SIR—782 deaths were registered in this office during the week ending at noon of Saturday, May 11, 1889, representing an annual death-rate of 25.98 per 1,000 on an estimated population of 1,565,196.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the city for the use of the Police Department as a Police Station, etc., of the premises on Sedgwick avenue in the Twenty-third Ward, and now occupied for that purpose, viz.: The premises designated on a certain map, entitled "Map showing property of W. B. Ogden situate in the City, County and State of New York," made by E. C. The Comptroller presented the following communication from Simon Stevens, Esq., relative to the proposed widening of West street, from West Tenth to West Twenty-third street, by the Department of Docks.

No. 61 BROADWAY, NEW YORK, April 2, 1889.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I am instructed by my clients not only to protest against the widening of West street and making it, instead of Thirteenth avenue, the "marginal" street between West Tenth and West Twenty-third streets, but to undertake to show that the dazzling brilliancy of that magnificent scheme has blinded its authors to the absolute wants and necessities of domestic and coast-wise trade, now almost totally excluded from berth-rights, or a home on the North river water-front of the City of New York.

To make myself clearly and precisely understood I beg to refer to some historical facts that have special bearing upon the problem before you at this time.

Previous to 1870 the authorities of the City of New York realized the necessity of improving the water-front in order to maintain the City's supremacy as an entrepot for foreign and domestic commerce, and to sustain its supreme advantages and facilities for exporting American products to every market in the world.

That year the legislature was asked, and it gave the City authority to create and organize a Department of Docks. By chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, that department was given exclusive charge and control of all wharf property belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, or to which the Corporation might become entitled by purchase or otherwise—and of the building, rebuilding, maintaining and repairing the same—and of making plans for improving the entire water-front of the City of New York. The Dock Department has exclusive or autocratic power, and controls the building, improving and leasing the wharf property belonging to the city. It only needs the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund whenever it desires to widen a pier or change its location. Their approval of agreements is also necessary for the purchase of wharf property from private individuals.

Contracts for building, dredging and repairs, amounting to millions of dollars, have, under the law, been made simply at the pleasure of the Dock Department, and without your knowledge or approval. You have no knowledge of contracts or contemplated expenditures on the water-front until requisitions for the money are presented for your signature. Under the statute you have not even then the discretion to refuse signing them. The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, custodians of the property belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, have no voice as to what wharf property in any locality shall or may be improved by the Dock Department, or for what purposes it may be used when improved—whether for foreign or domestic commerce—nor as to the terms and conditions of any lease of the city's wharf property, shedded or unshedded, nor what rules and regulations shall govern the leasing or collection of rents or wharfages, or care and safety of the \$75,000,000 worth of wharf property belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, or belonging to private persons, though, if any other city property, even of trifling value, is wanted by any of the city departments for public purposes, you must be consulted.

Should not all this be changed?

Only a few successful efforts at improvements in the last eighteen years have been made in several different localities on the North river. The Dock Department has built the two Erie Piers, between Warren and Jay streets; three Piers for the Old Dominion Steamship Company and the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, between Beach and Lighthouse streets, and fifteen new ones between Canal and West Tenth streets, and seventeen new ones between West Twenty-third and Sixtieth streets. The department is building one new pier on the site of the old West Washington Market, two between Jay and North Moore streets, and one or two others on the Hudson river further up-town, and has planned and located twenty more to be built at the foot of streets between West Twenty-third and Sixtieth streets, which, if built as the plan of the water front calls for, and the marginal street is opened the whole distance as now provided by law, that locality would give twenty new piers to meet the demands of foreign commerce so eloquently pleaded for by the Dock Department, and save from spoliation Thirteenth avenue, between West Tenth and Twenty-third streets, and give a home there to domestic and coast-wise trade, facilitate and cheapen marketing and all food supplies for the City of New York and its suburbs that depend upon the New West Washington Market for their supplies of marketing.

In many places on the East river, notwithstanding plans of improvement were made and filed some seventeen years ago, no extensive improvements on that side of the city have been made—nor even begun, that are creditable to the City of New York or the department that has this gigantic property and its improvements in charge. The public demands that are made for more extensive accommodations on the whole water front remain unsatisfied. For technical reasons private owners are not permitted to rebuild or improve their own property, nor will the city purchase private property that would yield to it ten per cent. per annum on the purchase money and cost of improvement. The Dock Department does not build the marginal street where already laid out, nor will it let the owners of private property abutting on said proposed marginal street build out on their own land under water to the outer or bulkhead line of said new marginal street, nor will it purchase the private property held under grants from the City. In fact this is but the old story of Esop's "dog in the manger." Is not the great and growing prosperity of New York retarded by such masterly inactivity?

Some fifty-five suits are now pending between the City and private owners for wharf property which the Dock Department has either seized, or has threatened to seize, without paying therefor, in its efforts to improve the water-front. Some of these suits have been pending well on to fourteen years, but not one is yet definitely settled. Private owners are willing to sell their wharf property at reasonable prices, or would improve the same on the City's plan if they were permitted to do so. It is contended that the City, under the right of eminent domain, has not the power to acquire this private wharf property now held for public use, because it is now held for the same use that it was originally granted, or would be held if condemned; such a proceeding, if successful, would be simply to change the ownership—nothing more, nothing less.

Modern engineering by the Department of Docks cannot be satisfied with anything that is seventeen years old, consequently most of the existing plans of that Department are like "castles in the air"; they are all on paper, and no effort seems to be making to carry out the old ones, except in certain localities, yet new plans for special sections of the water-front are submitted from time to time for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or authority is asked of the Legislature to change certain plans in certain districts—plans which the Commissioners have already approved and have refused to reconsider.

This last movement of the Dock Department to change the line of the "marginal street" between West Tenth and West Twenty-third streets, taken without your approval, would, if adopted, hang a depressing cloud over private titles in that district. Why does not the Dock Department complete some of its proposed improvements, partly made, on the North river above Twenty-third street and below Canal street, as already planned, and widen and complete the building of the "marginal street" so as to accommodate the commerce that is already here and crying for relief. Business is creeping along up-town slowly but surely, but would rush there if it could be accommodated. The question on all sides "Is the Dock Department, as now constituted, equal to the emergency? Does it not need reorganization, and to be put on a higher plane? Should not the necessities and the position of affairs command the highest order of talent as Commissioners and engineers, if we have not such already in that Department?" Who is at fault, and what is the remedy? Should not the affairs of the Department, particularly its plans and contracts, including leases and expenditures, as well as its purchase of property of all kinds, be put under the supervision of and control of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund?

Since the organization of the Department of Docks it has collected revenue amounting to over \$16,000,000, and has expended over \$14,000,000 in the same time. Who knows for what? It has built about forty piers at a cost, say of about \$50,000 each, making a total for piers of say..... \$2,000,000 00
It has probably built, say 6,000 feet of granite and concrete masonry and filled in behind the same and paved the street at a cost to the City of say \$350 per lineal foot measured on the bulkhead-line..... 2,000,000 00
Say for purchase of private property in seventeen years..... 1,000,000 00
\$5,000,000 00

The other \$9,000,000 has presumably gone for maintenance, repairs and administration. This is an alarming state of affairs, if my statements are true. I challenge an investigation or denial of any material point here made.

On two several occasions I brought some of these matters more or less fully to the attention of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as will appear by my letters printed in the CITY RECORD September 22, 1886, and January 22, 1889. I then pointed out modes of relief to some extent.

The New West Washington Market Association and the great warehousemen—manufacturers, iron workers and other business people in the district between West Tenth and West Twenty-third streets have so fully demonstrated what their losses would be if West street were to be widened, and Thirteenth avenue destroyed, that I will not dwell on that question further than to say, that if some of our enterprising mercantile citizens had not called upon the Dock Department for information as to the best localities for the new United States Appraiser's Stores being located on Thirteenth avenue, next above West Eleventh street, we, to-day, would not have heard of this costly scheme of changing the line of the water-front in that locality, nor would the Secretary of the Treasury have been persuaded to contract for the purchase of a part of a block of ground on which to erect the new United States Appraiser's Stores, one street further back from the river.

The property-owners of those twenty blocks of ground believed, when the same question was acted upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund five years ago, that that question was then finally settled, whereupon they in good faith have spent several millions of dollars in improving their property in that district, and they should not now be disturbed.

As an evidence of the demoralized condition of affairs in the Dock Department, and as at present constituted, the inability of the Department to cope with, or surmount those difficulties, several bills have been introduced into the Legislature with the hope of bringing order out of chaos, and ultimately making the water-front of New York City the most valuable, as well as the most attractive of any city on this continent.

The Comptroller presented a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted May 14, 1889, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to provide court-rooms for one of the Police Justices recently authorized to be appointed, within the territory embraced between Forty-eighth street, Broadway, Fifty-ninth street and Ninth avenue.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Health Department of the City of New York,
held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, August 2,
1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law
upon the Health Department, the following additional
section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and
health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared
to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 219. In every public hospital and dispensary
in the City of New York there shall be provided and
maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the
temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious
disease, who shall immediately be separated from the
other persons and other patients at such dispensary or
hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or phy-
sicians, of the officers, managers and of every one in
charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who
has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course
of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care
at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is im-
mediately made to the Health Department of the City of
New York of every person infected with a contagious
disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such
person or persons so infected are properly isolated and
kept separate from other persons and other patients.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Health Department of the City of New York,

Resolved, That section 18 of the Sanitary Code be
and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 18. That no owner or lessee of any building,
or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the
same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any per-
son, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which,
or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said build-
ings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ven-
tilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all
respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesom-
ness, for which this Code or any law of this State pro-
vides, or in which they or either of them require any
such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person
rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the
same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence,
any portion or apartment of any building, which apart-
ment or portion has not at least one foot of its height
and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk
and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the
floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or
which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive
gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this
section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occu-
pancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid
and as a part of any building rented or let, when they
are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any
person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole
dwelling apartment.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COM- MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

**UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS
350, 351, 352 AND 353, and as amended by chapter
559, Laws 1887, as follows:**

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time
to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of
water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now
provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to
different classes of buildings in said city in reference to
their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses
for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other
common purposes, number of families or occupants, or
consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and
modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to
time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and
establishments. All extra charges for water shall be
deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall
become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon
which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid,
shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears.
Such regular rents, including the extra charges above
mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occu-
pants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be
situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said
city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be
laid, and from which they can be supplied with water.
Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall
become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots,
respectively, as herein provided, but no charge what-
ever shall be made against any building in which a
water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as pro-
vided in this act. In all such cases the charge for
water shall be determined only by the quantity of water
actually used as shown by said meters. * * * * *

"The said commissioner of public
works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not
exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for
permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of
such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time,
prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such
fines shall be added to the regular water rents."

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width
fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the
Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-
houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy
the same, and for each additional family, one dollar
per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water
is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the
Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows,
to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each
barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty
dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Com-
missioner of Public Works; an additional charge of
five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-
tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be
charged at three dollars per annum each, and five
dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-
houses, and bathing establishments. Combination
stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in
the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be
charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid,
or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten
cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per
hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.
DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from
five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Com-
missioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per
annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:
HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged
six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse,
two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceed-
ing thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each
per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.
HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar
per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half
barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars
per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper
ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the
regular rate for private families, be charged for each
lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner
of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars
per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of
Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an
annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional
charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for
each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate
of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the
Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged
at such rates as may be determined by the Commis-
sioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS
shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by
the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power
up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars
per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over
fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents
each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum
of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a
lot one water-closet having sewer connection is
allowed without charge; each additional water-closet
or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All
closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be
charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether
in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

URINALS shall be charged two dollars per annum each.
WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when
water is supplied direct from the Croton supply,
through any form of the so-called single or double
valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks,
or any valve or cock of any description attached to
the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger,
or other water-closet not before mentioned, sup-
plied with water as above described, per year, ten
dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from
the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock,
and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe
to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the
hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective,
or from which an unlimited amount of water can be
drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five
dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from
any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that
are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aque-
duct, which are so constructed that not more than
three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the
handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are
provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe
must not connect with the water-closet, but be car-
ried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of
Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at
this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act
1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-
after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops,
hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-
houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished
for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all
expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water
rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton
water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water
is supplied, as now provided by law." * * *

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large
supply of water will be fitted with a meter.
Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred
cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily
or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Cus-
tom House measurement) for each time they take water.
Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per
ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board,
twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.
All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved
for special contract by and with the Commissioner of
Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to
another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep
their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures
connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost,
at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste
of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons,
railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-
mitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be
permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon
a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All
licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the
first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order
and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning
the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter
by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the
front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley,
attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left
running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste
from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in
winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the
penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals
must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars
for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-
saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly
prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas,
house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about
stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided
with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of
hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this depart-
ment may understand that the permission is not for the
use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other
vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding
rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense,
and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the
premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid
water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT
in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559,
Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 351 of the New
York City Consolidated Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887,
the following changes are made in charging and collect-
ing water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after
June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in
arrears in the same manner as regular rents have hereto-
fore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters
are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water
by meter measurement shall be the only charge against
such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through
meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the
year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirma-
tion of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall
include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established,
and will be imposed in each and every case where the
rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the
use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful man-
ner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on
the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings
or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears
in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every
nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will
be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN
made to this Department by citizens claiming
reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through
meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-
fective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful
waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be
turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-
out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-
ises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable
this Department to detect and check the useless and un-
warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential
to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-
ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for
the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through
meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the
law therefore holds the owner of the premises respon-
sible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that in all
further applications for reduction of water rents, no
allowance will be made on account of waste of water
occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or
plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occu-
pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may
have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the
owners of the buildings.
