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MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, August 19, 1914, at 10.30 O clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Commissioners Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh. The President presided.
The minutes of the meetings held July 29, a. m., July 29, p. m., and July 30 were

approved. The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the candidates named therein:

George F. Slater, a sandidate on the eligible list of Stenographer and Typewriter, failed to appear, as directed, and the Secretary was instructed to summon him for the next meeting of the Commission.

"Candidates must be in good general health, as shown by the state of nutrition,

color and development.

"Marked impairment of hearing will disqualify.

"The heart and lungs must be tree from evidence of organic disease.

"The heart and lungs must be tree from evidence of organic disease."

"The heart and tungs must be free from disabling deformity. Loss of an arm or leg, marked spinal curvature, imperfect function of the large joints of the upper or lower extremities sufficient to interfere with the locomotion of general bodily activity shall disqualify. Flat foot, varicose veins, hernia, or other physical defect if sufficiently pronounced to disable or to render normal physical activity impractions.

"A degree of physical strength sufficient to enable the candidate to perform any work which he may be called upon to do will be required.

"A medical certificate of vaccination, within four years, against smallpox is required to be presented either at the time of taking the physical examination or within one month thereafter. "No candidate shall be accepted who is suffering from communicable disease."

No interment, cremation, or other disposition of the dead body of any human being shall be made within the City of New York without a permit therefor granted by the Board of Health, nor otherwise than in accordance therewith, and said dead body shall be placed in a metallic or tin-lined box, or a box so constructed as to prevent the issuance of any liquids therefrom: and no sexton or other perliquids therefrom; and no sexton or other person shall assist in, or assent to, or allow any such interment, or aid or assist about preparing any grave or place of deposit for any such body, or assist in the cremation of the same, for which such permit has not been given authorizing the same. And it shall be the duty of every person who shall receive any such permit, to preserve and to return the same to the Depart-ment of Health, as its regulations may require.
