## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, February 15, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held February 8, 1901, were approved.

The communication from the Consolidated Gas Company, declining the offer of the Board of \$800,000, for the properties between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, bounded by Eleventh avenue and the proposed marginal way, and by Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues, including the bulkhead; and the offer of \$850,000 for the property similarly bounded, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, North river; but offering both parcels, exclusive of the buildings, for the sum of \$1,700,000, was tabled for one week.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 20705, submitting plan for the improvement of the water front at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and between One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Third avenue, on the Harlem river, was also tabled for one week.

The application of Evarts, Van Cott & Erskine, attorneys, requesting that permission be granted the owners to improve under the new plan, the property owned by them between Wall street and Maiden lane, East river, was taken from the table, and, at the request of the petitioners, withdrawn.

A representative of John Ellis & Co. appeared and requested permission to berth the oil boat "Thomas Ryan," temporarily, on the north side of the Pier foot of East Twentieth street.

On motion, the application was denied.

The communication from the Quebec Steamship Company, (Limited) requesting that no rental be charged for the use of the bulkhead along the easterly side of the approach to Pier, new 47, North river, but that said bulkhead be included in the rental for said pier and bulkhead southerly thereof, was referred to the Treasurer.

The communication from Barber & Co., requesting information as to what docking facilities can be afforded on the North river, between Thirty-fourth and Forty-seventh streets, for the various steamship lines now located in Brooklyn and Jersey City, was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Advising that his certificates have been indorsed upon Contract No. 697 for building a freight shed on the pier foot of West Fifty-ninth street, and on Contract No. 698 for building two piers at the foot of Market slip, East river, and that same are now valid contracts.

2d. Requesting information in relation to the paving of the bulkhead between Piers, new 45 and 46, North river. Action of the President in replying thereto approved.

3d. Transmitting copy of claim of Benjamin Griggs for damages to the schooner "William Clark" caused by the sinking of said schooner at the bulkhead north of Pier, new 52, North river, and requesting information in relation thereto. Action of the Secretary in replying that the damage to the schooner was not due to any negligence of this Department and that said schooner was berthed thereat without permit, approved.

From the Corporation Counsel—Requesting information in relation to the application of the United States Government to the Legislature for a grant of land under water adjoining Governor's Island. Action of the President in replying that there is no objection to the granting of such land under water on the part of this Department, approved.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting that dredging be ordered under the dumping-boards at the foot of Thirty-eighth street, East river, and at the foot of Lincoln avenue, Harlem river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office—Transmitting copies of applications of Carrie F. Merritt and Israel J. Merritt for grants of land under water at Whitestone, Borough of Queens.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted, and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy thereof to the Corporation Counsel:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify the Commissioners of the Land Office that this Department has examined into the applications of Israel J. Merritt and Carrie F. Merritt, dated December 18, 1900, for grants of land under water at Whitestone, Borough of Queens, and finds that the granting of same would conflict with the rights of the City under the provisions of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, and will be otherwise injurious to the public interests of The City of New York, and that therefore this Board protests against the granting of said applications.

From E. A. Cruikshank & Co., agents for owners—Requesting a further extension of thirty days, from February 18, 1901, in which to consider the offer of this Department for the purchase of Pier 14, East river. Application granted.

From the Atlantic Transport Company—Offering to reconstruct a shed on Pier, new 40, North river, and to improve the premises if the Board will extend the existing leases of Piers, new 39 and 40, North river, and adjoining bulkheads, for a further term of ten years. Application denied and the Secretary directed to state that under the existing lease the said company is obliged to rebuild the shed on the pier.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Stating that they will be unable to use Pier, new 31, East river, until March 1, 1901, and requesting that the time for the commencement of the rental of the pier be fixed at that date. Application granted.

From Lester W. Clark, attorney—Transmitting copy of application to be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office by Caroline V. Brown for a grant of land under water at Franklin avenue, on the Kill Von Kull, Borough of Richmond.

From the Long Island Railroad Company—In relation to possession by the City of the piers foot of Seventh and Eighth streets, East river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Long Island Railroad Company that this Department is willing to enter into an agreement to take possession of the pier at the foot of East Seventh street, and the south half of the pier at the foot of East Eighth street, said company to pay rental at the rate of \$1,500 per annum for the use of the pier at the foot of East Seventh street, and \$750 per annum for the south half of the pier at the foot of East Eighth street, for a period from six months prior to the commencement of the action for the recovery of the premises with interest for each year, less the amount of taxes paid by the owners during that period; the rental in the case of the pier at the foot of East Seventh street to be paid to the date the Department enters into possession of the pier, and in the case of the pier at the foot of East Eighth street, to December 20, 1897, the date upon which the Department fenced off the pier in consequence of its condition.

From Charles D. Burrus—Stating that he has prepared maps showing the various bulkhead and pierhead lines and all grants of land under water of the Borough of The Bronx, in Westchester County. Secretary directed to request said Burrus to furnish this Department with a complete set of said maps.

From the firm of Leonard J. Carpenter, agents for H. W. Peabody & Co.—Requesting permission to dredge to a depth of 24 feet at mean low water the half slip adjoining the easterly side of Pier 11, East river, and requesting that this Department dredge the half slip adjoining the westerly side of Pier 12, East river.

On motion, permission was granted to do the necessary dredging in the half slip adjoining the easterly side of Pier 11, and the Secretary directed to state that dredging is unnecessary in the half slip adjoining the westerly side of Pier 12.

From the American Ice Company—Requesting permission to maintain a portable watchman's shanty at the easterly end of its ice-house on the pier foot of Beekman street, East river. Application granted, the structure to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the International Navigation Company—Requesting permission to replace the doors of the shed at the entrance to Pier, new 14, North river. Application granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Edward Hett—Requesting permission to construct a pier in front of his property at New Dorp Beach, Staten Island. Application denied, the land under water thereat being owned by the State of New York.

From Mary A. Leyh—Requesting permission to construct a frame boat-house east of Holland's avenue, Jamaica Bay, Rockaway Beach. Application denied.

From W. J. Howard—Requesting permission to construct a two-story frame house at Howard's Pier, Jamaica Bay. Application denied.

From Elisha Smith—Requesting permission to erect a two-story frame house at Raunt station, Jamaica Bay. Application denied.

From Augustin Walsh—Requesting an extension of time for the completion of Contract No. 692.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building the outer portion of the pier at the foot of West Fifty-ninth street, North river, under Contract No. 692, Augustin Walsh, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including April 2, 1901, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the President—Recommending that an extension of thirty days from February 15, 1901, be granted the Central Vermont Railway Company in which to vacate the premises in the vicinity of Pier, old 36, East river. Recommendation adopted.

From Commissioner Meyer—Recommending that permission be granted the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company to erect a new pier and return on its property at the foot of Fifty-fifth street, Brooklyn, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and in accordance with plans submitted. Recommendation adopted.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending February 9, 1901.

2d. Reporting that Wilson, Adams & Co. were deprived of the use of bulkhead at the foot of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, on the east side of the Harlem river, by the Department of Bridges, from January 1, 1901, and recommending that the permit granted them to use the platform thereat, be revoked as of the date named. Recommendation adopted.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending February 9, 1901.

2d. Reporting the sinking of the canal-boat "Bertha" with cargo of coal in the slip on the south side of the pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, North river, and recommending that the owners of said boat and cargo be directed to remove same at once. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending the sale at public auction of the shed on Pier 39, East river, and of Belgian blocks and old rafts, etc.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Philip A. Smyth, auctioneer, be and hereby is directed to offer for sale, on behalf of this Board, on March 4, 1901, the old material, as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief.

4th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 20347, in relation to the petition of residents and property-owners in the vicinity of West Ninety-sixth street for additional wharfage facilities, and recommending that a new pier be constructed at the foot of said street.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the construction of a pier thereat.

the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

#### CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

#### ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the Comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 28 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1907,  
JULY 1, 1918,  
JULY 1, 1919,  
JULY 1, 1920, and  
JULY 1, 1921.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1900, at the rate of three and one-tenth (3 1/10) per cent. per annum, payable, also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to apportion the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned. Preference will, as far as possible, be given to the proposals received according to priority in the date of their receipt, the proposals first received being entitled to the privilege of the longest extension period, unless such proposal shall indicate a preference for the shorter terms. The stock which is to be extended in accordance with the terms of this circular must be delivered to the Comptroller upon demand, then the certificates will be stamped across their face with the terms of the extension, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, provided, however, that such stock now outstanding in coupon form when presented for extension will be extended in the form of registered stock. Thereafter transfers may be made of such stock on the books of the Corporation in accordance with the general provisions of law and the rules of the Department of Finance in regard thereto.
