GAS COMMISSION.

The officers designated by section 73 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, met in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, in the City Hall, at 12 M., Thursday, December 28, 1876, for the purpose of opening bids for lighting the streets, avenues, and places of the city with gas, from January 1, 1877, to March 31, 1877, both days inclusive.

All were present, viz.: Wm. H. Wickham, Mayor; John Kelly, Comptroller; Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works.

The Mayor presented an affidavit of W. A. Wall, Clerk in the office of the CITY RECORD, that an advertisement calling for proposals, had been duly published in the CITY RECORD for ten consecutive days.

Which was ordered on file.

The bids which had been received were then opened as follows:

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, held at the Comptroller's Office, in the New Court-house, on Thursday, December 28, 1876, at 2:20 o'clock P. M.

Present—John Kelly, Comptroller; William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation; John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held December 4, 1876, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors, with communications dated December 5, 1876, viz.:

1. West street (west side)—Setting curb and gutter stones and flagging, from Gansevoort to Bloomfield street.

2. Bogart street, setting curb and gutter stones and flagging, from West street to Thirteenth or Exterior avenue.

3. Fifth avenue, regulating and grading, setting curb and gutter stones and flagging, from Ninetieth to One Hundred and Twentieth street.

4. Madison avenue, paving with Belgian pavement, from One Hundred and Twenty-first street to One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.

5. One Hundred and Thirty-first street, paving with Belgian pavement, from Fourth to Fifth avenue.

6. One Hundred and Fifth street, paving with Belgian pavement, between First and Third avenues.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objection having been filed thereto, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, they were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating and grading Ninetieth street, from Eighth to Tenth avenue, with an award made by the Board of Assessors for damage to buildings by reason of change of grade on the line, and petitions and objections of parties interested, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with communication dated December 5, 1876.

After hearing Mr. H. A. Shipman, attorney for Messrs. I. & S. Bernheimer, in opposition to the assessment, on motion of the Comptroller, the assessment list was laid over.

The Comptroller also presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging Ninety-sixth street, from Eighth avenue to the Boulevard, together with an award for damage to building by reason of change of grade on the line, received from the Board of Assessors with communication, dated December 5, 1876.

After hearing Mr. Charles H. Kitchel, attorney in behalf of Sarah Woods, who had filed a petition for an award, on motion of the Recorder, the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, and superstructure of the Boulevard road or public drive, from the northerly side of the circle at the intersection of Broadway, Eighth avenue, and Fifty-ninth street, to the southerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, together with petitions and objections laid over at the last meeting of the Board, was taken up.

After hearing Mr. G. M. Ogden, in behalf of Trinity Church Cemetery; Mr. Charles H. Kitchel, attorney, in behalf of the New York Hospital and others; Mr. Samuel Holmes; Mr. Charles E. Miller, attorney for the Manhattan College and others; Mr. James A. Deering, attorney; Mr. C. G. Havens, and all other objectors present who desired to be heard in said matter, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the said assessment list was laid over for decision by the Board.

At 3:57 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend section 9 of chapter XIII. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, entitled 'Of firing of firearms, cannons, and fireworks,' passed May 17, 1876."

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended by omitting therefrom the words "Sulzer's East River Park," and by adding thereto, at the end thereof, the following: "Brien's Undercliff Park, Highbridge,"—so that said section 9 of chapter XIII. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, when so amended, shall read as follows:

"Sec. 9. No person shall fire or discharge any gun, pistol, fowling-piece, or other firearm in the City of New York, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offense. The provisions of this section shall not apply to Jones' Wood Coliseum, Washington Park, Hamilton Park, Bender's Schutzen Park, Bellevue Garden, Harlem River Park, Lion Park, Christ's Park, Kuntz Elm Park, National Park, Karl Park, Jerome Park, Fleetwood Park, Hudson River Park, and Brien's Undercliff Park, Highbridge."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provision of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Y., in the City and County of New York, be and the same is hereby authorized, and the Clerk of this Board be and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute a lease in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, and to affix the seal of said Corporation thereto, of the hall and rooms on the second floor of the building known as Morrisania Hall, situated on Railroad avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-sixth and One Hundred and Sixty-seventh streets, for the term of two (2) years from the first day of January, 1877, at the yearly rental of seven hundred and fifty dollars, payable quarterly, to be used and occupied by Companies A, G, and K of the Twenty-seventh Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., for an armory; that the said lease shall provide that no alterations of or additions to the said premises shall be made by the said Corporation or the said companies without the previous written consent of the owners; also, that the superstructure shall be kept in good repair during the term of said lease by and at the expense of the owners of said property, and that there be inserted in said lease the usual fire clause; and that the Comptroller be and he is hereby directed to pay the said rent quarterly.

Resolved, That the Legislature of the State, at its next session, be requested to enact such laws as will enable the corporate authorities of the City of New York to provide for the manufacture of gas and the laying of gas-mains in the streets, avenues, and public places of this city, in the same manner as Croton-mains are now laid; and be it further

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and it unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
