1. East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, from Summit avenue to Anderson avenue, regulating, etc., paving the roadway with telford macadam and planting trees.

Petition of Louis Meckes, and others, was read by the Secretary.

After some discussion the petition was laid over until the next meeting.

2. Monroe avenue, between Belmont street and Tremont avenue, regulating and grading, etc., paving the roadway with telford macadam and planting trees.

On motion of Alderman Peck the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That proceedings be and they are hereby initiated by the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, for regulating and grading Monroe avenue, between Belmont street and Tremont avenue, setting curb stones, flagging sidewalks a space 4 feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary thereon, and that the roadway thereof be paved with macadam and trees planted along the sidewalks between said streets, in accordance with petition of Mary J. Price and others, duly advertised and submitted the 23d day of January, 1902, there having been presented to this Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being \$22,000. The assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$288,900.

### BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Fifty-three orders for supplies and repairs were issued, the majority of which were subject to competition, one of which was subsequently canceled, and the most conspicuous of which, respectively, called for two maps of the boroughs of Brooklyn, in an oak case, for use in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, in the Borough Hall, the order for which was awarded to E. Belcher Hyde at \$92; for painting work in the office of the Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, Municipal Building, in connection with which estimates ranging from \$143 to \$235 were submitted, and the order for which was awarded to Peter J. Powers at the former figure; for seventy-five tons of Lehigh broken coal for the Municipal Building, for which five estimates were submitted and the order for which was jointly awarded to Nelson Brothers, and the M.-O.-H. Coal Company, each having submitted a bid of \$367.50, or \$490 per ton, for thirty-eight and thirty-seven tons respectively; for supplying one Globe filing cabinet to the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Municipal Building, the order for which was awarded to J. M. Bulwinkle at \$100, Stevenson & Marsters having submitted a similar bid, but offered no objection to the order being given to Bulwinkle, and for supplying fifteen tons of best grade Lehigh coal to the Borough Hall, in connection with which estimates varying from \$76.50 to \$84 were submitted, and the order for which was awarded to the M.-O.-H. Coal Company, the lowest bidder, at \$76.50, of \$5.10 per ton.

The Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices on January 21, formally requested Brigadier-General James McLeer, commanding officer of the Second Brigade,



N. G., N. Y., in a communication explaining the absolute necessity of the City for more office room in the Municipal Building, to vacate rooms 30 and 30a, by February 1, 1902.

On January 23 the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices notified the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company that the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices' responsibility for the payment of telephone service in offices, courts, armories, etc.—all of which are individually specified—outside of the domain of the Borough President, had ceased on January 1, 1902. The head of each office, etc., involved was similarly notified.

Two employees were reported as sick, unable to attend to their duties, and physicians' certificates substantiating the statements were filed.
