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### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held in Room 16, City Hall, at 2 o'clock p. m., on Wednesday, February 26, 1902.*

Present—Charles V. Fornes, President of the Board of Aldermen; N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy Comptroller; Elgin R. L. Gould, Chamberlain, and Herbert Parsons, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Mayor being absent, on motion, the President of the Board of Aldermen was called to the chair.

On motion of the Deputy Comptroller, John Korb, Jr., was unanimously elected temporary Secretary for the meeting.

The reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

The Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a renewal of the lease of offices in the Stewart Building, occupied by City Departments:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

February 1902.

SIR—In your communication of February 6, 1902, to Edward E. Harris, Superintendent, Stewart Building, relative to the renewal of the lease of the Stewart Building occupied by the Department of Finance, you stated certain concessions which you felt impelled to ask of the executors of the Stewart estate, as lessors.

First—As to the toilet arrangements provided for the Department of Finance, especially on the first floor, as inadequate as to accommodation and unattractive in point of lighting, ventilation and general cleanliness; and referring to the urinals as not drained as they should be—no washbasin in the room, except a sink used by the Cleaners.

You mention that it will be a great convenience to the Department of Finance, and it is a necessity upon which you insist, that an additional room be properly equipped at once. You mention No. 10 or No. 32 as suitable.

Second—You desire an improvement in the elevator system, great need of annunciators and other apparatus.

Third—The stoppage of the Broadway elevators and the closing of the doors on the Broadway side at 6 p. m. is also referred to as a matter of inconvenience.

Fourth—The cutting off of electric lights at 7 p. m., leaving some of the rooms in total darkness after that hour.

Fifth—Complaint is made that the building is imperfectly heated on Sundays and holidays, whereas rooms are frequently used on such days.

Sixth—The sweeping and cleaning of the offices of the Department are hastily and imperfectly done, especially in carpeted rooms.

Seventh—Some time in the month of March, 1900, a request was made by Comptroller Coler that you place prismatic sash lights upon all windows of rooms looking upon Reade street, as also on those looking on the inside court. For some reason you failed to take favorable action, and the matter was not pressed. I am convinced of the fact that the addition of these prisms is essential to the comfort and health of those who are required to work in these rooms by artificial light, and you earnestly desire this improvement be at once made.

In reply to this communication Mr. Harris, the Superintendent, on February 13, 1902, wrote the Comptroller as follows:

"Your favor of the 6th instant concerning certain desired improvements in the Stewart Building has received the careful consideration of the executors of the Hilton estate, with the object of meeting your views so far as possible.

"The executors are prepared, as soon as the details can be arranged with your representatives, to install the additional plumbing called for, in Room 32, one of the two rooms designated by you to be used for that purpose. This will consist of three closets, two urinals and a wash basin, all provided with the modern accessories as required by the Board of Health.

"The executors are prepared to provide the five passenger elevators with electric annunciators for the purpose of summoning, and with outside indicators announcing the approach of the cars.

"Such of the rooms of the Finance Department as are not supplied with gas fixtures, allowing the use of gas after the hour of 7 p. m., shall be so supplied.

"The executors are also prepared to order prismatic sash lights upon all windows of offices used by the Finance Department looking upon the court, and for twenty-one windows on the Reade street side of the building, all of the first floor.

"This covers, I believe, the substantial requirements of your communication. The other items are chiefly those concerning the cleaning of the apartments, etc. To correct any faults in this direction will always be my endeavor, though, under circumstances which are frequently adverse, it is difficult at all times, I am aware, to escape criticism in its fulfillment."

With reference to the heating of the building on Sundays and holidays, Mr. Harris stated, verbally, that the directions are to supply heat whenever it may be requested on such days.

Mr. Harris stated that he could not comply with the Comptroller's desire to keep the Broadway front of the building open after 6 o'clock p. m., as that hour had been fixed upon for various purposes of safety and police of the building.

In a letter from Mr. Sparrow, of the 19th of February, 1902, he states that at an interview with Mr. Harris on that date Mr. Harris agreed to put in prismatic lights, as follows:

On the first floor, outside rooms.....	25
On the first floor, rooms on court.....	15
On the second floor.....	3
On the third floor.....	1
On the fourth floor, expert accountants, etc.....	5
On the fourth floor, Division of Adjustment.....	2
On the second floor, on court.....	3

Total..... 54

In a communication of February 21, 1902, from Mr. Sparrow to the Comptroller he says that on that day he had an interview with Mr. Harris, the Superintendent, in which he was assured that

"he will allow the sum of \$600 for room 32, but the room, when equipped as an additional toilet room, will be fitted with eight closets instead of three, all of which, as well as the room itself, will be kept locked. Three of these closets will be for the exclusive use of the Comptroller and those to whom he may supply keys. The other five will be restricted to other leading tenants of the building whom the Superintendent is inclined to favor.

"The Superintendent is to assign a special man, whose sole business it will be to keep both toilet rooms on the first floor and the one on the ground floor in proper condition."

It appears to me that the Superintendent has agreed to all the requirements of the Comptroller, except the closing of the Broadway front at 6 p. m. Room 32 is added to the toilet arrangements of the building, with special private accommodations; the elevator service will be largely improved; prismatic lights will be furnished as promised, and a saving made in the rent of \$600 per annum.

The lease of the offices occupied by the city in the Stewart Building, as specified by the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 25, 1901, will expire May 1, 1902, and I would therefore recommend that the same be renewed for one year from said date, at an annual rental of \$110,600, the lessors agreeing to make alterations, improvements and provide prismatic lights, as set forth above.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and hereby is requested to prepare a lease to the city, for a term of one year from May 1, 1902, at a yearly rental of one hundred and ten thousand and six hundred dollars (\$110,600), upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease therefor, of certain rooms, offices and apartments now occupied by the various city departments in the Stewart Building, situated on Broadway, between Chambers and Reade streets, Borough of Manhattan, as follows:

By the Department of Finance—The whole of the first floor, with the exception of Room 32; also the offices or apartments in the basement or ground floor designated as JJ, TT and XX; also the rooms designated as Rooms O and P, fronting on Chambers street, and II, OO and PP, in the basement; also Rooms Nos. 52, 54, 55, 56, 63, 65, 67, 81, 83, 84, 85, 86, 87, 88, 89, 90, 91 and 92, on the second floor; also Rooms Nos. 139, 141 and 142 on the third floor.

By the Department of Taxes and Assessments—Rooms designated as D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K and R, on the ground floor, and Room DD, in the basement, with vault chamber and vault connected therewith.

By the Commissioners of Accounts—Rooms Nos. 104, 105, 114, 115 and 121 on the third floor.

By the Commissioner of Jurors—Rooms Nos. 123, 127 and 128 on the third floor.

By the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes—Room No. 203 on the fifth floor.

The owners to make such repairs, alterations and improvements as have been mutually agreed upon before the execution of the lease; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the city that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the President of the Borough of Richmond relative to a renewal of the lease of offices in the First National Bank Building, Borough of Richmond:

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, No. 12 Stewart Building, New York City:

DEAR SIR—In view of all the circumstances, I recommend the extension of the lease of the offices now occupied by the President of the Borough of Richmond for one year from the 1st of January, 1902.

These offices are admirably adapted to the President's uses, as well as for the meetings of the Local Board. If, however, new quarters in one building can be secured by the 1st of May for all the departments coming under the authority of the Borough President, I think it will be wise to make such change. I therefore recommend that no extension of the present lease of the so-called "Richmond Building" be made at present.

In case suitable quarters for all the departments can be secured when the lease of the "Richmond Building" expires on the 1st of May next, the offices now occupied by the President of the Borough of Richmond will be taken by the County Judge, whose court adjoins the office of the Borough President, and who very much desires such an enlargement of his quarters as my rooms will afford. The City, therefore, can lose nothing by making the lease of one year which I suggest.

FEBRUARY 20, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Upon the attached application of the President of the Borough of Richmond, for a renewal of the lease of offices (four rooms) on the second floor of the First National Bank Building, Jay street, Staten Island, for one year from January 1, 1902, I would recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize such renewal, upon the same terms, viz., \$1,200 per annum.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Police Department relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of premises at New Dorp, Borough of Richmond:

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Police Commissioner this day on reading and filing communication from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, dated February 19, 1902,

Ordered, That the proceedings of January 23, 1901, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to renew lease of premises on the southeast corner of New Dorp lane or avenue and Eighth street, New Dorp, Borough of Richmond, for the



term of one year from September 1, 1902, at an annual rent of \$1,000. B. C. Gaedeke, lessor, be and are hereby amended so that the term of such renewal shall be for three years, in pursuance of a covenant in said lease providing that the party of the second part may have, if it so elects, the privilege of a renewal of the indenture for three years from the expiration thereof, upon the same terms and conditions, etc.

The Deputy Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises No. 105 Jackson avenue, and No. 176 Seventh street, Long Island City, for the use of the Fire Department:

February 25, 1902.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I present herewith a report made to the Comptroller by the Engineer of the Department of Finance giving full particulars relative to the lease of premises occupied by the Fire Department at No. 105 Jackson avenue, and No. 176 Seventh street, Long Island City.

The lessor of the property has been to see me a number of times with a view of adjusting the matter, and he finally agreed to accept Mr. McLean's recommendations, with the exception of the term which he insists should be four years from January 1, 1901, instead of three years.

In view of the fact that the Fire Department has been in occupation of these premises, which were built upon plans approved by the Fire Department of Long Island City, since 1893, and are the most desirable to be had in that vicinity, I recommend that a lease be authorized for a term of four years from January 1, 1901, at an annual rental of \$1,000, payable monthly, the lessor to pay all taxes and assessments and keep the outside of the building in repair; the city to pay all the usual water rents and charges, and to make all necessary alterations and repairs to the interior of the building.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Mrs. Margaret Phillips, in communication to the Comptroller, under date of December 21, 1901, requests that some action be taken by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, fixing the rental for the year 1901 and ensuing term of years, of premises now occupied by the Fire Department as an engine house at No. 105 Jackson avenue and No. 176 Seventh street, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, City of New York.

In reply I would report as follows:

From the minutes of the Board of Fire Commissioners of Long Island City, now on file in the Expert Accountants' Bureau of this Department, it appears that this Fire House was built by Mrs. Margaret Phillips for the use of the city, in 1893, upon plans approved by the Fire Department of Long Island City.

The minutes of the Fire Board of August 1, 1893, say:

"The lease of the new Fire House on Jackson avenue, between Sixth and Seventh streets, was presented to the Board and read. It is for a term of two years from August 1, 1893, with the privilege of renewal for four years more, at a yearly rental of \$750, payable quarterly. The Board of Fire Commissioners have the privilege of purchasing the premises at any time during the demised period, or the renewal thereof, for \$12,000. On motion Commissioner Sharkey was authorized and directed to sign the lease as President of the Board for the city; Mrs. Margaret Phillips signing as owner of premises."

Some further extracts from these minutes are as follows:

May 15, 1895—Commissioner Gray, as Committee on renewal of lease of First Ward house, was authorized to offer Mrs. Phillips \$800 per annum on a lease of one year with privilege of two years renewal.

June 29, 1895—Commissioner Gray reported that Mrs. Phillips was willing to take \$800 per year rent for the First Ward Engine House, and the Clerk was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to draw up a form of lease on these terms.

I have been unable to obtain a record or copy of these leases. Mr. William E. Stewart, now at No. 19 Liberty street, Borough of Manhattan, was the Corporation Counsel of Long Island City during 1893, 1894 and 1895, but he does not recall the details, covenants, etc., of these leases, nor can his letter book of that period be found, though diligent search has been made.

The Common Council of Long Island City on December 21, 1897, adopted a resolution (copy of which is hereto annexed) authorizing the Mayor and Board of Fire Commissioners of Long Island City to lease the said premises for a period of three years at an annual rental of \$1,000.

The original of this resolution, now on file in the City Clerk's office in Long Island City, shows that it was received at the Mayor's office, December 24, 1897, but was never approved by the Mayor.

After a thorough search of the books and papers in said City Clerk's office, I am unable to find any trace of the lease so authorized or any evidence to show that it was ever executed or filed in that office.

An alleged copy of the lease dated December 30, 1897, has been produced and is attached hereto, but this lease does not appear to have been signed by the Board of Fire Commissioners, as required by the resolution of the Common Council of Long Island City, and in view of the fact that the said resolution had not been approved by the Mayor of Long Island City on the said 30th day of December, 1897, nor had the ten days allowed him by law for his approval or disapproval of such paper, expired, the question arises as to whether a valid lease was, or could be, executed upon the date named.

The question also suggests itself as to whether, under the resolution of the Common Council, the Mayor was authorized to execute a lease with the conditions as to renewal or purchase, contained in the alleged copy of the lease now produced.

The city has paid the rent on these premises to January 1, 1901, the last three years, at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, but has paid no rental since.

Mrs. Phillips, in her communication, requests that a lease be made for a term of five years, from January 1, 1901, at an annual rental of \$1,500, to be paid monthly, and that the lease contain the same covenants as expressed in the alleged lease.

The rental asked I consider excessive, and the covenants required are very unusual and not at all advantageous or fair to the city; if Mrs. Phillips's request was granted the city would either have to purchase the property for \$12,000 or continue renewing the lease indefinitely.

Therefore, in view of the fact that there is no lease or agreement binding the city to make a lease for a term of five years, at a rental to be agreed upon, and to contain the covenants that the city is to pay all the regular annual taxes, rents or charges which are or may be assessed or imposed, according to law, upon the said premises, including the usual water rents and rates, and to make a renewal on the same terms, or purchase the property for the sum of \$12,000, I would recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the Comptroller to notify Mrs. Margaret Phillips that they will authorize a lease to the city of her premises and building No. 105 Jackson avenue and No. 176 Seventh street, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, for the use of the Fire Department, for a term of three years from January 1, 1901, at an annual rental of \$1,000, payable quarterly, the lessor (Mrs. Phillips) to pay all taxes and assessments and keep the outside of the building in repair; the city to pay all the usual water rents and charges and make all necessary alterations and repairs to the interior of the building.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Department of Docks and Ferries in a communication dated February 6th to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, request the approval of a renewal of the lease of the Pier new 58, North river, situated between West Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, to John H. Starin, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1902, at an annual rental of \$13,750, payable quarterly in advance, all as provided for in the existing lease which expires May 1, 1902, and which is at an annual rental of \$12,500.

According to the report of the Department of Docks and Ferries the pier has been sublet to the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad.

The lease contains covenants that the lessee shall at his own cost keep and maintain the pier and appurtenances in good and sufficient repair, and in default of such covenant the City may make such repairs at the expense of the lessee, and if destroyed, shall be rebuilt by lessee.

That the City may at any time dredge the basins or slips adjoining said pier as may be necessary.

That the lessee will be responsible for all damages arising from any injury to persons or property due to his negligence or that of his employees, etc.

That the wharfage charged shall be in accordance with that fixed by law and that no charge shall be made for Hell Gate or Sound Pilot boats, boats belonging to the United States Navy or garrisons or ships of war of foreign nations.

That the Commissioner of Docks may terminate the lease upon written notice to the lessee if he shall deem it necessary to either improve the property upon plans now in existence or hereafter to be adopted, or if he shall determine that the pier or part of the same shall be used for other purposes than the collection of wharfage.

That the lessee shall have the right to build and maintain a shed, which, at the end of the lease, shall become the property of the City.

No further renewal is provided for.

I am of the opinion that the lease may be properly approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a renewal of the lease of Pier, new 58, North river, situated between West Twenty-eighth and West Twenty-ninth streets, Borough of Manhattan, to John H. Starin, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1902, at an annual rental of thirteen thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$13,750), payable quarterly in advance, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from Mr. William Montgomery relative to a sale of the lease of city property at the southeast corner of One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Amsterdam avenue, Borough of Manhattan:

NEW YORK, February 25, 1902.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I hereby make application for the premises situated at the southeast corner of One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Amsterdam avenue, the city being the owner of the said premises. I purpose to occupy the same as a plumbing and gasfiting establishment for my personal business and the purposes of my present occupation. I beg to offer, for the lease of the said premises for a term of three or more years, if the same is considered practical and favorably by the Commissioners, the sum of three hundred and sixty dollars (\$360) a year, and hereby agree to make all the necessary repairs of said premises, and will give a real estate bond to the city to cover all stipulated amounts.

I am informed that the city will not undertake to make the said necessary repairs to these premises. The cottage is at present in very bad condition. The roof leaks very badly, the windows are all broken, the doors are broken and out of repair, and if the place is allowed to remain in its present bad shape it will be in a very short time a total wreck.

In connection therewith the Deputy Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, and offered the following resolution:

February 26, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—William Montgomery, Plumber, No. 472 West One Hundred and Fiftieth street, makes application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of February 25, 1902, for a lease of premises owned by the city at the southeast corner of One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Amsterdam avenue. He offers therefor \$360 per annum for a lease for three years, agreeing to make all alterations to the premises.

In reply I would report that the lease of these premises was offered for sale on April 27, 1899, at an upset price of \$500, and the same was purchased by James F. McGowan, who failed to execute the lease therefor.

Since that time the premises have been in the hands of the Collector of City Revenue and are vacant, and I am informed that the frame building is in bad condition.

I would, therefore, recommend that the lease of the following described property be sold at auction for a term of three years from date of sale; lessee to make all repairs necessary to keep the premises in tenable condition, including repairs to roof, and lease to contain other usual clauses.

The premises on the southeasterly corner of Amsterdam avenue and West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, being 58 feet and  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an inch on West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, by 98 feet and  $\frac{5}{8}$  of an inch along the westerly line of the old Croton Aqueduct, by 78 feet 10 inches on Amsterdam avenue, together with the buildings thereon, at \$400 per annum.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to sell for the highest marketable price or rental, at public auction, after public advertisement, lease of premises belonging to the Corporation of The City of New York, described below, for the term of three years from date of sale.

The premises on the southeasterly corner of Amsterdam avenue and West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, being 58 feet and  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an inch on West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, by 98 feet and  $\frac{5}{8}$  of an inch along the westerly line of the old Croton Aqueduct, by 78 feet 10 inches on Amsterdam avenue, together with the buildings thereon.

The minimum or upset price for which said lease shall be sold is hereby appraised and fixed at \$400 per annum, and the sale should be made upon the following

Terms and Conditions:

"The highest bidder will be required to pay the auctioneer's fee and twenty-five per cent. of the amount of the yearly rental bid at the time and place of sale.

"The amount so paid for one quarter's rent shall be forfeited if the successful bidder does not execute the lease when notified that it is ready for execution. He will also be required to give a bond in double the amount of the annual rent bid, with two sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, conditioned for the payment of the rent quarterly in advance and for the performance and fulfillment of the covenants and terms of the lease.

"No person will be received as lessee or surety who is a delinquent on any former lease from the corporation, and no bid will be accepted from any person who is in arrears to the corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the corporation, as provided by law.

"No alteration shall be made in any of the premises except with the consent of the Comptroller, and all alterations made are to be made at the expense of the lessee.

"The lessee shall be required to make all repairs necessary to keep the premises in good tenable condition, including repairs to the roofs, at his own expense.

"The lease will be in the usual form of leases of like property, a copy of which may be seen at the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue, and of Markets, Department of Finance, Room 139 Stewart Building, corner Chambers street and Broadway, Borough of Manhattan.

"The lease will contain, in addition to other terms, a covenant or condition reserving to the corporation the right to cancel the same whenever the premises may be required by it for public purposes, upon thirty days' notice.

"The Comptroller shall have the right to reject any bid if deemed to be for the best interests of the city."

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries, transmitting memorandum relative to the proposed sale of the franchise of the Fulton, Wall, Catharine, South and Hamilton Ferries:

February 24, 1902.

SIR—I have been directed by the Commissioner of Docks to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 19th inst., requesting all the facts in regard to the sale of the franchises of the Fulton, Wall, Catharine, South and Hamilton Ferries.

Memorandum in relation to the ferry franchises of the Fulton, Wall, Catharine, South and Hamilton ferries.

The lease under which the ferries were operated prior to the first of May, 1901, and under which the Union Ferry Company is now holding over, was sold at public auction in 1893, the five ferry franchises, etc., being sold together at an upset price of seven and three-quarters per cent. of the gross receipts of all of said ferries. It also provided that the highest bidder or purchaser of the lease, other than the Union Ferry Company of New York and Brooklyn, assignee of the Union Ferry Company of Brooklyn, would be required to purchase and pay for the property of said company at the appraised valuation thereof, to wit, \$3,229,401. The lease also covenanted that four months previous to the expiration thereof an appraisal shall be made in the manner therein stated, by appraisers, one of whom shall be appointed by the Comptroller and one by the lessee.

The question was first taken up by the previous Board of Docks on February 21, 1901, when the matter was referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer, and on March 22, 1901, they submitted to the Board a recommendation which was adopted, that the lease of the ferry franchises and wharf property used in connection therewith be sold separately, at the upset price or rental per annum of \$29,144.65 for the Hamilton Avenue Ferry, \$19,361.66 for the South Ferry, \$9,797.65 for the Wall Street Ferry, \$15,462.96 for the Fulton Ferry, and \$14,636.26 for the Catharine Street Ferry, and that the Comptroller and the Union Ferry Company be requested to nominate each a disinterested person to act as appraisers of the boats, buildings and other property owned by the ferry company and used in connection with said ferries in accordance with the present lease thereof. These figures were arrived at by adding fifty per cent. to the amount received for each of the ferries for the year 1900, and amounting to eleven and sixty-five one hundredths per cent. of the gross receipts.

No appraisal had been made in conformity with the above recited covenant in the lease, and there was then no time to make one, but both the Dock Department and the company agreed to accept the valuation of 1898, namely, \$3,229,401, and to this there was no objection on the part of the Sinking Fund Commissioners.

The Engineer of the Finance Department reported at a meeting of the Sinking Fund held April 10, 1901, that, in his opinion, the upset price was too high, for the reason that the receipts from three of these ferries had been considerably decreased between 1896 and 1900, and that, in consequence of the assessed valuation having been fixed at the valuation of 1893 in a lump sum, that the ferry franchises should be sold together; he also suggested a few minor details, and the report was then ordered referred to the Department of Docks and Ferries, and the Board of Docks, on April 19, amended the form of advertisement and re-submitted same, so as to provide for the sale of the ferries in one lot.

At a meeting of the Sinking Fund held May 3, 1901, the terms and conditions of the proposed sale were approved, provided the lessee filed its official approval of the valuation of \$3,229,401, and the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries was thereupon ordered to request the company to file same, and Philip A. Smyth, auctioneer, was authorized to offer the franchise for sale at public auction.

The consent of the Union Ferry Company to the valuation was received by the Board of Docks May 17, and the auctioneer then offered the franchises for sale, but no bid was received.

On June 3, 1901, a communication was received from William A. Jenner, attorney, requesting, on behalf of the Union Ferry Company, that a new lease of the franchises be offered for sale at an upset price of three and one-half per cent. per annum of the gross receipts, and that the new franchise provide for an increase in the charge for foot passengers to two cents. The terms and conditions of sale were thereupon ordered prepared at an upset price of four and one-half per cent., no change, however, to be made in the charge for foot passengers. This was sent to the Sinking Fund for approval on June 4, 1901.

On June 12 the Deputy Comptroller requested a statement of the fee value and rental value of the property belonging to the city and used in the different ferries referred to, and on the 17th the information requested was transmitted as follows:

"I beg to state that, in the opinion of this Department, the value of the property, in case the ferries were removed and the property used for wharfage purposes, would be as follows:

"which, at fee value of \$100 per linear foot, amounts to \$53,500, 6 per cent. of which would make the rental value \$3,210."

At a meeting held June 20 the Sinking Fund declined to approve the terms and conditions of sale on the basis of 4½ per cent., on the ground that the upset price fixed was less than the rental which could be obtained for the wharf property of the city if leased for other than ferry purposes, and that if a sale should be made on the terms proposed, not only would the city receive nothing for the franchise for operating the ferries, but would in effect be subsidizing the ferry companies to the extent of the difference between such upset price and the fair market value of said wharf property, and suggested that the upset price be fixed at 5 3-10 per cent. On July 19 the lease of the ferry franchises was offered for auction at an upset price of 5 3-10 per cent. per annum, but no bid was received.

The Secretary was then directed to prepare new terms and conditions of sale at an upset price of 3½ per cent. per annum, which was transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund July 19, 1901. No action appears to have been taken by the Sinking Fund, and on October 25, 1901, the return of the proposed advertisement was requested by the Board of Docks.

On October 31, 1901, a communication was received from Wm. A. Jenner, attorney for the Union Ferry Company, stating that the company does not desire to be considered as operating the ferries under the terms of the lease which expired May 1, 1901.

The Union Ferry Company has paid no rent for the ferry franchises and wharf property since May 1, 1901, and a claim for six months' rent, to November 1, 1901, at 7¾ per cent. of the gross receipts, namely, \$30,977.36, was transmitted to the Corporation Counsel on December 20 of last year.

Attached thereto is a statement showing the receipts of the Union Ferry Company for the fiscal years ending October 31, 1896, 1897, 1898, 1899 and 1900; also the average receipts for the past five years for each ferry.
