Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon
the Health Department, the following additional section
to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health,
be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form
a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 200. No cow shall be kept within the built-up
portions of the City of New York, without a permit in
writing therefor from the Health Department.
