

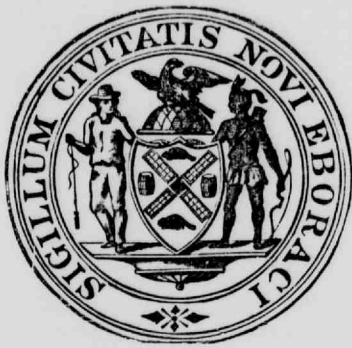

Whereas, The wooden shanties and buildings situate on the block bounded by Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets and Third and Lexington avenues, in the city of New York, are in a condition and effect dangerous to life or health, and in respect to sewerage, drainage, and ventilation, are a public nuisance, therefore

Resolved, That said wooden shanties and buildings are and are hereby declared to be a public nuisance, and that the report of Dr. Moreau Morris, Assistant Sanitary Inspector in the said district, dated September 26, 1880, and the report of the Sanitary Superintendent of date November 5, be and are hereby ordered filed among the records of this Board as sufficient proof to authorize its declarations that the said wooden shanties and buildings on the said block are a public nuisance and dangerous to life or health.

Resolved, That the Board of Health hereby enter in its records, the wooden shanties and buildings on the said block, bounded by Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, Third and Lexington avenues, as a nuisance, and order the same to be removed.

Resolved, That copies of the reports of Sanitary Superintendent Day and Assistant Sanitary Inspector Morris, upon the sanitary condition of block bounded by Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, Third and Lexington avenues, the property of the Corporation of the City of New York, and also copies of the resolutions of this Board, adopted pursuant to section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, declaring that the said wooden shanties and buildings located thereon are in condition and effect dangerous to life or health, and in respect to sewerage, drainage and ventilation are a public nuisance, and ordering that the said wooden shanties and buildings be removed, be forwarded to his Honor the Mayor, to the Council to the Corporation, to the Comptroller, and to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, with the request that the necessary action be taken to abate the nuisance.

Resolved, That Assistant Sanitary Inspector Murtha be and is hereby appointed Sanitary Inspector, to date from November 1, 1880, vice Viele, resigned.

Resolved, That Dr. Moreau Morris be and is hereby appointed an Assistant Sanitary Inspector to January 1, 1881, with salary at the rate of \$1,300 per annum, service to date from November 1.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer the sum of five hundred dollars from the appropriation made to the Health Department for the year 1879, entitled "Fund for Payment to Board of Police for the services of thirty patrolmen, etc.," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to a "Fund for the Support of the Night Medical Service" for the year 1880, as provided by section 8, chapter 588, Laws of 1880.

Resolved, That the Department of Docks be and is hereby respectfully requested to place at the dock used by the Reception Hospital, at the foot of East Sixteenth street, two spring scales.

An application from W. E. Howell and Mary Howell, orderly and nurse at Reception Hospital, for an increase of pay, was received, and, on motion, the application was denied.

The resignation of Sanitary Inspector Viele was received and accepted.

Action of the Board on Tenement house Plans.

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement houses were approved by the Board upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted.

Plan No. 562-2 for one seven-story tenement house 45 feet by 98 feet to be built on a lot 45 feet by 102 feet on the northeast corner of Broadway and Lexington avenue, to be occupied by seven families.

Plan No. 720-2 for one four-story and attic tenement house 26 feet by 77 feet, on a lot 26 feet by 125 feet at No. 18 St. Mark's Place, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 728-2 for three five-story tenement houses each 25 feet by 65 feet, with an extension 15 feet wide by 9 feet deep, to be built on lots each 25 feet by 100 feet at Nos. 228, 230, and 232 East Fifty-sixth street, each to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 731 for ten four-story tenement houses, one 26 feet 10 inches by 73 feet, and nine 19 feet 4 inches by 63 feet, to be built on lots, one 26 feet 10 inches by 150 feet, and nine 19 feet 4 inches by 100 feet, on the eastern Boulevard, between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, each to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 732 for one five-story tenement house 25 feet by 82 feet to be built on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the south side of Fifty-sixth street 450 feet west of Eighth avenue, to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 733 for three four-story tenement houses each 20 feet by 53 feet, to be built on lots each 20 feet by 109 feet 11 inches, on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-second street, beginning 76 feet east of First avenue, each to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 734 for one four-story tenement house 17 feet 2 inches by 52 feet, with an extension 13 feet by 13 feet, to be built on a lot 17 feet 2 inches by 102 feet 2 inches, on the north side of Eighty-fifth street, 123 feet east of Avenue A, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 735 for two five-story tenement houses to be altered each to be 35 feet by 35 feet (above the first story), on lots each 35 feet by 38 feet 4 inches at Nos. 182, and 182½ Washington street, corner Dey, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 741 for two five-story tenement houses each 25 feet by 72 feet, with an extension 14 feet wide and 6 feet deep, to be built on lots each 25 feet by 97 feet 6 inches, at Nos. 213 and 215 Fifth street, each to be occupied by ten families.

The following Plans were disapproved.

Plan No. 691-2 for two six-story tenement houses proposed to be built at Nos. 34 and 36 Greenwich street.

Plan No. 736 for the four-story tenement house No. 57 Macdougall street, now in course of alteration by the erection of an additional story.

Plan No. 740 for one seven-story tenement-house proposed to be built on the northeast corner of Broadway and Sixty-second street.

Violations Referred to the Attorney.

The violation of law in the construction of three tenement-houses on Tenth avenue, beginning 41 feet from the northeast corner of Eighty-second street, on plan No. 699, the same having been disapproved by the Board, was referred to the attorney for the necessary legal proceedings.

The violation of law by the alteration and conversion of the premises No. 348 West Twenty-seventh street to a tenement-house, on a plan not conforming to the requirements of law, was referred to the attorney for the necessary legal proceedings.

A communication signed by Owen Bannon, the owner of the house No. 301 West Thirty-sixth street, reported in violation, stating that the said house would not be used or occupied as a tenement-house, was received and ordered on file.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 30, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,887, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 861 tenement-houses, 104 private dwellings, 70 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 29 stables, 37 slaughter-houses, 1 lime kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 gas works, 2 public drains, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 1 dangerous building, 91 yards, courts and areas, 112 cellars and basements, 173 waste-pipes and drains, 227 privies and water-closets, 28 street-gutters and sidewalks, 12 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 5 smoky chimneys, 10 other nuisances, together with 67 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 561.

During the past week 116 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 95 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

112 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 98 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 95 houses, 95 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Six persons sick with contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 6, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,867, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 697 tenement-houses, 113 private dwellings, 67 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 40 stables, 36 slaughter-houses, 3 public drains, 1 lime-kiln, 1 garbage and 1 manure dumps, 16 sunken lots, 1 receiving basin, 1 lodge house, 94 yards, courts, and areas, 120 cellars and basements, 187 waste pipes and drains, 261 privies and water-closets, 32 street gutters and sinks, 4 dangerous stairways, 1 dam, 1 cesspool, 1 smoky chimney, and 50 other nuisances, together with 111 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports therein received from the Inspectors was 529.

During the past week 190 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 63 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

71 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 78 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 65 houses, 65 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Two cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 535 births, 43 still-births, 213 marriages, and 544 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 30, 1880; this shows a decrease of 23 births, 16 still-births, and 26 deaths, and an increase of 13 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 102 births, 27 marriages, and 50 deaths, and a decrease of 1 still-birth. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; inanition, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 17; bronchitis, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 11; suicide 1; and drowning, 2; while the deaths from diphtheria, increased 6; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 6; pneumonia, 12; aneurism, 2; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; premature and preterm births, 13. The number of deaths from scarlatina (15), croup (25), puerperal diseases (4), heart diseases (23), enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis (13), was the same in the two succeeding weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 118 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 167 under two years; 227 under five years, and 38 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 1 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 41.73 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 65 were in institutions, 291 in tenement houses, 167 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 110 on the first, 160 on the second, 102 on the third, 59 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 539 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-residents; 73 were stated to be single, 121 married, 68 widowed, and the condition of 282 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week was as follows, viz.: City deaths, 544; still-births, 43; bodies in transitu, 22; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 71 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 535 births, 213 marriages, 43 still-births, 544 deaths, 22 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 30 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 1 transcript of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 23 of death were issued during the week.

Report on "Shanties" Situated on Block, Bounded by Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth Streets Third and Lexington Avenues.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT—SANITARY BUREAU,
NEW YORK, November 5, 1880.

To the Commissioners of the Board of Health:

GENTLEMEN—I beg, respectfully, to call attention to the condition of the block, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, Third and Lexington avenues.

I had the honor, on September 28, of forwarding a report upon the sanitary condition of this locality, made by Dr. M. Morris, Assistant Sanitary Inspector. This complaint was based upon a letter from the house surgeon of Mount Sinai Hospital, which stated that erysipelas, dysentery, and diphtheritic troubles had for some time existed in the wards of the Hospital adjacent to the shanties. A copy of this report was forwarded to the Comptroller, since the block belongs to the City, with the recommendation that the shanties be removed within thirty days. Since that time the attention of this Bureau has again been called to the unsanitary condition of the block by the "Committee on Hygiene" of the Medical Society of the County of New York.

Complaints are not unfrequently made to this Bureau, against shanty districts, by citizens who have built fine houses near them, and whose property is depreciated by their presence. I have been governed, in entertaining such complaints, by the policy of the Board, that the interests of real estate must adjust themselves, experience having shown that the health of the "shanty population," compares favorably with that of those living in the lower class of tenement-houses, to which they would naturally gravitate. It has therefore been customary to confirm our sanitary efforts to such personal influence as the inspector could bring to bear on the occupants of the shanties, who are mostly irresponsible squatters, trusting to the city's growth to cure the evil, without radical interference from the Board. This particular block of shanties is, however, exceptionally bad, and is constantly getting worse. When the building of the "Institute for the Improved Instruction of Deaf Mutes" was begun on Lexington avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, the squatters driven therefrom, added to the population of the block under consideration, until now there are about forty shanties with the usual collection of cow and horse stables, shallow privies, manure heaps, goats, and fowls of various kinds. "There is no proper drainage, large quantities of decomposing refuse; filthy and offensive pools of water, liquid contents of the privies and the stables, are found on different portions of these lots," and it is believed that "the poisonous exhalations from them have caused special blood-poisoning, and disease among the patients of the Mount Sinai Hospital." The house physician and the sisters in charge of the Foundling Asylum (an institution which has 800 inmates) complain bitterly of the offensive odors from these shanties in consequence of which they are obliged to close their windows when the wind is southerly, and several rooms have been made absolutely uninhabitable. I have made several personal inspections of these premises within the last few months.

I respectfully recommend that the Board of Health declare these shanties a public nuisance and order their removal forthwith.

To the Board of Health of the Health Department.

I, Moreau Morris, holding the position of Assistant Sanitary Inspector in the Health Department in the City of New York, do report: That on the 21st day of September, 1880, I did inspect carefully, and personally examined the premises situated on block between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, and Lexington and Third avenues in the city of New York, and found the facts to be as follows: Said premises consist of 25 city lots of which the Comptroller has jurisdiction for the city of New York, and (in violation of section 170 of the Sanitary Code), were found in a condition dangerous to life and detrimental to health, for the following reasons, viz.: These lots are covered with shanties, out-houses, cow, and horse-stables. Each shanty has a surface privy, shallow in depth; several overflowing. There are about forty occupied shanties, paying no rent; virtually squatters. There is no proper drainage; large quantities of decomposing refuse, filthy oppressive pools of water, liquid contents of the privies and stables are upon various portions of these lots. The poisonous exhalations from this filthy accumulation, from privies, cow and horse stables, goat-pens, and chicken and fowl pens, and the want of drainage are causing special blood poisoning and consequent disease among the patients of Mount Sinai Hospital, situated on the block directly opposite, as is testified by the physician in attendance. He says "the stench from these hovels is sometimes most revolting. I have had cases of erysipelas frequently occurring in my surgical wards, on that side of the hospital, while other parts of the house were perfectly free from any such contamination, and now that whole side of the institution is infected with dysenteric and diphtheritic troubles." That this accumulation of shanties and their usual concomitants are causing pernicious nuisances, there can be no question.

I recommend that the Comptroller be requested to notify the several occupants and owners of these shanties that they must be removed within thirty (30) days from the aforesaid block. The names and location of said parties are shown on the diagram herewith annexed.

The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the issuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax
