

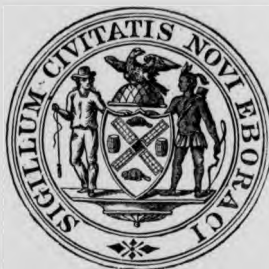

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office Saturday, May 7, 1887, at 11.10 o'clock A. M.

Present—Edward V. Loew, Comptroller; E. Henry Lacombe, Counsel to the Corporation; Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held March 23, 1887, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors, under date of April 14, 1887, viz.:

1. Eighty-ninth street paving with trap-block pavement, from Second to Fifth avenue.
2. Attorney street sewer, between Stanton and Rivington streets.
3. Fencing vacant lots on St. Ann's avenue, west side, between Westchester avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, known as the Bensonia Cemetery.

The Comptroller presented the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors, under date of April 28, 1887, viz.:

1. One Hundred and Forty-first street sewer, between Avenue St. Nicholas and Tenth avenue.
2. Attorney street sewer, between Stanton and Rivington streets.
3. Fencing vacant lots on St. Ann's avenue, west side, between Westchester avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, known as the Bensonia Cemetery.
4. One Hundred and Sixth street sewer, between Boulevard and summit east.
5. St. Ann's and North Third avenues flagging, on the easterly side of, from East One Hundred and Sixty-first street (or Clifton street) to East One Hundred and Sixty-third street.
6. Ninety-seventh street sewer, between Boulevard and Riverside avenue.
7. One Hundred and Fourteenth street sewers, between Fourth and Sixth avenues.
8. One Hundred and Sixth street sewers, between summits, east and west of Tenth avenue.
9. Hudson street sewer, between Christopher and Grove streets.
10. Fencing vacant lots on northwest corner of Seventh avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street.

11. Fencing vacant lots on block bounded by First and Second avenues, Eighty-second and Eighty-third streets.

12. Fencing vacant lots on north side of Fifty-seventh street, 100 feet east of Broadway, and running east about 150 feet.

13. Fencing vacant lots on northeast corner of Fourth avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street.

14. Flagging southeast corner of Lexington avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-third street.

15. Thirtieth street flagging, between Sixth and Seventh avenues.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion, the same were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing sewers and appurtenances in Grove street, between Brook avenue and North Third avenue, with connecting sewers in Bergen avenue, between Westchester avenue and Grove street; North Third avenue, between Westchester avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street; One Hundred and Fifty-first street, between North Third and Courtland avenues; One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between North Third and Courtland avenues; One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between North Third and Courtland avenues; One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, between North Third and College avenues; Elton avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-third and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets; Courtland avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-first and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth streets, was presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 6, 1887.

The said assessment list being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion the same was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving First avenue, from Ninety-second to One Hundred and Ninth street, with granite block pavement, having been received from the Board of Assessors without objections, under date of April 27, 1887.

At the request of Mr. T. H. Baldwin, attorney, the said assessment list was ordered to be referred back to the Board of Assessors for the hearing of objections which Mr. Baldwin stated he desired to submit.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb-stones and flagging in Eighty-eighth street, from Tenth to Riverside avenue, with record of awards for damages to buildings for change of grade, and petitions for awards for damages of Henry R. Mount, filed by T. H. Baldwin, attorney, and of Michael Friedland and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, ordered to be referred back to the Assessors at meeting of March 23, 1887, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of April 29, 1887.

After hearing Mr. Baldwin and Col. Gilon, Chairman of the Board of Assessors, on motion, the assessment list was ordered to be referred back to said Board for investigation of the subject of damages to land by reason of change of grade, and for the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation as to the power of the Board of Assessors in regard thereto.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb-stones and flagging in One Hundred and Third street, from Tenth avenue to Riverside Drive, with record of awards for damages to buildings by change of grade on the line; also claim and demand of John Cooney for an award and affidavit made by him as to ownership of the property, filed by Jno. C. Shaw, attorney, and affidavit of Richard S. Ely as to his ownership of lot at southwest corner of One Hundred and Third street and Eleventh avenue, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of May 6, 1887.

No one appeared in opposition after notice. On motion, the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for flagging, setting curb and gutter stones and laying crosswalks in Elton avenue, from Washington avenue to Third avenue, and objections of Robert Nicholson, ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors at meeting of January 14, 1887, in order to afford Mr. Nicholson an opportunity to be heard in relation to his objections, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 16, 1887, together with an affidavit made by Mr. Nicholson on March 2, 1887, in reply thereto.

After consideration, on motion, the objections of Mr. Nicholson were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging Lincoln avenue, from Southern Boulevard to North Third avenue, with record of awards for damages to buildings by change of grade on the line, ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors at meeting of March 23, 1887, for the purpose of affording Mrs. Bridget Kavanagh an opportunity of submitting evidence to the said Board in support of her objections, was presented by the Comptroller, having been returned by the Board of Assessors under date of April 22, 1887, together with affidavit of Mrs. Kavanagh, dated April 19, 1887. The Assessors state that "since the return of the assessment list they have personally inspected the flagging in front of Mrs. Kavanagh's property, and the appearance of the sidewalk proves beyond doubt that a new row of flagging has been laid under

the present contract and that the returns, as shown upon the assessment list, are correct and justly chargeable to the lots in question. The assessment list and all papers connected with the same are herewith retransmitted, without alteration, for your action thereon."

After consideration, on motion, the several objections received in said matter were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer in Forsyth street, between Stanton and Houston streets, and objections of Elizabeth Bernhard filed by Ashbel P. Fitch, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of April 28, 1887.

After consideration it was, on motion, ordered that said assessment list be referred back to the Board of Assessors for consideration in regard to the objections of Elizabeth Bernhard, who claims that she had built a private sewer, connecting her premises with the sewer in Houston street, under an order of the Health Department in February, 1885.

The assessment list for regulating and grading Third avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, and grading approaches to the same at intersecting streets, between Harlem river and One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, with record of awards for damages to buildings on the line, and applications and claims of various parties for awards, etc., ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors at meeting of November 6, 1886, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 28, 1887, together with the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation in said matter, dated January 31, 1887.

After hearing Mr. John C. Shaw in behalf of Mr. C. C. Hottenroth and Colonel Gilon, on motion, the said assessment list and accompanying papers were ordered to be referred back to the Board of Assessors with the request to examine the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the proceedings for the opening of Morris avenue with reference to the award made to Mr. Hottenroth, and for the cross-examination of said Commissioners by Mr. Shaw, his attorney.

At 12.25 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and by the use of the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

No ice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rates, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with, no deduction or extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
