KINGS COUNTY ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER COMPANY—APPLICATION FOR ISSUE OF \$5,000,000.00 BONDS—OPINION—ORDER APPROVING \$2,500,000.00 BOND ISSUE
Commissioner Maltbie presented an opinion in the matter of the application of the Kings County Electric Light and Power Company for approval of the issue of convertible debenture bonds of the par value of \$5,000,000.00, discussing the nature of the application, the amended applications by the Kings County Electric Light and Power Company and the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of Brooklyn, each for the approval of the issue of \$2,500,000.00 bonds, or \$5,000,000.00 in all, the relationship between the two companies, their earnings and financial condition, and

recommending the approval of an issue of \$2,500,000.00 debenture bonds, the proceeds to be used for extensions, additions and betterments to the physical property of the companies.

On motion, duly seconded, the foregoing opinion was duly approved, and an Order in Case No. 1174 was unanimously adopted as to the Kings County Electric Light and Power Company and the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of Brooklyn, authorizing the issue by the Kings County Electric Light and Power Company of \$2,500,000.00 par value six per cent debenture bonds and the application of \$1,000,000.00 of the proceeds of the bonds to extensions and additions to the physical property of the Kings County Electric Light and Power Company and \$1,500,000.00 of the bonds to loans to the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of Brooklyn to be used by the latter company for extensions and additions to its physical property, and further authorizing the execution and delivery by the Edison company to the Kings County company of the former's demand promissory notes, without interest, not to exceed the sum of \$1,500,000.00, and providing for the sale of said bonds at not less than par and accrued interest, the public sale of said bonds if they should not be subscribed for by the stockholders of the Kings County company, the submission to and approval by the Commission of proposed expenditures of the proceeds by each of the said companies, the keeping of accounts of the proceeds and the reporting by the 15th day of every month by the Kings County company of the disposal of bonds and by the Edison company of receipts and disbursements, and restricting the authorization to bonds and notes issued by December 31, 1910; the order to take effect January 24, 1910.

In voting for the adoption of the above Order, Commissioner Maltbie presented a memorandum in addition to the opinion, expressing his dissent in regard to the provision for the sale of the bonds at par and favoring a requirement for the sale of the bonds at their market value. [See Item No. 107.]

An adjourned hearing was held at 2:30 P. M., Commissioner Bassett presiding, upon the complaint of Jonas Monheimer against the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company in regard to a five-cent fare from New York to Coney Island on week-days. Appearances: Grosvenor H. Backus for the Commission; Dykman, Oeland and Kuhn, by William N. Dykman, for the company. G. P. Watkins, a statistician of the Commission, recalled, gave in evidence for the Commission statements of the company's passenger receipts, schedule running time and distance of regular trips and number of trips to Coney Island by days during the summers of 1908 and 1909, and the company's report to the Commission for September, 1909. Mr. Backus placed in evidence a certain statement of passengers on the company's lines to Coney Island. S. W. Huff, President of the Company, testified for the Commission as to the second-fare points of the company's Coney Island lines prior to August 31, 1908, the passenger traffic on the Coney Island division since that date as compared with the traffic prior thereto, the schedule running time between various points on the lines, and the company's agreements with employees as to shifts of employment. ASSEMBLY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE—REQUESTS FOR REQUESTS FROM COMMISSION FOR 1910 APPROPRIATIONS

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 13, 1910, from E. A. Merritt, Jr., Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the Assembly of the State of New York, asking the Commission to file requests for items for the year 1910 in the annual bill entitled "An Act making appropriations for certain expenses of government and supplying deficiencies in former appropriations." 2. Bancroft Street between Whitlock and Bryant Avenues, which is probably affected by the Southern Boulevard and Whitlock Avenue Route.
3. Unionport Road between Morris Park Avenue and Rhinelander Avenue.
4. Amethyst Street between Morris Park Avenue and Rhinelander Avenue.
5. Rhinelander Avenue between Unionport Road and Victor Street.
6. Oakley Street from Rhinelander Avenue to Sagamore Street and White Plains Road (proceedings pending), from Bronxdale Avenue northerly to White Plains Road near Thwaits Place.

Nos. 3, 4, 5 and 6 are affected by the White Plains Route.

DOUBLE-DECKING BROADWAY-LEXINGTON AVENUE SUBWAY—REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED BY APPELLATE DIVISION

LIVONIA AVENUE RAPID TRANSIT ROUTE—REPORT OF COMMITTEE

The Secretary presented the following report of the Committee on the Livonia Avenue Rapid Transit Route, which was thereupon approved and ordered filed:

To the Public Service Commission for the First District:

Your Committee to whom was referred on October 21, 1909, the matter of the proposed rapid transit route on Livonia Avenue and other streets and avenues in Brooklyn, would report as follows:

Your Committee considered the two petitions which were presented to the Commission for the construction of a rapid transit route along Flatbush Avenue from Atlantic Avenue and along the Eastern Parkway and other avenues and streets to the Queens County line.

On September 8th last a public hearing was held on the project, at which citizens had the opportunity of giving expression as to their willingness to have an elevated line on Livonia Avenue and as to bearing an assessment for the cost of same. The meeting was largely attended and views pro and con were presented. Following this an inspection trip was made by the members of the Commission who went over the route and locality.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the interests of the public would be served by the construction of a rapid transit line along the proposed route, namely, from Eastern Parkway at Buffalo Avenue, thence through private property to East 98th Street, thence through East 98th Street to Livonia Avenue, through Livonia Avenue to New Lots Road, that being the part not yet laid out. A map showing the same is attached hereto.

Within recent years a large population, estimated at 163,263, has grown up in the section which will be traversed by the proposed route. This runs through the district known as Brownsville on its southerly side, in which the rapid increase of population has been almost unprecedented. A table showing this is appended.

The route on Livonia Avenue is projected in connection with one which had already been laid out on the Eastern Parkway by the Rapid Transit Commission, known as Route No. 12, 22 R, which was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 14, 1905, and subsequently by the Mayor on July 28, 1905. Property owners' consents were filed December 6, 1906.

The growth of population not only along the Eastern Parkway itself, which is being rapidly built up, but upon the adjacent streets in that section, can scarcely have been anticipated at the time the route was laid out. It was projected as only a two-track line notwithstanding that two branches were proposed for it. One of these branches leaving the Eastern Parkway at Howard Avenue proceeds through private property and Hunterly Road to Blake Avenue, to Georgia Avenue to the junction of Jamaica Avenue and Broadway and Fulton Streets, at which point connection with other projected lines was provided. The other part of the Eastern Parkway route is its direct continuance along Pitkin Avenue to Georgia Avenue, where it joins the first named branch. The plans further provide for connection with the Brighton Beach road and also on the Parkway at Bedford Avenue with another line upon the latter which was under consideration.

Another very important connection besides those mentioned would be with a line under consideration through some intermediate avenue leading to the south, should it be constructed. The Eastern Parkway route also intersects the following surface lines:

At the Park Plaza, the Union Street,
Ninth Avenue,
Sixteenth Avenue,
Flatbush Avenue.

At Franklin Avenue, the line of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad.

At Nostrand Avenue, the Nostrand Avenue and Lorimer Street surface lines, and others which are operated over the same to Coney Island in the summer.

At Kingston Avenue with the Tompkins Avenue line.

At Troy Avenue the proposed extension of the Sumner Avenue surface line, and at Utica Avenue it crosses the Reid Avenue line.

On East 98th Street the route now proposed would intersect the Ralph Avenue and Rockaway Avenue surface line, the Bay Ridge division of the Long Island Railroad and the Canarsie branch of the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad.

When in addition to these connections the importance of the trunk line is considered, extending as it does from Atlantic Avenue through Flatbush Avenue to the plaza at Prospect Park, where it joins the Eastern Parkway, and its connections at its westerly end are considered, it will be seen that a modification is necessary in the plans of the line as laid out on the Eastern Parkway. That part of the route runs through what is rapidly becoming and must continue a most populous section, comprised almost wholly of the higher grade of residences. This is due not only to its natural convenience of access, but also to its desirable geographical position. It

is the crest of the land at about the highest elevation in Brooklyn, affording wide outlook over the Bay and surrounding waters. The route with its several connections may therefore be expected to become in the not distant future among the most important in the city.

As already laid out on Flatbush Avenue six tracks are provided from Pacific Street to the plaza, where the Eastern Parkway enters it. In view of future requirements, therefore, it would seem wise that provision should be made for the same number from that point at least as far as, or beyond, Nostrand Avenue to the east and also to continue on Flatbush Avenue from Pacific street to Atlantic Avenue. This would provide for utilizing any of several connections by which the lines could be continued across the Manhattan Bridge, or by some others of the additional routes which have been proposed, including another tunnel under the East River.

With the concentration of the several lines, and their connections, at Flatbush Avenue and Atlantic Avenue and vicinity, it is apparent that two tracks on the Eastern Parkway section would be wholly inadequate for future requirements. The present is, therefore, an appropriate time to consider such modification of the route, and application should be made for same in connection with the laying out of that hereby proposed for Livonia Avenue.

The conditions for construction throughout the entire route are most favorable, the soil being of gravelly nature. The location along the Eastern Parkway being, as already intimated, the summit of the divide separating the northerly and southerly water-sheds of Brooklyn, no difficulties are presented in connection with the sewer system. Also because of the great width of the Parkway there are no obstacles from longitudinal pipes. There is probably no place in the improved sections of the city where so little interference with underground structures would be encountered. The topography of the land also presents conditions especially favorable for subway construction throughout the length of the Eastern Parkway. From it there is a steep declivity to the lower level of the territory to the east and south through which Livonia Avenue runs. The subway, therefore, would naturally emerge just on the side of this, and the line should be carried on an elevated structure from that point over the rest of the route. This rather than a subway would be the almost necessary construction, also from the fact that all the territory to the south of the ridge of the Eastern Parkway is low lying ground at slight elevation above tide water. On this portion a subway would encounter difficulties from the sewer system. Such construction would, therefore, be undesirable and expensive, so greatly so that it is practically eliminated from consideration and scarcely need be further discussed. Nor in this place does the style of elevated structure require to be further considered, except to say that it should be of modern type embodying improved architectural features and others which would reduce noise to a minimum.

The application presented by the property owners and residents for the laying out of this route presents some new conditions which are noteworthy. The proposals not only bespeak the earnestness of their demand, but also from their nature commend themselves to favorable consideration. Already more than 52 per cent of the property owners have signified their consent in writing and presented the same to the Commission. They have also at their own expense employed eminent engineers who have made the necessary surveys and have prepared complete plans in detail which they have put at the disposal of the Commission. In addition, the property owners voluntarily propose to bear the cost of construction, the amount to be raised by assessment in whole or in part, as may be determined by the Public Service Commission and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the provisions of the law, as amended by the Legislature last year.

This is a route which may be considered one where the assessment principle may properly be applied, as it may in other parts of the city with advantage where such conditions exist. That method would open the way to a prompt undertaking of construction under conditions where it would afford a useful demonstration of the value of the principle and manner of building under assessment. It clears the way of objections which might otherwise be obstacles. It not only provides the money necessary for the construction, but it also furnishes a basis which enables the city to make terms most favorable for operation.

Your Committee commends the public spirit and enterprise of the citizens who thus appeal for the facilities this route would afford.

In view of the need and the advantages of the line, as well as of the conditions proposed, your Committee recommends the laying out of the route. Resolutions are submitted herewith for the further steps to be taken for the modification of the present and the laying out of the proposed new route.

BROOKLYN UNION ELEVATED RAILROAD COMPANY—APPLICATION TO DISCONTINUE AND RELOCATE LINWOOD STREET STATION—OPINION—APPROVAL ORDER

Commissioner McCarroll presented an opinion in the matter of the application of the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company for permission to discontinue the passenger station at Linwood Street upon its Fulton Street-Kings County elevated line and to remove the same to Ashford Street, stating that the growth of the population in the section and the convenience of the residents there required a better arrangement of stations on the line in the vicinity, that the Commission would not be justified in granting the petition of the residents for an additional station at Jerome Street, as that would bring the stations closer together than desirable on a rapid transit line, and that the relocation would make it equi-distant between the Van Siclen and the Montauk stations, and recommending the adoption of an order granting the application.

A further hearing was held at 2:30 P. M., Commissioner Eustis presiding, in regard to extending the Interborough Rapid Transit Company's Broadway express service to Kingsbridge and its Broadway local service to Dyckman Street. Appearances: H. M. Chamberlain for the Commission, James L. Quackenbush for the company, Andrew J. Shipman and Reginald P. Bolton for the Washington Heights Taxpayers' Association, a complainant. Counsel for the Commission placed in evidence correspondence of April 27-29, 1909, between Commissioner Maltbie and the company as to experimental installation of wheelguards on its cars. Ralph Sanger, a member of a company manufacturing the Hudson-Bowling wheelguard, and Wesley Meeteer, a member of a company manufacturing the Hipwood wheelguard, testified for the Commission as to the record, especial features and operating qualifications of their respective fenders and as to the arrangements between the railroad company and their companies for the installation of their respective devices on the company's cars. E. G. Connette, Transportation Engineer for the Commission, testified for it as to the effect of changes of car lengths or distances between car trucks on the clearance space at the Park Row loop, the estimated cost of such changes, the feasibility of using wheelguards under existing conditions on the company's lines, and the proper height of projecting fenders on cars. "Section 1. Article three, section 19 of chapter 19 of the Laws of 1909, entitled 'An Act relating to the domestic relations, constituting chapter 14 of the Consolidated Laws,' is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 19. Records to be kept by town and city clerks—Each town and city clerk hereby empowered to issue marriage licenses shall keep a book in which he shall record and index all affidavits, statements, consents and licenses together with the certificate attached showing the performance of the marriage ceremony which book shall be kept and preserved as a part of the public records of his office. On or before the fifteenth day of each month the said town and city clerk shall file in the office of the county clerk of the county in which said town or city is situated the original of each affidavit, statement, consent, license and certificate, which have been filed with or made before him during the preceding month. *In cities of the first class, however, the city clerk shall file every such affidavit and the other papers hereinbefore specified in the office of the board of health or department of health in the county, borough or place where such board or department maintains an office for the transaction of its business, where such license is issued.* He shall not be required to file any of said documents until the license is returned with the certificate showing that the marriage to which they refer has actually been performed.

"Sec. 2. Section 20 of article three of the said chapter aforesaid is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 20. Records to be kept by the county clerk (.) and boards of health or departments of health—The county clerk of each county shall record and index in a book kept in his office for that purpose each statement, affidavit, consent and license together with the certificate thereto attached showing the performance of the marriage ceremony filed in his office. *Except that in cities of the first class the board of health or departments of health shall keep the book required to be kept by the county clerk and record and index the papers referred to.* During the first twenty days of the month of January, April, July and October of each year the county clerk shall transmit to the state department of health at Albany, New York, a copy of all affidavits, statements, consents and licenses with certificates attached filed in his office during the three months preceding the date of said report, also copies of all contracts of marriage made and recorded in his office during said period entered into in accordance with subdivision four of section eleven of this chapter, which said record shall be kept on file and properly indexed by the state department of health. The

services rendered by the county clerk in carrying out the provisions of this article shall be a county charge except in counties where the county clerk is a salaried officer in which case they shall be a part of the duties of his office.

"Sec. 3. Section twenty-three of article three of the said chapter aforesaid is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 23. Presumptive evidence—Copies of the records of marriages including the licenses and certificate of marriage and all other records pertaining thereto duly certified by the clerk of the county or by the secretary of the board or department of health where the same are recorded under his or its official seal shall be evidence in all courts.

"Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately."

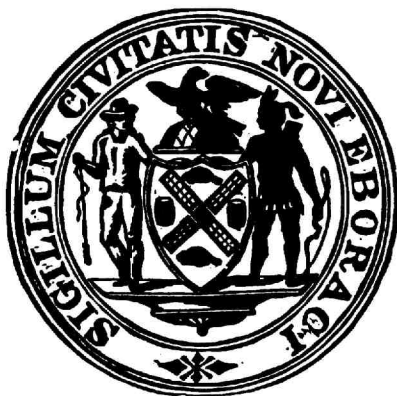
