



DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

[BOARD OF EXAMINERS.]

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held pursuant to call of Superintendent of Buildings, at the office of the Department of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, the 16th March, 1880, at 3 o'clock P. M.

There being present thereat, John Banta, Henry Dudley, James M. McLean, Edwin Dobbs, and Superintendent Henry J. Dudley.

Superintendent Henry J. Dudley presiding.
The Chairman submitted for the action of the Board the hereinafter named petitions and applications, to wit, the same having been laid over from last meeting:

Petition of John B. Snook to be allowed to line up the party wall between Nos. 368 and 370 Broadway, running through to Cortlandt alley, on lot No. 368, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 81, filed January 31, 1880.

On motion of Mr. Banta, approved unanimously.

Petition of Hugh Meehan to build the bearing wall of building southeast corner of One Hundred and Eighth street and Fourth avenue 12 inches thick on line of Fourth avenue, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 126, filed February 16, 1880.

On motion of Superintendent, laid over for proper drawings, unanimously.

Petition of Thomas Stent for permission to carry up the walls of building No. 354 Third avenue to an additional height of 15 feet, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 57, filed January 26, 1880.

On motion of Mr. Dobbs, approved unanimously.

Petition of Stephen D. Hatch, for permission to raise buildings Nos. 156 and 158 Broadway, two additional stories, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 85, filed February 2, 1880.

On motion of Mr. Dobbs, the petition was approved on condition, the north wall of extension in rear be carried up above present wall on iron beams, the wall above to be constructed with fire-proof materials. Unanimous.

Petition of Mary Tracy, per Andrew T. Wilson, for permission to build the upper walls of one-story building No. 1608 Second avenue, 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 157, filed March 1, 1880.

On motion of Mr. Dobbs, approved unanimously.

Petition of W. P. Birdsall, for permission to build the bearing wall on line Madison avenue, of building southwest corner of One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street and Madison avenue, 12 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 159, filed March 1, 1880.

On motion of Mr. Dobbs, the petition was approved, on condition that the bearing wall is constructed 16 inches thick, to the top of the first story floor beams. Unanimous.

Petition of F. W. Klemt, for permission to line the present 12-inch party wall of building No. 103 East Tenth street, with 12 inches brick wall in basement, and 4 inches in first story as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 58, filed January 26, 1880.

On motion of Mr. Banta, disapproved unanimously.

The Chairman then offered for reconsideration, as follows:

Petition of Henry Fernbach, for permission, in the alteration of building No. 38 East Eleventh street, to construct the walls of the thickness as described and shown in Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 204, filed February 27, 1880.

On motion of Mr. Banta, it was resolved the petition be approved, on condition that the walls of extension are constructed according to law. Unanimous.

Also the following new petitions:

Petition of A. B. Ogden, to build an extension to building No. 37 East Seventy-fourth street, to be about sixteen feet in height, the walls to be eight inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 255, filed March 8, 1880.

On motion, approved unanimously.

Petition of D. M. Smith, to build an extension in rear of building No. 151 East Thirty-fourth street, the same to be two story, and the second story upper walls eight inches in thickness, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 271, filed March 10, 1880.

On motion, approved unanimously.

Petition of Thomas Graham, for permission to build the walls of the fourth and fifth stories of building Nos. 305 and 307 East Forty-third street twelve inches in thickness, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 167, filed March 3, 1880.

On motion of Mr. Dobbs, so much of the petition is approved, as will allow the walls of the upper story to be constructed twelve inches thick, unanimously.

Special application of William Rowland & Co., for Clark & Seaman, for permission to erect a freight shed and office on Pier No. 9, North river, in conformity with plans and applications granted by Department of Docks. The building to be of frame, inclosed on sides with corrugated iron; roof to be of tin, as per Special Application No. 130, March 11, 1880.

On motion of Mr. McLean, the application was approved, provided the whole of the exterior is covered with metal, according to law. Unanimously.

Petition of Thomas H. McEvoy, for permission to erect a one-story brick foundry on west side of Third avenue, 100 feet south of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street (Twenty-third Ward), the brick wall or panel work between the piers to be 8 inches thick in southerly side wall, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 156, filed March 1, 1880.

On motion, approved unanimously.

Petition of F. C. Cormier, on behalf of Willard, Hawes & Co., for permission to erect a stable on east side of Lewis street, between Sixth and Seventh streets, known as Nos. 210 and 212 Lewis street, to be 37 feet front and 18 feet deep, two stories high, to be allowed to erect the second story walls 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 166, filed March 3, 1880.

On motion, approved unanimously.

Petition of George Dailey, for permission to build extension on rear of building southeast corner Ninth avenue and Forty-second street, to be 16 x 20, one story high, the walls 8 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 139, filed February 14, 1880.

On motion, approved unanimously.

Petition of W. G. Delamater, for permission to erect a one story carpenter shop at No. 1317 Third avenue between Seventy-fifth and Seventy-sixth streets, with 8 inch walls, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 200, filed March 13, 1880.

On motion, approved unanimously.

Petition of W. A. Coit, for himself and Franklin Coit, for permission to rebuild the five-story brick factory Nos. 85, 87, and 89 Elizabeth street, rear, partially destroyed by fire, the same as it was before the fire, viz.: 55 x 31, five-stories, and 50 feet high. Walls to be of brick, 16 inches in first story, and 12 inches thence to roof, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 170, filed March 4, 1880.

On motion, disapproved unanimously.

Petition of Samuel Lowden, for permission on behalf of Chas. Wagner, to alter the building Nos. 413 and 415 East Twenty-fifth street, by raising the present building one story, making the same five stories, 59.6 inches in height, thus allowing the walls of this building, which are all independent, and 16 and 12 inches thick, to be carried up from 48 feet in height to 59.6, as per Plans and Specifications for Altering No. 233, filed March 4, 1880.

On motion, laid over for further information, unanimously.

Application of John C. Winch, for permission to build a brick office one-story high on premises No. 521 West Twenty-first street, 10 feet front, 14 feet deep, 9 feet high, with 8-inch walls, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 173, filed March 5, 1880.

On motion, approved unanimously.

Petition of Thomas E. Godwin, on behalf of B. T. Babbitt, for permission to allow an additional story to be placed on the two buildings on Nos. 78 and 84 Washington street, now seven stories, with walls 32 inches thick in the basement (driven piles underneath), 24 inches thick through first and second stories, and 16 inches thick thence to top, the walls of said additional story to be 16 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 240, filed March 5, 1880.

On motion, laid over, unanimously.

Petition of S. D. Hatch, for permission to build the south wall of new building Nos. 364 and 366 Broadway, corner Franklin street, in the first story 24 inches thick, instead of 28 inches, as it is supported by cast iron and brick piers in the basement and cellar, as shown by Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 46, filed January 22, 1880.

On motion disapproved, all voting in the affirmative, except Messrs. Dobbs and Banta.

Petition of John B. Snook, for permission to build the walls of building southwest corner of South Fifth avenue and Spring street, as per amended Plan and Specification for New Buildings No. 142, filed February 24, 1880, to wit: to build the bearing wall on South Fifth avenue front 20 inches thick in second story, and the iron posts in first story 20 inches deep; also to build the westerly or other bearing walls 20 inches thick in first and second story, and to be exempted from providing iron shutters on openings above first story.

On motion of Mr. McLean, the petition was disapproved, except as to that part which refers to iron shutters.

Petition of Marc Eidlitz, for permission to alter the building on northwest corner First avenue and Twenty-eighth street, to wit: the present building is 100 x 50, five stories and 66 feet high. It is proposed to raise the building an additional story or 10 feet in height, the walls to be of brick 20 and 16 inches thick, as per Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 295, filed March 15, 1880.

On motion, approved, unanimously.

The Chairman presented for reconsideration of the Board the petition of A. Vandalsen & Arnott, for permission to erect an additional story on building No. 5 Front street, with 12-inch walls, as per Plan and Specification for Alterations No. 175, filed February 21, 1880.

On motion, laid over.

Petition of Joseph Thompson, in the erection of two brick dwellings 12 feet 6 inches by 60 feet and 44 feet high on north side Eighty-third street 200 feet west of Fourth avenue, for permission to construct the party wall between said buildings 8 inches thick, above the basement tier of beams, as per Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 180, filed March 8, 1880.

On motion, approved, on condition that the beams are alternated in the party wall. Unanimously.

The action of the Board on petition of William Schickel, relating to New Buildings Nos. 33, 35 and 37 East Seventeenth street, presented to the Board of Examiners at meeting held March 2, was upon motion reconsidered, and approved on condition that the east and west walls be increased 4 inches in thickness in that portion of the building over 71 feet in width, and fire-proof columns and

girders be also put in that portion of building from bottom to top in a line with the easterly brick wall of that portion of the building facing on Union square, and iron beams carried through from bearing walls, and over each column, properly strapped together and anchored in bearing walls; also that the top of said girders be filled in with fire-proof material to separate the beams.

All voting for approval, except Mr. McLean.
Petition of D. Lienan for permission to alter and enlarge building No. 74 Broadway, as per Plans and Specifications No. 224, of Alterations, filed March 3, 1880.
On motion, approved unanimously.
The minutes of the meeting being read and approved as recorded, the Board adjourned, subject to the call of Superintendent of Buildings.

Approved by the Mayor, March 9, 1880.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Johnson & Son to place and keep an ornamental lamp-post and lamp on the sidewalk in front of No. 109 Bleecker street, provided the post shall not exceed the dimensions prescribed by resolution of the Common Council, and that the work done and gas supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 2, 1880.
Approved by the Mayor, March 9, 1880.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Francis P. Fernald, Esq., owner, to construct five oval projections commencing over the store floor on the front of the buildings to be erected at the northeast corner of Broadway and Thirty-seventh street, as shown on diagram below, said projections to be thirty inches beyond the flush line of the wall, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 2, 1880.
Approved by the Mayor, March 9, 1880.

Whereas, A bill for the removal of the Murray Hill Reservoir, and converting the land into a park, has been introduced in the Senate by Hon. W. W. Astor of that body, without the consent of the City, which owns the fee, and of the Sinking Fund Commissioners, to whom the proceeds of all real estate are pledged for the payment of the city debt; and

Whereas, The bill in question, by appropriating the land to a use other than that to which it has long been applied, is in derogation of the rights of the city, which acquired the title, as part of the common lands under the ancient Dongan and Montgomerie charters, a title recognized and prescribed by the successive state constitutions; and

Whereas, The passage of such an act would create a precedent which exposes all the real estate held and owned by the city to hostile and injurious legislation, in disregard of the wants and interests of the city; and

Whereas, The Sinking Fund Commissioners have protested against the passage of such a bill and numerous associations and bodies have joined in such protest; and

Whereas, Such reservoir holds, when full, 24,006,000 gallons, a quantity which gives 600 gallons to each of 40,000 houses below, which quantity it formerly supplied, and under proper management can still supply, and it gains an accumulation in the night two miles nearer to those houses, than are the Park Reservoirs, which accumulation it supplies in the morning, and in our judgment the reservoir is a necessary part of the water system; therefore

Resolved, That the representatives in the Senate and Assembly from the City of New York be respectfully requested to oppose the passage of the bill in question; and be it further

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Board be and he is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this preamble and resolution to the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the Assembly, and to each representative from this city to the Legislature.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 10, 1880.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, February 24, 1880, with his objections thereto.

In Board of Aldermen, March 9, 1880, taken up and considered, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to James F. Malloy to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk in front of No. 398 Eighth avenue, the work done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 2, 1880.
Approved by the Mayor, March 11, 1880.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1880.

CHAPTER 20.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the time for the collection of taxes in the several towns of this State.

Passed February 20, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any collector or receiver of taxes in any town of this state shall pay over all moneys collected by him and shall make his return to the treasurer of his county, as now required by law, of all unpaid taxes on lands of non-residents, and shall renew his bond as herein provided, the time for the collection of all other taxes and for making return thereof, by him, shall be, and is hereby extended to the first day of May, eighteen hundred and eighty; such bond shall be renewed with such sureties as in any town shall be approved by the supervisor thereof, or in case of his absence or inability to act, by the town clerk thereof. The penalty thereof in any case shall be double the amount of taxes in that case remaining uncollected. The bond shall be approved in writing and filed in the same manner as the original bond is required by law to be filed and to have all the effect of the collector's or receiver's bond. A copy of the bond and the approval thereof shall, within fifteen days after the passage of this act, be delivered to the county treasurer of the county in which said town is, but nothing herein contained shall be construed as extending the time for the payment of the state tax, or any part thereof, by the county treasurer of said county to the comptroller as now provided by law.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the secretary of state, immediately after the passage of this act, to cause to be printed on slips of paper and delivered to each county treasurer a sufficient number thereof to supply one copy to each collector or receiver of taxes in said county, and it shall be the duty of said county treasurer to deliver one copy thereof to each collector or receiver of taxes in his county.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Proposals for the above, made in accordance with Sec. 73, Chap. 335, Laws of 1873, and Chap. 478 of the Laws of 1879, and the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, Chap. 8, Article 2, and enclosed in a sealed envelope endorsed "Proposals for furnishing the illuminating material for, and lighting and extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and maintaining the public lamps," with the name of the party making the same written thereon, will be received at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, until 12 o'clock M. of Friday, March 26, 1880, at which place and hour they will be publicly opened by said Commissioner and read.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them, and, if no other person be so interested, they shall distinctly state the fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making any estimate for the same supplies and work; and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and, also, that no member of the Common Council, Head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which proposals must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true; where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each proposal shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid or proposal, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he or they shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he or they would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, and otherwise; that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with an intention to execute the bond required by Section 27, Article 2, Chapter 8, of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties offered to be determined by the Comptroller.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals the several streets or parts of streets in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, and also the illuminating or candle-power of the gas they propose to furnish, when tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture, and bidders proposing to furnish any illuminating material other than illuminating or coal gas, must state distinctly what kind of material they propose to furnish, and the illuminating power of the burner they propose to use for the same.

Bidders are also required to state the price for which they will furnish the gas (of not less than sixteen candle power by photometrical test, at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture) or other illuminating material for each lamp, including the lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, reglazing, and painting lamp-posts and lanterns, and replacing the cocks, tubes, burners, cross heads, lamp irons, and lanterns thereto, for the period from May 1st, 1880, to April 30th, 1881, both days inclusive, stating the price, for the above named period of one year, for each lamp.

Bidders are also required to state a price for which they will repair lamp-posts, including straightening and relighting, and for each new lamp fitted up, as follows:

For each lamp post straightened, stating the price per post.

For each column relighted, stating the price per post.

For each lamp post removed, stating the price per post.

For each lamp post reset, stating the price per post.

For each new lamp fitted up, stating the price per post.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The number of public lamps to be contracted for is about 20,000.

The burners for illuminating gas are to be of a capacity to burn three cubic feet of gas per hour under a pressure of one inch, and in case the illuminating material shall be other than illuminating gas, then the burners to be used for such illuminating material shall give a light (by photometrical test) equal to the light given by the gas-burners in use in the public lamps in the City of New York.

Should any alteration or any attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which proposals are made in consequence of the use of illuminating material other than gas, then such alteration shall be done and such attachment placed on the lamps without expense to the city.

The number of hours the lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is 4,000.

The amount of security required is \$60,000 on all contracts which will amount to \$100,000 or more; and on smaller contracts the security shall be sixty per cent. of the total amount of the bid.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Should the person or persons to whom the contract is so awarded neglect or refuse to accept to contract within forty-eight hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, or if he accept, but does not execute the contract and give the proper security, it may be readvertised and relet as provided by law and ordinance.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless a written permission shall have been previously obtained from the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works.

The right is reserved to assign and designate to any bidder, whose bid shall be accepted, the number and location of the lamps to be lighted by such bidder, in any portion of the city for which proposals are received, and to increase or diminish such number.

The right is reserved to determine and designate, after the proposals are opened, what illuminating material shall be used in the public lamps, or any number of them, during the period before mentioned; also to decline any or all proposals if deemed for the interests of the Corporation, and no proposal will be accepted from or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation, upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

If the proposal of any bidder proposing to furnish illuminating gas shall include any lamps with which the pipes or mains of such bidder are not connected at the time of the making of the bid, and a contract for furnishing the gas for and lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, and maintaining any such lamps, shall be awarded to such bidder, in that case, thirty days from the date of the execution of such contract and such further time, not exceeding thirty days, as may be deemed reasonable by the Commissioner of Public Works, shall be allowed to such bidder in which to connect such pipes or mains with such lamps.

But no payment to such bidder, on account of any such lamps, will be made for the time so allowed, nor until the same shall have been connected with the mains of such bidder nor except for the time during which all the requirements herein mentioned shall have been fully performed.
