



To WILLIAM F. SMITH, Esquire, President of the Board of Police, New York City.

SIR—Herewith I return the communication signed Jane A. Speir, and relating to the services, retirement and death of her late husband James T. Speir, some time a member of the police force, and now deceased.

Upon examination of the records of the Department, I find that it appearing to the Board of Police, on or about September 13, 1878, that said James T. Speir, then being a member of the force, and having performed duty as such, for twenty years and upwards, had by a written application, dated September 2, 1878, requested to be retired and pensioned, the Board "therefore" resolved that the said James T. Speir, in pursuance of section 5, chapter 389, of the laws of 1878, be retired and awarded an annual pension of \$600; and I further find that on or about September 9, 1878, the Board of Surgeons of Police certified that the said James T. Speir was of unsound mind, that such mental disability was chronic and complete, and that the same had existed for the six months then next past.

Even if the Board of Police might have acquired jurisdiction to retire and pension Patrolman Speir upon the certificate of the Board of Surgeons, it appears to have acted, not upon such certificate, but upon the supposed application of said Speir, which said application was, in my opinion, void by reason of the mental incapacity of its supposed signer.

I am of opinion and respectfully advise that said application of James T. Speir should be treated as a nullity, and that the resolution and action of the Board, based thereon, should be considered as of no effect.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Department of Public Parks during the week ending Saturday, January 25, 1879.

MEETING HELD JANUARY 22, 1879.

Present—Commissioners Wenman (President), Wetmore, Conover, and Lane.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Superintending Architect be directed to report a plan for removing the two roadways through and across Washington square, west of the Fifth avenue roadway, and for curbing, turfing, and laying out walks through the same, together with an estimate of the cost thereof.

Resolved, That the Superintending Architect be and he is hereby directed to prepare all necessary working drawings for cases for the Museum of Art, in accordance with the dimensions and directions to be given by the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art; and that the work of constructing experimental cases be performed by the force in the employment of the Department, under his directions.

And Whereas, Subsequent examination of the statutes, suggested by a doubt as to the force and value of said resolution, has convinced the members of the Board that said resolution does not embrace the action on the part of this Board that is necessary and required by the law to enable the Board of Apportionment to authorize and provide the means to proceed with the work of such bridge; therefore

Resolved, That the resolutions offered by said Commissioner Lane, on the 18th day of December, 1878, and which are in the following words:

"Resolved, That a copy of the memorial of Mr. Lewis G. Morris and others, for the construction of a suspension bridge across the Harlem river, at One Hundred and Eighty-first street, at the point where the said bridge was located by this Department, and where the title to the lands on which to construct it was acquired by the City for that purpose, be communicated to the Comptroller of the City of New York, and that he be requested to take proper measures for the issue of bonds on account of the construction of such bridge, to an amount not exceeding five thousand dollars, pursuant to section third of chapter five hundred and thirty-four of the Laws of 1871, to be applied in making soundings and surveys for the locations of the piers and determining the plan of such bridge.

"Resolved, That the subject be laid over until such bonds are issued, and that said Lewis G. Morris and his associates be notified of this action of the Board."

—be and the same are hereby rescinded and repealed.

Whereas, By act of the Legislature, passed in the year 1871 (chapter 534), it is provided that the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks "may forthwith commence the building or construction of a suspension bridge north of the bridge known as High Bridge, but not more than half a mile therefrom;" and

Whereas, This act was passed in recognition of a long existing and conspicuous public necessity for the means of crossing the Harlem river; and

Whereas, The land for the approaches to the bridge on both sides of the river has long been taken and paid for by the city, and the amount thereof has been assessed on the property owners, and its construction will immediately connect an extensive system of highways now in actual use on both sides of the river; and

Whereas, This proposed bridge has this especial advantage, that the shores which it is to connect are at the proposed place of construction bold and elevated, so that the bridge will be of a height that will not impede the navigation of the Harlem river as proposed to be improved by the United States Government; and

Whereas, The unprecedentedly low prices of iron and the reduced rates of wages render this an especially fitting time for this Board to discharge the duty which was so many years since imposed upon it; therefore be it

Resolved, 1st. That in pursuance of the provisions of section 3, chapter 534, Laws of 1871, and section 16, chapter 329, Laws of 1874, and for the purpose of providing for the expense of constructing the bridge over the Harlem river, in the City of New York, described in said section 3, chapter 534, of the Laws of 1871, as "a suspension bridge north of the bridge known as the High Bridge, but not more than half a mile therefrom," the Department of Public Parks of said city, and the Board of Commissioners thereof, hereby make requisition on the Comptroller of said city to issue in the name of and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of said city, bonds to the amount of five thousand dollars; said bonds are to be issued in sums of even hundreds of dollars, shall be payable in not less than two nor in more than twenty years after the respective times at which they are issued, and shall bear such rate of interest not exceeding six per cent. per annum as shall be determined by said Comptroller.

Resolved, 2d. That the said Department and the said Commissioners thereof hereby certify that said amount, namely, five thousand dollars, is necessary to be raised for said purposes.

Resolved, 3d. That a certified copy of the memorial of Messrs. L. G. Morris, Gustave Schwab, Franklin Edson, and others, presented to the Department on the 11th day of December, 1878, be transmitted, with the foregoing resolutions, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.
