Resolution was adopted as follows:

Resolved, That the survey, map or plan made by Francis W. Ford, City Surveyor, under the direction of this Board, of the following described lands and premises selected as a site for buildings for the use of the Fire Department of the City of New York, pursuant to the resolution heretofore adopted in relation thereto, to wit, all those two certain lots, pieces or parcels of land, situate, lying and being in the Second Ward of the City of New York, and bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Maiden Lane, opposite the centre of a party wall, which point is distant one hundred and seventy-eight feet ten inches easterly from the intersection of the easterly side of William street with the northerly side of Maiden Lane; running thence northerly and through the centre of said party wall eighty-nine feet five inches; thence westerly thirteen feet five inches to a point distant eighty-five feet one and a half inches northerly from the said northerly side of Maiden Lane; thence southerly and at right angles to the last course four inches; thence westerly sixteen feet eight inches; thence southerly two feet ten inches; thence westerly one foot two inches to the centre of a certain party wall; thence southerly and through the centre of said party wall five feet; thence westerly two inches to the centre of another party wall; thence southerly and through the centre of the last mentioned party wall seventy-two feet five inches to the northerly side of Maiden Lane; and thence easterly and along the said northerly side of Maiden Lane thirty-four feet two inches to the point or place of beginning, be and the same is hereby approved by this Board; that such approval thereof be attested by the signature of the President of the Board subscribed thereon; and that the same be filed in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 151 of the Laws of 1894, and that four copies of the said survey, map or plan be made and attested in like manner, and that the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby authorized and requested to take such proceedings as may be necessary or proper for the acquisition of the said site, under and in pursuance of said act and all other statutes in such cases made and provided.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property

benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the paving, repaving or repairs.

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street), Fifth avenue (Washington place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).
