Resolved, That Commissioner MacLean be appointed Chairman and Acting President until the next meeting of the Board.

Commissioner MacLean offered the following:

That the persons named in lists marked A 1 and A 2 be appointed as Inspectors of Election to serve in the several election districts as such for the next ensuing election.

Commissioner French moved to amend, that a committee, consisting of Commissioners Wheeler and Morrison, take the list marked A 2, known as the Anti-Tammany list, and A 3, known as the Tammany list, and report to this Board, at 2 o'clock P. M., a name for each district from each of said lists, to serve as Democratic Inspectors of Election. Lost—Commissioners Wheeler and French voting aye; Commissioners MacLean and Morrison voting no.

Commissioner French moved to amend, that the first person named for each district in list A 1, known as Republican list, and in list A 2, known as Anti-Tammany list, be appointed Inspectors of Election.

Commissioner Wheeler moved to amend the amendment, that the two persons named in list A 1, and the first person named in each district on list A 2, known as Anti-Tammany list, be appointed Inspectors of Election. Lost.

Commissioner French moved that the Board take a recess for an hour. Lost.  
Commissioner French here withdrew his amendment. The question on original resolution, offered by Commissioner MacLean, was lost—Commissioners MacLean and Morrison voting aye; Commissioners Wheeler and French voting no.

Commissioner French moved that this Board appoint as Inspectors of Election the persons named in list A 1, known as Republican list, and also the persons named on list marked 3, comprising one each from the Tammany and Anti-Tammany lists. Lost.

Commissioner French moved that a recess be taken for an hour, or until 2.15 P. M. Lost.

Commissioner Wheeler moved that the persons named in list marked A, known as the Republican list, be appointed Poll Clerks.

Commissioner Morrison moved to amend, that the persons named in list marked B be appointed Poll Clerks.

Commissioner Wheeler moved to amend the amendment, that the Democratic Poll Clerks be taken alternately, one from each of the Democratic lists marked B and C. Lost. Commissioner Morrison's amendment lost. The question on the original was lost.

opposite their respective names, for the next ensuing election. Commissioner French moved to amend, that the alternate names on list marked A 3, commencing with P. Hagan, be selected by this Board as Inspectors of Election, possessing all the qualifications as stated by Commissioner Morrison, for those named in list A 2. Commissioner Morrison objected, the name P. Hagan having been already selected. Commissioner French corrected his amendment by naming second man (—) on the list. Lost.

Commissioner MacLean desired the following statement to be entered in the minutes:

I shall vote no, for the reason that the Statute, in my opinion, gives no warrant or color for a pretext that two Commissioners shall name more than two Inspectors; and that I am not aware of any grounds for claiming that the two Republican Commissioners shall name more than two Inspectors of Election. Two Inspectors of Election of each Election District of every Assembly District, named by Mr. French and Mr. Wheeler, Republican members, have been selected and appointed by the Board. I don't see any ground or excuse for claim on their part to nominate and dictate that any other persons shall be selected and appointed Inspectors of Election. Also the Statute gives no warrant or color for the Commissioner or Commissioners of any one political faith to name more than two Inspectors. Commissioners French and Wheeler, after naming two, have endeavored and are now endeavoring to force the selection of another. I do not, therefore, see any ground for the motion made by Mr. French, and I also say, further, that I am not of opinion, upon information had and inquiry made, that the persons so nominated and named by Mr. French are of different political faith and opinions from the two other persons named by Mr. French.

Commissioner French desired the following statement to be entered in the minutes:

Conceding all that the Commissioner has said with regard to his convictions of duty as sincere, I must resent the imputation he has thrown out that some ulterior purpose other than that of public duty has influenced myself and my republican colleague in opposing the appointment of the two democratic inspectors in the interest of the Anti-Tammany party. I hardly know how to repel that imputation on my official character otherwise than to say that any one who knows me won't accuse me of corrupt motives. I will not say, like Mr. MacLean, that I have not consulted any one about my duties in the present emergency. I have consulted with some of the leading men of the city and State, of different political views, and I have acted by the advice of abler men than myself, who are not partisans. I have thought it my duty to appoint these inspectors in the manner I have advocated, and I believe if it was not for the opinion concurring in by the judges appointed by the man himself you want to make Governor, to decide this issue, I would have consented to appoint these inspectors by giving the two democratic inspectors in each of the election districts to the party in harmony with the democratic members of this Board; that is, if I could not influence these Commissioners to make a more equitable arrangement. But in view of the opinion expressed by the Judges of the Extraordinary General Term, which clearly states it to be our duty to appoint inspectors who will represent equally both the democratic organizations of this city, I believe that such decision is just and fair and I propose to stand by it.

Commissioner Morrison desired the following statement to be entered in the minutes:

I want to say here that the action of the republican members of this Board indicates a clear alliance with that party known as the Tammany Hall party. It is most desirable to have a fair election, and that being so it is necessary to have those democratic inspectors of election appointed who are diametrically opposed on State issues to the republican organization. And I consider that any effort to substitute any other inspectors than those in full accord with the State ticket of the regular democracy should alarm the good sense of the community, and such action is calculated to lead to compulsion and corruption at the ballot box. The plan proposed by us will lead to different results.

The question on the original motion was lost—Commissioners MacLean and Morrison voting aye; Commissioners Wheeler and French voting no.

Commissioner Morrison stated, as an additional reason for his last vote against amendment of Commissioner French, that the law does not authorize the Republican Commissioners of the Board to nominate or name more than two of the persons for Inspectors of Election to be appointed by the Board.

Commissioner Morrison moved that the Poll Clerks not heretofore appointed, on lists A and B, as submitted, be selected and appointed Poll Clerks, to serve for the next ensuing election.
