Resolution Authorizing Heads of Departments to Grant Leaves of Absence to Certain Classes of Employees.

Whereas, The New York State Firemen's Association and the Southern New York Volunteer Firemen's Association hold their annual conventions during the months of August and June, respectively; and

Whereas, Many of the employees of the City of New York and the Counties within said City are members of these associations; and

Whereas, Many of these employees perform services as volunteer firemen for the City of New York and the Boroughs now embraced in said City and many of them at the present time are performing active service as such volunteer firemen; therefore be it

Resolved, That the heads of all departments in the City of New York and the Counties therein be and they hereby are requested to grant leaves of absence to the employees of their respective departments with pay for the three days commencing on the 11th day of June, 1918, to enable them to attend the convention of the Southern New York Volunteer Firemen's Association to be held at Brooklyn, New York, and be it further

Resolved, That similar leaves of absence be granted such employees to enable them to attend the convention of the New York State Firemen's Association at Lockport, New York, on the five days commencing on August 19th, 1918.

Provided, however, that said employees attend said conventions either as members or delegates and produce suitable certificates from the secretaries of said associations testifying to such attendance, and be it further

Chief Clerk, City Court—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$1,750, to Pay for Services of an Additional Stenographer from June 1 to December 31, 1918, Inclusive.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, City Hall Park, City of New York:

Gentlemen—Your attention is respectfully directed to a recent act of the Legislature of the State of New York, amending section 332 of the Code of Civil Procedure so as to provide ten instead of nine Stenographers of the City Court of the City of New York. This act, as amended, was passed March 7, 1918, approved by the Mayor March 22, and was signed by the Governor March 26, 1918.

The need of the court for the services of this official stenographer is urgent. The salary of each of the other nine court stenographers is fixed at \$3,000 per annum. Your Board is hereby respectfully requested to issue special revenue bonds in the sum of \$1,750, so as to provide funds for the payment of said stenographer from June 1 to December 31, 1918, inclusive. District Attorney, Kings County—Request for Authority to Draw on Account of Contingent Expenses.

District Attorney's Office, County of Kings, Brooklyn, New York, April 27th, 1918.

Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—The following resolution was adopted by your Board on February 1st, 1916, and, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, became effective February 15th 1916, without the signature of the Mayor:

Resolved, That for the purpose of defraying minor or incidental expenses and expenses of transportation incurred by the District Attorney's office of Kings County, the District Attorney of Kings County

It is absolutely essential that moneys should be advanced to this office, as it is necessary to pay out cash almost daily, and funds should be available for that purpose.

In view of the letter of the Comptroller, and for the reasons stated, I request that a resolution be adopted by your Board identical with that of February 1st, 1916, as quoted above. Yours very truly,

Board of Elections—Request for Permission to Enter Into Contract, Without Public Letting, for Necessary Supplies Required for Enrollment of Women Voters on May 25, 1918.

Board of Elections of the City of New York, General Office, Municipal Building, Manhattan, New York, April 29, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York, City Hall:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to the provisions of chapter No. 297 of the Laws of 1918, it becomes necessary for the Board of Elections of this city to make all necessary arrangements for the enrollment on May 25th of women voters in the City of New York, which involves the printing and supplying of maps, enrollment blanks, identification statements, additional sheets for registration books and numerous other election supplies, many of which are of an emergent character, and all must be furnished to the Board of Elections prior to May 20th. As the time elapsing between the present date and May 20th is insufficient to comply with the provisions of section 419 of the Charter of the City of New York, requiring that public estimates and bids shall be received and contracts awarded for supplies involving an expenditure of more than one thousand dollars, and inasmuch as it appears upon a careful estimate made thereon that the cost of such necessary supplies will amount approximately to the sum of \$4,650, the Board of Elections hereby respectfully request the adoption by the Board of Aldermen the following resolution:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Elections of the City of New York be and it is hereby authorized and empowered to enter into contract, without public letting, for the necessary maps, printing, stationery and supplies required for the enrollment of women voters of this City, to be used in connection with said enrollment, as fixed by law for May 25th next, at a cost approximately of \$4,650.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—The Memorial Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic of the County of the Bronx beg most respectfully to present to your honorable Board the urgent necessity for an increased appropriation to defray the expenses incident to the observance of Memorial Day, based upon the increased cost of labor, materials and other essentials. An Ordinance to Amend Section 35 of Article 2 of Chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Fire Prevention."

By Alderman Kenneally—

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fire prevention."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fire prevention," is hereby amended by inserting therein a new subdivision to read as follows:

2. To prevent films in projecting machines from taking fire. Every motion picture projecting machine used for the projecting of motion pictures, shall be equipped with an approved automatic shutter placed between the condensers and the film, and so arranged as to close immediately and automatically should the film become stationary through breakage or failure of the take-up to work properly.

Sec. 2. Subdivision 2 of section 35 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby changed to and shall be known as subdivision 3.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Finance, to which was referred on April 23, 1918 (Minutes, page 106), the annexed request of the Memorial Committee, G. A. R., for special revenue bonds, \$1,000, to meet increased cost of material, labor and other essentials incidental to the observance of Memorial Day, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the Committee has been advised by the Memorial Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic that this request is due to the increase in cost of materials, labor, etc., and, being in full accord with the purposes for which said funds are to be used, it recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) (in addition to the amount allotted in the Budget for 1918), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Memorial Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic, County of New York, for the purpose of meeting increased cost of material, labor and other essentials incidental to the observance of Memorial Day.

Due to the Government taking over control of output of all flour it has been impossible to have merchants contract for it. Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Bids were opened by this department on February 2, 1918, for furnishing one four-wheel tractor for a water tower. Two bids were received, one from The Front Drive Motor Company amounting to \$5,300, and the other from the Garford Motor Truck Company, Inc., amounting to \$5,627.90.

There are in the department at the present time, attached to water towers, two Garford tractors which have proven very satisfactory, and it would be to the department's best interest if the Garford tractor were made the standard for water towers.

The advantage of having one standard type, thus making parts interchangeable, cannot be too strongly emphasized. Mechanics become very familiar with apparatus when only one type is used, and usually can locate trouble and make repairs with the least cost to the City. A standard also reduces to a minimum the probability of a piece of apparatus being out of service for a protracted period. In addition to these advantages, fewer spare parts will be kept in stock than would be the case if two or more makes were in use, thus lessening the expenditure in this direction.

While the advantages of having one standard make are very important, I would not consider purchasing a Garford tractor at a cost greater than the low bid received at the opening referred to. I took the matter up with the Garford Company, and they agreed in writing, under date of April 3, 1918, to furnish a four-wheel tractor for \$5,300, so that the cost will be no more to the department than if the tractor were procured from the Front Drive Motor Company.

It is requested, therefore, that permission be granted to purchase one four-wheel tractor according to Fire Department specifications for \$5,300 without the formality of public letting.

There has been in the repair shops for several months a water tower which only requires a tractor to make it fit for service. I have refrained, however, from taking the necessary steps to purchase a tractor until I had personally investigated and become convinced it is necessary. While the department has gone through the winter without the services of the water tower which it is proposed to tractor, I consider it unwise and unsafe to be permanently without its use.

The Apparatus Board of the last administration recommended and urged the purchase of a complete new water tower, the cost of which is estimated at \$19,000. It is my intention to take no action on this recommendation. By the proposed purchase of a tractor at \$5,300 a first-class water tower would become available and no further purchase of this type of apparatus will be made, thus saving \$19,000.

I might add that at the present time I am personally working on a proposition in connection with motor apparatus which will result in saving more than \$150,000 on forty-two pieces, and have reason to believe it will be brought to a successful conclusion. Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting Substitute Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Hospitals.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on March 26, 1918 (Minutes, page 694), the annexed ordinance to amend article 1 of chapter 13 of the Code of Ordinances relating to hospitals, respectfully

REPORTS:

The Committee has given this matter more than ordinary consideration. It is worthy the attention, and after consultation with the Comptroller by the introducer, the conclusions of which were expressed at a meeting of the Committee, it was deemed wise to offer it to the Board for adoption in amended form. The amended form embraces the uniformed force of the Department of Street Cleaning with those of the Police and Fire Departments. This conclusion was reached, based on the request of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning (with whom Alderman McManus, the introducer, consulted), which set forth that the percentage of accidents to employees in his department was far in excess of those in the others. Considering that the employees of the latter department are deserving of thought the Committee reports for adoption the accompanying substitute ordinance.

SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 1 of chapter 13 of the Code of Ordinances relating to hospitals.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Sec. 1. Section 5 of article 1 of chapter 13 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§5. Members of the fire and police departments [] and the department of street cleaning.

[Any member of the uniformed fire department or police department who shall be injured or taken sick while on duty shall be received by any hospital for care and treatment.

The cost and expense of such care and treatment shall be certified by the superintendent or person in charge of such hospital to the comptroller, who shall pay the same, after audit.]

A member of the uniformed forces of the fire or police departments who shall be injured while actually employed in the discharge of police or fire duty, as the case may be, or while under orders of his superior officers in the police station or fire house, as the case may be, or who as the result of illness traceable directly to the performance of police or fire duty, as the case may be, or a member of the uniformed force of the department of street cleaning who shall be injured while actually employed in the discharge of duty, when certified to by the head of the department, shall be received by any hospital for care and treatment at the usual ward patient rates. The bill for such care and treatment at such rates, when certified by the superintendent or other person in charge of such hospital and approved by the police commissioner, fire commissioner or the commissioner of street cleaning, as the case may be, shall be paid subject to audit by the comptroller.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

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
