The discipline of the Department has been good, and the inspection, repair and operation of all the completed bridges have been attended to with care, and have proceeded as usual.

Bridges Over East River.

No. 1, Brooklyn Bridge-

On the bridge railway the local train service, operated by cable power during the morning and evening rush hours, and by electric power during slack hours, has been maintained with great regularity and freedom from accident.

The through elevated railway train service, operated over the bridge by electric power—from Park row, Borough of Manhattan, to Coney Island, Brighton Beach, Brighton Race Track, Manhattan Beach and on Fifth Avenue Line—furnished an acceptable means of travel to the resorts and districts served, but the efficiency of this service has been somewhat depreciated by numerous annoying delays incident to the stalling of trains upon the steep grades of the bridge, or resulting from defects in the new open motor car equipment. The railroad company is making persistent efforts to overcome all such hindrances to effective and regular train service.

In preparation for the installation of four additional loops for surface cars, at the Manhattan terminal of the bridge, active building operations were begun in March last, but all work was suspended early in April by the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company because a claim for damages for loss of light and air, etc., was made by Luyties Brothers, tenants of the arches under the bridge approach, between Rose and William streets. The railroad company declined to assume responsibility for such damages, and claimed that it was the duty of the City, for public interests, to settle with its tenant and thereby aid in the improvement of the terminal for surface cars. After much discussion and careful consideration of the subject, it was arranged that the City should make an agreement with Luyties Brothers whereby, in consideration of a certain reduction in the annual rent to be paid for the premises, they should waive their claim for damages for loos of light and air resulting from widening the roadways, and for temporary inconvenience due to or contingent upon interference with the free use of the premises by the erection of shoring and other material during construction, the railroad companies to bear the entire expense of all changes and additions of every kind and nature required, and to be responsible for all injuries and damages to persons or property—except those specifically covered by the agreement above mentioned—with the intent that the extension of the terminal for surface cars shall be constructed and the cars operated therein, subject to and in conformity with the terms of existing agreements under which the railroad companies obtained the privilege of crossing the bridge, and with the same force and effect as though the plans for the four additional loops had been included in said agreements.

This disposition of work and responsibility was satisfactory to all parties concerned, and building operations were resumed on June 22, 1903. It is expected that the new loops will be completed and ready for service on October 1 next.

These counts show an apparent falling off in the grand total of counts taken November 10, 1902 (329,645). This is due entirely to the very wet and unfavorable weather prevailing on June 29.

Betterments and Repairs.

Contracts have been made to replace the electric lighting plant of the bridge with engines, generators and lamps of modern construction, and 37,000 linear feet of new feeder cables and wires have been strung across the structure.

In addition to the ordinary routine care and repair of the bridge, the examination and repair of suspender stirrups and rods has been completed over the entire bridge; the lower cords of cantilever portion of inner stiffening trusses on river span have been reinforced, and similar work is in progress on outer trusses, and several of the diagonals of the trusses have been cut out and fitted with sleeve nuts

several of the diagonals of the trusses have been cut out and fitted with sleeve nuts for purpose of adjustment, and replaced.

The masonry work of viaduct approaches to Manhattan station have been carefully grouted and repaired under new stringers and tracks laid by the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company. The exterior of several of the warehouses, and the bridge over York street in the Borough of Brooklyn, have been cleaned and painted. The painters are now at work chipping, cleaning and painting the floor beams and floor system of the Manhattan land span.

A detailed and careful daily inspection of the suspenders, trusses, tracks and car equipment has been maintained during the quarter.

No. 2, Williamsburg Bridge-

Cables.

The cables have been fully completed except a very few small items, which cannot be done until the suspended structure is more nearly completed, and the completion of the repairs on Cables A and B injured by the fire. All the defective wires have been replaced by perfect wires, the additional bands and wires have all been applied to Cables A and B at the Manhattan tower, and the waterproofing and painting will probably be completed within a few days.

Brooklyn Approach.

No work of any consequence has been done on this approach during the quarter. The completion of the covering of the anchorage and the erection of the bronze railing are the principal items of work which remain undone.

Manhattan Approach,

The terminal masonry is practically completed on this approach, and the erection of the main portion of the steel structure is about finished. A considerable amount of riveting remains to be done, as well as nearly all the second-coat painting and the whole of the buckle plate flooring.

Suspended Structure.

A great deal of work has been done on the suspended structure during the quarter. All of the material is now erected in place, the travelers have been removed, and a good start has been made on the riveting. Owing to several causes not necessary to recount, the splices in the bottom chord will require a great deal of attention in the matter of riveting and reaming in the field. The contractors were obliged to devote special attention to this matter and have provided complete and powerful air reamers and have secured a special make of heavy air riveters, together with oil forges for the heating of the long rivets required in the chord members. The work of reaming the bottom chord splices has been begun with much energy.

The top chord splices were more carefully made in the shops, and much of this work will be avoided in these members. The riveting already done, and it is now being done at the rate of nearly 3,000 rivets a day, by about twenty riveting gangs, is entirely on the smaller rivets at the minor connections. It is hoped that the riveting of the bottom and top chords can commence this week, and will be pushed with considerable energy. with considerable energy.

Brooklyn Anchorage.

The contractors for the Brooklyn anchorage have now about completed all of the work under their contract.

Manhattan Anchorage.

The contractors have been very slow in pushing work on this anchorage. Nearly all of the granite, however, has been laid, but much of the backing remains to be laid. I hoped that this work would be finished this month, but it now seems probable that it will be near the end of next month before it will be completed.

No. 3, Manhattan Bridge-

Plans.

During the quarter the stress sheets have been completely revised to conform to the loads recommended by the Engineer Commission. The unit stresses have also been revised, and the modified cross-sections of the members of the bridge fixed in accordance therewith.

Superstructure.

The contract and specifications for the anchorages and steel superstructure, as well as the accompanying drawings, are practically completed, and preparations are being made for advertising for bids.

Masonry Pedestals.

On April 9 bids were received for the construction of the masonry pedestals on the town foundations, and on May 5 the contract was awarded to J. C. Rodgers, the

lowest bidder, for \$150,000.

At the Comptroller's suggestion the execution of the contract was postponed till after July 1.

Caisson.

The caisson for the Manhattan tower foundation has been completed and is ready to be towed to the site. The site is now being dredged and the plant being installed preparatory to sinking.

Brooklyn Approach.

Public hearings by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment were held April 7 and 24 on the proposed changes to the Brooklyn approach, and the matter was referred to the Commissioner of Bridges and the Chief Engineer of the Board.

Under authority of chapter 409 of the Laws of 1903, this matter may be disposed of by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment without reference to the Board of Aldermen.

Commissioners.

On May 20, 1903, John N. Partridge, Wm. Vanamee and Theo. B. Gates were populated Commissioners in condemnation proceedings to acquire property for the Brooklyn anchorage.

Vesting of Title.

On June 19, 1903, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed a resolution fixing September 15, 1903, as the time for the vesting of title to property to be condemned for the Manhattan anchorage. An application is now before the Board to fix the same date for the vesting of title to the property to be acquired by condemnation for the Brooklyn anchorage.

Engineer Commission.

The Engineer Commission appointed by the Mayor to pass on plans of the Manhattan Bridge filed its final report June 29, unanimously indorsing the revised plans, as approved by the Art Commission.

Consulting Engineers.

With the assistance of Messrs, F. C. Kunz and Wm. R. Webster, the specifications for material and shopwork have been worked up with great care.

A large number of tests have been made on nickel steel, unannealed and annealed, on specimens and on eyebars, to determine the necessary quality and treat-

The results have proved quite satisfactory, and by reason of certain arrangements perfected by the Commissioner with the manufacturers of the nickel, there will be considerable economy in the use of nickel steel for certain parts of the structure.

Arrangements have also been made with Mr. F. H. Cilly, C. E., for checking the computations of the stresses, so as to preclude any substantial error in the contract

Appropriation,

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 5 authorized the issuance of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$6,532,000 for the construction of the anchorages and superstructure. A public hearing was held by the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen June 19 on a resolution appropriating the above amount. No action has yet been taken by the Board of Aldermen, but it is expected that the appropriation will be made.

No. 4, Blackwell's Island Bridge-

During the quarter the contract drawings have been revised to conform to the loads recommended by the Engineer Commission for the Manhattan Bridge.

A regular working load of 6,300 and a special congested load of 12,600 were adopted, the unit stresses modified, and the stresses and sections completed accordingly. The contract and specifications were prepared with the expert assistance of Messrs. Kunz and Webster, and were approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel June 27, 1903. The contract drawings will be completed by July 18.

Check Calculations.

Mr. F. H. Cilly, C. E., was employed to check the stresses, and has completed the work for which he was first engaged.

Owing to certain desirable modifications of the trusses made since his work was undertaken, he has been engaged to make check calculations of the final stresses.

Nature of Work Done.

The laying of masonry and cutting of stone has progressed steadily, with the exception of one week, when the men were on strike, and the other work done during the quarter consists mostly of earth and rock excavation and the erection of plant at Pier I and the west anchor pier.

Supplemental Agreement.

Supplemental Agreement No. 4, providing for the moving of Pier 1, was duly signed December 1, 1902, but delivery of same was postponed on suggestion of Assistant Corporation Counsel Harris until June 1 pending an agreement with the

New York Steam Company relative to an easement over its property between Fiftyninth and Sixtieth streets.

Negotiations for Supplemental Agreement No. 5, to provide for the changes in
the two anchor piers necessitated by the recommendation of the Board of Engineers,
have been in progress for the past few months without reaching any agreement

further than to submit the matter to arbitration, as a method of determining a basis on which an agreement might be made.

Arbitration.

Accordingly, on June 5, the matter was referred to Messrs. S. Whinery and John F. O'Rourke, representing the City and the Contractors respectively. A number of conferences have been held, and the arbitrators are now awaiting certain information which is being prepared for them. The whole matter will probably be disposed of in a few weeks. disposed of in a few weeks.

Real Estate.

The Commissioners of Estimate in condemnation proceedings appointed December 22, 1901, to acquire title to property required in the Borough of Queens for the construction of the massonry piers filed their reports June 8, 1903, the awards

amounting, with interest, to \$87,614.32.

The Commissioners appointed in the proceedings to acquire property on the Manhattan side have not yet reported.

An agreement has been reached with the New York Steam Company relative to an easement over its property between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, and the papers have been prepared for signature.

Appropriation.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 1 authorized the issuance of Corporate Stock to the amount if \$3,868,000, which, with the amounts previously authorized but not issued, will cover the cost of the steel superstructure, the elevator shafts on Blackwell's Island and the towers on the two anchor piers. The matter is now awaiting action by the Board of Aldermen.

HARLEM RIVER AND BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

No. 5, One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge-

Construction work on the One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge is in practically the same condition as reported on April 1. The contractor has been ordered to begin erection of draw span, but has not yet done so. The delay in the work has been caused by the non-completion of the subway tunnel crossing the Harlem river at this point, which must be finished before the bridge can be completed. The Chief Engineer of the Rapid Transit Commission, Mr. William Barclay Parsons, has promised to urge the completion of the tunnel at an early date.

No. 9, Fordham Heights Bridge-

No. 9, Fordham Heights Bridge—
An appropriation of \$5,000 was made April 20, 1903, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for preliminary surveys and soundings for the proposed Fordham Heights Bridge, and soundings have been made on the site from Two Hundred and Seventh street to One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street. As the bridge which carries Broadway over the Ship Canal will have to be reconstructed to accommodate the elevated structure of the Rapid Transit Railroad, it is proposed to bring the draw span and both fixed spans down the river and re-erect them at Fordham Heights, thus effecting a considerable economy in the cost of the new bridge.

A general plan and estimate of cost were transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment June 22, 1903, for approval by that Board and by the Board of Aldermen, and an appropriation of \$250,000 for beginning work asked for.

No. 1, Willis Avenue Bridge-

A commission to appraise the land required was appointed March 18, 1903.

The original plan of this improvement contemplated a very handsome structure at an estimated cost of over \$300,000. The new design, though not so elaborate, is in harmony with the existing bridge, and will fill all practical requirements. It is expected that, with the completion of this approach to Willis Avenue Bridge, the public interest in an approach from the Southern Boulevard to Third Avenue Bridge will cease, as the former will probably accommodate all the travel from the east which now makes a detour to get on the Third Avenue Bridge.

No. 4, Madison Avenue Bridge-

The reconstruction of Madison Avenue Bridge has been under discussion for some years, and efforts have been made to have the map of the City changed, fixing the new approaches. This has lately been done on The Bronx side of the river, and will undoubtedly soon be done on the Manhattan side. July 6, 1903, plans and an estimate of cost were transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval, and an appropriation of \$150,000 asked for with which to begin work.

The usual repairs have been made to the Harlem river bridges, and considerable work has been done in The Bronx during the last quarter. Some changes have been made in the repair force, which have added to its efficiency, but the addition of several men is needed badly. A great improvement has been brought about by putting all

per diem men on an hourly basis of pay, and paying them by check instead of cash. The Department Paymaster now goes wherever the men are at work and pays them, and there is no loss of time, as was the case when the men had to go downtown to the Paymaster's office, or hunt for one of his deputies, losing frequently a half-day to each man per week.

An account of travel over the Harlem river bridges was taken in 1898 and also in 1899, but, for various reasons, was not taken again till June of this year.

The statistics of such travel are useful in showing the relative value to the public The statistics of such travel are useful in showing the relative value to the public of different bridges, and are frequently referred to in relation to other questions. Therefore, six bridge tenders from various bridges were detailed on this special duty during the week ending June 20, and, working eight-hour shifts of two men each, counted the travel for twenty-four hours on each bridge, beginning at Ship canal at midnight of June 14 and ending at Willis avenue at midnight June 20. The foot travel on New York and Putnam Bridge was counted by its own bridge tenders, in addition to their other duties, during the twenty-four hours of June 23.

The men were furnished with tallying machines, a watch and note books. They re carefully instructed in their new duties, and they are entitled to credit for their faithful and intelligent work.

The figures of the count, given below, probably represent a condition of mini-

The strikes in the building trades and of the building material drivers had reduced the amount of trucking. Several weeks of bad weather had kept people indoors, and the usual summer closing of the Harlem theatres had reduced the evening travel on foot and in cars

For the statistics of the car travel we are indebted to the officers of the Union and Metropolitan railways.

I hope to have another count taken in the fall under more favorable conditions, so that an average of the two will fairly represent the usual volume of travel over the Harlem river bridges.

In September, 1902, a painting force was organized, consisting of a foreman and ten painters. They were furnished with a good outfit of paint, brushes, cleaning tools, ladders and rigging, and began work almost immediately on Third Avenue Bridge. They have been called off at various times on smaller and more pressing work, notably the Broadway Bridge and railings of Macomb's Dam Bridge, all of which have been reported from time to time, and completed the painting of Third Avenue Bridge on May 18, 1903.

The area of exposed metal surface on the bridge is 55,500 square yards, and the cost of painting per yard was 14 8-10 cents.

The bridge had not been painted since 1899, and was in such condition that the Foreman estimated that at least one-half the time of the men was spent in cleaning. As there is always some cleaning to be done before paint can be applied, it may be proper, in order to get a basis for comparison, to deduct from the labor cost of this work 25 per cent. on account of the unusual condition of rust. This brings the

cost of painting down to about 12 cents per yard, which compares very well with the cost of similar work done by contract.

It will be advantageous to increase the painting force by the addition of ten men, if the appropriation for 1904 will admit of so doing.

The average number of draw openings per day for this quarter are as follows:

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX. Maintenance and Repairs.

No. 1, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Bridge, over Mott Haven Canal-

The bridge over Mott Haven Canal at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street has been maintained in good order and needed a few slight repairs. This structure has been carrying the greater part of the heavy crosstown trucking of this section of the borough on account of the improvements being made to One Hundred and Thirtyeighth street, the latter thoroughfare having been almost impassable during the

No. 7. Westchester Avenue, temporary bridge-

Repairs were made to the east abuttment, which had been damaged by a tow The roadway on the east side was partly resurfaced with macadam.

No. 3, Unionport Bridge-

A few repairs were made to the flooring, but the bridge will be thoroughly over-hauled in July. The reinforcement of this structure has been delayed by the more pressing demands for repairs to Pelham Bridge, over Eastchester bay; these repairs are practically finished.

No. 8, Pelham Bridge, over Eastchester bay-

No. 8, Pelham Bridge, over Eastchester bay—

The causeway approaches of this bridge were extensively repaired during the quarter. Weak portions of the retaining wall were strengthened, the two small deck spans connecting parts of the causeway were replanked, gates were set up at the ends of the draw span and the footpath trestle was partly replanked. The two fixed spans were blocked up on four double bents of piles that were driven during the previous quarter, and the drum and turning gear were repaired. The drum was turned a quarter circle so as to bring sound sections of the I under the towers. The old loading beams under the towers (four 2-inch I beams spanning 9 feet with two intermediate points of support) were cut out and replaced by 8-inch beams framed into the drum, and by one 6-inch beam at each tower. The drum under the towers was reinforced by a 1-inch plate planed to fit the fillets, and heavy plates were put in place under the towers. The repairs to the draw span necessitated the closing of navigation on the bay for one week. In addition to the work done by our own men, the Department of Parks laid a new macadam pavement on the causeway, the surface covered being about 2,000 square yards. The cost of this work was charged against the appropriation for the Department of Bridges.

No. 5. City Island Bridge—

No. 5, City Island Bridge-

The only repairs that were needed were resurfacing part of the sidewalks and roadway of the east approach, where they had been washed out by high tides during northeast storms. The end lifts and aprons were readjusted and a new manhole cover was put in place. Four spans of the old City Island Bridge were torn down, and the material thus obtained was used in making repairs to Pelham Bridge.

No. 6, Eastchester Bridge-

The deck of Eastchester Bridge was partly replanked.

Bridges Projected or Under Construction,

No. 2. New Westchester Avenue Bridge-

The west abutment was completed. The trestle approach on the east side was also completed, but a few minor changes will be made in the hand railing and gates. The superstructure was finished and painted two coats; the machinery and motor are in place, but not connected up. The railing on the bridge has been all erected and painted two coats, and the surface underneath the bridge on the east side has been graded, but not completed as required. The earth fill on the east approach is finished, but no macadamizing has yet been done. Rain and strikes have interfered with the progress of the work during the last month of this quarter.

No. 4, Pedham Bridge (New)-

The surveys for the new structure were completed and the architect's drawings were prepared early in the quarter. The general plans were approved by the Secretary of War in May, and since that time the design of the foundations, piers and arches has been in progress. Estimates of the cost of the work have also been

BOROUGH OF QUEENS AND NEWTOWN CREEK. No. 1, New Vernon Avenue Bridge Construction-

No. 1, New Vernon Avenue Bridge Construction—

The remaining buildings were removed from the line of work, and the contractor has erected boilers, engines and store houses. The north approach and abutment of the old bridge has been removed, and the site of the north side river piers and sea wall has been dredged. All the sewer work has been completed, except about twenty feet on Vernon avenue, between Jackson avenue and Third street, which cannot be built until the removal of a telegraph line pole. Pneumatic Caisson Pier 10 W is now sinking, cutting edge at elevation 37, and Caisson 10 E is ready for launching. The east trench, south approach, and one-half of abutment have been excavated. The east wall, north approach, has been concreted to street subgrade, and the west trench, north approach, excavated. About 250 cubic yards of granite bridge seats, caps, etc., and 150 cubic yards of limestone have been received. About 600 tons of steel for viaduct have been shipped from the shops at Athens, N. Y. This work is progressing slowly. Plans for widening the east side of Manhattan avenue for a distance of one hundred feet south of Ash street have been sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This widening should be done before the completion of the south approach. The New York and Queens County Railway Company has applied for an injunction restraining the building of the bridge across Third street, as the construction at this point will not allow the company the use of its track on Third street. The matter was argued in the Supreme Court on June 20, but no decision has as yet been reached.

No. 2, Greenpoint Avenue Bridge— No. 2, Greenpoint Avenue Bridge-

New hatch covers have been made for the roadway, and the shelter house painted with two coats of paint. A plan, submitted by borough authorities, has been approved, with a change in line, for a storm sewer, which passes through the Queens abutment of this bridge.

No. 3, Meeker Avenue Bridge-

The roadway planking has been renewed in places and a wooden platform erected around the centre pier preparatory to the installing of the electric operating machinery. This platform was used as a working scaffold for this erection, and will be continued as a handy means of oiling, cleaning and future repairing. Arrangements are being made for the supply of power to operate this bridge by electricity. The hand railing has been renewed, channels and bars replacing sheet iron construction which had become badly corroded, and shelter house has been painted with two coats.

No. 4, Grand Street Bridge-

No. 4. Grand Street Bridge—

Hand operating machinery has been erected, with all parts cast steel. Broken cast iron bearing (electric operating machinery) has been replaced by a cast steel bearing. The four lifting wedges at the ends of the draw span, which were improperly designed, have been replaced by suitable ones, and the hanging platforms erected at the ends of the draw span have more than paid for themselves in making this change of the lifting wedges. New hatch covers have been made for the roadway. The Committee, consisting of Deputy Commissioner Robinson, Consulting Engineer Martin and Engineer in Charge Byrne, appointed to examine into the claims for extra allowances presented by the contractor for the construction of this bridge, reported a finding which has been accepted by the contractor, and the matter of the construction of the Grand Street Bridge is closed.

No. 6, Borden Avenue Bridge—
The ends of the draw span have been raised to make allowance for the warm weather, and new end bearing blocks have been put in place. This adjustment of the ends necessitated a change in the level of the railroad tracks, which work was done by

the New York and Queens County Railway Company. The timber abutments have been raised to meet the new grade of draw span, and the New York and Queens County Railway Company has repayed the stone block pavement at the approaches. Plans and estimates for a new bridge have been sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

N. 7, Flushing Bridge—
Supports have been placed on the end floor girders of the approach spans at the rest piers, and the end floor girders of the draw span strengthened. Slight repairs to the centre pier fender have also been made. The New York and Queens County Railway Company have renewed the roadway planking where necessary, and repaired the paving between tracks on the Flushing approach. Borings and survey have been made for the proposed new bridge, and plan and map of property required therefor have been sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. A plan of the proposed bridge, with soundings and tide currents in Flushing creek, has been sent to the War Department for approval.

No. 8, Strong's Causeway Bridge— This bridge is in fair condition. The centring latch has been adjusted, and the centre and rest piers given two coats of paint.

No. 9, Little Neck Bridge-

Slight repairs to abutments have been made.

No. 11, Vernon Avenue Temporary Bridge-

Slight repairs have been made to the operating machinery. The Brooklyn approach has been hit so frequently by passing vessels that it has been found necessary to put in additional longitudinal bracing; this work is now going on.

BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND RICHMOND. New Bridges.

No progress has been made toward authorizing the construction of the new bridges proposed for Hamilton avenue, Third street and Union street, all of which are over Gowanus canal.

Maintenance.

No. 2, Ninth Street Bridge-

The frame of the motor is cracked and has been patched up pending the arrival of the new part,

No. 4, Carroll Street Bridge-

This bridge has been painted.

No. 6, Washington Avenue Bridge-

A 2-inch cast iron water pipe was found to leak from electrolysis. It was replaced by another 2-inch cast-iron pipe, which was "grounded" in the canal by a soldered copper connection and a piece of rail immersed in the canal. A difference in potential of 2½ volts was found between the pipe and the canal, the pipe being positive to the canal. I think this difference would be about four volts in the rush hours.

Owing to the failure of one of the sheave foundations on June 9, this bridge has since been handled with the towing capstan by means of rope tackles. Towing of vessels will be resumed as soon as the repairs are completed.

The wood block pavement laid last January has successfully carried the heavy traffic passing over this bridge, and shows no signs of deterioration.

No. 7, Metropolitan Avenue Bridge-

No. 7, Metropolitan Avenue Bridge—

Work on the end lifts has been delayed by the slow delivery of steel casting. The shop work, however, has been completed, and it is expected that the field work will be completed by the end of July. The granite copings, which were badly worn, have been replaced with timber with 3-inch oak wearing surfaces. The wood copings have been laid so as to allow the bridge to be opened in either direction, which will reduce the time required for opening the bridge. The railroad company has paved the roadway with 3-inch creo-resinate yellow pine blocks laid on the lower planking without any cushion of sand or other material, and at the same time new flat rails of the "Brooklyn Bridge" pattern were laid. The Department put down new creosoted wheel guards and 3-inch oak plank at the ends of the bridge. The upper part of the superstructure has been painted and the lower part will be painted after the end lifts are installed. Water pipes have been run to the grass plots with hose connections for watering the grass. Plans have been made for a new bridge house containing a room fitted for a public comfort station.

Minor repairs on the various bridges have been made as required.

No repairs have been required by Borough of Richmond Bridges.

The following tables show the relation of the bridges to land and canal traffic, also the expenses of each bridge for the quarter.


