Resolved, That two lamp-posts with Boulevard lamps be erected and lighted in front of the Franklin Street M. E. Church, located at No. 176 Franklin street, under the direction of the Com-

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 250 of article XXVI. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section I. Section 250, article XXVI., chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, is hereby amended by inserting after the words "hand and seal, to" the words "so many and," and after the words "such persons as" the words "he shall think proper and who," and by adding at the end thereof the following, "and every license granted under and by virtue of the provisions hereof shall be revocable by the mayor for cause," so that said section when so amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 250. The prayor may from time to time grant licenses, under his hand and seal, to so many

Sec. 250. The mayor may from time to time grant licenses, under his hand and seal, to so many and such persons as he shall think proper, and who shall produce to him satisfactory evidence of their good character, to exercise or carry on the business of a pawnbroker, or of a loan broker, or keeper of a loan office; and no person shall exercise or carry on the business of a pawnbroker, loan

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broker, or keeper of a loan office, without being duly licensed by the mayor, under the penalty of fifty dollars for each day he or she shall exercise or carry on said business without such license, and every license granted under and by virtue of the provisions hereof shall be revocable by the Mayor

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
