The President opened the estimate box—Mr. John H. Andrews, representing the Finance Department, being present—and announced that it contained two envelopes, indorsed "Estimate for supplying the Board of Elections of The City of New York with stationery, printing and supplies for Primary Election purposes," as per proposals advertised for, as follows, viz.:

From the J. W. Pratt Company, Nos. 52 to 58 Duane street, Borough of Manhattan, New York City, fifteen hundred and eleven dollars (\$1,511).

From the Martin B. Brown Company, Nos. 49 to 57 Park place, Borough of Manhattan, New York City, fifteen hundred and forty-nine dollars (\$1,549).

The Chief Clerk also stated that he had received a certified check for \$250 with each of said bids, as follows:

From the J. W. Pratt Company, on the New York National Exchange Bank, in favor of the Comptroller, signed "J. W. Pratt Company, J. F. Handy, Treasurer."

From the Martin B. Brown Company, on the New York National Exchange Bank, in favor of G. Radford Kelso, signed "Martin B. Brown Company, J. B. Lyon, Treasurer," and indorsed by G. Radford Kelso in favor of the Comptroller.

The representative of the Comptroller stated that the above-mentioned bids appeared to be correct as to form.

The following resolutions were thereupon adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the contract for supplying the Board of Elections of The City of New York with stationery, printing and supplies required by the Board for the Primary Election to be held March 29, 1904, as per proposals advertised for and this day publicly opened, be and hereby is awarded subject to the approval by the Comptroller of the sureties submitted in said proposal to the J. W. Pratt Company, of Nos. 52 to 58 Duane street, Manhattan (they being the lowest bidders), for the sum of fifteen hundred and eleven dollars (\$1,511).

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk of the Board be and hereby is directed to forthwith transmit to the Comptroller for approval the proposal, with tender of sureties received from the J. W. Pratt Company, and also (for disposal in accordance with law) the surety deposits received from bidders for said contract.

Resolved, That the President be and hereby is authorized to execute such contract for and on behalf of the Board of Elections of The City of New York upon the approval of sureties by the Comptroller.

The following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the requirements of the Primary Election Law, the Board of Elections, as Custodians of Primary Records, hereby prescribes the ballot to be used at the Primary Election to be held March 29, 1904, as follows:

The size of the ballot in the County of New York for the Democratic Party shall be 8½ inches by 9¼ inches, and in the counties of Kings, Queens and Richmond shall be 8½ by 7 inches.

The size of the ballot in The City of New York for the Republican Party shall be 8½ inches by 7 inches.

The weight of the paper shall be 32 pounds to the ream of 480 sheets, double cap, each sheet 17 inches by 28 inches, with one or more water-marks in each ballot.

The color of the Democratic ballot shall be light blue, and the color of the Republican ballot shall be pink, and each color uniform throughout.

Each ballot shall have printed or written upon its face the Party name, the Assembly District number, the Election District number, when the Election District is a unit of representation, the names of the positions to be filled, and the names of the persons to be voted for to fill such positions. All printing thereon shall be in black ink.

The President then submitted to the consideration of the Board a communication received from the J. W. Pratt Company, dated the 20th instant, containing proposal to supply the paper to be used for the ballots at the Primary Election to be held on March 29, 1904, the paper to be water-marked "Berlin Mills," and the color thereof to be light blue for the Democratic ballots and pink for the Republican ballots, at the following rates, viz.:

Ballots 8½ by 9¼ inches, \$1.35 per 1,000.

Ballots 8½ by 7 inches, \$1 per 1,000.

Ballots 8½ by 4½ inches \$0.68 per 1,000.

Communication filed and the following resolution adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Elections, in compliance with the provisions of chapter 473, section 6, Laws of 1899, hereby approves and selects as the paper to be used for the ballots at the Official Primary Election to be held March 29, 1904, that represented by samples marked "A," submitted and filed with the proposal this day received from the J. W. Pratt Company, of Nos. 52 to 58 Duane street, Borough of Manhattan, New York City, containing the water-mark "Berlin Mills," on condition that the said J. W. Pratt Company duly execute and file within five days herefrom, in consideration of such selection, an agreement to promptly furnish, from February 29 to March 29, 1904, in conformity with the requirements set forth in the resolution of the Board this day adopted (relating to paper for the Primary ballots), such quantity or quantities of said paper as may be ordered by organizations, committees, or persons desiring the same, and at the prices named in said proposal of the J. W. Pratt Company, viz., one dollar and thirty-five cents (\$1.35) per thousand ballots of size 8½ inches by 9¼ inches, and one dollar (\$1) per thousand ballots of size 8½ inches by 7 inches, with the express understanding that all payments and liabilities for paper furnished in accordance herewith are to be accepted from or assumed by the persons or parties respectively who furnish, order or receive the same, and that in no event will a claim of any nature whatever be entertained or created against The City of New York or the Board of Elections of said City, for any paper or ballots furnished or supplied by said J. W. Pratt Company of New York City, in conformity with the terms and conditions of this resolution.

The following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That, in compliance with the requirements of chapter 473, section 4, subdivision 3, Laws of 1899, the several Assembly districts in The City of New York be and hereby are divided by Election districts into Primary districts for the purposes of the Official Primary Election to be held March 29, 1904, which Primary districts are hereby composed, constituted and assigned, as set forth in the schedules approved by the Board August 12, 1903, and directed on that date to be placed on file, the same having been submitted by the Chief Clerks of the branch offices in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and marked respectively "A," "B," "C," "D" and "E."

The following communications were received and disposed of as stated, viz.:

From the Merchants' Association of New York, dated the 23d instant, acknowledging receipt of Senate and Assembly District maps. Filed.

From Joseph Cassidy, Chairman, Queens County Democratic General Committee, dated the 19th instant, transmitting a copy of rules and regulations adopted by said Committee on the 19th instant. Filed.

From Jacob Brenner, Chairman, Executive Committee, Kings County Republican General Committee, dated the 23d instant, asking for the removal of Edward J. Walsh and Charles Kling as Republican Inspectors of Elections for the Sixteenth Election District of the Second Assembly District, Kings County, on the ground of their failure to enroll in October, 1903, and declare their party affiliation with the Republican Party. Referred to the Secretary for answer.

The following preamble and resolution was adopted, viz.:

Whereas, The Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, by resolution adopted December 2, 1903, at and upon the request of the Board of Elections of The City of New York, authorized and directed the Comptroller of the City to execute a lease with and from A. B. Yetter, of the ninth floor of the premises Nos. 305 and 307 East Sixty-first street (known as the Globe Storage Warehouse) for a period of two years from December 1, 1903, at the annual rental of \$1,500, payable monthly; and

Whereas, Said A. B. Yetter has declined to execute a lease for said premises for a period longer than one year from December 1, 1903, notwithstanding that the Board of Elections understood that he had assented to a lease for two years; and

Whereas, The said premises are and have been since December 1, 1903, necessary and in use for storage of material and property of the City, required in the conduct of public elections; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby is requested to amend the resolution of said Board, adopted December 2, 1903, so as to read, that a lease of said premises may be authorized for the period of one year from December 1, 1903, instead of two years from said date as heretofore requested and adopted.

The Board then adjourned.

The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
