No. 344.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 102 of the Building Code in regard to the requirements for auxiliary fire apparatus.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 102 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 102. In every building now erected, unless already provided with a three-inch or larger vertical pipe, which exceeds one hundred feet in height; and in every building hereafter to be erected exceeding eighty-five feet in height, and when any such building does not exceed one hundred and fifty feet in height, it shall be provided with a four-inch stand pipe, running from cellar to roof, with one two-way three-inch Siamese connection to be placed on street above the curb level, and with one two-and-one-half-inch outlet, with hose attached thereto on each floor, placed as near the stairs as practicable; and all buildings now erected, unless already provided with a three-inch or larger vertical pipe, or hereafter to be erected, exceeding one hundred and fifty feet in height, shall be provided with an auxiliary fire apparatus and appliances, consisting of water tank on roof, or in cellar, stand pipes, hose, nozzles, wrenches, fire extinguishers, hooks, axes and such other appliances as may be required by the Fire Department—all to be of the best material and of the sizes, patterns and regulation kinds used and required by the Fire Department. In every such building a steam or electric pump and at least one passenger elevator shall be kept in readiness for immediate use by the Fire Department during all hours of the night and day, including holidays and Sundays. The said steam or electric pumps, if located in the lowest story, shall be placed not less than two feet above the floor level. All the wires and cables which supply power to the electric pumps shall be covered with fireproof material, or protected in such other manner as to prevent the destruction or damage of said cables and wires by fire. The boilers which supply power to the passenger elevators and steam or electric pumps, if located in the lowest story, shall be so surrounded by a dwarf brick wall laid in cement mortar, or other suitable permanent waterproof construction, as to exclude water to the depth of two feet above the floor level from flowing into the ash pits of said boilers. When the level of the floor of the lowest story is above the level of the sewer in the street a large cesspool shall be placed in said floor and connected by a four-inch cast-iron drain pipe with the street sewer. Stand pipes shall not be less than six inches in diameter for all buildings exceeding one hundred and fifty feet in height. All stand pipes shall extend to the street and there be provided at or near the sidewalk level with the Siamese connections. Said stand pipes shall also extend to the roof. Valve outlets shall be provided on each and every story, including the basement and cellar and on the roof. All valves, hose, tools and other appliances provided for in this section shall be kept in perfect working order, and once a month the person in charge of said building shall make a thorough inspection of the same to see that all valves, hose and other appliances are in perfect working order and ready for immediate use by the Fire Department. If any of the said buildings extend from street to street, or form an L shape, they shall be provided with stand pipes for each street frontage. In such buildings as are used or occupied for business or manufacturing purposes there shall be provided, in connection with said stand pipe or pipes, two-and-one-half-inch perforated iron pipes placed on and along the ceiling line of each floor below the first floor, and extending to the full depth of the building. Said perforated pipe shall be provided with a valve placed at or near the stand pipe, so that water can be let into same when deemed necessary by the firemen, or in lieu of such perforated pipes automatic sprinklers may be put in. When the building is twenty-five feet or less in width two lines of perforated pipe shall be provided, and one line additionally for each twelve and one-half feet, or part thereof, that the building is wider than twenty-five feet. A suitable iron plate with raised letters shall be fastened to the wall near said stand pipe, to read, "This stand pipe connects to perforated pipes in the cellar."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Amendment to the rules and regulations for Plumbing, Drainage and Water Supply of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan.

That section 39 of the rules and regulations for Plumbing, Drainage and Water Supply of Buildings shall read:

"All connections between lead pipes and between brass or copper pipes must be made by means of white soldered joints, and all floor flanges of all sanitary fixtures and all connections between said fixtures and waste or soil pipes, where said connections are on outlet or sewer side of trap, shall be made without the use of red lead, putty, plaster, cement or any other similar substance."

That section 106 of the rules and regulations for Plumbing, Drainage and Water Supply of Buildings shall read:

"All earthenware traps must have heavy brass floor plates soldered to the lead bends or, where brass or iron pipes are used, to be screwed to same and bolted to the trap flange and the joint be made gas-tight without the use of red or white lead or any similar substance or rubber washers, the use of which in the making of said connections is hereby prohibited and no device for such connections will be permitted to be used unless it has been approved by the Bureau of Buildings."

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, May 8, 1903.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held on Friday, May 1, 1903.

There were present President Ogden and Commissioners Mason, Dykman and Banta.

The reading of the minutes of the meeting held May 1 was postponed until the next meeting.

Jefferson Deevy, accompanied by his counsel, Abram I. Elkus, appeared to show cause for the certification of his name as eligible for appointment to the position of Captain in the Police Department. He submitted the following

Protest.

"To the Municipal Civil Service Commissioners of The City of New York:

"Gentlemen—I, Jefferson Deevy, Captain of Police of The City of New York, do respectfully protest against any action being taken by you in any way relating to the revocation of my certification on the eligible list for promotion as Captain of Police. Without limiting myself by the following statement of grounds, I respectfully make this protest upon the following grounds, among others:

"1. That I had absolutely no part of the furnishing to you of my record in the Police Department, and that any errors in said record which may have existed occurred without my knowledge or consent."

"2. That your Board has no jurisdiction or legal right to review and overrule the action of the Board which certified me upon the eligible list for a Captaincy of Police."

"3. There is no evidence or proof of any kind that the addition of the fine of ten days' pay to my record would in the opinion of the examiners who examined me have reduced my rating below the minimum required by the Board which certified me upon the eligible list."

"4. That I was entitled to certification on the eligible list for promotion to my present position as Captain of Police, and as a veteran of the Civil War was entitled to my appointment as Captain."

"I make this protest reserving to myself all further and other legal objections to any further action you may take."

"Yours respectfully,

(Signed) "JEFFERSON DEEVY, Captain of Police."

May 8, 1903.

The Commission reserved decision in the matter.

Four members of the Uniformed Force of the Fire Department appeared, by invitation, to protest against the following paragraph of Rule 54:

Subject: Quarterly Report Ending March 31, 1903.

To the Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following statement of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending March 31, 1903:

Beginning at the Battery, North river, the permanent breakwater south of Pier "A" has been practically completed.

Work on the section of the bulkhead wall in the vicinity of Cedar street, North river, has been in progress. In connection with the bulkhead wall at this section, it is proposed in the near future to construct two piers, and a contract has been prepared and let for the erection of Pier 10. A contract has also been prepared, but has not yet been let, for the erection of Pier 11.

A freight shed has been erected along the bulkhead between Rector and Carlisle streets by the Metropolitan Steamship Company.

The extension of Pier, new 35, North river, from the outer end has been in progress.

At Chelsea Section, North river, dredging has been in progress during the quarter, and the actual work of construction of the bulkhead wall has been begun. The factories and other buildings occupying ground recently condemned for the use of this Department have been sold at public auction and have been removed by the purchasers. The old Pier at the foot of West Nineteenth street is being removed, and the platform between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets is being torn out. Piers at the foot of West Nineteenth and West Twentieth streets are being removed, and the old shed on the Pier at the foot of West Twenty-first street is being torn down under contract. The work of removing Pier at Twenty-first street itself is also in progress. The Pier at the foot of West Twenty-second street has been removed and preparations are being made for building a new pier in place thereof. Extensive dredging operations have been in progress between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, between Nineteenth and Twenty-first streets, and between Twenty-first and Twenty-third streets. A portion of the Erie Transfer Bridge and the ferry structure of the latter company at Twenty-third street, North river, have been removed.

At West Forty-seventh street section work has been in progress during the quarter.

An incinerator is being constructed at West Forty-seventh street, North river, by the Department of Street Cleaning, and a platform built at the same locality.

At West Fifty-first street, North river, an extension to the pier from the outer end has been in progress.

A new pier is being constructed at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, and at West Fifty-ninth street a section of the bulkhead wall is being built.

Work on the Pier at Seventy-ninth street has been in progress during the quarter, but is now temporarily suspended.

At West Ninety-seventh street, North river, a new pier is being built by the force of the Department.

Substantial progress has been made in the construction of the bulkhead wall at Claremont section, North river, though no actual wharfage room has been made by the work done. The inner end of the old Pier at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-second street has been removed, as well as the bulkhead south of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street. Earth filling is in course of being placed in rear of the wall at this section.

On the East river a dumping board, which had been previously erected by Brown & Fleming, has been torn down and removed from Pier, old 12, East river.

A shed has been erected on Pier 16 by C. H. Mallory & Co., and a steel shed is in course of construction on the bulkhead platform between Piers 16 and 17, East river, by the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company.

A freight shed is in course of erection on Pier 12, under contract.

The inner portion of Pier, old 25 and old 26, and the sheds thereon, are being removed to make way for the construction of the proposed bulkhead wall in the neighborhood of Peck slip. The removal of Pier, old 24, to make way for proposed Pier, new 19, was begun, but was stopped by injunction of the Supreme Court.

In the neighborhood of Market Section filling is being placed in rear of the bulkhead wall already built in that vicinity. A temporary approach has been constructed to Pier, new 29, and the sewer in this neighborhood kept in repair during the quarter. Rip-rap is being deposited about the foundation piles of Pier, new 30, East river, in order to strengthen the pier for the support of a recreation structure shortly to be erected thereon.

At East Twenty-third Street Section earth filling has been placed in rear of the wall already built.

The recreation ground in the vicinity of East Seventeenth and East Eighteenth streets has been cared for during the quarter.

Considerable work has been done at the East Thirty-eighth Street Section during the quarter, though no actual wharfage room has been made. Earth filling has been placed in rear of that portion of the wall built, and a foundation is being erected for a crane at the foot of East Thirty-ninth street for the New York Edison Company.

At East Seventy-fourth Street Section the work of construction of the wall has been in progress, and is rapidly approaching completion so far as it can be built at present. A rubble wall has been built at the northerly end of the section to retain the earth filling, and a platform has been constructed from the southerly end of the bulkhead wall to the southerly limit of the section.

At the foot of Eighty-sixth street two old piers which have existed for some time have been removed, and a contract has been prepared and let for building one new wooden pier in place of the two which formerly existed.

The bulkhead wall at East One Hundred and Second, One Hundred and Tenth, One Hundred and Sixteenth and One Hundred and Twenty-first Streets Sections has been examined with a view of making repairs to the masonry.

Between One Hundred and Eleventh and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets, Hudson river, extensive repairs are being made to the crib bulkhead at the request of the Park Department.

Filling is being placed behind the crib bulkhead along One Hundred and Thirty-first street, Harlem river, and in rear of the crib recently built at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street.

A coal handling plant and a derrick are being erected between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth streets by Cording & Salzman.

Between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, Harlem river, retaining structures are being erected by John B. McDonald.

A rip-rap stone wall is being erected at Morris Heights by the Gas Engine and Power Company and Charles L. Seabury & Co. (Consolidated).

At Casanova a platform and other structures have been erected by the Rock Plaster Company.

The old float at Randall's Island was removed and a platform erected along the line of the steamboat landing for the Department of Public Charities.

Close piling is being driven along the crib bulkhead at Riker's Island to prevent deposits made thereat being washed away.

A new wooden pier with appurtenances has been constructed on the westerly side of North Brother Island under contract.

At East One Hundred and Thirty-second street, East river, the work of constructing a new pier has been completed.

In the Borough of Brooklyn, among the numerous water front improvements may be mentioned a crib bulkhead, with coal handling tower and in-take tunnel, which is being constructed by the Edison Electric and Illuminating Company, between Sixty-sixth street and Wakeman place.

At the foot of Fifty-second street, South Brooklyn, a sheet pile bulkhead has been constructed by State Naval Militia, and five piers are in course of construction between Forty-third and Fifty-first streets by the Bush Company, Limited.

At the foot of Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets the water front has been improved by the Brooklyn Dock and Terminal Company.

In the Atlantic Basin extensive water front improvements are in progress by the New York Dock Company.

Between Bay Thirty-eighth and Bay Fortieth streets the land under water is being filled in by William Ulmer, and at Sea Gate, Coney Island, a sheet pile bulkhead has been constructed by John B. O'Donohue.

In the Borough of Queens among the work in progress may be mentioned a pier built at the foot of Academy street by Jamieson & Bond, and an extension to the present coal handling plant at Bond avenue, and a pile bulkhead between Academy avenue and Bond street, all being constructed by the same firm.

In the Borough of Richmond a number of pieces of work have been done by private parties, supervised by this Department.

Along the marginal street on the North river asphalt has been laid at various places where necessary to repair the pavement already laid, and on the East river the pavement has been repaired where necessary, and a contract awarded for new paving between Eighteenth and Twenty-first streets and between Piers, old 20 and new 16.

The timber basin on the North river, the pile basins on the North river and at Sherman's creek, the basin for the storage of old material, Brooklyn, and the Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth streets have all been maintained and cared for.

The recreation buildings on the North and East rivers have been maintained and cared for and repairs made where necessary. The recreation structure on Pier 43, North river, at the foot of Christopher street, has been painted.

All of the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter, and has been repaired from time to time when necessary. The surveys of the water front and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx have been made, and an extensive survey of the water front of Queens and Richmond is in progress. All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or private parties.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order or permit from the Board of Docks. Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit from the Commissioner of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the office force has been engaged in regular routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 868 linear feet. Wharfage room destroyed by the City in preparing for new improvements is 2,794 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 840 square feet.

The total increase of wharfage room made by private parties under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries is 3,500 linear feet.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE Erie Railroad Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a railroad in and upon Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way lying between Thirteenth avenue and the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of the City of New York hereby grants to the Erie Railroad Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railroad, with a single switch connecting the two tracks, to be operated by steam locomotives or other motive power which may be lawfully employed, except horses or the overhead system of electricity, across Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way extending from the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City, County and State of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—This ordinance as to the marginal wharf which extends from the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river shall not be operative and no rights thereunder shall vest in the grantee, its successors or assigns until the Commissioner of Docks, under the provisions of section 819 of the Charter of the City of New York, shall approve by resolution, license or otherwise, the use of such marginal wharf by the grantee in the manner herein provided, or in such other manner as he may prescribe, not inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate such railroad shall be held and enjoyed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided, with the privilege of renewal of the grant for a further period of twenty-five years, upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and is not to include the valuation of the right of the grantee to operate or use of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Provided, however, and this grant is upon the express condition that the right, privilege and franchise conferred by this ordinance may be cancelled and annulled upon one year's notice in writing to the grantee, its successors and assigns, by the joint act of the Commissioner of Docks of the City of New York and of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or their respective successors in authority, and thereupon all the rights of the grantee, its successors or assigns in and upon the street and marginal wharf or way aforesaid shall cease, and the railroad and its structures thereon shall be forthwith removed and the pavement of the street or wharf restored under the same conditions and covenants as are contained in the following paragraph of this section, designated third:

Third—Upon the termination of such franchise, right or privilege, whether original or by way of renewal, the plant and property, with its appurtenances, of the Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, in the street and upon the marginal wharf or way aforesaid, shall be forthwith removed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, and the surface of the said street or marginal wharf or way upon which such railroad was laid shall be restored to a condition equal to that of the surrounding surface and pavement

of such street and wharf. In default of the performance of this condition by the grantee, its successors or assigns, the proper legal authorities may cause such property and plant to be removed from the street and wharf aforesaid and the surface thereof to be restored in the manner above described at the expense of the grantee, its successors or assigns, and such expense shall be recovered by The City of New York by action or otherwise.

Fourth—The grantee, its successors or assigns shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money:

During the first term of five years the annual sum of \$675.

During the second term of five years the annual sum of \$700.

During the third term of five years the annual sum of \$725.

During the fourth term of five years the annual sum of \$750.

During the fifth term of five years the annual sum of \$800.

Such sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year.

Fifth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—The said railroad may be operated by locomotive steam power or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law, excepting overhead electrical power and horse power, provided, however, that the locomotive steam engines used shall be housed or boxed so as to conform to the type commonly known as the dummy engine.

The number of cars to be included in any train operated upon the railroad shall be limited to ten, and the speed of the engines and cars shall never exceed six miles per hour. No car or engine shall be permitted to remain stationary within the limits of Thirteenth avenue, or upon the marginal wharf or street at any time.

Seventh—The railroad constructed under this ordinance shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise and for no other purpose, and especially for no purpose in connection with the passenger traffic as commonly understood.

Eighth—Such railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and solely upon the terms and according to the lines and surveys and of the character of the rails and other parts of the construction approved by the Commissioner of Docks of the City of New York and the President of the Borough of Manhattan. Such railroad of the grantee, its successors or assigns shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Ninth—Said railroad shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York, and especially shall in all respects be subject to the power and authority of the Commissioner of Docks to regulate and control the uses of the marginal wharf or way above described, and the transportation of property thereon.

Tenth—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall at all times keep the street between the tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow.

Eleventh—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall keep in permanent repair the portion of the surface of the street and of the marginal wharf or way between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the street and marginal wharf or way, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs hereinafter contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twelfth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited and annulled by The City of New York by an action brought by the Corporation Counsel on ten days' notice to the grantee, its successors or assigns.

Sec. 3. This grant is upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Sec. 4. The grantee, its successors or assigns shall commence the construction of the railroad under this franchise and complete the same within six months from the date when it has obtained the necessary permits and resolutions of the City officials and Departments, and on or before January 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceedings either at law or otherwise for that purpose, provided, however, that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for a period not exceeding six months.

Sec. 5. This grant is upon the express condition that the grantee, within thirty days after it has been duly authorized to construct or operate its railroad hereunder, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of \$1,500, either in money or in securities, to be approved by him, which shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of said grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railroad. In case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company.
