To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Dear Sirs-In accordance with the direction contained in the following resolution adopted at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held October 31, 1910, I have the honor to transmit herewith the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1911, and accompanying schedules of "Salaries" and "Salaries and Wages:"

Resolved. That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to forthwith transmit to the Board of Aldermen the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1911 for consideration and action thereon, in accordance with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter." Yours very truly,

BUDGET FOR 1911.

Resolved. That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of the City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, viz., one hundred and fifty-eight million six hundred and twenty-five thousand five hundred and twenty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$158,625.529.91); second, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, viz., five million four hundred and fifty-three thousand eight hundred and five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$5,453,805.25), and, third, the amount estimated to he the defliciency on January 1, 1910. in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, viz., ten million dollars (\$10,000,000); he it further

Resolved. That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven, with the exception that the items contained in the schedules under the titles of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees;" "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Regular Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

(a) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries. Regular Employees," to any other appropriation

or schedule than "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees." (b) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules or "Salaries, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Temporary Employees."

(c) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages. Regular Employees."

(d) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of than Wages, Temporary Employees."

(e) That no transfer shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Compensation, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Compensation, Temporary Employees."

(f) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein for the various kinds of supplies and contingencies to any other than to

a supply or contingency account.

Second-That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees;" "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Regular Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," herein contained, except (a) when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and (b) in the case of schedules under the title of "Salaries" or "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages, "Regular Employees," when such change will not increase the monthly rate of the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries," "Salaries, Regular Employees," or "Wages, Regular Employees," in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments, and (c) in the case of schedules under the titles of "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," when such change will not increase the total amount herein appropriated for the said schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third-

(a) That the heads of the several Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees;" "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Regular Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees;" "Compensation, Temporary Employees," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and

(b) That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payroll is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedules supporting any such appropriation or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportion-

ment, the full schedules as changed.

(c) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the facts, stating that the recapitulation

attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said

(d) That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.

(e) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.

(f) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payrolls to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time

-be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations for (1) supplies; (2) general supplies; (3) materials for repairs and replacements; (4) fuel, and (5) forage, to any Board, office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for the purchase of such "Supplies," "General Supplies," "Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials fuel and forage hereafter to be promulgated

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may hereafter be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying as to the sufficiency of appripriations out of which contracts for "Supplies," "General Supplies," Materials for Repairs and Replacements," "Fuel" and "Forage" are to be paid, shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies or materials, from which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform with such standard specifications; be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter,

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven be established in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedules, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second-That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules entitled "Wages, Regular Employees;" "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Compensation, Temporary Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, offices. Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of the City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and eleven be established in the different Boards, offices, Bureaus and

Departments of the City or County Governments. Third-Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, offices. Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries," or "Salaries, Regular Emto transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of ployees;" "Salaries, Temporary Employees;" "Wages, Regular Employees;" "Wages, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule Temporary Employees," and "Compensation. tion and examination of duly authorized representatives of the Depart-
ment of Finance, and at all proper times the Department of Public Chari-
ties shall have access to the record of inmates.

4. All institutions receiving public moneys shall, not later than March 31 of each year, submit to the Comptroller an annual report covering the period of the preceding calendar year, showing receipts from all sources and expenditures for all purposes in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an apportionment has been made, he shall, in his discretion, suspend payments and give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease making further payments, and, upon the determination of said Board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon end.

6. Where apportionments are made upon a per capita basis for inmates of private charitable institutions, there will be no payments unless the inmates shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as proper charges against the City; and except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public hospitals.

In determining the acceptance of patients in private hospitals as proper charges, the Commissioner of Charities shall first consider the nature of the services actually rendered to the patients by the hospitals. The records of the institutions and the bed-card notes showing the treatment given shall be received as the essential evidence in deciding acceptances or rejections. The City shall not be liable for any payment to charitable institutions in excess of the apportionment which may have been made to such institutions, notwithstanding the acceptances of the Commissioner of Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

7. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

8. No money shall be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

9. That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of five years of age and over during ten months in the year, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special ruling may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving money under this section shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, as provided in section 1154.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money will be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children, under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and has been placed in this Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This order has no relation to the class of children of such mental and physical condition as those cared for in the City institution at Randalls Island.

11. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that the per capita rates hereinafter provided are too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate or rates for any or all

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First-The said right to construct maintain and operate said conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be au-thorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term

of this contract. If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of com-pensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. (c) An annual payment of twenty-five cents (\$0.25) for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway, excepting, however, such conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of

any street, avenue or highway.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following

shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before February 1 in each year for

paid on or before February 1 in each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding.

(d) Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company and within one (1) month from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to the City the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750); said amount being due the City by reason of the unauthorized occupation of the streets by the Company or its predecessors streets by the Company or its predecessors.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or reso-lution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for retrigerating rights or transfer at ments for retrigerating rights or franchise at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal) thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstand-ing, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth-Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, or within the districts hereinbefore described.

Fifth-The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein con-tained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiv-ing of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consenor consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Com-pany before such termination, the conduits and appurtenances of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or in-

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Com-

Seventh-The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

tion under the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such man-ner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hinderance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

mum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth—The Company, upon the application

for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within District Number 1, or if such district be extended as hereinbefore provided, then within such extended district, shall extend its conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided. Seventeenth—The conduit lines hereby authorized shall be used only by the Heermance Storage and Refrigerating Company, and for no other purpose than supplying refrigeration.

Eighteenth—The Company shall submit a report to the Board not later than February 1, in each year, for the year ending December 31 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comp-troller of The City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnish ing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twentieth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be

provision to the effect that the conduits con-structed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Prowided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forth-

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its conduits and appurtenances as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such conduits or appurtenances which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second-The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the conduits authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-third-This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pave-ment and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal pro-ceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with in-terest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any notice or direction of the Board or with any notice or direction of the Board, or other municipal officials, given or made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force in such case and in any of these events, the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each violation, which sums may be deducted from said fund.
