That such precinct be located at Borough Hall, in said borough, in the rooms now occupied by the License Squad.

That the License Squad as now constituted be abolished, and that the members of the Police force who were attached to said squad be and are transferred to said precinct.

That all officers who now are or may hereafter be assigned for the performance of police duty in the respective courts located in the Borough of Brooklyn be attached to said precinct.

That all the duties heretofore performed or required to be done by the License Squad or any officer attached thereto be and are required to be done by the officers assigned to said precinct.

The commanding officer of said precinct shall assign such members of his command as may be necessary for the proper performance of duty at theatres, halls and places of entertainment. The officers so assigned shall enforce the City ordinances and regulations governing the approach and departure of all conveyances to and from such theatres, halls and places of entertainment, and preserve the public peace and order.

The commanding officer of said precinct shall, in addition to other books required to be kept, keep a book showing each warrant issued by any court or magistrate and which is delivered to an officer of his command for execution, with the name of magistrate or judge issuing the same, the name of the accused, the name of complainant, crime charged, date of receipt of warrant, date of execution and disposition of case.

The commanding officer shall by himself or a Sergeant or Roundsman visit each court within his jurisdiction, at least once a day, and exercise such personal supervision over the officers in each court as shall insure their efficient performance of duties.

As there is no prison connected with this precinct, the members of said precinct who make arrests will take their prisoners to the station-house nearest the place where such arrests are made.

The officer in charge of such station will enter these prisoners as "detained" and at once communicate the pedigree and particulars of the case to the officer in charge at the Eighty-second Precinct, by telephone or otherwise, who will enter the same in blotter of said station.

In a case where the arrest is made by officers of said precinct and prisoners are taken direct to court, the officer making the arrest is required to take pedigree and other necessary data, and report same to his commanding officer.

Rule 12 of General Rules, so far as applicable, shall govern the action of the commanding officer of precinct and officers assigned to courts. Warrants and processes of courts and magistrates may be delivered by the courts or magistrates to the Patrolmen assigned to their respective courts.

It shall be the duty of officers attached to said precinct, who are assigned to courts, to cause all processes and orders delivered to them by the judge or magistrate, to be promptly executed and obeyed. Such officers shall each day report to commanding officer, on blanks to be provided, the receipt of each warrant by him, showing the time of day such warrant was received, with the name of judge or magistrate issuing same, the name of the accused, the name of the complainant, crime charged and the action taken by him thereon; he shall also report on blanks to be provided, as to the execution of the warrant and disposition of case.

Summer uniforms for Patrolmen—made of light-weight cloth—to consist of single-breasted, straight front, turn-down collar skeleton blouse, five buttons down the front, no buttons on the cuff; one inside left breast pocket; cuff to be formed with narrow black cloth piping straight across four inches from the bottom of the sleeve. Trousers to be made of same goods as the blouse, with a narrow black cloth piped stripe on the outside seam; side, two hip, fob, and billy pocket on the right leg, twelve inches deep. This pocket to be cut below the hip pocket.

Spring and fall uniforms for Patrolmen made of medium-weight cloth, to consist of a single-breasted frock coat, buttoned to the neck, turn-down collar, nine buttons down the front; length of coat to extend one inch above the knee; two buttons on the back waist seam; side edges with two buttons; length of side edges not less than twelve inches; cuffs to be pointed, piped with black cloth; two buttons on the cuff; two inside breast pockets; two skirt pockets; coat to be fully lined and well padded. Trousers medium weight, same cloth as coat, with narrow black cloth piped stripe on the outside seam; side, fob, two hip and billy pockets.

Winter uniform to consist of overcoat and trousers of heavy-weight cloth. Overcoat to be double-breasted frock, buttoned to the neck; turn-down collar, two and one-half inches deep; nine buttons on each breast; buttons placed at an equal distance apart; lower button to be in the waist-line; distance between each button to be seven inches at the top and three and one-half inches at the bottom, measured from the center of each button when the coat is buttoned; the length of the coat to extend two inches below the knee; the edges of coat to be double-stitched three-eighth inch; cuff to be piped with narrow black cloth piping straight across; two buttons on each cuff; two buttons at waist seam in back, and pointed side edges not less than fourteen inches with one button at each point, making four buttons at back of coat; skirt of coat to be cut without piecing; two inside breast pockets and two skirt pockets; coat to be wool-lined and well padded. Trousers to be made of same material as the coat; side, hip, fob and billy pockets.

Summer helmet to be pearl gray, with dark gray band.

Winter helmet to be dark gray, with black patent-leather band and bound with black patent leather.

Helmet wreath to be of nickel or silver, with words "Woodlawn Cemetery" in half-circle above wreath. The word "Police," under, in large letters, and number below. The helmet device to be attached to the helmet with rings.
