WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending December 31, 1893.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections and reinspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was 180,634, classified as follows:

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 434 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 257 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 12 permits to land rags (in bulk), under bonds, and 41 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

The deaths for the quarter numbered 9,473, being 298 more than in the corresponding quarter of 1892, but giving a smaller death-rate than for the fourth quarter of either of the previous four years, viz.: 19.78.

The increase of 298 deaths was mainly due to an increase in the deaths from contagious and infectious diseases, especially diphtheria and measles, which have been unusually prevalent. The deaths from the principal infectious diseases for the fourth quarters of 1893 and 1892, respectively, were as follows: Diphtheria, 663 against 381; typhoid fever, 137 against 116; measles, 108 against 88; scarlet fever, 58 against 115, and small-pox, 31 against 19, diphtheria alone thus accounting for 282 out of the 298 excess of deaths. The falling off of scarlet fever is very marked, and the mortality from measles is light, when the large number of reported cases is taken into consideration, viz.: 108 deaths to 2,190 cases, a mortality of about 5 per cent.

The deaths from diarrhoeal diseases were 323 against 274 in 1892, and from phthisis 1171 against 1151, a variation too slight to be worthy of note. The deaths from diseases of the respiratory organs also varied little from 1892.

There was a falling off of 70 in the deaths by accident (328 against 398), but an increase of 37, over 70 per cent., in the deaths by suicide (88 against 51), undoubtedly due to the hard times, as the increase of deaths from this cause began early in September.

As regards the ages of those who died during the quarter, there was a considerable increase in those of 65 years of age and upwards, viz.: 186 against 126, and of children under 5 years of age, viz.: 3,543 against 3,212, an increase of 331, attributable almost entirely to the prevalence of infectious diseases.

The number of births reported was 13,771, against 12,710 in 1892, and of marriages 4,340, against 4,413.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending December 31, 1893, the number of notices issued by the Board was 5,024. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

Air shafts cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with sewer.

Chimneys repaired, extended, cleaned or obstructions removed.

Cisterns disinfected, emptied, cleaned or covered or provided.
Clothes-poles reset.
Coops cleaned, disinfected or removed.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
