

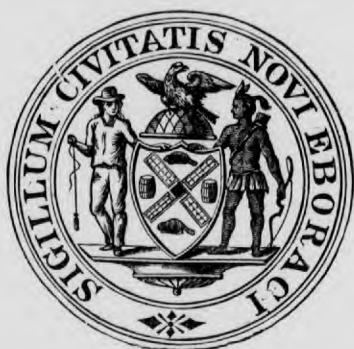

#### SANITARY BUREAU.

##### Work of the Sanitary Inspectors.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 95,125.

The number of causes of complaint returned was 18,470.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 2,891, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 443 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 944 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 166 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 65 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending March 31, 1885, nine thousand three hundred and fifty-one (9,351) permits were granted for burials. During the same period one hundred and seventy-eight (178) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; seven hundred and fifty (750) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; eight hundred and forty-seven (847) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand five hundred and fifty-two (1,552) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and nine hundred and thirty-two (932) transcripts of the records of deaths, one hundred and twenty-four (124) of marriages and one hundred and eighteen (118) of births from said records were issued. There were five thousand six hundred and thirty-two (5,632) persons registered as married during the quarter, and seven thousand six hundred and twenty (7,620) children were born during the same period.

The statistics of marriage during the last quarter of the year 1884 and the first quarter of the present year, compare as follows:

## OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending March 31, 1885, the number of notices issued by the Board was 6,686. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents to violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 25, 1885:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 8,223.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,805.

During the past week 357 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 76 permits.

There was issued to remove manure from stables in the city, 1 permit.

There was issued, under the Sanitary Code, 1 miscellaneous permit.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 300 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 54 visits were made, and 47 disinfections were made.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 3.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,329, of which 832 were primary and 497 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 14,225 pounds of meat and 2,320 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 116, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 20, the number of arrests made was 1.

The certificates of 505 births, 50 still-births, 200 marriages, and 759 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 25, 1885. This shows a decrease of 93 births and 103 marriages, and an increase of 63 deaths and the same number of still-births when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 36 births, 12 still-births and 34 marriages, and an increase of 123 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 8; whooping cough, 3; puerperal diseases, 2; inanition, 7; rheumatism and gout, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; bronchitis, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; surgical operations, 4; while the deaths from measles increased, 2; scarlatina, 9; diphtheria, 2; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 8; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; cancer, 5; pneumonia, 24; heart diseases, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 14; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 8; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; premature and pretermatural births, 9; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from cerebro-spinal fever, alcoholism and suicide was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 155 were in institutions, 415 in tenement houses, 174 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 13 were on the basement floor, 144 on the first, 184 on the second, 146 on the third, 79 on the fourth, 29 on the fifth, 4 on the sixth; 759 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents; 99 were stated to be single, 102 married, 92 widowed, and the condition of 367 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 759; still-births, 47; bodies in transit, 20; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 80 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 505 births, 200 marriages, 47 still-births, 759 deaths; 20 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 129 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 14 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 66 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 25, 1885, was 61.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.138, the mean humidity was 64, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 890, and the total amount of rain-fall was .00 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 710 deaths and still-births, or 87.76 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 14; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 283; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 102; Greenwood (undenominational), 54; Lutheran (undenominational), 111; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 24; Evergreen (undenominational), 40; Woodlawn (undenominational), 36; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 12; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 12; Washington (undenominational), 9.

The actual mortality for the week ending April 18, 1885, was 731; this is 99 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1884, and 21 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.36 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,389,287.

Mr. Theodore Weston, architect, appeared before the Board and presented plans for the enlargement of the Art Museum building.

On motion said plans were approved, and the concurrence of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as required by Chapter 106 of the Laws of 1885, was requested.

From the Secretary of the Civil Service Examining Board, inclosing list of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Superintending Gardener, and reporting F. H. D. Mason and P. W. St. John as eligible for promotion.

On motion, the appointment of George C. Woolson, Superintendent Gardener, March 18, 1885, and that of F. H. D. Mason, Clerk, April 1, 1885, subject to the approval of the Civil Service, were ratified and confirmed.

From the Secretary of the Civil Service Examining Board, submitting the names of persons eligible for appointment as Parkkeepers.

From D. F. Appleton, designating the 6th day of June for the presentation of the Pilgrim statue to the city by the New England Society. Referred to Commissioner Beekman.

From Henry P. Sandford, Julia A. Bunting and others, petitioning for the construction of a sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, between Willis avenue and Brown Place. Referred to the Engineer of Construction to report upon.

From John A. Knox and Newberry D. Lawton, asking permission to construct a sewer through Fulton avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, to connect their premises on Fulton avenue with the sewer in Third avenue, at their own expense.

On motion, it was ordered that the petition of N. D. Lawton and J. A. Knox be referred to the Engineer of Construction for examination and report, and if he reports that there be no objections, that a permit be granted. The work to be done under the direction of this Department.

From the Athletic Association of the College of the City of New York, asking that a plot of ground in the Central Park be designated for their exclusive use for athletic sports. Denied.

From Thompson & Dolivar, applying for permission to place their "Lohengrin Boats" on Central Park Lake. Granted until June 1 next.

From J. P. Ryan, applying for a renewal of his license for selling refreshments in Battery Park. Referred to Commissioner Beekman.

From John C. Cornett, applying for permission to moor a float and let boats at the Third Avenue Bridge over Harlem river. Referred to Commissioner Powers.

From the Board of Assessors, returning the assessment list for the Brook avenue sewer for alteration, and

From the Engineer of Construction, reporting in relation to the same and stating that in view of the tax maps having been prepared, it would be necessary to make an entirely new set of maps and sheets.

On motion, said communications were referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, with the request that he furnish this Department with his opinion whether this additional work can be charged for in the assessment list, and if not, whether it can be paid for out of the appropriation for "Surveys, Maps and Plans for the year 1885."

From the Topographical Engineer:

1st. Calling attention to the fact that the Draft Damage Map in the matter of opening Railroad avenue, east from the Harlem river to East One Hundred and Sixty-first street was transmitted April 28, 1883, and that the draft Benefit Map was transmitted November 12, 1883, but no final copy of either map has been requested for the use of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed in that proceeding.

On motion, the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in that matter be requested to use all means in their power to hasten the completion of the legal proceedings for the opening of that avenue.

2d. Submitting a map, plan and profile, showing Bailey avenue, from Boston avenue to Van Cortlandt avenue, for adoption preliminary to preparing the Rule map.

On motion, the map establishing the grades of Bailey avenue from Boston avenue to Van Cortlandt avenue, was adopted and ordered filed according to law.

From Engineer of Construction and Topographical Engineer, reporting in relation to the streets and avenues in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards through which sewers should be built as a sanitary necessity.

On motion, the Engineer of Construction was directed to prepare plans and specifications for the construction of a sewer in East One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, from North Third to Brook avenue, with branches, etc., as provided in plan of drainage for Sewerage District No. 33A, and submit them to the Board, and the Topographical Engineer directed to prepare and submit a map showing the plan, profile and section of the Mill brook drains, preparatory to their construction.

From the Engineer of Construction:

1st. Submitting a plan and specifications for the improvement of Riverdale avenue, from its intersection with the northerly line of the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway to the northerly line of the City of New York. Approved and ordered advertised.

2d. Submitting a plan and specifications for constructing a sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, from Washington avenue to North Third avenue, with a branch, etc. Approved.

From the Architect:

1st. Submitting plans and elevations for a carriage-shed proposed to be erected at Claremont on Riverside Park, with an estimate of the cost. Referred to Commissioner Powers to report upon.

2d. Submitting a plan for the final surface improvement of Riverside Park above One Hundred and Fifteenth street. Laid over.

3d. Submitting plans and estimates for iron folding-gates proposed to be erected at the head of the stone steps leading to the river at the Third avenue bridge. Referred to Commissioner Beekman to report upon.



The Treasurer was authorized to issue an order for the construction of a receiving-basin at the southwest corner of One Hundred and Seventieth street and Fulton avenue in connection with the sewer to be built in that street.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to transfer the sum of \$292.50 from the unexpended balance of the appropriation, "Maintenance Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards," 1884, for which it is not required, to the appropriation, "Harlem River Bridges," 1884, which is insufficient.

The Engineer of Construction was charged with the duty of inspecting from time to time the various bridges over the Harlem river, under the jurisdiction of this Department, and directed to report thereon to this Board at its first meeting in each month.

It was ordered that arrangements be made with Bayne's Sixty-ninth Regiment Band for furnishing music for concerts at the Battery during the coming season, and for calcium lights to be used on the evenings of the concerts.

The Architect was directed to prepare and submit plans for a Ladies' Cottage to be erected on the north meadow, a portion of the cottage to be used for storing implements for lawn tennis players.

The President designated Commissioner Beekman to conduct police trials until the first meeting of this Board in May next.

The employment of twelve laborers and four double teams was authorized for work on Riverside Park.

The employment of four gardeners was authorized.

The employment of two pavers, at \$2.50 per day each, and one asphalt paver, at \$3 per day, was authorized.

The employment of four double teams was authorized for work on the parks.

The President was authorized to employ watering-carts for sprinkling Riverside avenue during the present season.

The President was authorized to appoint a painter.

The pay of division gardeners was fixed at \$2.50 per day, to date from the commencement of the next pay-roll.

The pay of horses and carts was fixed at \$3 per day, to date from the commencement of the next pay-roll.

Requisition was ordered made upon the Civil Service Examining Board for two persons eligible for appointment as draughtsmen.

Nine laborers and one cottage-laborer, reported by the Superintendent of Parks, and seven laborers, reported by Superintendent Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, for inefficiency were discharged, and the employment of others to take their places was authorized.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 29, 1885.—SPECIAL MEETING—10 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Crimmins (President), Powers, Beekman.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of Street Openings, acknowledging the receipt of a communication from this Department, relating to the progress of various street-opening proceedings, and the taking of lands for drains as authorized by Chapter 360, Laws of 1883. Ordered filed.

From the Secretary of the Civil Service Examining Board, submitting lists of persons eligible for appointment as Inspectors of Regulating and Grading, Inspectors of Sewers and Masonry, and Parkkeepers. Ordered filed.

From the Secretary of the Civil Service Examining Board, submitting the names of R. Meyer and George E. Fuechter, as eligible applicants for appointment as draughtsmen.

On motion, it was ordered that said applicants for appointment as draughtsmen be summoned to appear before the Engineer and be examined as to their fitness for doing the work required of them.

From the Secretary of the Civil Service Examining Board, submitting the name of Michael McCann as an eligible applicant for appointment as Foreman of Masons. Ordered filed.

From Egbert L. Viele, inclosing a bill amounting to \$275, for expenses incurred while a Commissioner of this Department. Laid over.

From the Topographical Engineer, recommending the employment of three additional draughtsmen and computers.

On motion, requisition was ordered made upon the Civil Service Examining Board for three persons eligible for appointment as draughtsmen.

From the Topographical Engineer, reporting upon the petition of Weeks W. Culver, Henry Ruhl and Gustav W. Fuess, for the opening of Cauldwell avenue, between Teasdale place and East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, and stating that such opening does not appear to be needed at this time for either public convenience or drainage, and that when said avenue is to be opened one proceeding should cover its entire length.

On motion, said report was ordered filed, and a copy sent to the petitioners.

From Miller & Macfarlane, attorneys for George F. Doak in relation to the contract, as awarded to him on 1st instant, for furnishing Roa Hook gravel, and requesting this Department to notify the Comptroller that it consents to the substitution of Charles Gudet on the proposal of Mr. Doak.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of said communication to the Counsel to the Corporation.

Mr. Theodore Weston, architect, appeared and presented a form of contract and specifications for enlarging the Art Museum building in accordance with the plans presented and approved on the 22d instant, which was ordered transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his examination and approval as to form.

A plan was received from the Architect, showing a proposed new walk and bear-pit on the Zoological grounds in Central Park, and approved.

The Secretary was directed to notify the New York & Harlem Railroad Company of the dangerous condition of the streets, roads, avenues and public places in the Twenty-third Ward, crossed by the tracks of the Port Morris branch of the said railroad, and to direct the said company immediately to place, maintain and properly operate suitable and substantial gates, doors, guard-rails or other protections, for the safety of the public, at each and every of such crossings.

The Counsel to the Corporation was requested to take such action as may be proper to prevent the further encroachment by the elevated railroads on the Battery Park contemplated in the construction of platforms extending along the tracks, and to compel the removal of so much of said platforms as may have been already placed.

In accordance with the provisions of section 562 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as amended by chapter 430 of the Laws of 1883, the Engineer of Construction was directed to prepare and submit to this Board proper and suitable plans for the construction of the drains within the district designated and known as the "Woodscock District."

The Engineer of Construction was directed to prepare plans and specifications for the construction of the Mill brook drains from Westchester avenue to their termination between East One Hundred and Forty-first and One Hundred and Forty-second streets, and submit the same to the Board for approval.

The Engineer of Construction was directed to proceed with the work of resetting the curb on the new line as established for the south side of Eighty-first street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, on the north side of Manhattan square.

The Secretary was authorized to have prepared, an analytical index of the minutes for the year ending with April 30, 1885, at an expense not exceeding \$75.

The Treasurer was authorized to purchase a business wagon and harness for the use of the Superintending Gardener.

4. Regulating, grading, etc., Tremont street, from Boston road to Bronx river.
5. Regulating, grading, etc., East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from North Third avenue to Southern Boulevard.
6. Regulating, grading, etc., East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, between Boston road and Union avenue.

—were ordered prepared and printed.

The employment of twenty laborers was authorized for work on tar walks.

The employment of twenty-four laborers and four double teams was authorized for work in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

The pay of drivers of carts and teams employed on Maintenance of Parks and Places was fixed at the rate of \$2 per day, to take effect with the pay-roll commencing May 3, next.

Commissioner Powers was authorized to substitute the name of an axeman in place of John Smith, appointed on 1st inst., who failed to report for duty.

## APPROVED PAPERS.

Resolved, That the first paragraph of section 107 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be amended by striking out the word "may" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "shall," so that said paragraph as amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 107. Any duly licensed hackney coach or cab shall stand, while waiting for employment, at any of the following places and for the periods of time hereafter provided.

Resolved, That section 108 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be amended by striking out the word "may" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "shall," and striking out the word "Aldermen" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "Alderman," so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows: "Sec. 108. The Mayor of the City of New York, with the advice and consent of the Alderman of each district, may from time to time designate additional places in each district as he shall deem proper at which hackney coaches and cabs shall stand while waiting for employment."

Resolved, That section 109 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be amended by striking out the word "five" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "ten," and by adding thereto the following: "But nothing in this article contained shall be construed to impose any liability upon any owner or driver of any duly licensed hackney coach or cab by reason of soliciting or taking employment while driving through or along the public streets and thoroughfares of the City of New York."

"Provided, however, that the penalty imposed by this section shall apply to every such owner or driver of such hackney coach or cab, who shall drive the same along or in front of any of the designated stands enumerated in this article and the amendments thereof, for the purpose of soliciting or intercepting any person from employing any duly licensed hackney coach or cab which may at the time be waiting at any of such stands," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 109. The owner or driver of any hackney coach or cab, which shall stand waiting for employment at any other place than as herein provided, shall be liable to a fine of ten dollars, to be imposed by the Mayor or his First Marshal, and to be sued for and recovered by the Attorney to the Corporation for the use of the city.

But nothing in this article contained shall be construed to impose any liability upon any owner or driver of any duly licensed hackney coach or cab by reason of soliciting or taking employment while driving through or along the public streets and thoroughfares of the City of New York.

Provided, however, that the penalty imposed by this section shall apply to every such owner or driver of such hackney coach or cab who shall drive the same along or in front of any of the designated stands enumerated in this article and the amendments thereof, for the purpose of soliciting or intercepting any person from employing any duly licensed hackney coach or cab which may at the time be waiting at any of such stands."



Resolved, That section 89 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be amended by striking out subdivisions 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, and 20 thereof, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"CABS."

1. For conveying one or more persons any distance, sums not exceeding the following amounts: Fifty cents for the first mile or part thereof; and each additional half mile or part thereof, twenty-five cents. By distance, for "stops" of over five minutes and not exceeding fifteen minutes, twenty-five cents. For longer stops the rate will be twenty-five cents for every fifteen minutes, or fraction thereof, if more than five minutes. For a brief stop, not exceeding five minutes in a single trip, there will be no charge.

2. For the use of a cab, by the hour, with the privilege of going from place to place and stopping as often and long as may be required, one dollar for the first hour or part thereof, and for each succeeding half hour, or part thereof, fifty cents.

"COACHES."

3. For conveying one or more persons any distance, sums not exceeding the following amounts: One dollar for the first mile or part thereof; and each additional half mile or part thereof forty cents.

By distance, for "stops" of over five minutes and not exceeding fifteen minutes, cents. For longer stops, the rate will be cents for every fifteen minutes or fraction thereof if more than five minutes. For a brief stop, not exceeding five minutes in a single trip, there will be no charge.

4. For the use of a coach by the hour, with privilege of going from place to place and stopping as often and long as may be required, one dollar and fifty cents for the first hour or part thereof; and for each succeeding half hour or part thereof, seventy-five cents.

5. No cab or coach shall be driven by the time rate at a pace less than five miles an hour.

6. From "line balls," one or two passengers, to any point south of Fifty-ninth street, two dollars; each additional passenger, fifty cents; north of Fifty-ninth street, each additional mile shall be charged for at a rate not to exceed fifty cents per mile.

7. Every owner or driver of any hackney coach or cab shall carry on his coach or cab one piece of baggage, not exceeding fifty pounds in weight without extra charge; but for any additional baggage he may carry he shall be entitled to extra compensation at the rate of twenty-five cents per piece.

So that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 89. The price or rates of fare to be asked or demanded by the owners or drivers of hackney coaches or cabs shall be as follows:

"CABS."

1. For conveying one or more persons any distance, sums not exceeding the following amounts: Fifty cents for the first mile or part thereof; and each additional half mile or part thereof, twenty-five cents. By distance, for "stops" of over five minutes and not exceeding fifteen minutes, twenty-five cents. For longer stops, the rate will be twenty-five cents for every fifteen minutes or fraction thereof, if more than five minutes. For a brief stop, not exceeding five minutes in a single trip, there will be no charge.

2. For the use of a cab, by the hour, with the privilege of going from place to place and stopping as often and long as may be required, one dollar for the first hour or part thereof, and for each succeeding half hour or part thereof, fifty cents.

"COACHES."

3. For conveying one or more persons any distance, sums not exceeding the following amounts: One dollar for the first mile or part thereof; and each additional half mile or part thereof, forty cents. By distance for "stops" of over five minutes and not exceeding fifteen minutes, thirty-eight cents. For longer stops the rate will be thirty-eight cents for every fifteen minutes. For a brief stop, not exceeding five minutes in a single trip, there will be no charge.

4. For the use of a coach, by the hour, with privilege of going from place to place and stopping as often and long as may be required, one dollar and fifty cents for the first hour or part thereof, and for each succeeding half hour or part thereof, seventy-five cents.

5. No cab or coach shall be driven by the time rate at a pace less than five miles an hour.

6. From "line balls," one or two passengers, to any point south of Fifty-ninth street, two dollars; each additional passenger, fifty cents; north of Fifty-ninth street each additional mile shall be charged for at a rate not to exceed fifty cents per mile.

7. Every owner or driver of any hackney coach or cab shall carry on his coach or cab one piece of baggage, not to exceed fifty pounds in weight without extra charge; but for any additional baggage he may carry, he shall be entitled to extra compensation at the rate of twenty-five cents per piece.

Resolved, That section 96 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be and the same hereby is repealed.

Resolved, That section 100 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 be amended by striking out the words "sections 74 to 79, both inclusive," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "section 89," and by adding at the end thereof the following:

"It shall be the duty of the driver of every such hackney coach or cab, at the commencement of his employment, to present the passenger employing him with a printed card or slip containing, in case of cabs, subdivisions 1 and 2, and in case of coaches, subdivisions 3 and 4 of section 89 of this article."

So that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 100. There shall be fixed in each hackney coach or cab, in such a manner as can be conveniently read by any person riding in the same, a card containing the name of the owner of said carriage, the number of his license, and the whole of section 89 of this article, printed in plain, legible characters, under a penalty of revocation of license for violation thereof, said section to be provided by the License Bureau in pamphlet or card form, and to be furnished free to the owner of such hackney coach or cab.

It shall be the duty of the driver of every such hackney coach or cab, at the commencement of his employment, to present the passenger employing him with a printed card or slip containing, in case of cabs, subdivisions 1 and 2, and in case of coaches, subdivisions 3 and 4 of section 89 of this article.

**APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE** heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
