## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau, for the week ending August 19, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1480, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 571 tenement-houses, 102 private dwellings, 14 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 41 stables, 54 slaughter-houses, 3 lodging-houses, 1 other building, 2 mills, 14 sunken and vacant lots, 79 yards, courts and areas, 90 cellars and basements, 195 waste pipes and drains, 227 privies and water-closets, 27 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 10 smoky chimneys, 17 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 500.

During the past week 254 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

97 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

140 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 78 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 68 houses, 68 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

4 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

## Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 523 births, 48 still-births, 123 marriages, and 754 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 19, 1882, this shows an increase of 16 births and a decrease of 4 still-births, 36 marriages and 74 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was a decrease of 43 births and 96 marriages, and an increase of 13 still-births and 71 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; scarlatina 2; diphtheria, 2; whooping cough, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 56; inanition, 2; cancers, 2; bronchitis, 7; marasmus, tabes, mesenterica and scrofula, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; direct effect of solar heat, 3; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 7; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; drowning, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 1; typhoid fever, 9; malarial fevers, 7; alcoholism, 5; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; heart disease, 8; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; convulsions, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preterm births, 2; surgical operations, 1. The number of deaths from croup, erysipelas, typhus fever, pneumonia, and suicide was the same in the two successive weeks.



Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 138 were in institutions, 448 in tenement-houses, 158 in houses containing three families or less, 2 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 16 were on the basement floor, 153 on the first, 188 on the second, 138 on the third, 79 on the fourth, 30 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 752 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents; 55 were stated to be single, 141 married, 67 widowed, and the condition of 491 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 754; still-births, 48; bodies in transit, 27; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 76 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 523 births; 123 marriages; 48 still-births; 754 deaths; 27 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 45 searches

of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 28 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 19, 1882, was 68.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.869, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,134, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.05 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Whereas, It appears from the report of the Superintendent of the Fire-Alarm Telegraph to this Board, that by the contact of electric illuminating wires with the fire-alarm telegraph wires of this Department, and the wires of telephone and telegraph companies now so extensively introduced into dwellings, manufactories, warehouses, stores, etc., it is possible to set fire to buildings, and even to fire a number of buildings simultaneously, and after the close of the day's business; and,

Whereas, The lines and instruments of the fire alarm system, in case of contact with electric illuminating wires, are greatly damaged or their usefulness destroyed, as has happened on several occasions mentioned in the report of the Superintendent of Telegraph, thereby leaving important sections of the city without the necessary facilities for transmitting alarms of fire; and,

Whereas, The experience of this Department shows that the danger of fires resulting from the contact of telegraph and telephone wires with those for electric illuminating purposes is too manifest to be overlooked, and that a necessity exists for some action to guard against the same; and,

Whereas, The Common Council is authorized by law to establish suitable rules and regulations governing the construction of electric illuminating wires within the city limits; therefore,

Resolved, That a copy of the said report of the Superintendent of the Fire-Alarm Telegraph, together with the accompanying draft of ordinance, be transmitted to his Honor the Mayor, with the request that he present the same to the Honorable Board of Aldermen. Adopted.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—I observe, by the CITY RECORD of July 5, 1882, that the Board of Aldermen is reported as acting as a Board of Supervisors, on that day, in the receipt of the assessment rolls from the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, and of the final estimate for 1882, from the Comptroller. I take the liberty, therefore, of calling your attention to the fact that there is no such office in the city of New York as that of Supervisor, and that there is no Board of Supervisors, and that the Board of Aldermen, in the performance of any duties devolved upon them by law, can no longer lawfully act as a Board of Supervisors, but must perform all such duties as a Board of Aldermen.

At the time the act, consolidating the city and county of New York, was passed, in 1874, there were certain duties imposed upon Boards of Supervisors by the constitution of the State, and it was, therefore, impossible, at that time, to abolish the Board of Supervisors in this county. The powers of duties, however, previously devolved upon the Board of Supervisors in this county, were transferred to the Board of Aldermen, so far as it was possible to do so, though it was provided, in a supplemental and explanatory act (chapter 305), that nothing in the act consolidating the city and county should be construed to affect the election and appointment of county officers whose election and appointment were provided for by the constitution, the apportionment of Members of Assembly, or any other purpose for which the city and county of New York was recognized in the constitution. The constitution difficulty, about transferring all the powers of the Board of Supervisors to the Board of Aldermen was, however, afterwards removed by an amendment of the constitution, which took effect January 1, 1875, and which was as follows:

"There shall be in the several counties, except in cities whose boundaries are the same as those of the county, a Board of Supervisors, to be composed of such numbers, and elected in such manner and for such period, as is, or may be, provided by law. In any such city the duties and powers of the Board of Supervisors may be devolved upon the Common Council or Board of Aldermen thereof."

After the adoption of this amendment to the constitution, the question whether the office of Supervisor and the Board of Supervisors still existed in the City and County of New York came before the Court of Appeals, in the case of Billings vs. The Mayor, 69 N. Y., 413. Mr. Billings was an alderman, and claimed salary from the city for his services as Supervisor. One of the grounds of the defence was that there was no such office as Supervisor, nor was there any Board of Supervisors, and this defence was sustained by the unanimous judgment of the Court of Appeals. The opinion was written by Judge Rapallo, who, after referring to the provisions of chapter 304 of the act of 1874, consolidating the city and county of New York, said:

"The object of this act, as is well known, and is apparent from its whole context, was to abolish, as far as the constitution permitted, a separate county organization and the function of the Board of Supervisors, and to vest all the functions of that body in the Board of Aldermen, a"



"such, but inasmuch as, by the constitution, some duties were expressly required to be performed by Boards of Supervisors as such (Constitution, 1846, article 3, section 5), the exception was made so as to enable the Board of Aldermen to act as a Board of Supervisors in the cases where action as Supervisors was required by the constitution, and consequently could not be devolved by the Legislature upon the Board of Aldermen. The act, therefore, devolved upon the Board of Aldermen, as such, all the powers and duties formerly appertaining to the Supervisors, excepting only such as the Legislature could not authorize to be performed by any other body than the Board of Supervisors. So far and so long only as required by the constitution were any powers and functions left in any body acting as a Board of Supervisors.

"By the amendment of the constitution, which took effect January 1, 1875 (section 22, article 31), all restraint of this description was removed. The county of New York was no longer required to have a Board of Supervisors, and in that city and county all the powers and duties of the Board of Supervisors were rendered capable of being devolved upon the Board of Aldermen. After this amendment took effect, therefore, there remained no case to which the exception contained in the act of 1874 was applicable. There was no case in which action could not, under any power conferred by that act or otherwise, be taken in any other manner than by the Board of Supervisors. When there remained no case in which action in any other manner could not be authorized, that act operated to totally abolish all the functions of Supervisors as such, and there was no case in which the Board of Aldermen were required to, or could, act as a Board of Supervisors. The functions of the office having been abolished, the office itself ceased to exist, and, consequently, no one could be entitled to claim the salary, even if one had been attached to it."

It does not admit of question, therefore, that under this decision the Board of Aldermen, in this city, can no longer, under any circumstances or at any time, act as a Board of Supervisors. Whatever acts are performed must be done by the Board of Aldermen as such, not by the Board of Aldermen as a Board of Supervisors. In meeting, therefore, on the first Monday of July, to receive the assessment rolls and the final estimate from the Finance Department, and in hereafter passing an ordinance levying a tax, in canvassing the votes after election, and in the performance of every other official act, the Board should meet as a Board of Aldermen, and perform such acts as a Board of Aldermen, and not as a Board of Supervisors.

For particulars of the nature and extent of the work to be done, reference must be made to the plans and specifications on file in the office of the Chief Clerk of the said Department.

All the old buildings, walls and other materials now on the lot and premises are to be removed by the contractor, and shall be his property. Bidders in making their estimates will consider the value of such materials.

Bidders will state in writing, and also in figures, a price for the work complete. The price is to cover the furnishing of all the materials and labor and the performance of all the work called for by the specifications, plans, drawings, and form of agreement.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. Should the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his or their bid or proposal, or if he or they accept but do not execute the contract and give the proper security, he or they shall be considered as having abandoned it and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet as provided by law.

No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the national banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and be retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED  
for the government and proper care of piers, bul-  
kheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the pro-  
visions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the  
Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks,  
and published, to take effect on and after

MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as  
follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regula-  
tion, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor,  
punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars,  
or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both  
such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said  
Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or  
disobedience to any of the following rules or  
regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby  
fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions,  
is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and  
to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or  
by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform  
be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on  
any part of the water-front of the city, without a written  
permit therefor being first had and obtained from the  
Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars,  
for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner,  
lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any  
water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit  
any such work to be done upon his premises before such  
permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further  
penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which  
shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform  
so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit  
being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expira-  
tion of the time which may be allowed for such removal,  
by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant,  
by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be  
also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other  
structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoist-  
ing-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or  
other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or  
maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf  
structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a writ-  
ten permit therefor being first had and obtained from the  
Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such  
premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent, of any such  
structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply  
with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for  
the district to remove any such structure, erection, or  
obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by  
such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occu-  
pant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-  
five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall  
elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction,  
shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the  
removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel  
upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such  
vessel is being unladen, after service by the Corporation  
Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee,  
master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a  
notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered  
by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a pen-  
alty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such  
offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the  
damages of every description which shall be caused by  
the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or  
wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both  
of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, con-  
signee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally

under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and  
every day, during which any part of said cargo shall re-  
main upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after  
the expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be re-  
covered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally  
and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every  
kind encumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf  
structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated  
for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable  
to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard,  
at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such  
property, and all expense incurred for such removal and  
storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon,  
and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be  
delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal  
and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any en-  
gine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under  
a permit of the Board, on any unshedded pier, or other  
wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so  
as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and  
to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder,  
under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each  
and every day which may elapse before the discontinu-  
ance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or dis-  
charged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar  
cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier,  
bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper plank-  
ing be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bul-  
khead or other wharf structure from injury consequent  
upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the  
stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of  
five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of  
twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such  
stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other  
wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, con-  
signee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally  
and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for  
using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon  
wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under  
lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such  
penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging  
stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property not owned  
by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel  
unless canvas or similar material be extended from the  
vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which  
such vessel is being unladen, to prevent the falling of  
the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such  
wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the  
sand dumped thereon from going through into the water,  
then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel,  
unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to  
receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars  
for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, con-  
signee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally  
and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on  
account of sand discharged upon wharf property belong-  
ing to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to  
the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on  
account of sand discharged upon wharf property not  
owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner  
thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every  
pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall  
keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent  
thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment  
of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices,  
signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall  
be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or col-  
lector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead,  
or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or  
dredging are required by said Board, specifying the  
nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required,  
and the time within which such repairs must be made, or  
such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or  
occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and  
requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a  
penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall  
elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or  
any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters  
surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any  
other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty  
of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be re-  
covered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally  
and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure,  
or other property, from which any such substance shall  
be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the  
same; or if any such substance be thrown from any  
vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the De-  
partment, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to  
be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of  
such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the  
waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from  
the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from  
time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a  
penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be re-  
covered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier,  
bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such  
snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually  
dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk  
discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once  
removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least  
twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending re-  
moval, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each  
and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall  
remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner  
or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or  
from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed,  
on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all  
vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads con-  
structed under the new plans adopted by the Department,  
shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be,  
fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise  
ordered by the Board.

No. 14.—The term "Board" when used in the fore-  
going rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The  
Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New  
York," and the term "Corporation," when so used, shall  
be taken to mean "The Mayor, Aldermen and Common-  
ality of the City of New York."

### ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

THE COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED BY CHAP-  
ter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or  
modify assessments for local improvements in the City of  
New York, in pursuance of said act and the amendatory  
thereof, give notice to all persons affected thereby  
that the notices required by the said act must be filed  
with the Comptroller of said city and a duplicate thereof  
with the Counsel to the Corporation, as follows:

As to all assessments for local improvements confirmed  
before June 9, 1880, on or before November 1, 1882. As  
to all assessments for local improvements completed be-  
fore June 9, 1880, and since confirmed, on or before No-  
vember 1, 1882. As to any assessment for local improve-  
ments known as Morningside avenues, within two months  
after the dates upon which such assessments may be  
respectively confirmed.

The notice must specify the particular assessment com-  
plained of, the date of the confirmation of the same, the  
property affected thereby, and in a brief and concise  
manner the objections thereto, showing, or tending to  
show, that the assessment was unfair or unjust in re-  
spect to said real estate.
