

The 680 deaths represent a death-rate of 17.85, against 18.21 for the previous week, and 19.86 for the corresponding week of 1893.

The number of deaths was slightly smaller than that for the previous week. There was an increase of 6 in the deaths from measles, of 15 from cancer, of 9 from phthisis, of 5 from hear

disease, of 16 from pneumonia, and of 11 from congenital debility, which was a little more than offset by a decrease of 30 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 14 from apoplexy, of 10 from Bright's disease, and of 7 from violence.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Fourteenth and Sixteenth Wards, and from scarlet fever in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards.
