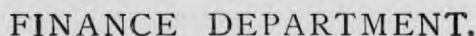

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my supervision for the quarter ending 30th April, 1887:

Chambers Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, 24th November, 1877, and 21st November, 1878.

The temporary wooden sewer-box between Piers, new 20 and new 21, N. R., was repaired. Water was drained from the surface of the earth filling.

Laight Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, 30th July and 3d November, 1880.

The plank approach leading to Pier, new 27, N. R., was shored up and 81 loads of filling were received on tickets and deposited thereunder.

The bulkhead-wall foundation was examined and found covered with mud, which will have to be removed before proceeding with the work.

PIER, NEW 42, NORTH RIVER.

Secretary's Order No. 6043.

The new silt basin was set to grade and the pavement was relaid around it by George F. Doak, under Treasurer's Order No. 12113. The joints in the pavement were filled with gravel and coal tar by the force of the Department.

PIER, NEW 43, NORTH RIVER.

The new silt basin cover was set to grade and the pavement was relaid around it by George F. Doak, under Treasurer's Order No. 12113. The joints in the pavement were filled with gravel and coal tar by the force of the Department.

West Twenty-third Street Section—North End—Resolution of the Board, 28th June, 1882.

The temporary sewer-box connecting the brick sewer at the old bulkhead at the foot of West Thirtieth street, under the new sewer opening through the bulkhead wall, was finished.

PIER, NEW 59, NORTH RIVER.

Plank approach to the Pier was repaired.

PIER, NEW 60, NORTH RIVER.

The plank approach was raised and repaired.

West Thirty-first Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, 8th August and 19th September, 1883.
5,045 loads of filling were received by tickets and were deposited in rear of the wall.

West Thirty-second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, 22d October, 1885.

Dredging—10,641 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from the site of the bulkhead wall by the Union Dredging Company, under Treasurer's Orders Nos. 12077 and 12194.
Stone Filling—2,513 cubic yards of small cobble stones and 3,520 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and placed in the bulkhead wall by Messrs. Brown & Fleming, under Treasurer's Orders Nos. 12091, 12279, 12298 and 12092.
The 702 cubic yards of small cobble stone previously stored on the new-filled land were transferred and put in the wall by the force of the Department.
Piling and Woodwork—253 vertical piles and 44 bracing piles were driven and stay-lathed. 4 binding frames were made and put in place, 71 foundation piles were cut off by machine, 216 linear feet of longitudinal capping and 24 transverse caps were put in place. Piles delivered for the work by George Karr, under Treasurer's Order No. 12037, were inspected.
Masonry—6 concrete foundation blocks were set, and the chain grooves were filled with concrete in bags.

PIER, NEW 61, NORTH RIVER.

Resolution of the Board, 16th March, 1887.

16,837 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from the site of proposed Pier, new 61, by the Union Dredging Company, under Treasurer's Order therefor.

GENERAL CHARGES TO SECTION.

Mooring Piles—Two clusters of 5 piles each were driven for moorings for floating property engaged on the work of the section.
Timber Basin—12 old piles were driven and boomed in basin south of West Thirtieth street, North river, to store materials from West Thirty-second Street Section.

New Pier and Approach at West Fortieth street, North River—Contract No. 231.

Richard Cronin, contractor, continued the work of building the new Pier and approach at the foot of said street, under his contract therefor.

Crib-bulkhead, West Seventy-seventh to West Seventy-eighth Street, North River—Contract No. 243.

William P. Kelly, contractor, at work dredging for the site of new crib under his contract therefor. Begun 15th April, 1887.

Proposed Crib-pier at West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth Street, North River—Secretary's Order No. 6200.

18 test piles were driven to ascertain the nature of the bottom.

PIER, NEW 32, EAST RIVER.

Resolution of the Board, 1st December, 1886.

The Union Dredging Company at work excavating and removing crib-work and mud on the site of proposed Pier, new 32, under Treasurer's Orders therefor. Begun 15th December, 1886.

Contract No. 241.

John Gillies, contractor, removed Pier, old 41, East river, and the old crib-bulkhead at and south of Pier, old 41, under his contract therefor, and commenced the repairs to the crib-bulkhead. Begun 15th March, 1887.

Proposed Crib-bulkhead, East Seventy-sixth Street, East River—Secretary's Order No. 6248.

Drove 6 test piles to determine the nature of the bottom.

Proposed Dumping-board at East Eightieth Street, East River—Secretary's Order No. 6251.

Drove 8 test piles to determine the nature of the bottom.

Proposed Extension of Storehouse Pier, Blackwell's Island—Secretary's Order No. 6218.

Drove 13 test piles to determine the nature of the bottom.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Blacksmiths made and repaired ironwork for different sections and for floating property. Carpenters prepared moulds for concrete blocks. Laborers made 8 concrete foundation blocks, containing a total of about 264 cubic yards of concrete. 50 barrels of Portland cement were received and stored for Department use. Two samples of cement were tested for private parties by order of the Board.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

The yard has been maintained and the property there has been taken care of.

The work of repairing the anchorage for the derrick guys has been completed. Messrs. Nolan & Son have delivered granite at various times under their contract therefor No. 230, and the granite has been stored in the yard for issue as required.

100-ton derrick "City of New York."—The crew and force of floating property cut out and put in new yellow pine girders under deck, laid some 2-inch yellow pine flooring in hold, put on wood and cast-iron braces, put in truss and circle bolts, repaired steam-pipes, pipes in tanks, beams, etc., cleaned engines and machinery, cleaned out hold and bilges and examined tower and braces.

The derrick loaded 6 concrete blocks at the yard, and was towed to West Thirty-second Street Section, and after setting them in the wall was taken back to the yard. Lifted Pile Driver No. 3 from the Pier at West Fifty-seventh street and put it in the water.

Alfred J. Murray, under Treasurer's Order No. 12190, furnished yellow pine for repairs to girders and floor. Gaskell, Greenlie & Co., under Treasurer's Order No. 12220, furnished brace casting.

10-ton derrick.—The force of the Department repairing house, water-tank, pipes, engine and machinery, made new hatch, put floor in coal bunker, painted house, cleaned water-tank, engine blocks, etc.

Tug "Manhattan."—The tug "Manhattan" has done all the towing required by the Department up to the 28th April, 1887, when it was laid up for repairs, and the towing thereafter was done by tugs hired from V. Vierow, under Treasurer's Order No. 12310. The force of the Department calked sides, woodwork, machinery and engines, scraped and painted hull, put in new limber chain, cleaned engines and painted work, removed ice-breaker for the season and made and painted hanging fenders.

April 26.—Tug was placed in Tebo's dry dock at Twenty-third street, South Brooklyn, under Treasurer's Order No. 12300, for examination of bottom, which was made, and the tug was run off at 8.30 A. M. on the 27th.

April 28.—The tug was laid up at the Atlantic Basin Docks for repairs to engine by Pioneer Iron Works, under Treasurer's Order No. 12282.

Patterson Brothers, under Treasurer's Order No. 12273, furnished galvanized iron chain and one flue brush.

Hodgman Rubber Co., under Treasurer's Order No. 12253, furnished new hose and couplings. Dredges No. 3 and No. 4 remain in the possession of the Union Dredging Company.

Pile Driver No. 1.—No work required.

Pile Driver No. 2.—The force of floating property at work repairing ways, house, engine and machinery. The Pioneer Iron Works, under Treasurer's Order No. 12246, furnished new smoke-stack. John W. Sullivan, under Treasurer's Order, No. 12099, furnished new drum frame and fittings.

Pile Driver No. 3.—The force of floating property completed calking the scow and putting on wearing pieces, cleaned engines and machinery. It was placed in the water 9th April.

Pile Driver No. 5 (fitted up as a pile cutter).—Has been at work at West Thirty-second Street Section, and is now laid up at the yard. The force of floating property repaired engines and machinery.

Pile Driver No. 6.—Has been in commission from time to time on work of general repairs. The force of floating property repaired house, ways, engines and machinery and calked its side.

Pile Driver No. 7.—Has been in commission from time to time on work of general repairs. The force of floating property repaired ways, water-tank, deck and machinery, calked deck and new water-tank, and cleaned boiler and machinery.

Pile Driver No. 8.—The force of floating property fitted up its new boiler and smoke-stack, repaired deck, water-tank, coal-bunkers, ways and cleats, and calked deck and water-tank. The Police Department inspected boiler on the 25th March.

Pile Driver No. 10.—The force of the Department repaired ways, friction drum, engine, machinery, hatches, etc., and cleaned boiler and engines. J. T. Dill, under Treasurer's Order No. 12255, furnished cast-iron collar.

Pile Driver No. 11.—The force of floating property packed valves, repaired boiler, steam-pipes, and machinery. J. T. Dill, under Treasurer's Order No. 12255, furnished cast-iron collar. The Police Department inspected boiler on the 12th April. The pile driver is now at work on West Thirty-second Street Section.

Boring Machine "Woodcock."—Is laid up at the yard in good order.

Divers' Scow "G."—Has been at work on West Twenty-third Street Section and for general repairs.

Small Divers' Scow.—Is laid up at the yard in good order.

Divers' Scow "B."—The force of the Department calked deck. It has been in use from time to time, and is now in good order.

Deck Scow "C."—Has been in use from time to time, and is now in good order.

Deck Scow "D."—The force of the Department calked deck. It has been used from time to time, and is now in good order.

Deck Scow "E."—Has been in use from time to time, and is now in good order.

Scow "F" (used and fitted up with coal pockets for carrying coal).—Is in good order.

Scow "Jim."—Is at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard loaded with piles and timber for use of general repairs.

Scow "May."—Is at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, and is not worth repairing.

Scow "Willie."—Has been in use from time to time, and is now laid up.

Scow "Joe."—Has been broken up, and is not now on the list of floating property. The old material therefrom has been turned over for use on general repairs.

Small Boats.—Work on the new 15-foot yawl boat No. 19 has been continued. Repaired and painted yawls, skiffs, etc.

Pier "A," North River.

Cleaned boiler on the 20th February. McNab & Harlin, under Treasurer's Order No. 12205, furnished two number plates for boilers, and they were put on by the Department force. John W. Sullivan, under Treasurer's Order No. 12099, furnished two cast-iron fenders for deck of pier.

Offices, etc.—Various repairs were made to office building on the pier.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

Overhauled derrick and machinery.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Steam was kept up around the water-pipes, etc., until April 5. A number plate was put in stationary boiler in Pipe Shop.

Various other small pieces of work have been done on account of floating property, machinery of the Department, office fittings, automatic tide gauges, construction, etc.

Surveying Party.

The Surveying Party has given all the lines and levels required for the various work of the Department, and the various levels over wall and pavement have been taken as usual.

Three surveys have been made on the North river water-front, one on that of the East river and twelve on the Harlem river, eight of which on the North river and four on the Harlem river were in connection with the supervision of work done by private parties under permit from the Board, and plots of the same have been made for the records of the Department, and the necessary lines have been determined upon and given for work under permit.

In addition to the above, the new continuous survey of the North river water-front, from the Battery to Barclay street, has been carried on.

17,434 disk soundings have been taken by the Surveying and Sounding Parties in 82 slips, and 526 rod soundings in 10 slips; of which 9,769 disk soundings in 30 slips and 338 rod soundings in 5 slips were on the North river, and 7,665 disk soundings in 52 slips and 188 rod soundings in 5 slips were on the East and Harlem rivers.

The greater part of these soundings have been recorded, and the remainder are nearly ready for record.

The automatic tide gauges have been attended to.

SIR—There were 627 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 4, 1887, which is a decrease of 105, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 50 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending May 28, 1887, was 674, which is 37.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.70 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,477,960.

And no dirt, sand, ashes or other similar substance shall be deposited by any person operating a railroad or stage line in the City of New York upon the surface of any paved street in said city without a permit from this Department.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

PROPOSALS FOR ESTIMATES FOR FURNISHING MATERIALS AND PERFORMING CARPENTER WORK IN THE ERECTION OF AN ARMORY BUILDING ON THE BLOCK BOUNDED BY THE BOULEVARD, NINTH AVENUE, SIXTY-SEVENTH AND SIXTY-EIGHTH STREETS, NEW YORK CITY.

PROPOSALS FOR ESTIMATES FOR FURNISHING materials and performing carpenter work in the erection of an Armory Building, on the block bounded by the Boulevard, Ninth Avenue, Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, New York City, will be received by the Armory Board, at the Mayor's Office, City Hall, until 2 P. M. of the twentieth day of June, 1887, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read by said Board.

Any person making an estimate for the above work shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope to the President of said Armory Board, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing Materials and Performing Carpenter Work in the Erection of an Armory Building, on the block bounded by the Boulevard, Ninth Avenue, Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets," and also with the name of the person or persons presenting the same, and the date of its presentation.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect; and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, in the amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000).

Bidders are required to submit their estimates upon the following express conditions, which shall apply to and become part of every estimate received:

1st. Bidders must satisfy themselves, by personal examination of the location of the proposed work, and by such other means as they may prefer, as to the accuracy of the estimate, and shall not at any time after the submission of an estimate, dispute or complain of the statement of quantities, nor assert that there was any misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of the work to be done.

2d. Bidders will be required to complete the entire work to the satisfaction of the Armory Board, and in substantial accordance with the specifications of the contract and the plans therein referred to. No extra compensation beyond the amount payable for the work before mentioned, which shall be actually performed, at the prices therefor to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

Bidders will state in their estimates a price for the whole of the work to be done, in conformity with the approved form of contract and the specifications therein set forth, by which price the bids will be tested. This price is to cover all expenses of every kind involved in or incidental to the fulfillment of the contract, including any claim that may arise through delay, from any cause, in the performing of the work thereunder.

Bidders will distinctly write out, both in words and in figures, the amount of their estimates for doing this work.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to attend at this office with the sureties offered by him or them, and execute the contract within five days from the date of the service of a notice to that effect; and in case of failure or neglect so to do he or they will be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet, and so on until it be accepted and executed.

Bidders are required to state in their estimate their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein; and if no other person be so interested, the estimate shall distinctly state the fact; also that the estimate is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, Head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. *Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.*

Each estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if said person or persons shall omit or refuse to execute the contract, they will pay to the Corporation of the City of New York any difference between the sum to which said person or persons would be entitled on its completion, and that which said Corporation or the Armory Board may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work to be done by which the bids are tested; the consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by law. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered is to be approved by the Comptroller of the City of New York, after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National Banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of \$1,250. Such check or money must not be enclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Board who has charge of the Estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned by the Comptroller to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him by the Comptroller.

No estimate will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

Bidders are requested, in making their bids or estimates, to use a blank prepared for that purpose by the Board, a copy of which, together with the form of the agreement, including specifications, and showing the manner of payment for the work, can be seen upon application at the office of the architect, George B. Post, No. 15 Cortlandt street, New York City.

The Board reserves the right to reject any or all estimates not deemed beneficial to or for the public interest. Plans may be examined, and specifications and blank forms for bids or estimates obtained, by application to the architect, at his office, No. 15 Cortlandt street, New York City.

IN RELATION TO JURORS FOR STATE COURTS.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc. etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
