

NEW COURT-HOUSE COMMISSION.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners for the Completion of the New County Court-house.

NOVEMBER 28, 1877.

OCTOBER 17, 1877.

The specification for the work of completing the iron roofing for the Court-House was approved, and the form of contract for said work was adopted and transmitted to the Counsel to the Corpora-

and the form of contract for said work was adopted and transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his approval.

The blank form of proposal was adopted and a certain number of copies of same were ordered to be printed for the use of bidders.

Messrs. J. & W. C. Spears, having executed the mason work of the walls up to the top of the third story floor, became entitled to the payment of three thousand dollars, being the installment numbered "seventh" in their contract, whereupon said amount was certified to the Finance Department for payment. ment for payment.

It was ordered that advertisements for proposals for completing the iron roofing be published in the CITY RECORD.

OCTOBER 24, 1877.

The bill of Mr. Leopold Eidlitz, for \$2,082.50, for services as Architect and Superintendent, said sum being the amount of commission on all the payments made to the several contractors since

The amount of \$15,000 was certified to the Finance Department for payment to Messrs. Sinclair and Milne, for completing the stonework of the walls up to the window sills of the third story.

The specification of the iron roofing was directed to be printed.

At the meeting of the Commissioners held for the purpose, all the proposals received for completing the iron roofing of the Court-House were publicly opened and read, in the presence of the Comptroller and such of the parties making proposals as desired to be present, as follows:

No. 1. Heuvelman, Haven & Co., \$7,375.00.

No. 2. Post & McCord, \$5,465.00.

Thereafter the Commissioners met in regular session, when

The proposal (No. 2) of Messrs. Post & McCord was accepted, as the lowest bid, and the contract enveloped to them

The proposal (No. 2) of Messrs. Post & McCord was accepted, as the lowest bid, and the contract awarded to them.

Messrs. Sinclair & Milne, having completed the stonework of the walls up to six feet above the window sills of the third story, the sum of \$15,000 was therefore certified to the Finance Department for payment to them, as the ninth installment.

The Architect was directed to report what, if any, would be the saving in cost by substituting a suitable iron staircase in the place of the proposed stone staircase, leading from the balcony of the rotunda to the fourth story of the south wing.

The Commissioners adopted sundry preambles and resolutions, expressing their condolence with the widow and family of their late colleague, Mr. Smith E. Shaw, and directed that a copy of the same be transmitted to the widow of the deceased.

NOVEMBER 12, 1877. Mr. Philip A. Dugan was directed to do certain temporary repairs to the roofs to prevent leaks.

The communication of Mr. Max Bayersdorfer in reference to certain injuries alleged to have been sustained by Mr. David Klein while passing through the Court-House, was laid on the table.

NOVEMBER 14, 1877.

The sum of twenty-five hundred dollars was certified to the Finance Department for payment to Messrs. J. & W. C. Spears, for completing the mason work of the walls up to ten feet above the third story floor.

Mr. Francis Blessing, who was appointed by his Honor the Mayor to fill the vacancy in this Commission caused by the death of Mr. Smith E. Shaw, took his seat and entered upon the duties of Commissioner.

The sum of \$15,000 was certified to the Finance Department for payment to Messrs. Sinclair & Milne, they having completed the stonework of the walls up to twelve feet above the window sill of the third story.

Requisition was made upon the Comptroller for the issue of fifty thousand dollars of "New York County Court-House Stock, No. 5."
