## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

## Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held Wednesday, April 7, 1915, at 10.30 o'Clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Commissioners Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of rule XVII., clause 2, in so far as it relates to the minimum relative measurements for Patrolman. Dr. Edward T. Higgins, Police Surgeon, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Competitive Class, Part I. (Ungraded Positions), Group 3 (Positions of a Special or Miscellaneous Character), the following: "Overseer, New York City Reformatory." Burdette G. Lewis, Esq., Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Correction, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by increasing the number of Clerks to the Board in the Exempt Class for the Board of Elections from nine to fifteen. Hon. Edward F. Boyle, President of the Board of Elections, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. Harry W. Marsh, Esquire, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in opposition. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Department of Public Charities," the following: 10 Deputy Superintendents of Training School, 6 Superintendents of Training School. The following named appeared in opposition to the proposed amendment: Hon. John A. Kingsbury, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities; Hon. Henry C. Wright, First Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities; Mrs. William K. Draper, Trustee of the Metropolitan Training School; Mrs. Cadwalader Jones, President of the Board of Trustees of the City Hospital Training School; Mrs. William Church Osborn, President of the Board of Managers of Bellevue Hospital; Miss Clara D. Noyes, General Superintendent of Training School, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals; Dr. John W. Brannan, President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meeting held March 10 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, that paragraph 2 of Civil Service Rule XVII. (Special Provisions affecting the Police and Fire Services) be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

**Duties**—To conduct investigations into and to prepare reports upon economic and fiscal phases of city planning problems, particularly those connected with the regulation of the height, character and use of buildings, and the districting of the city for the purpose of such regulation.

**Requirements**—Candidates must present evidence of experience in the investigation of problems of the character described and in the preparation of a report of such investigation; or in such other work of investigation and report as would tend to qualify them for the duties of this position. Candidates should be thoroughly familiar with current discussion and practice in city planning, both constructive and regulatory, and should have an intimate knowledge of the economic and legal conditions governing such planning in this city.

The minimum age is twenty-one years.

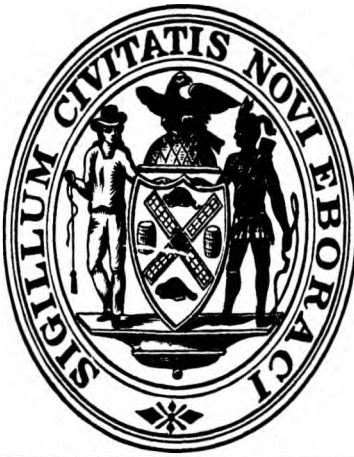

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
