MONTAUK AND GLENDALE CUT-OFFS.

Sirs—I am in receipt of the Secretary's letter bearing date June 26, transmitting copies of two letters of Edward M. Shepard, Esq., bearing date June 22 and June 24, 1908, transmitting consents of abutting property owners to the construction and operation of the Glendale and Montauk Cut-Offs, and stating that the same are filed under the terms of Article II of the certificate granted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners to the Long Island Railroad Company, accepted June 25, 1907. The certificate provided in Article II in part as follows:

"The franchise hereby granted shall, if the Board shall so determine, become void unless within one year after the time of such acceptance of this certificate by the railroad company, that company shall further, and in due and lawful form, obtain, as far as may be necessary and, if and when obtained, file in the office of the Board, the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on the portions of streets over or under which the new connections or any part of the routes thereof run, to the construction and operation of the new connections or such part thereof." * * * *

I am of the opinion that an examination should be made by the Commission to ascertain if the consents are in due and lawful form and by the proper persons and sufficient in amount to comply with the provisions of the franchise.

In case copies of these consents are filed which have been compared and found to be true copies by you, I see no objection, but rather a benefit, in the withdrawal of these original consents from your file by Mr. Shepard, acting on behalf of the Long Island Railroad Company, for the purpose of having the same recorded by the proper officials in Queens County, at the expense of the company, under a stipulation that after being so recorded, the originals shall be returned to your file.

I accordingly transmit to you a form of a proposed resolution to this effect.

BROOKLYN UNION GAS CO.—APPROVAL OF ADDITIONAL ISSUE OF STOCK.

Commissioner Eustis presented the following report in the matter of the application of the Brooklyn Union Gas Company for the consent and approval of the Commission to the issue of \$3,000,000 par value of its capital stock for the purpose of converting convertible debentures of said Company heretofore issued:

The Brooklyn Union Gas Company in 1904 sold at par \$3,000,000 six per cent debentures which, by their terms, are convertible after three years, upon any interest day, into stock of the company upon the basis of one share of stock for each \$100, face value, of debentures and if not so converted the debentures become due for payment March 1, 1909.

The company, at the time of the issue, increased its authorized capital stock from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 for the purpose of issuing the necessary new stock to make this conversion, and has lately made to this Commission the suggestion that inasmuch as contract rights and the obligation to issue this stock had become fixed prior to the enactment of the Public Service Commissions Law, the necessary stock could be issued by the company without application to or approval of the Commission.

The Counsel to the Commission, on the question being submitted to him, advised the Commission that it was not to be thought that the legislature deemed it in the public interest that parties to such pre-existing contracts should assume to themselves authority to decide what the rights and privileges of the parties thereto are in the premises, and that in his opinion such contracts, and the acts of the company and others which tend to fix definitely the rights and obligations of the parties, should be submitted to the Commission and its authority obtained for the issue of the stock in accordance with the obligations of the contract and the law. He added that it was to be assumed that in such cases the Commission would see that the rights of holders of securities of the company were properly secured to them, and that the rights of the company and of the public were properly protected.

The Brooklyn Union Gas Company has therefore made application for an order authorizing the issue of \$3,000,000 of stock for the purpose of making the conversion of these debentures, either upon September 1st, the interest day, or March 1st, the date of the maturity of the debentures.

I am of the opinion that this is a lawful refunding of obligations of the company as the words are used in Section 55 of the Public Service Commissions Law, and I accordingly advise the granting by the Commission of the authority for the issue of this \$3,000,000 of stock, the same to be used only for the purpose of converting the outstanding debentures to the same amount.

FINAL ORDER (No. 640).

In the meantime, however, that you may be advised of the attitude of the Commission, I will say that, in view of all the facts, the Commission considers the suggestion made by you to be wise and prudent. In the opinion of the Commission, therefore, a separate account should be kept to cover the following items:

Discounts and Commissions upon an issue of notes of a par value of \$25,000,000..... \$1,250,000
Recording tax upon a par value of \$40,000,000 of 45 year gold bonds, dated November 1, 1907..... 200,000
Total..... \$1,450,000

A sinking fund or an amortization account should also be kept, to show the amounts paid in to the fund year by year, and the total amount to the credit of the fund at the end of each year, including payments thereto and interest paid or accrued. This fund should be sufficient at the end of forty-five years to amount to \$1,450,000, and the annual payments thereto should be sufficient, with interest thereon, to amount to this sum at the end of the period.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From June 28 to July 11, inclusive, 89 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 17 at Gouverneur Hospital, 46 at Harlem Hospital and 27 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

Reports of the attendance of the visiting physicians and surgeons are herewith transmitted.

The Supervising Engineer, Mr. Jones, has gone carefully into the question of heating Pavilions A and B and the Nurses' Home with the present boiler house, and reports that Bellevue Hospital and the two new buildings can be properly heated by the plant, provided the wooden buildings on the grounds be removed. These should be removed in the fall.

Attention is invited to the serious question of the care of tubercular patients in Bellevue Hospital. To-day the total number of patients under treatment is 943, of which 104 are tubercular. On July 11 the Department of Charities took ten male patients, but for several weeks previous was not able to take any, and the crowded condition of the wards of that Department seems to make it impossible to depend on that service alone in the future. It has been necessary to use a male surgical ward of twenty beds to accommodate these patients, and it is likely that one of the medical wards for women will have to be used to accommodate the tubercular women patients. It is recommended that the Department of Charities and the Department of Health be asked to make provision for such patients.

A reconsideration of the action of your Board regarding the establishment of a day camp for tubercular patients on the ferryboat near Gouverneur Hospital is recommended. Careful consideration has been given this matter, and it is found that it will materially increase the expense of Gouverneur Hospital by necessitating additional employees at higher wages, because there is no room to house such employees at Gouverneur Hospital. It is proposed that one meal a day be furnished from the hospital, and Dr. Huddleston states that the number of patients likely to be cared for will be about 75 per day. It is a physical impossibility for the kitchen at Gouverneur Hospital to do this additional cooking, and the food cannot be properly delivered to the patients a distance of over two blocks from the hospital. It is recommended earnestly that this Department incur no responsibility for such a boat. It is a constant menace, because of the possibility of fire and of patients falling overboard. It is likely to mislead the public by giving the impression that something is being done of a curative kind, and will result in lessened effort to secure the establishment of proper institutions for such patients where they would be subjected to necessary supervision and regulated by such discipline as would conduce best to a cure.

In advertising for the equipment of Pavilions A and B, certain articles made by the State prisons were included to determine whether they could be bought cheaper elsewhere. Supplies must be purchased from that Department under chapter 429 of the Laws of 1896 and 447 of the Laws of 1902. Section 107 of the latter provides that the prices shall be as near the general market price as possible. In most instances the bids were less than the prices of the State Board of Classification and the State Prison Department consequently was asked to furnish a release on these articles. Several conferences have been had with the prison officials, and they now submit in writing the proposition to furnish the supplies at an average of all the bids received, the supplies to be equal in every respect to the sample or to be subjected to rejection, and to be delivered before September 1. Their argument is that because a price is the lowest in a bid it does not follow that it is the market price. It is recommended that this question be referred to the Corporation Counsel for action.

The hospitals of this Department frequently have requests from Medical Examiners of the Street Cleaning Department, officials of the Police Department, etc., regarding the diagnosis and condition of employees of these Departments admitted to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and it is recommended that the question be referred to the Corporation Counsel as to whether the disclosure of these diagnoses is permissible.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the matter of caring for the tubercular patients be referred to Dr. Brannan and Mr. Hebbard as a Special Committee.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To request an opinion from the Corporation Counsel in the matter of purchasing supplies from the State Prisons Department.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To request an opinion from the Corporation Counsel in the matter of giving copies of the records of patients who are employees of City Departments.

Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee, to which had been referred the drawings of the fence for the new Bellevue Hospital, reported favorably upon said drawings, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To accept the report of the Building Committee.

Dr. Brannan spoke of the irregular attendance of the Physicians and Surgeons of the Fordham Hospital Out Patient Department, and the failure of the Medical Board of that institution to appoint a Supervisory Committee for the Out Patient Department, as required by the rules.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To call the attention of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital to both of these matters.

Dr. Brannan spoke of the application of the Firemen for increased wages, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To take no action in this matter, as there was no authority for the increased wages of these employees.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To approve the list of appointments, dismissals, resignations, increases in salaries, transfers and changes in the payrolls in the month of June, 1908.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matter set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
