That the Sixth Avenue Railroad Company is also a corporation, duly organized and incor-porated under and by virtue of the laws of the State of New York, and authorized by the City and State of New York to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railroad for 'public use on certain streets and avenues in the said City of New York, including Lenox avenue, formerly known as Sixth avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to Harlem river. Said applicants allege that said branch and extension cannot be operated as an independent railroad without inconvenience to the public, but that it is to the public advantage and convenience that the same should be operated as a continuous line or route with the railroads of said applicants ; that said route will be operated by the same motive power as is lawfully permitted or used on the route of either of said applicants, and said applicants will not use on said route either locomotive steam or overhead trolley power.

The decrease of 29 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 8 in the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, of 18 from phthisis, of 17 from Bright's disease, and of 10 from old age, partially offset by an increase of 5 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 7 from measles, and of 8 from disases of the nervous system.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, from measles in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Twenty-second Ward.

ACQUIRED BY WATER ORANTS.
