SIR—There were 643 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 17, 1885, which is a decrease of 34, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 84 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending January 10, 1885, was 685, which is 15.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.84 per 1,000 persons hving, the population estimated at 1,378,437.


