First floor to be equipped with shower baths, and the second floor to be divided into two classrooms, seating fifty pupils each.

That a building constructed in accordance with the plans submitted would be better in the following respects for the safety of the inmates than one erected according to the Building Code, or 35 feet in height and non-fireproof.

First—That entire first floor, including bathrooms, corridors, floors, partitions, etc., and second story corridors, floors and partitions shall be fireproof, steel floor beams, six-inch terra cotta block arches, four-inch block partitions and asphalt floors.

Second—That stair corridors, floors and stair construction are of fireproof material, and number of continuous runs being in excess of that required by Code, there being two continuous runs for an area of 1,845 square feet.

being two continuous runs for an area of 1,845 square feet.

Third—That it is essential that ceilings shall be 15 feet in height for the proper ventilation of baths and classrooms; also to permit of sufficient headroom for stairs

ventilation of baths and classrooms; also to permit of sufficient headroom for stairs connecting this addition with present school.

It is urgently requested that permission be granted to erect this semi-fireproof addition, 39 feet 6 inches in height, or 4 feet 6 inches in excess of that required by Code for a non-fireproof building.

Mr. Francis H. Kimball appeared before the Board in explanation of the appeal, which reads as follows:

To allow the six-story extension to be carried to a height of 81 feet 6 inches from

To allow the six-story extension to be carried to a height of 81 feet 6 inches from curb line to highest point of roof beams.

This height is necessary in order that floor levels shall correspond with those of the existing buildings. The heights of stories are more than is usual for a building only six stories in height, and the number of stories are no more than would ordinarily be placed on a building not exceeding 75 feet in height.

This new extension, which is only 23 feet in width, is located on a corner of two principal streets, and the added area will afford greater facilities for egress of customers and employees to reach the street in case of fire and panic, and overcomes the objections to the existing "dead end" of the present structure.

Fire escapes are to be placed on the new front, as required by the Bureau of Buildings.

Buildings.

In many respects this new addition will be built better than the Code provides for an ordinary six-story building, in that it is to be of steel skeleton construction. The ceilings will be wire lathed, and all masonry will be laid up in Portland cement. On motion, laid over for one week, the Clerk being instructed to send requisition to the Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Brooklyn for the plans.

A N ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE Union Railway Company of New York City the right or franchise to construct and operate a street surface railway as an extension of its existing railway in, upon and along the surface of certain streets, avenues and highways, and to, upon and across a bridge and viaduct constructed in and owned and maintained by The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise or right to extend its railway and to use the streets, avenues, highways, bridge and viaduct of the city, and to construct, maintain and operate a double-track street surface railway, as an extension of its existing railway for street railway purposes in the conveyance of persons and property, in, upon and along the following-named streets, avenues, highways, bridge and viaduct, viz:

Commencing at the intersection of Jerome and Sedgwick avenues approach, formerly called Ogden avenue approach, to Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge; thence southerly upon and along said bridge and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct and Macomb's Dam Bridge; thence southerly upon and along said bridge and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct and Macomb's Dam Bridge and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; also from the intersection of said Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; also from the intersection of said central or Macomb's Dam Bridge and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; also from the intersection of said railroad by the overhead system of electricity or any other motive power which may be lawfilly employed upon the same; all in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City, County and State of New York. The phrases "said railroad" or "said railway" hereinafter used, shall be construed to mean the railroad construc

tion, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railroad is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successor or assigns. It shall be in the following manner:

The three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights of franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives, so far as this franchise is concerned, any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sub-let in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Union Railway Company of New York City, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any-

wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent con-

or waiving of any one or more of such consents, shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the Union Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, and by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property in accordance ith the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other persons be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
