## BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

March 31, 1903.

Present—Messrs. William J. Fryer, Warren A. Conover, Cornelius O'Reilly, William C. Smith, Charles D. Purroy and Charles G. Smith.  
Meeting called to order at 3 p. m. by the Clerk, who stated that the Chairman would not be present owing to absence from town, whereupon, on motion, Mr. William J. Fryer was designated to act as Chairman.

Mr. Fryer then took the chair.

Minutes of meeting of the 24th instant read and, on motion, approved.

Appeal No. 63 of 1903, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 9 of 1903, No. 28 East Twenty-second street, Manhattan; Messrs. M. & L. Hess, agents and appellants. On presentation of report and on motion appeal was denied.

Appeal No. 68 of 1903, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 10 of 1903, southeast corner of Twenty-eighth street and Thirteenth avenue, Manhattan; Messrs. D'Oench & Yost, architects and appellants.

On presentation of report and on motion, appeal was laid over.

Appeal No. 69 of 1903, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 11 of 1903, Nos. 141 and 143 Stockholm street, Brooklyn; Joseph Endres, appellant.

On motion, referred to Chief Purroy for examination and report, with recommendation.

Appeal No. 70 of 1903, New Building No. 604 of 1902, Nos. 225 and 227 West Fifty-third street, Manhattan; Paul C. Hunter, architect for Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, appellant.

To allow us the privilege of not covering the columns and beam flanges with fireproofing, as called for in the general class of buildings. We ask to waive this portion of the construction, as it is impossible, owing to the complex electrical and mechanical requirements and the relation of the traveling crane to the columns; and it has been the practice in all previous structures of this class to build this portion of the work as we desire. The Manhattan Power House, the Edison Power House, the Metropolitan Power House are examples of just such a building as we are erecting. Mr. Paul C. Hunter appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 72 of 1903, New Building No. 598 of 1902, south side of One Hundred and Forty-third street, about 125 feet two inches from southwest corner of Broadway, Manhattan; Paul C. Hunter, architect for Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, appellant. Appeal same as No. 70.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 73 of 1903, New Building No. 594 of 1902, Nos. 264 and 266 West Ninety-sixth street, Manhattan; Paul C. Hunter, architect for Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, appellant. Appeal same as No. 70.

Appeal No. 74 of 1903, New Building No. 288 of 1902, block between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth street, Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, Manhattan; Paul C. Hunter, architect for Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, appellant. Appeal same as No. 70. On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 75 of 1903, New Building No. 585 of 1902, Nos. 108 and 110 East Nineteenth street, Manhattan; Paul C. Hunter, architect for Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, appellant. Appeal same as No. 70.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 76 of 1903, New Building No. 584 of 1903, Nos. 29, 31 and 33 City Hall place, Manhattan; Paul C. Hunter, architect for Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, appellant. Appeal same as No. 70.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 77 of 1903, New Building No. 250 of 1902 B, west side Simpson street, about 60 feet from northeast corner Westchester avenue, The Bronx; Paul C. Hunter, architect for Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, appellant. Appeal same as No. 70. On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 78 of 1903, New Building No. 1323 of 1902, southeast corner Degraw street and Albany avenue, Brooklyn; Benj. J. Sturges, appellant.

The privilege to reduce the thickness of three of the inside party walls upon the top story of said buildings from 12 inches, as the permit calls for, to 8 inches.

The buildings are only 17 feet wide by 50 feet deep. All the other walls will be built 12 inches way to the roof.

All party walls have each two wide chimney breasts, firm and substantial.

Mr. Benj. J. Sturges appeared before the Board. On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 79 of 1903, New Building No. 58 of 1903, Nos. 517, 519, 521 and 523 West Twenty-ninth street, Manhattan; John A. Hamilton, appellant.

The building is composite, in that there are three distinct sections, the westerly section being about 25 feet wide by the full depth of the lot on the cellar and first stories, and in the upper stories falling off some 10 feet at rear, and for this section I have provided a continuous line of stairs from cellar to roof, the partitions around same being of studs, brick filled, wire lathed and cement plastered, and the openings having metal-covered doors and glass where used is to be wire glass. The easterly section is 25 feet wide and is one full story in height over the full lot (no cellar here), being used for stable, and with no openings into the other part of the building. The second-story apartment for engineer or watchman is some 30 or more feet in depth by 25 feet wide, and is on the front of this easterly section.

The centre section is 50 feet wide by same depths as the westerly section, and is thus lighted on front, rear and on the easterly side over the stable. In this centre section we have one stairway from cellar to the roof, and exactly as specified in westerly section, and in addition to this and to fulfill the intention of the law we have placed an exterior wrought-iron side stairway of the fire escape form, but with wider treads, being at stairway angle, and these platforms and stairs are accessible from the different stories or floors through regular door openings in which metal-covered doors are hung and having wire glass in same, and these stairs lead from the roof of the factory or central section to roof of stable, and through the doorway of apartment we have its stair to sidewalk, thus giving continuous egress or ingress from street to roof or vice versa. We have in addition to these three stairways the regular fire escape on the front of the building, so that it will be seen that we are amply supplied with means of exit.

Inasmuch, therefore, as we fully comply with the spirit and sense of the law, and inasmuch as I have deafened the stair partitions of or around the inner stairs and put metal-covered doors thereto, all as shown and described; I respectfully ask that this outside stair above described receive the approval of your Board as complying with the law. On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 80 of 1903, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 12 of 1903, No. 14 Charlton street, Manhattan; J. B. Franklin, architect and appellant.

On motion, referred to Chief Purroy for examination and report with recommendation.

Appeal No. 81 of 1903, Alteration No. 1158 of 1903, north side York street, about 91 feet from northwest corner York and Bridge streets, Brooklyn; A. W. Ross, Deputy Superintendent of School Buildings, Borough of Brooklyn, appellant.

That the appellant be permitted to erect a two-story semi-fireproof addition to Public School No. 7, situated on York street, west of Bridge street, Borough of Brooklyn.

First floor to be equipped with shower baths, and the second floor to be divided into two classrooms, seating fifty pupils each.

That a building constructed in accordance with the plans submitted would be better in the following respects for the safety of the inmates than one erected according to the Building Code, or 35 feet in height and non-fireproof.

First—That entire first floor, including bathrooms, corridors, floors, partitions, etc., and second story corridors, floors and partitions shall be fireproof, steel floor beams, six-inch terra cotta block arches, four-inch block partitions and asphalt floors.  
Second—That stair corridors, floors and stair construction are of fireproof material, and number of continuous runs being in excess of that required by Code, there being two continuous runs for an area of 1,845 square feet.

Third—That it is essential that ceilings shall be 15 feet in height for the proper ventilation of baths and classrooms; also to permit of sufficient headroom for stairs connecting this addition with present school.

It is urgently requested that permission be granted to erect this semi-fireproof addition, 39 feet 6 inches in height, or 4 feet 6 inches in excess of that required by Code for a non-fireproof building.

Mr. A. W. Ross, Deputy Superintendent of School Buildings, appeared before the Board. On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 82 of 1903, New Building No. 93 of 1903, northwest corner Amsterdam avenue and One Hundred and Seventh street, Manhattan; Neville & Bagge, architects and appellants.

To allow the use of steel girders in place of brick wall in rear portion of building, as originally shown on plans, to support wooden floor and roof beams.

Mr. Neville appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved on condition that the partitions separating the two rear apartments be solidly filled with fireproof material between studs, and wire-lathed and plastered.

The Chairman presented a letter from Mr. Francis C. Kimball requesting a hearing on Appeal No. 83 of 1903, filed this day, In re premises No. 29 Elm place, Brooklyn, which privilege was, on motion, granted.

Mr. Francis H. Kimball appeared before the Board in explanation of the appeal, which reads as follows:

To allow the six-story extension to be carried to a height of 81 feet 6 inches from curb line to highest point of roof beams.

This height is necessary in order that floor levels shall correspond with those of the existing buildings. The heights of stories are more than is usual for a building only six stories in height, and the number of stories are no more than would ordinarily be placed on a building not exceeding 75 feet in height.

This new extension, which is only 23 feet in width, is located on a corner of two principal streets, and the added area will afford greater facilities for egress of customers and employees to reach the street in case of fire and panic, and overcomes the objections to the existing "dead end" of the present structure.

Fire escapes are to be placed on the new front, as required by the Bureau of Buildings.

In many respects this new addition will be built better than the Code provides for an ordinary six-story building, in that it is to be of steel skeleton construction. The ceilings will be wire lathed, and all masonry will be laid up in Portland cement.

On motion, laid over for one week, the Clerk being instructed to send requisition to the Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Brooklyn for the plans.

Tenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall be five cents, and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or a line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of The City of New York. The rates for the carrying of property over said railroad upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successor or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eleventh—The cars on said railroad shall run at intervals of not more than ten minutes from 6 o'clock a. m. to 8 o'clock p. m. and at intervals of not more than twenty minutes from 8 o'clock p. m. to 6 o'clock a. m. of each day, and as much oftener as the reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by City Ordinance.

Twelfth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheel guard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fourteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the streets, bridge and viaduct upon which said railroad is constructed, between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Fifteenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets, avenues, highways, parkways, public places, bridge or viaduct, upon which said railroad is constructed, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets, avenues, highways, parkways, bridge and viaduct, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, highway, parkway, public place, bridge and viaduct upon which said railroad is constructed, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Sixteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article 4 of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted affecting the surface railroads operating in the City of New York, shall be strictly complied with as to said railroad.

Section 4. This grant is upon the express condition that the use of the said railroad, including the tracks, wires and other equipment constructed upon the Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge and its approaches, and upon the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct, and upon the Macomb's Dam road as above set forth, and within a distance of 1,000 feet from the end of such approaches to said bridge and viaduct, shall be granted by the Union Railway Company of New York City, its successors or assigns, to any other person or corporation to which The City of New York may have granted or may hereafter grant the right or franchise to use such bridge or approaches or viaduct for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum which shall not exceed the legal interest on one-half the cost of the construction of such railway and its approaches as aforesaid, and the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars of such person or company thereon, and one-half the cost of maintenance of the tracks, wires and other equipment of the Union Railway Company used by the said grantee, including the paving and cleaning of streets from ice and snow, and all the other duties imposed upon the Union Railway Company in connection with the maintenance of the portion of said railroad used by said grantee. The grant of this franchise shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar franchise upon the same or other terms and conditions over the same streets, avenues, highways, bridge, approaches and viaduct upon which said railroad is constructed, to any other person or corporation, and such persons and companies shall have the right to make all track and other connections which may be requisite and necessary to connect with the tracks of the grantee, its successors or assigns, it being intended by this provision to restrict to two the number of tracks upon the bridge above described and the approaches thereto, including the viaduct in West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street.

Sec. 5. The said railway company shall commence construction within ten days from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the city officials and departments, and shall complete construction within ninety days thereafter; otherwise this grant shall be forfeited. Provided that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, and that the city officials or departments, who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said bridge and viaduct, may extend said time for a period or periods not exceeding ninety days further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the city officials.

Sec. 6. This grant is upon the express condition that the Union Railway Company, within

thirty days after this ordinance takes effect and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railroad, and in case of default in the performance of said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headways of cars, fenders and wheel guards and the heating of the cars, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of two thousand five hundred dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sec. 6. The provisions and obligations of this ordinance shall only attach to the rights and franchise hereby granted and the railroads constructed thereunder and the operation thereof.

Sec. 7. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
