

SIR—In compliance with the requirements of section 110 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 516, Laws of 1884, we have the honor to submit herewith the results of our examination of the Comptroller's and Chamberlain's offices for the fourth quarter of the current fiscal year, and submit statements as follows:

- "A"-Receipts and Payments-Special and Trust Accounts.
- "B"-Receipts and Payments-Appropriation, General Fund and Taxes Accounts.
- "C"-Receipts and Payments-Sinking Fund, Redemption Accounts.

- "F"-Statement of Warrants issued, paid, canceled and outstanding.

- "G"-Statement of Registered Interest checks remaining unpaid in the Chamberlain's Office.

- "I"-Statement of Stocks and Bonds issued and canceled.
- "J"-Statement of the City Debt.
- "K"—Statement of all accounts upon the Chamberlain's ledger, showing balances brought from the preceding quarter; receipts and payments during the quarter; transfer entries with authority for the same, and balances carried forward.
  - "L"-Trial Balance, December 31, 1888, of the Chamberlain's Ledger.

What few differences have been found by us in the Chamberlain's books, and shown in the footnotes, are such as are attributed to clerical errors of no significance, and the same have been duly corrected.

#### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, at I o'clock P. M., on Tuesday, March 12, 1889.

Present-Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller, and Walton Storm, Chairman of Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

Absent-William M. Ivins, Chamberlain.

The minutes of the meetings held February 4 and 5, 1889, were read and approved.

Upon motion of the Recorder, Mr. Reeves E. Selmes was appointed Secretary pro tem. in the absence of the Secretary.

The Comptroller presented the following report and resolution on the leasing of the franchise of the ferry, by the City, between Grand street, East river, and Broadway, Brooklyn:

> CITY OF NEW YORK-FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, March 12, 1889.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN-The lease of the franchise of the ferry from Grand street, East river, north side, in New York, to Broadway, in Brooklyn, E. D., will expire on May 1, 1889, and it is necessary to take action for the sale of the lease of the franchise for another term.

The old lease was made in 1879 for the term of ten years, to the New York Ferry Company, at an annual rent of \$18,862.85. This sum was fixed when the lease was sold in 1879, upon the basis of eight per cent. of the gross receipts, which were then estimated at \$235,785.66 annually. The actual gross receipts of the ferry during the last ten years (four months in 1889, up to May 1, estimated), as per statement rendered by the ferry company, which is herewith presented, are \$2,360,135.81. A rental of eight per cent. based upon this amount would be \$18,881.10, or \$18.25 more per annum than the rent under the old lease.

It appears, however, that during the last four years, since the establishment of the ferry from Twenty-third street to the same ferry landing, foot of Broadway, Brooklin, the receipts of the Grand Street Ferry have gradually diminished from \$280,989.27 in 1884, to \$208,349.48 in 1888, as shown by the statement of gross receipts of that ferry from May 1, 1879, to May 1, 1889, as follows:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of law and the ordinances of the Common Council relating to the leasing of ferries, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to take the necessary measures to sell the lease of the franchise of the ferry from and to north side of Grand street, East river, in the City of New York, to and from Broadway, in the City of Brooklyn, after due advertisement, to the highest bidder, for the term of ten years from May 1, 1889; and the minimum rental is hereby appraised and fixed at the sum of \$15,000 per annum, upon the following

A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, August 2, 1883, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 219, In every public hospital and dispensary in the City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious disease, who shall immediately be separated from the other persons and other patients at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons so infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and other patients.

of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:
Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:
Sec. 18. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hireout, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 559, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordnary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and smodify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are restectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be determined only by the quantity of water vided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water water meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

M#TERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar. Soda, Mineral Water and Root Beer Fountains shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

Stam Engines, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of fire dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

Water-Closets and Urinals.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or wine will be control as the control of the con

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each. WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferryhouses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \*

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extracharges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have hereto-

are as in the same manner as regular rents have hereto-fore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

3th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

CONSUMERS.

Numerous Applications have been made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore invented to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water development of buildings, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.

#### GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF

New York, which were formerly under water, and
which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain
covenants, on the part of the grantees, and their successors and assigns, to manutain and keep in repair the
adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets
is such as to make it necessary that they should be repaired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon
the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should
now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested
that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released,
upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot.

The matter will shortly be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and
the adjustment of the basis of commutation, and application for releases should therefore be made at once.
