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## EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Office of the Mayor, July 18, 1906.

Pursuant to the authority vested in me by law, and on the requisition of fifteen members of the Board of Aldermen made in accordance with the provisions of section 37 of the Greater New York Charter, I, Patrick F. The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out a new street west of Riverside drive, at about One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street.

The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of vesting title to Two Hundred and Twelfth street, from Broadway to the Harlem river.

Resolved, by the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that title to Two Hundred and Twelfth street, from Broadway to the Harlem river, be vested in The City of New York; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of regulating, grading, curbing and flagging Two Hundred and Twelfth street, from Broadway to the Harlem river.

Estimated cost, \$12,514. Assessed value of the property affected, \$218,300.

On motion of Alderman Meyers, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

To regulate, grade, curb and flag Two Hundred and Twelfth street, from Broadway to the Harlem river, and in connection therewith to construct necessary masonry retaining wall; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of constructing sewer in Two Hundred and Twelfth street, from Broadway to the Harlem river.

Estimated cost, \$13,158. Assessed value of the property affected, \$366,800.

On motion of Alderman Meyers, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

To construct sewer in Two Hundred and Twelfth street, from the Harlem river to Broadway; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out One Hundred and Seventy-third, One Hundred and Seventy-fourth and One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets, between Fort Washington and Haven avenues; also the extension of Haven and Buena Vista avenues.

Note—The map showing the laying out of these streets was adopted by the Board of Local Improvements on November 28, and has been returned by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with a request that a plan be devised whereby the destruction of buildings might be avoided.

Mr. James A. Deering appeared and requested an adjournment.

Mr. Joseph A. Flannery appeared and urged that prompt action be taken by the Board.

On motion of Alderman Meyers this matter was laid over until next meeting.

On motion of Alderman Meyers the Board adjourned for three weeks, the next meeting being July 31, 1906.

First—That we have completed our estimate of damage, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, and having objection thereto, do present their said objections in writing, duly verified, to us at our office, in the office of the Law Department, No. 166 Montague street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on or before the 16th day of July, 1906, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on the 17th day of July, 1906, at 3 o'clock p. m.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate of damage, together with our damage maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings of the Law Department of The City of New York, in the Borough of Brooklyn, No. 166 Montague street., in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, there to remain until the 27th day of July, 1906.

Third—That, provided there be no objections to our abstract of damage, our final report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 17th day of September, 1906, at the opening of the court on that day.

## NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
