Three surveys have been made on the North river water-front, one on that of the East river and twelve on the Harlem river, eight of which on the North river and four on the Harlem river, were in connection with the supervision of work done by private parties under permit from the Board, and plots of the same have been made for the records of the Department, and the necessary lines have been determined upon and given for work under permit.

In addition to the above, the new continuous survey of the North river water-front, from the Battery to Barclay street, has been carried on.

17,434 disk soundings have been taken by the Surveying and Sounding Parties in 82 slips, and 526 rod soundings in 10 slips; of which 9,769 disk soundings in 30 slips and 338 rod soundings in 5 slips were on the North river, and 7,665 disk soundings in 52 slips and 188 rod soundings in 5 slips were on the East and Harlem rivers.

The greater part of these soundings have been recorded, and the remainder are nearly ready for record.

The automatic tide gauges have been attended to.

D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register: SIR—There were 627 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 4, 1887, which is a decrease of 105, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 50 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending May 28, 1887, was 674, which is 37.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.70 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,477,906.



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


