MONDAY, December 8, 1890.

The officers designated in section 69 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 met in the office of the Mayor at 12 M. of Monday, December 8, 1890.

SIRS—In regard to the several bids for electric-lighting which were received yesterday, I have to report as follows :

The United States Company bid for 307 lamps, at 43 cents each per night, and it was the only bidder for these lamps ; of these lamps 298 are now lighted, and 9 are not lighted.

The Brush Company bid for 289 lamps, of which 137 were at 43 cents and 152 were at 45 cents per night, and it was the only bidder for these lamps ; of these lamps 211 are now lighted and 78 are not lighted.

The East River Company bid for 247 lamps, at 44½ cents each per night, and it was the only bidder for these lamps ; of these lamps 160 are now lighted and 87 are not lighted.

The Mount Morris Company bid for 171 lamps, at 43 cents each per night, and it was the only bidder for these lamps ; of these lamps 122 are now lighted and 49 are not lighted, 25 being new lamps on Lenox avenue.

The Harlem Company bid for 211 lamps, of which 192 were at 43 cents and 19 at 50 cents (these 19 being in Mount Morris Park), and it was the only bidder for these lamps ; of these lamps 101 are now lighted and 110 are not lighted, 15 being new lamps in East River Park.

The North New York Company bid for 28 lamps, at 50 cents each per night, and was the only bidder for these lamps, none of which are now lighted.

There are some discrepancies on the bids as to the actual number of lamps, which is immaterial.

The total number of lamps mentioned in the bids aggregate 1,253, and the average price is 43½ cents each.

There were 146 lamps not bid for, because the wires have been cut down and cannot be replaced.

EAST RIVER ELECTRIC LIGHT CO.,
December 6, 1890.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor, President of the Gas Commission :

SIR—The burden which a rental of a thousand dollars a mile per annum for a three-inch duct in the electric-light subways of the city will impose upon the public lighting of the city streets is shown by the following :

The East River Electric Light Co., on the 4th instant, at the public bidding, bid for the public lamps on Fifth avenue, between Twenty-third and Forty-second streets, fifteen in number, forty-three (43) cents per night each.

To reach these lamps it will be necessary to pay a subway rent to the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Co., according to the existing system, for two ducts, one on each side of the avenue, for nineteen blocks, that is, nineteen-twentieths of a mile, amounting to nineteen hundred dollars (\$1,900) per annum, or upwards of thirty-four (34) cents per night, subway charge on each of said lamps.

It will require compensation in a number of other places to make good to some extent the loss sustained in the above instance.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
