BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment Held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, January 18, 1918.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—John F. Hylan, Mayor; Charles L. Craig, Comptroller; Alfred E. Smith, President, Board of Aldermen; Frank L. Dowling, President, Borough of Manhattan; Edward Riegelmam, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Henry Bruckner, President, Borough of The Bronx; Maurice E. Connolly, President, Borough of Queens; and Calvin D. Van Name, President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. John F. Hylan, presided.

Approval of Minutes (Cal. No. 1).

The Minutes of meetings held December 28, 1917, and January 4, 1918, were approved as printed in the City Record January 18, 1918.

PUBLIC HEARINGS.

On Franchises.

Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation (Cal. No. 2).

Hearing on the order to show cause why a resolution declaring forfeited the contract dated October 29, 1912, granting a franchise to the South Shore Traction Company, and subsequently assigned, with the consent of this Board, to the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation, and the contracts dated July 21, 1913, and January 21, 1916, by and between the City and the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation, amending said contract dated October 29, 1912, should not be adopted, and why such resolution shall not provide that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of said contracts shall thereupon become the property of the City, without proceedings at law or in equity.

The hearing was fixed for November 2, 1917, by resolution adopted October 19, 1917 (Cal. No. 127), and was continued from time to time until this day.

On December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 14), an injunction issued by the Federal Court, restraining the Board from taking any action in this matter, was presented and referred to the Corporation Counsel.

As the hearing on the temporary injunction is fixed for January 21, 1918, before the Federal Court, the hearing before the Board on the order to show cause was continued until February 8, 1918.

The Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board by February 4, 1918, as to the status of the injunction proceedings.

Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation (Cal. No. 3).

Hearing on the application of the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation for an extension of time of six months from the date when it shall receive the necessary material with which to complete and put into operation that portion of its street surface railroad from the intersection of Sutphin Road and Lamberville Avenue to the intersection of Central Avenue and Springfield Road, Borough of Queens.

By resolution adopted October 26, 1917 (Cal. No. 61), the hearing was fixed for November 2, 1917, and was continued from time to time until this day.

On December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 14), an injunction issued by the Federal Court, restraining the Board from taking any action in this matter, was presented and referred to the Corporation Counsel.

The Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board by February 4, 1918, as to the status of the injunction proceedings.

The hearing was continued until February 8, 1918.

Rapid Transit Railway—Modification of Southern Boulevard and Whitlock Avenue Route (Cal. No. 4).

Consideration of the communication from the Public Service Commission for the First District transmitting for approval resolutions adopted by said Commission modifying and amending the route and general plan of construction of the Southern Boulevard and Whitlock Avenue Route, Borough of The Bronx, so as to provide for a subsurface passageway connecting the Hunts Point Road Station of the Southern Boulevard and Whitlock Avenue route with the Hunts Point Road Station of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company.

This communication was presented to the Board at the meeting of December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 183), when, by resolution duly adopted, December 28, 1917, was fixed as the day for consideration, and the matter also referred to the Committee on Transit and the Comptroller for report.

At the meeting of December 28, 1917 (Cal. No. 2), the consideration was continued until this day.

The matter was referred to the Committee on Franchises and the consideration continued until February 1, 1918.

Miscellaneous Hearings.

Hearing on a Proposed Amendment to Use District Map, Section No. 9, so as to Include in an Unrestricted District Both Sides of William Street, Between Webster Avenue and Beebe Avenue, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 5).

(A hearing was held on December 14, 1917 (Cal. No. 23), in pursuance of resolution adopted on November 16, 1917 (Cal. No. 25); and after the close of the hearing a resolution was adopted authorizing the change. An examination of the advertisement of the notice of the hearing disclosed the fact that said notice was defective in that it omitted a part of the description of the proposed amendment. In order to remove any doubt as to the regularity of the proceeding, it was suggested that a new hearing be held on the proposed amendment.)

(On December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 133), the matter was laid over until January 4, 1918, and on the latter date (Cal. No. 33) a resolution was adopted fixing January 18, 1918, as the date for a new hearing in the matter.)

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

No one appearing in opposition to or in favor of the proposed change, the hearing was closed.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the resolution entitled: "A resolution regulating and limiting the height and bulk of buildings hereafter erected and regulating and determining the area of yards, courts and other open spaces, and regulating and restricting the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified uses and establishing the boundaries of districts for the said purposes," adopted July 25, 1916, be and the same is hereby amended by changing Use District Map, Section No. 9, so as to include in an unrestricted district all that area not now so included on both sides of William street within 100 feet thereof, between a line parallel to Webster avenue and 100 feet southerly therefrom, measured at right angles, and a line parallel to Beebe avenue and 100 feet southerly therefrom, measured at right angles, Borough of Queens, as shown upon a map bearing the signature of the Secretary of the Committee on the City Plan and dated October 24, 1917.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—14.

Department of Education—Transfer of Funds (Cal. No. 7).

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted December 26, 1917, by the Board of Education, requesting that \$2,165.73, representing proceeds realized from the sale of products of the Manhattan Trade School for Girls, be transferred to the Special Trade School Fund of the Department of Education; and the following report of the Comptroller recommending approval thereof:

January 15, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On December 26, 1917, the Board of Education requested the appropriation to the Special Trade School Fund, in accordance with section 1066 of the Greater New York Charter, of \$2,165.73, representing proceeds realized from the sale of products of the Manhattan Trade School for Girls. In regard to this request the Secretary of the Committee on Education reports as follows:

"The Manhattan Trade School for Girls, which is situated at 209-213 East Twenty-third Street, near Third Avenue, prepares girls to enter trades, and endeavors to place them in positions in which they can earn good wages and have opportunity to advance themselves until they become skilled workers. The school offers training in the following trades: Dressmaking, millinery, clothing, machine operating, straw machine operating, embroidery, machine operating, kid glove operating, sample mounting, novelty work, lamp shade making and fancy feather making. In connection with the training for these trades, girls are also taught designing, drawing, English, business arithmetic and accounts.

"No provision is made in the annual Budget for funds with which to purchase the necessary supplies for use in the Manhattan Trade School for Girls, the money required for this purpose for this school being obtained in full from the sale of the products of the school. During the year 1917 the funds accruing from this source amounted to \$21,774.77. The money realized from the sale of products from this and other vocational and trade schools is, from time to time, paid into the City Treasury and credited by the Auditor of Receipts to a suspense account entitled S-109 G, Sales of Property by the Board of Education, pursuant to the provisions of section 1066 of the Greater New York Charter, which reads in part as follows:

"The said board may sell at prices as may be agreed upon such manufactured articles or other products of any of its schools, day and evening, as may not be utilized by the board of education, and all moneys realized by the sale thereof shall be paid into the city treasury and shall at once be appropriated by the board of estimate and apportionment to a special fund to be administered by the board of education for such purposes as said board, in its discretion, may determine."

"The account opened by the Auditor of Disbursements for this particular school is designated as Code S-462, Special Trade School Fund, Borough of Manhattan, Manhattan Trade School for Girls. This fund now has a cash balance of \$19,451.82. In order to comply with the provisions of the Charter, the \$2,165.73 in question will have to be transferred by resolution from suspense account S-109 G, Sales of Property by the Board of Education, to the fund S-462, Special Trade School Fund, Borough of Manhattan, Manhattan Trade School for Girls."

In view of the foregoing facts, I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request. Respectfully, CHARLES L. CRAIG, Comptroller.

Marshall, one of the Official Stenographers of the Supreme Court, Kings County, for the sum of \$113.20 for furnishing the Governor of the State of New York and the County Clerk of Kings County each with a transcript of the minutes in the case of the People vs. Johann Berg. The defendant was convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to death. The minutes cover 256 pages, aggregating 566 folios at 10 cents per folio, \$56.60 in each copy, making a total of \$113.20.

The copy to the Governor was furnished pursuant to section 493 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, and the charges therefor are mandatory and proper county charges. The Code reads:

"Section 493. The judge, presiding at the term at which the conviction took place, must immediately thereupon transmit to the governor a statement of the conviction and sentence, with the notes of testimony taken upon the trial by him or the notes, written out, taken by a stenographer or assistant stenographer, attending the court or term pursuant to law."

The copy to the County Clerk was furnished pursuant to section 456 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, which reads in part:

"Where the defendant is convicted of a crime the clerk of the court * * * shall * * * notify the stenographer that an appeal has been taken, whereupon the stenographer shall * * * deliver to the clerk of the court a copy of the stenographic minutes * * * of the trial * * *. The expense of such copy shall be a county charge, payable to the stenographer out of the court fund upon the certificate of the judge presiding at the trial."

These charges are also mandatory and a proper county charge. The vouchers referred to are approved by the County Clerk, and the Presiding Judge, under date of December 20, 1917, issued an order to the Comptroller to make payment thereof.

The tax levy fund, 2239TW, and water revenue account, S-885, are the general material budget accounts. Corporate stock funds "C. D. W.—12, Water Fund, Borough of Brooklyn," "C. D. W.—13, Water Fund, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx," "C. D. W.—14, Water Fund, Borough of Queens," and "C. D. W.—15, Water Fund, Borough of Richmond," were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in additional amounts of \$105,000 on May 11, 1917; \$42,000 on September 28, 1917; \$85,000 on May 11, 1917, and \$60,000 on May 11, 1917, respectively, and the unencumbered balances on January 1, 1918, were approximately \$11,000, \$51,200, \$19,600 and \$16,800, respectively.

The corporation cocks purchased from budget funds are for new house connections and the cost is returned to the City by the house owner. Those purchased from corporate stock funds are replacements, where the services are changed from an existing pipe to a new one and where a house owner has already paid for connections.

In 1917 approximately \$960 was spent for corporation cocks from corporate stock funds and about \$9,660 from budget funds. In the 1918 budget \$7,140 was allowed for corporation cocks.

The form of contract and specifications are satisfactory, but the estimate of cost was evidently made up on prices existing early in 1917 and is now too low.

At present market prices the quantities included in the proposed contract would cost about \$6,125, instead of \$4,460.

From Citizens and Public Bodies.

Fifth Avenue Coach Company (Cal. No. 20).

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted January 13, 1918, by the Congregation Evangelical Lutheran Church of Our Saviour, at 179th Street and Audubon Avenue, Borough of Manhattan, protesting against the withdrawal of the bus service to Fort George and intermediate points operated by the Fifth Avenue Coach Co.

Which was referred to the Committee on Franchises.

Audubon Avenue, Westerly Side, Between 180th and 181st Streets, Borough of Manhattan—Amendment of Building Zone Resolution (Cal. No. 21).

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 11, 1918, from Lorenz F. J. Weiler, requesting, on behalf of the "Whitecap Holding Co.", owner of property on the northwest corner of 180th street and Audubon avenue, that the building zone resolution be amended so as to place in an unrestricted district property on the westerly side of Audubon avenue, between 180th and 181st streets, Manhattan.

Albemarle Road, Both Sides, Between Flatbush and Bedford Avenues, Borough of Brooklyn—Amendment of Building Zone Resolution (Cal. No. 22).

Public Service Commission for the First District—Approval of Agreement Modifying Contract for Construction of Route No. 61 of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad and Issue of Corporate Stock Therefor (Cal. No. 23).

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 14, 1918, from the Public Service Commission for the First District, requesting that the Board approve of a proposed agreement with Patrick McGovern & Co., modifying the contract for the construction of route No. 61 of the Broadway-Fourth Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad, so as to provide for the construction of niches for signal apparatus; also requesting an issue of \$660 corporate stock to provide the necessary means for meeting the City's obligations under such modifying agreement.

Public Service Commission for the First District—Amendment of Resolution Relative to Construction of a Temporary Inspection Shed by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company Adjacent to Hunterspoint Avenue Station of the Queensboro Subway in Long Island City (Cal. No. 24).

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 10, 1918, from the Public Service Commission, requesting that the Board amend the resolution adopted June 22, 1917 (Cal. No. 67), authorizing the Public Service Commission to order the construction of a temporary inspection shed adjacent to the Hunters Point Avenue Station of the Queensboro Subway Rapid Transit Railroad in Long Island City as a part of the work to be performed by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company under the provisions of agreement modifying contract known as Contract No. 3, for the construction of rapid transit railroads, so as to increase the limitation of expenditure for such work from \$10,000 to \$12,410.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Relief from Scarcity of Coal (Cal. No. 28).

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 144), the Board adopted a resolution requesting the representatives in Congress from the City of New York to use their utmost efforts with the constituted authorities controlling the transportation and delivery of coal to relieve the situation in the City at once.)

House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., January 12, 1918.

MR. JOSEPH HAAG, *Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, Municipal Building, New York, N. Y.:*

My dear Mr. Haag—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 11th instant advising me of resolution adopted by your Board aent present shortage of coal in the Greater City of New York, and in reply beg to state that I have brought the matter to the attention of U. S. Fuel Administrator Harry A. Garfield and filing with him your letter.

For your information would advise that Dr. Garfield has assigned Mr. P. B. Noyes, Chief of the Conservation Division of the Fuel Administration, to go immediately to New York to advise with State Fuel Administrator Albert H. Wiggins with regard to necessary curtailment of the use of coal by industries, theatres and amusements.

Overcrowded terminal facilities and transfer facilities in New Jersey have seriously interfered with the prompt delivery of large quantities of coal which through the efforts of the Fuel Administration have been sent to these terminals for trans-shipment to New York. At present large quantities of coal are in cars and in coal pockets at these New Jersey points. In spite of the fact that this coal is available for use in New York, it has been found impossible to transport across the North River and New York Bay sufficient daily supply of coal to meet the normal needs of the City and it is for this reason State Administrator Wiggins finds it necessary to curtail the consumption of coal in New York, and Conservation Director Noyes will co-operate. (This paragraph is quoted from the statement of Edward S. Rochester, Editor of The Official Bulletin, January 12, 1918, and just released).

Department of Finance—Statements Relative to Authorizations for Non-revenue Producing Improvements, Unencumbered Cash Balances, Approximate Encumbrances and Method of Financing Balances (Cal. No. 29).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Comptroller:

January 15, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—There is submitted herewith for the information of the Board, and for the consideration of its Finance Committee, Statement "A" showing authorizations for non-revenue producing improvements not yet issued on January 7, 1918, (\$18,852,975.29), together with the cash balances (\$290,827.54), then to the credit of the corresponding accounts.

Statement "B" herewith shows that these authorizations are to be financed pursuant to the "pay-as-you-go" law (section 169 of the Charter), in approximately equal amounts from serial bond issues and from the tax budgets, \$9,103,957.39 and \$9,749,017.90, respectively. It is now the practice to issue corporate stock notes (section 189 of the Charter) for the portion of the cost of non-revenue producing improvements to be met out of fifteen-year serial bonds and to issue tax notes (section 189 of the Charter) for that portion of the cost to be included in the tax budgets.

Particular attention should be given by your Finance Committee and by the heads of the departments for which the authorizations were made to the possibility of rescinding any portion of these authorizations which are not absolutely required.

The authorizations arose out of the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of September 12, 1914, embodying the agreement of the Board with the bankers that thereafter provision should be made for non-revenue producing improvements, as follows:

It will be noted that the statement herewith shows that of the \$18,852,975.29 authorized but not encumbered on January 7, 1918, \$9,559,121.23 is for "Gary" schools and \$2,37,303.81 is for "Non-Gary" schools.

The unencumbered portions of the authorizations may be rescinded by action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

As to the unencumbered cash balances of the authorizations, they may be transferred, pursuant to section 237 of the City Charter, as amended by section 220 of the Laws of 1917, to an account entitled "moneys available for permanent improvements

for which corporate stock may lawfully be issued," and the fund thus created may be applied by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to any purpose for which serial bonds may be used.

From December 1, 1917, to January 7, 1918, as shown by Statement "C," herewith, the authorizations of various departments for non-revenue producing improvements have been encumbered in approximately the sum of \$1,555,000, so that if rescindments of authorizations or transfers of cash balances are to be made, it is important that they shall be made promptly. Department of Education—Appropriation to Complete Equipment of Manhattan Trade School for Girls (Cal. No. 30).

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 15, 1918, from the Comptroller transmitting for reference to the Committee on Finance and Budget report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, dated January 12, 1918, on the request of the Board of Education for an appropriation of \$37,623, to provide means to complete the equipment of the Manhattan Trade School for Girls.

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance and Budget.

President, Borough of Manhattan—Transfer of Appropriation (Cal. No. 31).

The Secretary presented a communication dated January 11, 1918, from the President of the Borough of Manhattan requesting the transfer of necessary funds from unexpended balances of appropriations for the year 1917, to provide for the compensation of Plumbers in his office at \$6 per day, from July 1, 1917.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

President, Borough of Manhattan—Waiver of Provisions and Requirements of Resolution Adopted July 11, 1912, Relative to Appropriation for Construction of Sewer in East 42d Street (Cal. No. 32).

(On October 5, 1917 (Cal. No. 80), this matter was referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget.)

(On December 14, 1917 (Cal. No. 45), the report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget was presented (is printed in said Minutes) and the matter was laid over until December 21, 1917. At said meeting the matter was also referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board for consultation with the Consulting Engineer, Borough of Manhattan, and the Chief Engineer of Sewers of said Borough for report December 21, 1917. On December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 147), a report of the Chief Engineer was presented (is printed in said Minutes) and a resolution adopted appropriating \$27,000 for this work.)

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President, Borough of Manhattan:

January 15, 1918.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Municipal Building, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—On November 22, 1917, a very violent explosion, probably due to the accumulation of gasoline vapors, occurred in the sewer in East 42d Street, between the East River and Third Avenue. The power of the explosion was so great that it shattered the sewer structure from the East River to a point between Second and Third Avenues and that portion of the sewer which was not originally constructed in rock tunnel between the East River and First Avenue was completely shattered, the overlying earth forced upward and the sides of the sewer outward so as to leave the structure in a dangerous condition liable to collapse and close off flow entirely. On this section just referred to, the manholes were shattered and blown out so as to form craters about eight feet in diameter at the surface.

The funds appropriated for repair purposes having been exhausted, the then Commissioner of Public Works took up the matter of repairing this sewer with the Finance Department, whereupon he was informed that in an emergent condition like this it would be a proper procedure to immediately begin the repair of the sewer in order to save the City harmless from damage and to restore the street surface to a safe condition for public travel.

The nature of the funds to be appropriated for the repair of reconstruction of this sewer was left to the Board of Estimate to decide. On November 28 my predecessor addressed the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment citing the above facts and asking approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the steps already taken and requesting the appropriation of funds to meet the cost of this work. This matter was considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at their meeting on December 14, 1917, and at the same meeting there appeared on the calendar a report from Corporate Stock Committee of the Board on a previous request of my predecessor made on August 3, 1917, for funds to repair a portion of this sewer between First Avenue and Third Avenue made necessary by a previous explosion. In the meantime bids had been received under two alternatives; the first to reconstruct the sewer between the East River and First Avenue, and the second to include the entire work of reconstruction between the East River and First Avenue and the repair of the sewer between First and Third Avenues.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan requested the unanimous consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to consider in connection with the report of the Corporate Stock Committee above mentioned, the later request for funds for the reconstruction just referred to and brought to the attention of the Board the fact that bids had been received, the amount thereof, the definite proposal contained in the contract, specification and plans, which matters were referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with instructions that he consult with the Consulting Engineer and Chief Engineer of Sewers of the Borough of Manhattan and report to the Board at the meeting to be held on December 21.

The Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate caused an examination to be made on December 17, 1917, by an engineer of the Board, and he also called upon the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Sewers for all information, reports, plans of the original sewer and plans and specifications of the proposed reconstruction, including the bids received for work to be performed and including the reports on previous explosions. The Chief Engineer reported to the Board on December 19, 1917, and, among other things, stated that between the East River and First Avenue the sewer has been almost entirely destroyed. Many sections of the crown and both sides are entirely down, some of these sections being over 40 feet in length. The large masses of brick masonry are hanging from those portions of the sides and crown still in place and earth in large quantities has fallen into the sewer. The brickwork still in place is split on both sides and sections of it have been forced backward into the surrounding soil a distance of from one foot to six inches. A few sections of the invert appear to be in fair condition, but are covered with large masses of fallen brick. * * * All the manholes have been wrecked and sections of the roadway, about 15 feet in length between the surface tracks, have fallen in, the tracks opposite the manholes being now supported by heavy timbers. Between the manholes the pavement has been forced upward about four inches. * * * In view of the conditions above described, there can be no question but that the sewer between the end of the tunnel and the East River must be entirely reconstructed. This is not a question of repair, and, while the report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision, dated November 24, 1917, suggests that the sewer could be put in fair condition at an expense of \$1,500, this report was undoubtedly written before the last explosion, which occurred on November 22. As to the manner in which the cost of this reconstruction should be met, it seems unfair to consider the payment of this expense from the Street Improvement Fund and the levying of any assessment. The original sewer was paid for by an assessment about forty years ago at a total expense of about \$51,200, and its present wrecked condition is not due to inadequate capacity or poor construction, but to a number of explosions of which there appear to have been four, namely, on June 30 and September 22, 1914, and on August 2 and November 22, 1917.

The Board authorized an issue of Corporate Stock amounting to \$27,000 for the repair and reconstruction of the sewer in East 42d Street, between First Avenue and the East River, at its meeting of December 21, 1917. Subsequently, my predecessor awarded a contract to the low bidder for the reconstruction of the 42d Street sewer between the East River and First Avenue and the contractor im-

mediately proceeded with the work. This contract was duly forwarded to the Comptroller for registration. Under date of January 9, 1918, Deputy Comptroller Joseph Johnson addressed me as follows:

"It does not appear that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved the Corporate Stock expenditure in accordance with its resolution of July 11, 1912, and I would request that the requisite approval be obtained so that the contract may be advanced for registration."

I would therefore request that this matter be placed upon the calendar of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of January 18 for the consideration of the Board, and that the appended resolutions be adopted. Very truly yours,

The following was offered:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution on July 11, 1912:

"Resolved, That all Boards, Departments, Bureaus, Commissions or Offices of The City or County Government authorized by this Board to incur obligations and execute contracts payable out of Corporate Stock other than such Corporate Stock as is issued for Rapid Transit purposes, or for work done under the jurisdiction of the Board of Water Supply, be and they hereby are directed to submit to this Board for its approval forms of contract, plans, specifications and estimates of cost pertaining to the same, prior to advertising for bids upon public works, funds for which are derived from Corporate Stock issues, and also are directed to submit to this Board for its approval all preliminary and final agreements with an architect or architects for public works funds for which are derived from Corporate Stock issues, except that during the months of July, August and September said forms of contracts, plans, specifications, estimates of costs and preliminary and final agreements with architects shall be submitted to the Comptroller for his approval."

Whereas, The Board of Estimate at their meeting on December 14, 1917, referred the request of the President of the Borough of Manhattan for funds to make an emergency repair or partial reconstruction of the 42nd Street sewer, between the East River and Third Avenue, to the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with the contract, specification, plans and bids for the performance of the work; and

Whereas, In the Chief Engineer's report to the Board (No. 17279) of December 19, 1917, sets forth the fact that an emergent condition then existed in 42nd Street, between First Avenue and the East River, due to the shattered condition of the sewer; and

Whereas, The Chief Engineer of the Board, in his report, stated that it seemed unfair to consider the payment of this expense from the Street Improvement Fund and the levying of any assessment, the original sewer having been assessed and the wrecked condition not being due to inadequate capacity or poor construction; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate at its meeting of December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 147), appropriated Corporate Stock to the extent of \$27,000 for the reconstruction of the sewer in 42nd Street, between the East River and First Avenue; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment in their action of December 21, 1917, virtually approved the form of contract, plans, specifications and estimates of cost pertaining to this work; therefore,

Be It Resolved, That the provisions and requirements of the resolution of July 11, 1912, in so far as they require that forms of contract, plans, specifications and estimates of cost be submitted prior to advertising for bids upon public work be waived in this particular case; and

Be It Further Resolved, That the Board of Estimate hereby approves the actions of the President of the Borough of Manhattan in expeditiously handling this emergent matter.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

President, Borough of The Bronx—Appropriation for Repaving Streets (Cal. No. 33).

Atlantic Avenue, from the Brooklyn Borough Line to Van Wyck Avenue, Excluding All Land Within the Right-of-Way of the Long Island Railroad and All Land Actually Occupied by Railroad Buildings—Amending Proceedings for Acquiring Title by Eliminating Therefrom the Section East of Maure Avenue, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 77).

(A hearing on the proposed area of assessment in this matter was fixed for December 14, 1917, by resolution adopted on November 16, 1917 (Cal. No. 127). On December 14, 1917 (Cal. No. 14), the hearing was continued to December 21, 1917. On December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 13), the hearing was closed and the matter was laid over until January 18, 1918.)

The Secretary presented a report, dated October 30, 1917, of the Chief Engineer on the petition of R. W. Kellogg, dated August 13, 1917, requesting that the proceeding herein be amended, recommending approval of said request, if the petitioners first pay to the City the sum of \$5,678, representing the incidental expenses and the proposed assessment for benefit upon the section of the street to be discontinued, and file a waiver of all claims for disbursements to which they may otherwise be entitled. (Report of the Chief Engineer is printed in the minutes of meeting held November 16, 1917 (Cal. No. 127).)

The matter was laid over two weeks (February 1, 1918).

East 19th Street, 90 Feet South of Church Avenue, 176 Feet North of Tennis Court, Borough of Brooklyn—Amendment of Building Zone Resolution (Cal. No. 78).

This matter was referred back to the Fire Department.

County Clerk, Richmond County—Expenditure of Funds (Cal. No. 80).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated October 18th, 1917, from the County Clerk, Richmond County, requesting permission to expend \$800 for rebinding law books and libers; and a report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision recommending denial thereof.

(On December 21, 1917 (Cal. No. 114), the matter was laid over until December 28, 1917. On December 28, 1917 (Cal. No. 106), the matter was laid over until this meeting.) (Report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision is printed in the minutes of December 28, 1917.)

The matter was withdrawn by the President of the Borough of Richmond and the papers ordered filed.

Anna R. Kane—Claim of (Cal. No. 81).

(On November 16, 1917 (Cal. No. 59), November 23, 1917 (Cal. No. 91), November 30, 1917 (Cal. No. 115), December 14, 1917 (Cal. No. 155), December 28, 1917 (Cal. No. 91), and January 4, 1918 (Cal. No. 23), the matter was laid over; on the latter date until this meeting.)

The Secretary presented a certificate of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller certifying for payment, pursuant to section 246 of the Charter, claim of Anna R. Kane for \$175, for services as Typewriting Copyist in the Department of Public Charities for the period from January 1 to April 16, 1917 (Certificate is printed in the minutes of meeting of December 28th, 1917 (Cal. No. 91)).

The Secretary also presented a communication, dated November 29, 1917, from Anna R. Kane, requesting favorable action.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved. That, pursuant to section 246 of the Greater New York Charter, being chapter 601 of the Laws of 1907, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that the City of New York has received a benefit from the services of Anna R. Kane in the Department of Public Charities, and is justly and equitably obligated to pay her, without interest, the sum of one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175) for such services as typewriting copyist for the period from January 1 to April 16, 1917; that said sum shall be paid to her in full satisfaction of the claim which she presented; that the interests of the City will be best subserved by the payment of the said claim in that amount and that such sum shall only be paid upon the execution by the said Anna R. Kane of a full release in favor of the City of New York in such form as may be approved by the Corporation Counsel; and the Comptroller

is hereby authorized to pay said claim in the sum of one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175) from the appropriate fund available for the purpose.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment (Committee on the City Plan)—Request of John P. Fox, Consultant on City Planning, for Leave of Absence (Cal. No. 82).

The Secretary presented a communication dated December 29, 1917, from the Secretary of the Committee on the City Plan, recommending that the request of John P. Fox, Consultant on City Planning at \$4,140 per annum, for leave of absence without pay for a period of three months be granted.

(On January 11, 1918 (Cal. No. 84), the matter was laid over until this meeting and referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades for report as to whether there is any need for this position.)

(On January 15, 1918 (Cal. No. 3), the Board, upon the recommendation of the Committee on Salaries and Grades, adopted a resolution granting Mr. Fox one month's leave of absence, without pay.)

The matter was referred back to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.

Resolution to Authorize the President of the Borough of Manhattan to Purchase Coal Without Public Letting.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the President of the Borough of Manhattan be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase coal, without public letting, for the proper maintenance of the buildings and plants under the control of his department for the period of three months ending March 31, 1918.

Resolution Designating Commissioner of Public Markets, Pursuant to Provisions of Section 14 of Chapter 813 of Laws of 1917, as Agency for Purchase, Storage and Sale of Food and Fuel to the Inhabitants of New York City.

Whereas, The State Food Commission, under date of November 1, 1917, pursuant to the provision of section 14 of chapter 813 of the Laws of 1917, gave the following consent in writing to the exercise by The City of New York of the power to purchase food and fuel with municipal funds and on municipal credit, and to provide storage for and sell the same to its inhabitants, under the provisions of said section:

"Whereas, The City of New York has certified to the existence of an actual and anticipated emergency on account of a deprivation of necessities by reason of excessive charges and otherwise, and has applied to the State Food Commission for the consent of such Commission to exercise the power of purchasing food and fuel with municipal funds and on municipal credit and provide storage for and sell the same to its inhabitants of such city, in such manner and through such agencies as it may determine,

"Now, therefore, after due consideration, the State Food Commission hereby grants such application, subject to the following resolutions and restrictions, viz.:

"(1) Such consent is granted until further order of the Commission.

"(2) The City of New York shall make, monthly or oftener if required by the State Food Commission, a report of its operations, pursuant to the foregoing consent, to the State Food Commission. Such report shall be in such form as shall be prescribed by the Commission.

"Dated, Albany, N. Y., November 1st, 1917."

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby designates the Commissioner of Public Markets of The City of New York as the agency for the purchase, storage and sale to the inhabitants of the City of food and fuel, pursuant to the provisions of section 14 of chapter 813 of the Laws of 1917.

No. 4.

An Ordinance to Provide for the Acquisition by the City of New York of Coal for the Preservation of the Public Health, Safety and General Welfare of the People of Said City.

Whereas, there is a great scarcity of coal and other fuel in The City of New York, caused by the lack of sufficient supply and the unnecessary hoarding thereof; and

Whereas, said lack of coal has produced a condition of want and suffering, seriously menacing the public health, safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of said City; and

Whereas, the foregoing conditions amount to a grave public emergency, necessitating the exercise of the power of eminent domain; now, therefore,

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Mayor of The City of New York is authorized and empowered by and through such person or persons as he may designate for that purpose, to take and acquire in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, coal situated within the limits of said City by whomsoever the same may be owned or possessed, in such quantities and amounts as said person or persons so designated by him, for such purpose, may determine to be necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, general welfare and the relief of the poor of the City and which may be determined by said person or persons so designated by the Mayor to be unnecessary for the use of the person or corporation from whom the same may be taken and acquired.

Section 2. Upon the taking of such coal in the manner aforesaid, title thereto shall vest in The City of New York and the same shall be distributed in such manner as the Mayor may direct.

Section 3. Within 30 days after any such taking, The City of New York, by its Corporation Counsel, shall apply to the Supreme Court in the First Judicial District, upon notice, to have said Supreme Court, without a jury, ascertain and determine the compensation which should justly be made by The City of New York to the owner or owners of the coal so taken. Such notice shall be personally served upon the owner or owners of said coal so taken as aforesaid 5 days prior to the making of the application by the Corporation Counsel, and, in the event that personal service upon the owner or owners cannot be effected, said notice shall be given to such per-

sons and in such manner as the Supreme Court shall direct. Said Supreme Court, without a jury, upon such application, shall ascertain and determine the compensation which should justly be made to the owner or owners of the coal so taken, and shall make an award therefor to such owner or owners who shall be entitled to enter a judgment against The City of New York for the amounts awarded as such compensation. Such judgments may be reviewed in the manner prescribed by law for the review of final decrees in condemnation proceedings, under chapter XXI of the Greater New York Charter.

Section 4. The Comptroller of The City of New York is hereby authorized to settle and adjust in the manner prescribed by section 149 of the Greater New York Charter, any and all claims which any owner or owners of coal may have against said City by reason of the taking of such coal, as provided in this ordinance.

Section 5. Any person or persons designated by the Mayor to act under the provisions of this ordinance shall be freed from any personal liability for such acts as he or they may perform in carrying out the provisions of this ordinance, and the Comptroller of The City of New York is hereby authorized to execute a bond on behalf of The City of New York, indemnifying and holding such person or persons free and harmless from any and all actions at law or suits in equity or special proceedings which may be brought against him or them to recover damages or to prevent him or them from enforcing the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 6. This ordinance shall be liberally construed for the purpose of carrying into effect the objects and purposes specified in the preamble.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.




