



DAILY MEETINGS, July 26 to 31, 1875.

Present—Commissioners Bailey, Brennan, and Cox.

Communications Received.

From Penitentiary—Reporting escape of nine prisoners from steamboat Minnahanonck; five retaken. Ordered that guard-boat be kept in tow, and guard to remain in it and not to leave his boat under any consideration until prisoners are locked up; quarters, fore and aft, to be examined before and after each trip; search for the prisoners not to be given up.

From Lunatic Asylum—History of eleven patients received during week ending July 24, 1875. Referred to Examining Clerk.

From New York City Asylum for Insane—Reporting history of seven patients received during week ending July 24, 1875. Referred to Examining Clerk.

Resolutions.

Ordered, That the Storekeeper have woolen rags washed and prepared to be made into rag-carpet, and cotton rags made into patch-work for bed-quilts, by inmates of Alms-house. July 26, 1875.

Adopted July 30, 1875.
