

#### MEETING, JULY 18.

A resolution was adopted requesting the President to make application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a transfer of \$625 to "Maintenance, 1876."

Messrs. Morton, Chesley & Co., contractors, were allowed a payment of \$12,000 on account. John Reynolds, Laborer, was restored.

Payment was authorized to be made the contractor for removing the Swedish School-house from Philadelphia to the Payle.

Notices were ordered sent to all persons interested in opening Bronx River avenue, that the Department will receive their petition if they wish to have legal proceedings for the acquiring title of the land commenced now.
