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#### DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

Report for the Quarter ending March 31, 1880.

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS, OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT, No. 2 FOURTH AVE., NEW YORK, April 1st, 1880.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—I have the honor herewith to submit my report of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending March 31st, 1880.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for new buildings was 250, and the number of

buildings embraced therein was 460. Of these plans, 192 were, upon examination, approved; 34 rejected, but subsequently amended and approved, and 24 wholly rejected. The estimated cost of the erection of these buildings was

\$5,261,350.

The number of new buildings commenced during the quarter was 375; the number completed, 405, and 1,009 are now in process of erection. The classification of the buildings proposed to be erected was as follows:

Of the foregoing buildings, 381 were to be erected in that portion of the city north of Fortieth street.

#### Alterations to Buildings.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for alterations to buildings was 378, and the number of buildings embraced therein was 410. Of these plans 284 were, upon examination, approved, 47 were rejected, but subsequently amended and approved, and 47 were wholly rejected; 91 were to be increased in height, 125 extended, 137 altered internally and 228 externally.

The estimated cost of the alterations of these buildings was \$1,152,292.

The number of alterations commenced during the quarter was 253, the number completed 233, and 167 are now in process of alteration.

### UNSAFE BUILDINGS.

The number pending on December 31, 1879, was 99, and the number since reported was 169, making a total of 268.

Of this number 14 have been taken down and entirely removed, 145 have been repaired, and . made safe, and 109 are in process of removal or repair.

### VIOLATIONS.

The number of violations of the law reported during the quarter, was 147, and in 90 of these cases the law has been complied with, and 48 violations reported prior to, and pending on January 1, have been removed, making the total number removed during the quarter, 138.

106 cases are now in the hands of the Attoracy of the Department for prosecution.

Received from the public during the quarter, 276; in 143 cases, no cause for complaint was found, 13 were removed upon verbal notification given by the Examining Inspector, 47 proved unsafe buildings, and 73 violations of the various provisions of the law, of which the owners were duly

#### FIRE ESCAPES.

The number of buildings reported as requiring means of escape in case of fire, during the quarter

was 193.

Of these 100 were made to conform to the law, upon notice, and 93 are now under process. The number of cases of this class reported prior to January 1, and since removed is 90, making a total of 190 cases, in which buildings were provided with means of escape in case of fire.

Arch girders tested during the quarter, 68; iron beams, 103; and iron lintels, 12; all of which, having been found capable of sustaining the weight proposed to be imposed thereon, were approved, except 1 iron beam.

#### LEGAL BRANCH.

During the quarter, 48 cases have been sent to the Attorney for prosecution, 7 of which were for insufficient means of escape in case of fire, 17 of which were for unsafe buildings, and 24 for violations of various provisions of the law.

#### NOTICES.

The number of notices and notes issued and served during the quarter, was 2,816; of this number 677 were for additional means of escape in case of fire, iron shutters and unprotected hoistway, and elevator openings; 365 for various other violations of the law; 587 were for unsafe buildings, and the balance, 1,187, miscellaneous.

#### CONCLUSION.

Your attention is particularly called to the large excess of buildings proposed to be erected as per plans submitted during the last quarter, as compared with the first three months of last year. This increase was predicted by me, and I quote the following from a communication sent by me to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated September 13, 1879:

"I beg leave to ask your careful attention to the annexed comparative statement of the work of the Department for corresponding periods during the years 1878 and 1879, showing an increase in 1879 of 450 new buildings and alterations, and over \$6,000,000 in cost of same. This evidence of renewed prosperity in the building interests of the City, in the judgment of those best informed, is but the beginning of a more active revival now begun, and entails unusual exertion and watchfulness on the part of every officer and employee of the Department."

Six hundred and seventy-seven (677) notices for fire-escapes, hoistways, iron shutters, etc., consisting of "cautionary or first notices" and "second notices," were issued and served during the last three months. Seven (7) cases have been sent to the attorney for prosecution. Six hundred and thirty (630) buildings have been examined by the inspectors of this bureau, and, except those reported, have been found provided with all the requirements of the law.

By referring to Exhibit "1" it will be noticed that there are two hundred and four (204) cases for additional means of escape in case of fire still in process of removal, for many of which contracts are out and the proper work is being done. Of these cases in process of removal, sixty-four (64) are in the hands of the attorney for prosecution, in addition to which the attorney has five (5) cases for repairs to hoistways and four (4) cases for iron shutters.

There shall be a Superintendent of Parks, whose duty it shall be to direct and supervise all the mechanics and laborers and their foremen, who are in the employment of the Department on the various parks and places, the bridges over the Harlem and Bronx rivers.

There shall be a Topographical Engineer, who shall have charge of the laying out streets and avenues, parks and places above One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and of the monumenting of the same.

SIR—There were 519 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 3, 1880, which is a decrease of 24, as compared with the number reported during the preceding week, and 15 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending March 27, 1880, was 527, which is 18.4 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.73 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,108,170.
