GENTLEMEN—On the 1st day of November next bonds issued by the County of Kings, payable from taxation, amounting to thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), become due.

As no appropriation was made therefor in the budget of the late City of Brooklyn, it becomes necessary to provide for the payment thereof.

The amount required for this purpose can be transferred from the appropriation made by this Board for "Interest on Bonds and Stock to be issued in 1898," which exceeds the amount now ascertained to be necessary for such purpose, to the appropriation for the "Redemption of the City Debt."

I therefore submit herewith a resolution to effect such transfer.

To the Board of Estimate and Appportionment:

SIRS—I am in receipt of a communication from Mr. Charles V. Ade, Clerk of your Board, bearing date October 12, stating that he is directed by you to request my opinion as to the power of the Board to appropriate to the College of The City of New York for the year 1899 the sum of \$175,000 asked for by said college, or any sum in excess thereof.

The power to appropriate to the College of The City of New York is found in section 1131 of the Charter, which provides, among other things:

"Section 1131. It shall be the duty of the trustees of said college, annually, on or before the 1st day of September, to report to the board of estimate and appportionment such sum, not exceeding one hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars in any one year, as they may require for the payment of the salaries of the professors and officers of said college; for obtaining and furnishing scientific apparatus, books for the students and all other necessary supplies therefor; for repairing and altering the college buildings; and for the support, maintenance and general expenses of said college."

The Board of Estimate and Appportionment is then authorized to raise the amount appropriated by them by taxation, and it is then further provided in the section:

"Upon the recommendation of the trustees, the board of estimate and appportionment and the municipal assembly may increase, from time to time, the amount annually to be raised in the tax levy for the maintenance of the college of The City of New York."

The fair inference from the language quoted is, that the amount which may be raised, under the latter portion of the section quoted, is in addition to the sum specified, namely, "not exceeding \$175,000," mentioned in the first part of the section, and therefore the Board of Estimate and Appportionment has power, in its discretion, to appropriate such sum as it may deem expedient, even though it be in excess of the \$175,000 mentioned.

This law authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to provide for these expenses either by including the same in the budget or by issuing special revenue bonds for that purpose. It has always been the practice to authorize the issue of revenue bonds for the payment of these expenses, and I recommend that this plan be followed for the ensuing year.

I also have to request that authority be granted for the issue of revenue bonds to the amount of twenty-five thousand dollars for the work of re-indexing in the Bureau of Arrears, under the provisions of the same act. Mr. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

Sir—Your communication, dated September 13, 1898, is received.

You transmit therewith an audited voucher for \$84, for advertising notices of Commissioners of Jurors of Kings County, in favor of the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle"; also communications from the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" to the Auditor of the Borough of Brooklyn, refusing to accept the warrant for \$84, as drawn against their contract (No. 214) with The City of New York, for publication of notices and advertisements required by the Greater New York Charter to be published in it as a Corporation Newspaper.

The "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" claims that this advertisement is not included in their contract, No. 214, aforesaid, but is required by section 1136 of the Code of Civil Procedure.

You also transmit a communication from the Auditor of the Borough of Brooklyn to you in regard to the matter, dated September 12, 1898.

The Auditor of the Borough of Brooklyn in his communication to you asks whether payment should be made from the appropriation for corporation advertising or, if not, out of what account should the payment be made, stating that, if the contention of the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" should be correct, he does not know what account to draw the warrant against, as the Commissioner of Jurors' office has only an appropriation for salaries.

I have examined the contract, No. 214, which provides as follows:

"The party of the first part hereto" (i.e., The Brooklyn Daily Eagle) "doth hereby promise and agree to publish in the newspaper called 'The Brooklyn Daily Eagle,' all notices and advertisements required by the Greater New York Charter to be published in it as a 'Corporation Newspaper'."

Under this contract the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" is only required to publish the notices and advertisements required by the Greater New York Charter to be published in it as a "Corporation Newspaper".

The advertisement in question is required by section 1136 of the Code of Civil Procedure, and it is to be paid for as provided in section 1134 of the Code, which provides as follows:

"The board of supervisors of the county must provide suitable rooms and other accommodations for the use of the commissioner of jurors, and also for the compensation of his assistants, clerks and messengers, and for necessary printing and advertising, books, stationery and other articles required for the convenient discharge of his duties."

By chapter 380 of the Laws of 1897, the only powers left in the Board of Supervisors is practically to act as a Board of County Canvassers.

By section 1386 of The Greater New York Charter "all powers of local legislation and administration in the counties of New York, Kings and Richmond which are not, at the time of the taking effect of this act, vested in boards of supervisors of said counties" (being chapter 380, those quoted) "or which are not vested in other county officers required by the constitution of the state to be maintained in said three counties, respectively, are hereby vested in the municipal assembly of The City of New York, as constituted by this act, except where otherwise vested by this act in administrative departments or officers of said city."

By section 1583 of The Greater New York Charter it is provided as follows:

"All county charges and expenses and salaries of county officers in said counties" (i.e., New York, Kings and Richmond) "and each of them shall be audited by The City of New York, in the same manner as the salaries of city officers and city charges are paid; but nothing in this section contained shall be construed as in any way changing or modifying the provision contained in section 902 of this act, to the effect that the sums necessary to defray the salaries of county officers and to pay county charges and expenses in said counties shall be levied and assessed upon the property of said three counties, respectively, so that each shall ultimately bear and pay all its own county charges."

Section 902 of the Charter provides how county charges and expenses in New York, Kings and Richmond Counties, and that part of Queens County within the City, are to be paid, and further provides:

"To the end that each of said counties and said part of Queens county shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county or part of county, for county purposes distinguished from city purposes."

You ask me to advise you whether, in my opinion, the position taken by the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" is correct, or whether you should sustain the position taken by the Auditor of the Borough of Brooklyn.

In my opinion, the position taken by the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" is correct and you cannot sustain the position taken by the Auditor of the Borough of Brooklyn.

GENTLEMEN.—The Commissioner of Water Supply in a communication to this Board dated October 12, 1898, referred to the Comptroller on October 12, 1898, requests that bonds be authorized to replenish the Croton Water Fund, the balance of which is now practically exhausted.

The purposes for which it is proposed to expend this money are stated in the communication of the Commissioner of Water Supply. I cannot agree, however, that so large an amount is needed at the present time. I believe that the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) will be sufficient to enable the Commissioner of Water Supply to continue the improvements to the Croton water system covered by the Croton Water Fund up to January 1, 1900. A resolution to authorize that amount of bonds is herewith submitted. These bonds being issued for the purpose of water supply, are not within the limitation of the constitution regarding municipal indebtedness.

In the city of New York as formerly constituted it was customary for the Comptroller to present to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at the same time that the Departmental Estimate was submitted, statements showing the amounts required for redemption of and for the payment of interest on bonds, amounts required for annual installments for Sinking Fund purposes for State Taxes, and for rents of premises not provided for in departmental appropriations.

In former years, however, the bond statements presented for consideration in the provisional estimate were less largely conventional or formal, owing to the fact that these statements (made up to August 1st), could, if necessary, lay no claim to accuracy in regard to the amount of special revenue bonds to be issued between that date and the close of the year. The really important bond statements were always presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in manuscript at the close of the hearing of the Final Estimate during the last few days of December in each year.

Under the provisions of the greater New York Charter, however, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment only makes an estimate, and that during the month of October. An element of uncertainty or of guess-work is therefore introduced into the preparation of the bond statements which cannot be avoided. To reduce these elements of uncertainty as much as possible, and with the view of preparing bond estimates which shall be as nearly as possible accurate, I will present these statements toward the end of the month of October, just prior to the date when the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is required to transmit their estimate to the Municipal Assembly.

The new positions included in this salary list might as well have been filled during the present year and would have been less for the inadequacy of the appropriation allowed, \$22,500 less than the amount asked for in my Departmental Estimate for 1898.

The present engineer staff is entirely inadequate, especially because of the necessity of furnishing estimates of proposed works in local boards and to the Board of Public Improvement, as required by the Charter, which provides that improvements involving assessments for benefit shall not be authorized until detailed estimates of the cost thereof shall have been submitted to the Board of Public Improvement, with the assessed value from the latest tax-roll of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment. The work of making the preliminary surveys on which these estimates are based is constantly increasing. Most of the money expended for this class of work is included in the assessment lists themselves, and in this way is returned to the City.

The services of the three assistant engineers provided for are absolutely necessary. This year the Department has been seriously embarrassed by lack of appropriation to pay for a full corps of engineers. The number of large public improvements about to be undertaken and others in contemplation for execution next year render imperative the services of the additional engineers included in the estimate. Unless the full estimate for engineering be allowed, the Department will not be able to promptly furnish plans and estimates of proposed improvements, nor will it be in a position to have such works thoroughly supervised and inspected while in progress.

The engineer included in the new appointment is required for the Borough of Manhattan. In each of the other boroughs there is an engineer. The necessity for the services of one in Manhattan is certainly as great as in any of the other boroughs.

At present the Department has no regular bookkeeper and urgently needs one.

The services of an assistant contract clerk and of an auditing clerk are also needed.

There are now no stenographers employed in this Department chargeable to the appropriation for "Salaries—General Administration." The two stenographers and typewriters provided for in the estimate are absolutely necessary.

The total of the present salary roll being \$14,675 necessitates the explanation that while this amount is \$1,225 in excess of the sum of \$13,450 allowed for 1898, there will not be a deficiency in this account, inasmuch as two of the seven Inspectors included under this head were not appointed until August 1, and therefore will receive only five months' salary during the year.

In addition to this amount there is included in the estimate \$20,000 for maintaining 107,584 square yards of asphalt pavements upon which the periods of guarantee of maintenance have already expired or are about to expire, and the same amount for restoring an estimated area of 9,000 square yards of asphalt pavement which will be burnt out by bonfires. This is a conservative estimate, based on the actual number of square yards of asphalt destroyed by bonfires during the past year.

The balance of the estimated amount (\$350,000) is needed for repairing and maintaining granite, trap-block and Belgian block pavements, of which there are about 250.97 miles.

During the present year lack of appropriation has prevented this Department from complying with numerous requests for the repairing of streets which are greatly in need of improvement, and it is estimated that the amount of this appropriation will be needed to replace old and defective pavements with new ones in 1899.

Of this estimate \$1,713,781 is required to repave with asphalt 45 streets, or parts of streets, that have been recommended to the Board of Public Improvements by local boards of various districts, acting upon petitions presented by property-owners and residents of those streets. An examination of the streets has been made, and it is found necessary to repair them. The work cannot be done unless the estimated amount of appropriation is allowed. Heretofore the extensive repaving of the streets of the city has been accomplished by means of the proceeds of bonds, the issuance of which was authorized by acts of the Legislature. Instead of this method of raising the funds necessary for this purpose, this appropriation, based on recorded petitions and actual official estimates, is asked.

I may add that on several of the streets, for the repaving of which provision is made in this estimate, there are public schools, thus increasing the necessity of laying asphalt pavements to lessen the noise of traffic, which at present is a severe strain on the nerves of both teachers and pupils.

The 300 tons of coal included in this estimate is required for blacksmith's work and for the operation of 16 road rollers.

The three carriages provided for are needed to replace carriages worn out in the service, and which could not be repaired at a cost under fifty per cent. of their original value.

The Department has only one stone truck at present. The two additional trucks included in the estimate are necessary to meet the requirements of the service.

The 6 additional sprinkling-trucks are needed to enable the Department to sprinkle all the macadamized roads east of the Bronx river. With the 8 sprinkling-trucks now available for that district, the Department is able to sprinkle only a little more than one-half the mileage of macadamized roads in that locality.

There are at present in use 6 sheet-iron carts, 1 for each paving gang. It is proposed to increase the number of paving gangs from 6 to 20, hence 14 additional sheet-iron carts are urgently required.

There is but one portable tar-kettle available for use at the present time, and that one is of an unsatisfactory type. The 4 new and improved ones included in the estimate are necessary.

The 2,500 cubic yards of clean boiler ashes, estimated to cost \$1,875, are necessary for use in leveling sidewalks where streets are not regulated and graded.

The 50,000 cubic yards of broken stone and screenings provided for are needed to macadamize roads and to repair existing macadam pavements.

In explanation of the item of \$1,920 for water for sprinkling-trucks east of the Bronx river, it may be stated that it is proposed to have 14 sprinkling-trucks employed in that district. These, with 2 sprinkling-trucks with steam road-rollers, make 16 in all. The necessary supply of water for these trucks will cost \$20 each per month for a period of six months. The water will be obtained from the New York and Westchester Water Company for use in the district east of the Bronx river, and the rate of \$20 per month is the same as that now being paid for a supply of water for each sprinkling-truck.

involving an assessment for benefit shall be authorized until a detailed estimate of the cost thereof shall have been submitted to the Board of Public Improvements, with the assessed value, from the latest tax roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment. From the same account there must also be paid the expense of making preliminary surveys, estimates, plans and specifications for contracts after improvements are authorized by the Municipal Assembly. Heretofore no survey or estimate has been required before the passing of an ordinance, and the cost of the preliminary work necessary is now greatly increased by the necessity of making surveys and preparing estimates of improvement works in advance of the adoption of ordinances thereto. Most of the expense of preliminary surveys and estimates is charged against the work after it is under construction and is included in the assessment thereto. In this way the money expended is returned to the City Treasury.

The item of \$1,300 for the purchase of surveying instruments and apparatus, and for making necessary repairs thereto, is required and ought to be appropriated.

The purpose for which this appropriation is needed is to enable the Department to ascertain the character of subsurface material where improvements are to be made, so that accurate estimates of the kinds of material to be excavated may be made in advance of the letting of contracts. The custom of determining, in advance of the awarding of a contract, the quantity of rock, earth or other material to be excavated, has to a large measure stopped the notorious practice of presenting unbalanced bids for contracts. In making surveys in the surveying sections of the Borough of The Bronx, it is necessary to establish definite official bench marks, giving accurately the elevation above high water on fixed points, so that the whole system of street improvements within the Borough, when completed, will conform to a uniform datum. The necessity of this appropriation to grade and improve the Grand Boulevard and Concourse is imperative.

On May 20, 1898, the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted a resolution recommending to the Board of Public Improvements and to the Municipal Assembly that immediate action be taken toward presenting an appropriation sufficient to grade and make payable the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, which was laid out on the map system of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fifth Wards under special legislative authority, and with the implied understanding that the actual work of construction would be commenced as soon as the City had acquired title to the necessary land.

It has been estimated that the rough grading of the Concourse for its entire length and width to the sidewalk lines and grades would cost about \$1,000,000. I have set this estimate down to \$800,000, and if this amount is allowed I will immediately take steps to have the Concourse graded, first beginning with those sections which are due, on account of the presence of colonial buildings which have been removed from the lines of the street. The money expended in constructing the Grand Boulevard and Concourse will be a paying investment to the City, measured as it will open up about five miles of valuable frontage which will yield increased taxes.

Since 1895, \$600,000 has been raised by the issue of bonds, under authority of special acts of the Legislature, for repairing streets and avenues in the part of the city now known as the Borough of The Bronx. The estimate of \$200,000 for this purpose is made in conformity with section 240 of the City Charter, which provides that the Board of Estimate and Appropriation shall annually include in its final estimate such sum as shall be included in the estimate of the Department of Highways, to be expended in repairing or resurfacing such streets, roads, avenues and public places as shall be certified to the Municipal Assembly by the Commissioners of Highways as required to be repaired for the safety, health or convenience of the public, and as said Assembly shall by ordinance or resolution direct.

At least \$100,000 is necessary to repair streets or parts of streets on which public schools and hospitals are located.

In the general repaving, One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Streets are included. The improvement of these streets is most urgently needed. Petitions for the repaving of many other streets are on file. An appropriation twice as large as the amount estimated could be advantageously expended. The sum estimated will not be more than sufficient to pay for repaving streets which are in absolute need of improvement, and of which there are at least four miles.

The Deputy Commissioner of Highways for the Borough of Brooklyn states that the salary amount is as small as it can be made. The services of the 2 additional Assistant Engineers, 1 Leveller, 2 Rodmen and 4 Clerks included in the list are absolutely necessary, the present engineering and clerical force being inadequate.

The \$1,000 Clerk included in the new appointments is to fill a vacancy caused by the recent discharge of a Clerk whose place has not yet been filled.

Comparing the amount of the present pay-roll (\$65,838) with the sum of \$77,838 shows a difference of \$2,000. This is accounted for by the fact that the Inspectors of Incumbrances and several of the other officers included in the list were appointed on dates between February and July, thus receiving pay for only a part of a year.

This amount is needed to make repairs to stone pavements, many of which are in dangerous condition, especially the cobble-stone pavement, which must be made safe and passable until it can be replaced by paving of new and improved material.

The item of \$20,000 for maintaining asphalt pavements not under guarantee of maintenance is less than the amount of the contract made for the present year.

The macadamized roads in the Borough of Brooklyn are very much used, and most of them are in fair condition, but they cannot be so maintained without the estimated appropriation.

The sprinkling will add to the durability of the roadways and is necessary to make them tolerably comfortable to drive on in dry weather.

There being 62 miles of macadamized streets and about 140 miles of dirt roads to be cared for by this Department, the amount of the estimate is as low as it can be made.

Setting and resetting curbs, gutters and crosswalks.

In the late City of Brooklyn a sum varying from \$25,000 to \$30,000 was annually set aside for setting and resetting curbs and improving gutters and crosswalks. There being no allowance for this purpose during the present year, many repairs which were originally needed could not be made. It is especially necessary to renew crosswalks on important thoroughfares, and the money asked for can be well spent.

Removal of Incumbrances.

A Bureau of Incumbrances has been organized in the Borough of Brooklyn, and a vast amount of work awaits performance. This estimate of \$10,000 will be necessary to remove obstructions from public streets and sidewalks.

Flagging and fencing in front of City property.

This amount is required to keep in repair the sidewalks in front of public buildings, and to fence storage and repair yards, also other property owned by the City.

Surveying Instruments and Engineering Materials.

A new transit and level will be required. To pay for these and for rods, tape line stakes, and other small supplies, \$1,200 is necessary.

(Section 250 of the City Charter.)

Wherefore the extensive repairing of streets has been paid for by the proceeds of trust. Section 250 of the Charter provides that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall include in its trust funds and a sum for repairing streets and avenues as shall be included in the estimate of the Department of Highways.

On the number of the estimate \$100,000 will be required for repairing Bedford Avenue with asphalt. \$75,000 is needed to repair the surface of existing granite or macadamized pavements on Bedford Avenue; \$25,000 should be expended in replacing asphaltic pavements with asphalt in districts in which the sanitary condition is bad.

These items amount to \$25,000, leaving only \$75,000 for the estimated amount for repairing streets, or paved streets, in which it is found that asphaltic pavements are bad. For this work there is the estimate of the Department of Highways, December 1888, recently submitted an estimate of \$107,000. At all events, apparent that with fair wages it will be impossible to do more than repair with asphalt a few of the older streets, or wash the present pavement and repave.

There are two miles of asphaltic pavements in the Borough of Brooklyn, which ought to be repaired with new and improved asphalt if funds could be obtained to meet the expense.

It has been suggested that it would cost about \$100,000 to put all the asphalt in the Borough of Brooklyn in good condition. Compared with this sum, the estimate submitted for repairing streets and avenues in Brooklyn is \$100,000 a very much sum.

The extent of areas where the population is dense and the sanitary conditions are bad, is imperatively necessary to lay new pavements.

In streets where traffic is very heavy, damage is daily being caused to vehicles by the blunt edge of the old asphaltic pavements, and claims are likely to be made against the City for such damage.

The removal of certain parts of Bedford Avenue, which was paved many years ago with asphalt, it is said that repair to the present pavement cost \$100 per square yard per annum. To continue this expenditure would be an unwarrented waste of public money, as it would be much more economical and beneficial to replace the asphaltic pavement with new.

In this ward there are 107½ miles of streets to be repaired, cleaned and maintained from this appropriation. Of macadamized roads there are 20 miles of paved streets, 7½ miles of dirt roads or unpaved streets, 20 miles of macadamized county roads, 3 miles, total, 91.50 miles. 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It may be stated in brief that the work of the Department of Highways in the Borough of Queens during the coming year will comprise the repairing, surfacing, cleaning and sprinkling of 503 miles of macadamized roads and streets; the repairing of 44½ miles of paved streets, and the thorough and repairing of 29½ miles of dirt roads and streets, and the cleaning, mowing and repairing of culverts, including the inspection and supervision necessary for the proper maintenance of sidewalks and the removal of manholes.

The items included in the estimate for "Labor, Maintenance and Supplies" have been prepared after the most careful and economical calculation, and, in view because the amount asked for is certainly needed to maintain and keep in proper condition the 850 miles of roads and streets in the Borough of Queens.

The estimate for the laboring force is based upon an average of 200 working days for the year, and as the Borough of Queens is the largest of the five boroughs of the city, and as many of the streets are in wretched condition on account of lack of proper care in consequence of the inadequate appropriation allowed for 1898, the Deputy Commissioner of Highways for the Borough of Queens urges and requests that all the amounts included in the estimate for "Labor, Maintenance and Supplies" be allowed in full, in order to enable him to put and keep the roads and streets in his borough in fair condition.

In the estimate provision is made for an expenditure of about \$200,000 in cleaning and maintaining about 100 miles of macadamized country roads, which are expected to come under the jurisdiction of the Department of Highways for the year 1899, and county roads having been cared for this year by the Board of Supervisors of Queens County.

At present the laborers employed by the Department of Highways in the Borough of Richmond receive only \$1.00 for 10 hours' work. On or before the 1st January, 1899, the rate of pay for 10 hours' work will undoubtedly have to be paid, and provision for the increase is made in the estimate.

With \$1 more instead of 10 hours' labor per day, a large number of men will be required to perform the necessary work, and the labor payroll will thus be considerably increased.

The appropriation allowed for the present, year being incomplete, is less than sufficient to maintain in good condition the macadam roadways in the Borough of Richmond, and consequently in need of general repair, which cannot be made until the appropriation for 1899 shall become available. If the full amount asked for the maintenance of the macadam streets and roads is not allowed, the money already expended in repairing these surfaces will do no productive or no benefit to the community which would result if the necessary repairs were allowed.

Moreover, new and improved tools are being procured by the Department from contractors, and additional expenditures for operating these newly improved articles become necessary. It is important economy to properly and systematically maintain these roads. If the work is neglected, it will cost no small amount to repair in case of emergency to maintain the macadam pavements in good condition.

It ought to be noted that the work of clearing all the streets in the Borough of Richmond is performed by the Department of Highways, including the removal of snow, ice, cones and culverts, as well as clearing streets of snow for vehicular traffic when absolutely necessary. No provision for this most important work was made in the appropriation for 1898.

Great care has been exercised in the preparation of the estimate, and it forms doubtless item included therein strict economy has been kept in view.

In addition to the usual appropriations, I respectfully submit that an appropriation be made for the above purpose.

The Department in this borough has let no contracts and constructed no sewers during the recent year, except such as had been previously provided for. It has now, on account of petitions from property-owners, health authorities and its own views of the necessity of the case, planned sewer work to cost over \$300,000, all of which should have been constructed this year. It is in continuous receipt of petitions and requests for work of this kind.

As the legal difficulties concerning the Street Improvement Fund have not yet been removed to the extent of enabling bonds to be issued, I set no other resource at present except in direct appropriation.

The funds thus expended are returnable to the City again by assessment upon the property benefited, so that the City at large is not a loser in the end by making such an appropriation.

It is not necessary to go into any argument to show the necessity of this kind of work. Next to the water supply the sewer system is the most important of all the works under the City Government. No property can be utilized without drainage, any more than it could be utilized without water supply. This appropriation is urgently needed.

The works that we have designed have been presented to the various boards entitled to pass upon them, and have received the approval of all, so far as they have gone, and will shortly be in a position to be contracted for, provided the funds are available. I submit list under schedule, with estimated cost.

Under the head of Salaries, the amount of money for work, set aside by the Board of Estimate and Appportionment for the year 1898, was salaries, including one-third salary of Deputy Commissioner and Chief Engineer, \$10,000.67. The amount asked for the year 1899 is \$10,786.67, making an increase of \$800. The necessity of this increase was found, by the experience of this year, to be absolutely necessary so far as the additional expenditure of \$800 was concerned, in view of the fact that the work could not be properly performed with less than three inspectors. Under the head of Sewers, Repairing and Cleaning, the amount set aside by the Board of Estimate and Appportionment for the year 1898 was \$8,000. The amount asked for the year 1899 is \$10,786.67. This increase is asked for the purpose of paying to certain, the Staten Island Water Supply Company in this borough, who supply water to the public through automatic flush tanks for the purpose of cleaning and sweeping.

In the preparation of the estimate for the year 1898 this item was not asked for through error. The Water Company have, as yet, presented no bill, nor do I know that they intend to. The condition of the bridge over the Moat Haven Canal at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street has become so serious that it will be necessary to erect a temporary structure to carry the traffic. The widening of the street and the raising of the grade three feet above the present surface of the bridge, have made the need of a new structure most urgent. I request for the purpose of making the extraordinary repairs needed, the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, unless the appropriation is made for building a new structure as hereinbefore requested.				
Some radical repairs will be needed on the Cromwell's Creek Bridge at One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street; the Tremont Avenue Bridge over the Bronx river, and the Unionport draw-bridge over Westchester creek, the expense of which is included in the sum of \$7,400.				
There are no available funds for preliminary work, such as surveys, plans, soundings, borings, etc. The need of an appropriation for such purpose is so evident that I urge that part of the salaries of the Engineer Corps be paid out of an appropriation for preliminary surveys, as has been the custom in the Department of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, which this Department succeeds. I therefore ask for this purpose the appropriation of thirty-three hundred and eighty dollars, which is one-third the salary list.				
The Engineering Corps is entirely without instruments, tools, and other working materials, the work being carried on with instruments borrowed from the Department of Highways. I ask for the purpose of buying the needed instruments, tools and engineering supplies the appropriation of ten hundred and fifty dollars.

DEAR SIR.—In compliance with section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, and with the resolution adopted by your Board on July 1, as communicated in the circular letter of July 21, from the Comptroller, I have the honor to present the following estimate of the amounts required to conduct the public business of the Department of Water Supply for the year 1898.

For proper classification the appropriations called for in this estimate are divided as follows: First—An appropriation for wages of the working force, including Foremen, Mechanics, Laborers, Watchmen, Firemen, teams or trucks, horses and carts, etc.; for work done and materials furnished under contracts, made by public competition and awards to the lowest bidders, and for services, materials, and supplies furnished in small quantities without public letting, but in every practicable case on competitive bids obtained from reputable and responsible parties in the respective lines of business.

Second—Appropriation for the salaries of the permanent officers, Engineers, Engineers' Assistants, Clerks, Inspectors, etc., employed in the several branches of the Department.

Section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1892 has heretofore limited the expenditure from annual appropriations for laying additional water-mains to extend the water-service into new streets to \$250,000, including the salary account, the estimate for which follows below. It is probable that the limitation still exists under the Greater New York Charter, and it is certain that the demands for extension of the water mains, particularly in the Borough of The Bronx, during 1898 will exceed that limit of appropriation. Therefore, anticipate no limitation on the part of your Board to allow the full amount of this estimate.

The entire appropriation is to be expended, and has always been expended, under contracts for furnishing and laying water-mains, which are made by public competition, letting and awards to the lowest bidders, and under authority of resolutions and ordinances passed from time to time by the Board of Public Improvements and the Municipal Assembly.

Chapter 410 of the Laws of 1894 provided for the issue of fire-hydrants each to the amount of \$50,000 for each of the years 1894 to 1898, inclusive, to be expended in the acquisition of hydrants and their connections with water-mains where called for by the Fire Department.

This issue of stock was authorized, made and expended each year, except the current year, 1898. The legislative authority for is again with this year. There is urgent necessity for about large double-nipple fire-hydrants for adequate protection from fire south of Forty-second street, where large business buildings are taking the place of private dwellings, and north of Forty-second street, where small dwelling houses are replaced by large apartment houses and hotels. The new large hydrants are also needed in accomodating the increased size and power of the fire engines. The average cost of furnishing and placing one of the large size hydrants and connecting it with the distributing main, is \$175. The above estimate of \$25,000, therefore, provides for 143 additional hydrants to be placed during the ensuing year.

There are now 281 public drinking hydrants for man and horse water the charge of the Department in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. They serve a very useful and humane purpose, and demands for the erection of additional hydrants or fountains are very frequent and urgent, especially in the Borough of The Bronx and the upper end of Manhattan Island, where large suburban districts are being rapidly populated and changed to an urban character, with all the accompanying demands for the public necessities and conveniences which they provide for its older and densely populated sections. The appropriation for public drinking hydrants has, however, been kept at the low figure of \$1,000 for more than ten years past, and has been barely adequate for the repairs and maintenance of existing hydrants and fountains. During that period all applications for the erection of additional hydrants had to be denied for want of appropriation. For the ensuing year, 1898, the repair will require at least \$2,500, and in the above estimate it is proposed to allow \$2,500 for the erection of about 100 additional drinking hydrants in locations where they are most urgently needed.

The labor and materials required for the repairs and maintenance of the entire system for distributing the water supply from the Croton, Bronx and Byram rivers have to be provided for from this appropriation. The system now includes 830 miles of distributing mains, 2,300 stop-cocks and 11,000 fire-hydrants, through which are daily distributed 2,000,000,000 gallons of water from the Croton and 18,000,000 gallons from the Bronx and Byram rivers. The annual addition to the system average 22 miles of water-mains, and a proportionate number of stop-cocks and hydrants. The yearly addition, therefore, amounts to over two per cent of the whole, while the above estimate asks for an increase of less than one-third of one per cent in the appropriation for maintenance and repairs. The necessity of providing adequate means for the safety of this great distributing system is too self-evident to need special demonstration here. The Department must be enabled to repair all defects and leaks with the utmost promptitude, and must be prepared to meet any emergency which might endanger the health and comfort of the people through lack of adequate water supply. In recent years the labor required has been much increased by the untrained and too often unskillful and careless use of the fire-hydrants for street cleaning, and by the frequent necessity of relaying water-mains in the Borough of The Bronx, in consequence of changes of street grades.

My Departmental Estimate for 1898, presented to your Board in January last, called for \$234,400 for this appropriation, but the Board reduced the appropriation to \$210,000. The reduction of \$24,400 had to be taken out of the items of materials and supplies.

The foregoing shows that the only item of increase in the present estimate over my estimate for 1898 is \$2,000 for resurfacing pavements over street openings, which is rendered necessary by the extension of asphalt pavements, the restoration of which is more expensive than that of the old stone pavements. Adding to this the \$4,400 reduction made in the appropriation for 1898 from my Departmental Estimate, makes the difference or increase of \$7,400 in the present estimate over the appropriation for 1898.

In July last your Board made an appropriation of \$5,333.53 for salaries for inspection of hydrant service by private companies, for the remaining five months of the year, which is at the rate of \$8,000 a year, including seven Inspectors at \$1,000 each, and \$1,000 for their traveling expenses. From the foregoing it will be seen that, while the nominal increase of the estimate for 1899 is \$20,730, the actual increase is only that for 12 additional Inspectors of Meters, amounting to \$16,000. The services of these additional Inspectors will be greatly needed during the ensuing year; first for the purpose of making a complete survey of houses throughout the Borough of Brooklyn, where no survey has been made for eight or ten years past; and it is believed that in consequence thereof a large number of houses are now not properly classified and are not charged the full water-rent according to their dimensions and occupancy; and 2d, to carry out the intention and purpose of placing a large number of additional stethometers to buildings occupied for business purposes. Both of these objects will effect a large increase in the water revenue, and it is therefore very desirable that the full amount of the above estimate shall be appropriated.

The system of distributing mains in the First and Third Wards of the Borough of Queens, comprising Long Island City and the former villages of Flushing, College Point and Whitestone, now includes 140.73 miles of water-mains, ranging in sizes from 4 inches to 16 inches, with 454 stop-cocks and 600 fire-hydrants. This entire system has to be maintained in effective condition from the above appropriation, and in consequence of the fact that the hydrants, stop-cocks and most of the water-mains in Long Island City were placed more than twenty-four years ago and received comparatively little care prior to the present year, the cost for labor and materials in place and keep the entire system in proper order next year will be exceptionally heavy, the appropriation for the present year having been found insufficient to allow the purchase of more than a fraction of the new material required.

On May 19, 1898, this Department, under authority granted by the Board of Public Improvement, entered into a contract with the Citizens' Water Supply Company of Newtown, L. I., to furnish a daily supply of 3,000,000 gallons of water, or so much less as the Department might require, for distribution in the First Ward of the Borough of Queens,即 Long Island City, where the public water supply was entirely deficient. The contract price for this water supply is \$65 per one million gallons. Your Board appropriated the sum of \$50,000 for this purpose, the appropriation being subsequently reduced to \$25,200 by transfers to other appropriations. The supply of water under the contract began on June 1 at a moderate rate, which was gradually increased to the rate of about one million gallons per day. New applications for water supply for large manufacturing concerns have since been received, and there is a constant growth in the demand for water for domestic purposes, and to meet these demands it is necessary that an average daily supply of 2,500,000 gallons be obtained under this contract during the ensuing year, which, at the contract price, will amount to the above estimate of \$54,345.

There is urgent necessity at the moment now and in the immediate future for the better development, improvement and expansion of the water system in the First and Third Wards of the Borough of Queens (Long Island City, Flushing, Whitestone, and College Point), which is the property of the City. Additional wells should be driven to utilize the available sources of water supply and to increase the quantity of supply.

The pumping plants should be correspondingly improved and enlarged. Many miles of additional water-main should be laid to meet the circulation

Hydrant service in the Borough of Richmond is now furnished by two private water companies under existing contracts made by the former county, town and village authorities. In addition to these, a new water company is prepared to furnish hydrant service in territory not heretofore covered. The present Departmental Estimate for 1899 provides for the hydrants now supplied by the two former companies with an addition of 150 hydrants to be placed by them next year and 50 hydrants to be placed and supplied by the new company, in order to meet the demands for extension of the water service and of fire protection.

This appropriation is for postage, telegraphing, telephone service and other incidentals, and it was found inadequate during the present year. It should, therefore, be increased to \$500.

As required by the circular letter from the Comptroller, I append hereto a separate comparative statement in tabular form, showing in one column the amounts of all appropriations, including transfers, made to this Department for the year 1898, and in parallel columns the amounts of appropriations asked for in this Departmental Estimate for 1899 and the increases and decreases as compared with the appropriations for 1898.

It is not anticipated that there will be any unexpended balances in any of the appropriations for 1898 at the end of the year, except in the appropriation for "Laying Croton Pipes," in case the Municipal Assembly should continue to defer beyond the present year the passage of resolutions and ordinances presented by this Department and approved by the Board of Public Improvements, authorizing the laying of water-mains in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. The resolutions and ordinances so presented could consume the entire appropriation if passed by the Municipal Assembly. Under these circumstances, I cannot make any estimate of any probable unexpended balance at the close of the year.

The foregoing estimate is made in strict conformity with sound economy, but with a due regard to the fact that the water supply of this great city is of too great importance to the people to be jeopardized by inadequate means for its preservation and necessary extension. No other element in the City's administration has a greater or more direct influence on the welfare of the people, and failure to ask for or to provide adequate means for its maintenance would be a culpable error of judgment.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WICKLE, Chairman, Board of Estimates and Apportionment—Sir—I submit herewith my estimate of the expenses of the Department of Street Cleaning, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, for the year 1899. Amounting in the aggregate to \$5,476,088.21

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

The work of a certain few officials and employees in the Department being general in character, it would be obviously improper to charge the amount of their salaries to any particular borough. I have, therefore, set them apart in the estimate under the above heading, and respectfully request that your Board appropriate the amount separately.

MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

Experience up to the present time has confirmed my opinion, formed early in the year, that so far as these two boroughs are concerned, the estimate of my predecessor, for the year 1898, was none too large. Whatever success may have attended my administration thus far has been attained by forcing the efforts of both man and beast, and if any material reduction is made from the figures furnished herewith, it will result either in a falling off of the work or a continuance of the undue strain referred to. For your information and for possible use in future reference, I have separated the estimates for these two boroughs, but would call the attention of your Board to the fact that the business of this Department in Manhattan and The Bronx is so interwoven that I believe it will be decidedly unwise to make two distinct appropriations for the year 1899. I therefore respectfully request that the appropriation be made to cover both boroughs in common as was done for the year 1898.

BROOKLYN.

The conditions to be met in 1899 in this borough are exceptional. There exists at present a contract entered into between the old city of Brooklyn and one Jos. A. McGarry for the cleaning of streets and the collection and final disposition of ashes, street sweepings, etc. This contract was adjudged to be valid by the Corporation Counsel of the present City of New York, and work has been continued under it as before. On March 31, 1899, however, the contract will expire, after which date the system which now obtains in the Borough of Manhattan must be extended to Brooklyn, so far as this particular character of work is concerned. (See section 53 of the Greater New York Charter.) I have, therefore, made the estimate in two parts, one for three (3) months ending March 31, 1899, and another for nine (9) months ending December 31, 1899, showing the total for the year in the recapitulation. I am satisfied that the work cannot be properly done under the conditions for less than the sum asked for, and I trust that the full amount will be allowed.

QUEENS.

Here the conditions are also peculiar, although different. The work to be done will vary in parts of the borough, being dependent upon changes in population. For this and other reasons I am convinced that it would not be economical to establish and maintain a system of Department Stables, and have, therefore, prepared my estimate with the purpose of hiring horses and carts, the number of which can be added to or decreased, as may be required. The question of the final disposition of garbage in Queens is a most difficult one. I am satisfied that its only solution for the present is the use of crematories, and I have, therefore, made my estimate dependent upon the creation of four (4) of them. The inhabitants of this borough are certainly entitled to better services than I have been able to give them with the small amount of money available. I hope your Board will enable me to bring it up to a satisfactory point by allowing all that I have asked for.

that the comparisons are not fair throughout. It will be several years before the expenses of one year can be properly considered as a guide for the year to follow.

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I am unable thus early in the year to estimate what, if any, unexpended balances there will be of the 1858 appropriation. Later, I shall be glad to furnish you with the figures, if so desired. In conclusion, I beg to say that I have examined carefully every item in the estimates, and believe that every dollar will be necessary to efficient and satisfactory work.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

I herewith submit "Provisional Estimate" for the maintenance and government of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, for the year 1899.

By the provisions of sections 607, 612 and 617 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, the parks north of the Harlem river were placed under the management of the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx and for all practical purposes were constituted a separate department.

While these parks in preceding years were under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Parks, there had not been any systematic plans adopted for their management and improvement. They were placed under the control of a superintendent whose exacting and meticulous duties in the jurisdiction of the old City of New York prevented anything more than a nominal supervision of the great parks above the Harlem river.

The work of maintenance was left largely to subordinates, and the work of construction to the Engineering Department already burdened with the cares of the parks south of the Harlem.

In the years 1896 and 1897 portions of the money appropriated by various acts of the Legislature from the proceeds of bonds for the Improvement of Parks and Parkways were assigned to some of the parks and parkways, and contracts for this work were either under operation or had been awarded but not executed at the commencement of the present year.

When the present Commissioner assumed office the following parks were under the jurisdiction of the Borough of The Bronx:

When the Departmental Estimate for 1898 was finally fixed, it was the aim of the Commissioner to so regulate the expenditures as to produce the best results. The very large territory to be covered—over 4,000 acres of parks and parkways—and that both maintenance and construction were involved, made it extremely difficult to apply the comparatively small amount appropriated over this area so as to do justice to all localities.

I desire to briefly recapitulate the condition of the several parks and to designate what, in my judgment, is absolutely necessary to maintain them in good condition, with as little work of construction as is absolutely required for present conditions.

1. Pelham Bay Park,

With an area of 1,755 acres, is situated at the extreme northeast limits of The City of New York. It has a water frontage of nearly seven miles upon Pelham Bay and Long Island Sound.

But little work has been accomplished in the park beyond the ordinary work of maintenance. Its inaccessibility to visitors and its large area has prevented any extended work of improvement.

Two trolley lines have been projected, one of which will be in operation before the close of the present year.

Under the direction of the Engineer-in-Chief a topographical survey is now being made with a view to begin such improvements as can be made with the appropriation for the coming year. With cheap and rapid transit this park will attract thousands of visitors by reason of its location upon the shore of Long Island Sound. It is proposed to open such roadways and pathways as will render the water front accessible.

2. Van Cortlandt Park,

With an area of 1,132.52 acres, is situated in the extreme northwest section of the city. It contains Van Cortlandt Lake, used in the winter for skating. During the past winter about the only skating in the city was at Van Cortlandt Lake. The area of the lake is 11 acres. The houses used in the winter about the lake are in fair condition, but require considerable additions. A great deal of work has been done during the past season in clearing the grounds of underbrush, etc., but the entire eastern section of the park is in its natural state. A large amount of regulating and grading is required in the neighborhood of the Colonial Mansion. As in Pelham Bay Park, new roads and paths are required to bring prominent points of interest within easy reaching distance.

The early colonial and revolutionary history of Van Cortlandt Park attracts thousands of visitors. It is accessible both by trolley and railroad.

3. Bronx Park,

With an area of 661.00 acres, is situated at One Hundred and Eighty-second street and Southern Boulevard. The Bronx river runs through the park from the northwest to the southeast sections. By the provisions of chapter 285, Laws of 1891, the northerly section of this park was set aside for the use and occupation of the Botanical Garden. This tract comprises 250 acres.

By the provisions of chapter 433, Laws of 1895, the southerly section of Bronx Park, comprising 261 acres, was given to New York Zoological Society. The central section, comprising 150 acres, still remains under the control of the Park Department.

By the provisions of section 613, chapter 378, Laws of 1897 "It shall be the duty of the Commissioner for the Borough of The Bronx to maintain the New York botanical garden and the buildings appertaining thereto, and such other institutions or buildings, as may be established in any park, square or public place under his jurisdiction by authority of the municipal assembly."

I hereby annex the communication of the Director-in-Chief, Prof. N. L. Britton, as to the requirements of the Garden for the year 1899.

The contract for the Museum building, amounting to \$347,010, was awarded to the John H. Parker Company on December 28, 1897, and work was commenced about April 1, 1898. The work on the building has progressed rapidly, and at the present writing the interior steel frame is nearing completion.

By resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted March 24, 1897, section 6, provided, "The City of New York shall annually provide the necessary funds for the maintenance and care of the Zoological Garden" but the appropriation for the first year is not to exceed sixty thousand dollars." The said section further provided that "The said city shall also furnish the necessary supply of water, and adequate police patrol and protection, and the salaries of all persons employed directly in the service and development of the Zoological Garden shall be paid from the maintenance fund, and from such other funds as may be available for and applicable for the purpose."

The New York Zoological Society have broken ground and expect to have the buildings mentioned in its application to your Board, and under which the appropriation for \$62,000 was granted, erected, and in operation by the 1st day of June, 1899.

I herewith annex the statement and application of William T. Hornaday, Director, in relation to said appropriation.

The remaining area of 150 acres, lying between these two great enterprises, will require additional roadways, paths and other improvements. This section contains the old Lorillard Mansion, the old snuff mill, the most beautiful portion of the Bronx river, and is very attractive to the thousands of visitors who now visit the park. It is proposed to construct additional roadways and paths that will connect the north and south sections of the park.

Bronx Park is already accessible by several lines of trolley cars, and with the additional facilities proposed by the Union and People's Line of Railway, will be one of the most popular parks within the boundaries of the great City of New York. It has been no unusual circumstance to have an attendance of ten thousand at the Sunday concerts in this park.

4. Crotona Park,

Containing 154.60 acres, is situated at Fulton, Third and Arthur avenues. This park is largely patronized by visitors from the lower part of the city for the reason that it is the terminal station of the elevated railroad.

It requires a large amount of grading, new paths, additional sodding and planting of shrubbery.

5. Claremont Park,

Containing 38 acres and bounded by Teller avenue, Belmont street, Clay avenue and One Hundred and Seventieth street. In this park is situated the headquarters of the Department of The Bronx. The building and the stables of the Department have been placed in thorough repair.

This section being thickly populated and one of the largest public schools in the city fronting directly upon the park, and the park opening directly upon these two thoroughfares, make the protection of the park by a railing an absolute necessity.

The average attendance at the Sunday concerts has been eight thousand persons.

7. Cedar Park,

Covering a territory of 17.47 acres and bounded by Walton avenue, One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, Mott avenue, etc., overlooks the Harlem river. With the exception of a growth of stunted cedars, from which the park derives its name, there is but little shrubbery or shade.

It is proposed to complete new roadways and paths, to thoroughly re-grade and to commence an extensive system of tree planting.

To preserve the park it will be an absolute necessity to erect a retaining-wall along its entire western boundary (Walton avenue). This will be a work requiring a large amount of expenditure, and, as it will be of permanent character, it is proposed to ask the Legislature for a sufficient appropriation by the issue of bonds.

Smaller Parks.

Cromwell's Creek Park, area 27 acres, was created by the erection of the new Macomb's Dam or Seventh Avenue Bridge. The increased height of the new bridge left a large area of low lands that threaten to be a serious menace to the health of the community. Whether these lands should be filled by successive appropriations or whether legislative enactment should be sought and a park created is a matter for your serious consideration. This land has a frontage of 225 feet on the Harlem river and of 1,650 feet on Cromwell's creek. The estimated cost of filling, laying out, etc., for this park is \$150,000.

St. James Park—Area 11.83 acres, situated at Jerome avenue, One Hundred and Ninety-first street and Creston avenue, requires grading, new paths, sodding, etc. This is an entirely new park and little or no work has as yet been done.

Washington Bridge Park—with an area of 8.45 acres, situated at the eastern terminus of the Washington Bridge over the Harlem river, will require new fences and resodding.

There are a number of small parks—Fulton Park, at Fulton avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street; Fordham Park, at Fordham road and One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street; Poe Park, East One Hundred and Ninety-second street and Kingsbridge road, and a number of small triangular parks caused by the intersection of the several avenues throughout the territory of The Bronx, and which require refencing, in many cases regrading, resodding, etc.

Parkways.

A chain of parkways has been established connecting the three great parks—Mosholu Parkway, from Van Cortlandt to Bronx Park; Bronx and Pelham Parkway, through Bronx Park; thence to and through a portion of Pelham Bay Park. Contracts, some completed, some in process of construction, and others waiting for such appropriations as may be deemed necessary at the present time.

When completed, these parkways will furnish a most magnificent driveway, running almost across the entire northern section of the city, and easily accessible from all directions by avenues and boulevards.

Crotona Parkway connects Crotona Park with Bronx Park.

In these parks and parkways there is now in use 22,472 miles of roadway, consisting of 7,253 miles of dirt roadway, or 78,834 square yards, and 15,219 miles or 216,102 square yards of Telford macadam pavement.

It will require 6,000 cubic yards of trap-rock screening annually to keep this Telford macadam pavement in repair, and also the necessary labor, teams, etc., to distribute the trap-rock screenings and to properly do the maintenance work.

Considerable regrading will be required at points of connection and intersection. Constant rolling and sprinkling will be necessary during the greater portion of the year, and also a careful supervision at all times. In the lower parks, covering the most thickly populated section of the territory, there has been serious complaint of lack of sidewalks upon the streets and avenues forming the boundaries of these parks. It will be necessary during the coming year to lay some 4,000 linear feet of walks, either of limestone or asphalt walks, where the boundaries of the parks are continuations of streets or avenues.

Buildings.

There are fifty-five buildings, the property of the City, under the control and care of this Department. They are situated in Pelham Bay, Bronx, Van Cortlandt, St. Mary's and Claremont Parks. These buildings now bring into the treasury of the City the sum of \$8,000 rental per annum.

The houses are in very bad shape. For years past there has been no intelligent supervision, only such ordinary repairs as were actually necessary to make them tenable; in many cases the rent has been only nominal, the tenant making the repairs. The houses have been going from bad to worse. Many of them are old mansions, which if put in good repair would bring largely increased rentals.

For this purpose the sum of ten thousand dollars is required, and intelligently expended would be a profitable investment for the City.

Supplies.

When the Commissioner for the Borough of The Bronx assumed office there were hardly tools enough for the men employed, and those on hand were old and completely worn out. It was necessary that new supplies be speedily obtained, and the ordinary tools, such as shovels, spades, rakes, hoes, scythes, nails, etc., were purchased from time to time under the provision of law permitting such purchases.

Of the higher grades of labor-saving machinery there was not a single piece in the possession of the Department.

Steam rollers were borrowed from neighboring departments when not in use.

Stone was broken by the old, laborious and expensive hand method.

Sprinklers were borrowed from other departments wherever found and not in use.

The condition of the appropriation for 1898 prevented any purchase of the high-class labor-saving machinery.

The maintenance of the roadways of and connecting the parks, as well as the making of such new roads as are required, both Telford macadam and dirt roads, render large quantities of broken stone a necessity. There is an inexhaustible supply of rock in the parks, some of which is necessary for removal in the work of grading. A suitable crusher will save its cost during the first year. All our new roads already show the want of proper care to protect their surface. One steam roller is necessary; two could be used to good advantage.

At least ten new sprinkling carts will be required each year for several years to come.

Water and Drainage.

There is no system of water supply and drainage in the parks of the Borough of The Bronx. Temporary supplies of water in two of the parks, the largest being only a two-inch supply, have been made. The toilet system is the old outhouse earth closet. The only drainage is the surface system.

Frequent complaints have been made through the Board of Health as to offensive nuisances, and such temporary abatement has been made as was possible. Public Comfort Stations must be provided in all the parks.

For the purpose of establishing a water and drainage system the sum of \$25,000 is required for the coming year.

Bridges.

By a decision of the Corporation Counsel, dated August 13, 1898, Pelham Bridge, which crosses Eastchester creek, in Pelham Bay Park, is under the jurisdiction of this Department. It is part of the thoroughfare to Westchester County and eastern Connecticut, and is used by hundreds of vehicles daily.

So bad was the apparent condition of this bridge that it was first deemed advisable to ask for sufficient money to build an entirely new structure, that would meet the largely increased traffic. But when the cost was considered (\$150,000), I deemed it advisable to endeavor to put the old bridge in such repair that it would meet present necessities. This is being done at an expense of \$6,000. To maintain and keep in repair this bridge and the bridges crossing the Bronx river will require an appropriation of \$10,000.

Nurseries.

A nursery has been established in Bronx Park which already contains 20,000 plants, shrubs and young trees. Branches should be established in Pelham Bay Park and Van Cortlandt Park. From these nurseries all of the plants and trees necessary for our 4,000 acres can be furnished.

For the necessary buildings and preparation of the ground the sum of \$5,000 will be required for the coming year.

The estimates for the year 1898 for the Borough of The Bronx, practically a new Department, were entirely experimental.

The amount of \$150,000 for "Maintenance and Construction" was the estimate of the old Board, and contemplated no change of the old system.

The Commissioner for the Borough of The Bronx has endeavored in bear in mind the injunction of the Comptroller that "every item of expense not absolutely necessary should be excluded, and every item included in the estimates should be reduced to the lowest amount of expenditure consistent with efficient service, in order to secure the utmost economy in the administration of city affairs and make the burden of taxation as light as possible."

The estimate for "Maintenance and Construction" is based upon the work performed during the late spring, summer and early fall months. The number of teams and the number of men should be the minimum. When the park area of The Bronx is considered, the largest park territory of any city in the world, the entire force called for could be used to advantage in any one of the large parks for many years to come. The ordinary purposes of maintenance only have been considered with the addition of the actual work of construction for immediate use.

The large increase of our local population, together with the immense number of visitors from other sections of the city, to be largely increased by additional transit facilities, demand a fair and thorough consideration of the needs of the Department.

The Commissioner would respectfully request that the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, either collectively or individually, visit the parks north of the Harlem river, and judge personally of the necessity for a fair, just, yet economical appropriation.

DEAR SIR.—In compliance with your request I have the honor to submit, on behalf of the New York Zoological Society, detailed estimates of the expenditures that must be made in the Zoological Park during the year 1899 on account of maintenance.

It is proper that I should preface my schedule by stating, for your information, that about December the society will begin to advertise for animals with which to stock the park. The delivery of animals will begin early in February, if not before, and it is intended that by May 1 a large stock of quadrupeds, birds and reptiles shall be on hand with which to open the park. During the winter three large buildings, the bird-house, monkey-house and reptile-house will be completed, and experienced keepers and helpers will be required, as follows:

- 1 Keeper and 1 Helper for the deer, antelope and bovines.
- 1 Keeper and 1 Helper for the monkey-house.
- 1 Keeper and 1 Helper for the carnivorous animals.
- 1 Keeper and 1 Helper for the rodents.
- 1 Keeper and 1 Helper for the water birds.
- 1 Keeper and 1 Helper for the land birds.
- 1 Keeper and 1 Helper for the reptiles.

It is the intention of the Zoological Society to erect other buildings as rapidly as possible, and it is reasonably certain that the natural increase in buildings and collections, which will take place during the latter half of 1899, will make additional demands on the maintenance fund which will tax it to the utmost to meet.

Your attention is called to the fact that the Zoological Society has assumed the burden of furnishing to the city not only the entire outfit of buildings and cages for animals, but also the animals with which to fill them. It is evident that during the next two or three years the financial burdens of the society on account of the Zoological Park will be very great. For this reason the society must avail itself of the agreement made with the city authorities on March 24, 1897, which provides that "the salaries of all persons employed directly in the service and development of the Zoological Garden shall be paid from the maintenance fund, and from such other funds as may be available for and applicable to the purpose." The subjoined schedule of permanent employees includes only such persons as come under the above specification.

DEAR SIR—I am directed by President Clason of the Park Board, to request that you will send me the Departmental Estimate of the Park Department, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, by attaching thereto the following explanation as to part of the appropriation asked for maintenance, etc. (\$350,000). In this amount about \$25,000 is intended for the purpose of introducing water service in Central Park for watering lawns and plantations during dry and hot weather. Efforts have been made to secure an appropriation for irrigating purposes in Central Park for several years, and it is earnestly desired to call attention to the importance and necessity of it. The injury, sometimes fatal, to lawns, trees and shrubbery, from the want of water during the several droughts has been very great for several years past. Experience has shown that the facilities at present at the command of the Department are entirely inadequate. In order to do the work properly it will require the following plant:

Thirty-two thousand feet of 2-inch steel water pipe with proper connections, etc., and the necessary labor to lay the same.

Ten thousand feet of 1-inch rubber hose with nozzles and appliances. The greater part of this proposed plant will have to be laid through an excessively rocky territory, as that where the lawns, trees and shrubbery suffer the most in dry weather.

The estimated cost of such a plant is, approximately, as follows: Cost of excavating trench 32,000 feet long, 3½ feet deep, removing rock, laying pipe, refilling trench and restoring surface of ground, at 60 cents per foot..... \$21,760.00 Cost of 32,000 linear feet of pipe, at 10 cents per foot..... 3,200.00 Cost of 10,000 feet of 1-inch rubber hose, in 50 foot lengths, with coupling (hose), 11 cents per foot; couplings, 200 required, 17 cents per pair..... 1,134.00

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I would ask to make the following statement of the necessity for an increased appropriation to the Department of Public Charities for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the year 1899.

SALARIES.

The first material item of increase appears under the head of "Examiners and Clerks for Dependent Children," where two Examiners are asked for at \$1,200 each. The necessity of these additional Examiners arises from the application of sections 663 and 666 of the Charter, which demand that the Commissioners of Public Charities shall investigate charges against children when notified by any Court or Magistrate in The City of New York.

Under the head of "Store Department" an increase of \$2,650 is asked for, because the service in this Department on the present economical basis is inadequate and unsatisfactory. The increase of \$2,650 asked for under the head of "Steamboats" is for the equipment of the new launch asked for, with the exception of \$200 increase in the salary of the Supervising Engineer. This new launch is badly needed. At the present time the only direct means of communication between Randall's Island and Manhattan Island is by an open row-boat, which is extremely uncomfortable in the cold or wet weather and at times not altogether free from danger to the women and children that are constantly transported to and from Randall's Island.

Under Bellevue Hospital the increase of \$1,620 asked for is for the employment of two Firemen and one Engineer, who are absolutely needed to run the new boiler-house which is about to be opened.

Under Gouverneur Hospital an additional sum of \$7,248 is asked for for the equipment of the new hospital which is now in process of construction and should be finished and occupied by the 1st of January, 1899. The new hospital will require more than double the space and double the expense of the old hospital because it will furnish more than double the number of beds—84 in the new against 39 in the old—and because the general construction and equipment of the new hospital will demand a different and more expensive class of Laborers, such as Engineers, Firemen and Elevator Attendants.

The increase of \$1,625 asked for for Harlem Hospital is due to the service made necessary by the building of an addition that will double the number of beds now in Harlem Hospital. It is expected that this addition will have been completed and occupied by January 1, 1899.

The increase of \$2,678 for Fordham Hospital is due to the additional help necessary to run the new hospital just moved into by the Department. The number of beds here is double the number of those that were in the old hospital.

The additional expense of \$1,350 in the City Hospital is necessary to the service. The addition of \$500 in the pay-roll of the Almshouse is necessary for the service.

Of the increase asked for for the Metropolitan Hospital, the most necessary is the pay for additional Nurses, an Assistant Engineer and one Fireman.

The additional expense for the Metropolitan Training School is for Nurses. The additional expense for Randall's Island Asylum and Schools is for \$1,440 for Hospital Helpers which are necessary to keep the institutions clean, and for \$500 as an increase to the salary of the Superintendent, Mrs. Dunphy, who has fully demonstrated that she is worth it.

An increase of \$1,800 is asked for for the Infants' Hospital, Randall's Island, for six Trained Nurses. The reduction in the death rate in this institution for the year 1898 over the year 1897 is more than 50 per cent., and this gratifying result is obtained by intelligence and experience in taking care of the infants. The number of deaths in the first seven months of 1898 in the Infants' Hospital was 361. The number of deaths in the first seven months of 1898 was 152. In order to preserve this record I believe that the six Trained Nurses asked for are necessary.

ALTERATIONS, ADDITIONS AND REPAIRS.

Under the head of "Alterations, Additions and Repairs," the sum of \$54,800 asked for is for the ordinary repairs for steamboats, boilers, water-piping, etc., in the Department, except a new water and fire system and a new water filter at Bellevue Hospital, and a new launch, which are necessary.

The improvements asked for on Randall's Island are not only necessary but pressing. Pavilion F, now occupied by the male idiots, is so overcrowded that both the comfort and the health of the inmates demand the extension asked for. The piazza on the various buildings indicated in the estimate are old and rotten and should be replaced with new ones for the safety of the children.

occupying the buildings. All the new flooring asked for is greatly needed. The steam-heating apparatus asked for is necessary because the various wards, dormitories and pavilions indicated in the estimate are now heated by stoves, which are inadequate for warmth in winter and are also dangerous in the possibility of fire. The water-towers in Wards 11, 14 and 15 are necessary for sanitary reasons, as the closets are now altogether too close to the wards, and the plumbing is so old and rotten that the health of the inmates is threatened thereby.

The Metropolitan Hospital needs new roofs throughout and metal ceilings, an elevator, window sashes and window frames and window gratings. The floors at this time are worn and broken and splintered and generally in a deplorable condition, in spite of the best efforts to keep them clean.

At the City Hospital new roofs are absolutely necessary for the dispensary, nervous-disease and convalescent pavilions, and new floors and a roof for the Maternity waiting ward, which is now one of the unhealthiest places in the Department. The other improvements asked for in the City Hospital are necessary for the proper care of the poor sick.

In Bellevue Hospital the sleeping accommodations for male and female help have long been a reproach to the Department. At the present time these people are daily overcrowded in cellars that are ill-ventilated and otherwise unfit for dormitories. It is proposed to put a main roof on the north wing of the hospital which would furnish sleeping accommodations for the paid help, at an estimated cost of \$12,000. A crematory for garbage and other refuse is also badly needed in Bellevue. The roof of the entire hospital is in a wretched condition and should be replaced by an entirely new one. Two new dynamos and engine of 1,000 electric light capacity each are asked for because their use would be an economy in the management of the hospital. We have already the steam-power necessary to run the dynamo, and their use would be considerably less than what we are now paying for electric lights in the hospital. The two-story building for clothes-room and wagon-house asked for in the estimate is a pressing need. The removal of the Central Office from Eleventh street and Third avenue to Twenty-sixth street and the East river has overcrowded Bellevue's wagon-room. The clothes are now kept in what was known as the old dispensary pavilion, which is neither large enough nor constructed properly for the purpose.

The two new buildings asked for the Almshouse are among the most pressing needs of the Department. The experience of last winter shows that the census of the Almshouse was in excess of the accommodation. The result was over-crowding and general ill-health in the inmates. Inasmuch as there has been a steady increase in the census of the Almshouse it is only fair to expect that there will be more inmates the coming winter than ever before. The bath-rooms asked for the Almshouse are quite as necessary as the new buildings. The way the inmates are bathed now is in the most primitive manner in old and broken tubs, and one at a time, so that half the people are not bathed at all, and probably half of those that are bathed are only half-bathed. Proper bathing facilities are the great crying need of the Almshouse. Without them the inmates cannot be kept clean. Without cleanliness vermin cannot be kept out of the Almshouse. With modern bathing facilities where large numbers could be bathed at the same time, the inmates could be kept clean and the possibility of the greatest curse of the Almshouse—vermin—would be minimized, if not altogether removed. The washings-including the new floors, the repairs to roofs, and especially the new plumbing asked for here, are pressing necessities.

SUPPLIES.

An increase of \$100,000 is asked for for supplies. The census increase in the Department from 1897 to 1898 is \$50. In addition to that natural increase we shall have in operation in 1898 three new hospitals, Freshman, Havemeyer and Convalescent, each of which has doubled the number of beds it formerly had and will require double the amount of supplies used in 1897. Furthermore, in order to keep within the appropriation of 1898, a cut of ten per cent on all supplies was made, and only one-third of the clothing asked for throughout the Department was allowed. The result was that for the first eight months of the year the Department was far short of supplies, and throughout the year the supply of clothing was so insufficient that all the material for clothing in stock was exhausted, and garments that had been used in 1897 were used in 1898 until they were worn out. The outcome of it all is that the Department is without clothing at present and is reduced to such an extremity as to clothing in use that without a liberal appropriation for this purpose it will be literally in rags the coming year.

The increase of \$4,000 in the Transformation Account is found necessary by the experience of the year. The \$4,000 allowed for 1898 was exhausted long ago and the transportation since that time has been paid out of the Supply Account.

The increase of \$7,500 asked for for ambulances, horses, harness and traps is necessary because the increase in the loads of Harlem, Freshman and Convalescent Hospitals demands an increase in the ambulance service for those hospitals and because the ambulances now in the service of the Department are so worn out that replacement is needed to answer ordinary calls with safety to patients, drivers, horses and horses.

The \$5,000 asked for the repair and overhauling the sea-wall of Blackwell's Island is for a need that is apparent to the most casual observer in passing Blackwell's Island. The sea-wall there is old and rotten and broken, and unless it is repaired quickly the damage to the Island will be so great that a sum far in excess of that asked for now will be required to repair it. The \$5,000 asked for here is for two-thirds of the repairs to the sea-wall, the Department of Correction having asked for \$1,000 necessary to repair one-third of the sea-wall.

This estimate is submitted after a careful study of every detail and with a sincere wish to be economical in the management of the Department of Public Charities, but with a deep conviction that every dollar asked for is absolutely necessary for the welfare of the Department and for the credit of the City.

Sir—In compliance with your circular letter of July 24, 1898, I beg to transmit herewith estimates of the amounts necessary for the proper conduct of the Department of Correction for the year 1899.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appropriations:

Sir—In transmitting estimates of expenses for this Department, I beg to call your attention to the following of notes:

The salaried account is increased by \$12,000. I have raised the salaries of all Keepers and Guards as follows: After three years service, to \$900, after six years' service, to \$1,000. I have asked for sufficient help to office Riker's Island; this will cost \$8,000. Total increase for salaries, \$12,000.

No increase in rations.

For repairs to buildings and apparatus I ask \$10,000, this is \$1,500 more than was allowed in 1898. For repairs to numbers I ask \$10,000, in addition \$10,000 received in 1898.

Unless repairs are made to the sea-wall on Blackwell's Island, it will probably be washed away. In order to put the fort which belongs to the Department of Correction in proper order, I have asked for \$4,000 for canvas, etc.

I would like to introduce electric-light in the Penitentiary and Workhouse, Blackwell's Island, and have asked for \$12,000 for that purpose.

The Board of Public Improvement reports that it will cost about \$20,000 to put in Cunard water, build a new well (provided there can be removed from the old reservoir), plan trees, appoint Master Masons, purchase carts, horses, harness, etc., for Riker's Island, and unless this is done the Island cannot be occupied by the Department.

The amount required for Donations to Discharged Prisoners for 1899 will be \$2,000, an increase of \$200.

Remarks.

The estimates for Brooklyn show very little change from the amounts allowed in 1898. I have asked for \$5,000 for an electric-light system for the Kings County Penitentiary. I have also asked to restore the \$100 to the Keepers' salaries, this amount having been deducted in 1898 in order to bring the salary account within the amount appropriated.

There will be little or no balance left of the 1898 appropriation.

With the hope that your Honorable Board will pass the estimates as presented,

It will be noticed that apparently there will be a balance of about \$1,000 at the end of this year in the account of Salaries, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. This is due to the fact that the present Commissioner of Buildings for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, when he took control of that office, found it necessary for the betterment of the service and the City's interests to dispense with the services of a number of employees of the Department who were found to be unfit for the duties to which they were assigned; these were mainly Inspectors of Buildings. The vacancies thus caused will necessarily have to be filled, and they will be filled as soon as an eligible list is received from the Civil Service Commission; there will then be no unexpended balance to the credit of this account.

The items of increase asked for, for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, are as follows:

\$1,500 increased salary for the Superintendent of Buildings.

\$1,200 for one Photographer.

\$14,400 for twelve additional Building Inspectors.

\$3,500 for five additional Plumbing Inspectors.

It is proposed if the sum be allowed, to place these twelve additional Building Inspectors in the very large territory of the Borough of The Bronx. There are at present but twelve Building Inspectors there, and it is a physical impossibility for twelve men to properly cover this territory, no matter how faithfully they may work. The number of improvements which are being made in the Borough of The Bronx is constantly increasing and the force of Inspectors must be increased proportionately.

In the Borough of The Bronx, there are only five Inspectors of Plumbing. It is proposed to appoint and detail five additional Plumbing Inspectors in that territory for the same reason that it is proposed to increase the force of Building Inspectors.

It is the desire of this Board that the Department of Buildings, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be brought up to the highest possible standard of efficiency, but with the present insufficient funds this is an impossibility. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is therefore asked to appropriate \$10,000 for the purchase herein set forth, which is \$23,450 more than the amount appropriated for Salaries for the Department of Buildings in the Borough of Brooklyn for the year 1888, but only \$2,000 more than the present requirements of the Department, taking the pay-roll for the month of August, 1890, as a basis.

The territory to be covered is so large that a horse and wagon is necessary, \$650 for photographic cameras, with all necessary apparatus, \$650 a carriage for the amount of increase that will be required, for 1890, for car fares, fees of lagermen and messengers.

In asking for an appropriation of more money for the year 1890 than was granted for the current year for the Department of Buildings, Borough of Queens and Brooklyn we hope to prove that the amount appropriated for 1889, as appropriated by the City Board, will be completely insufficient to cover the amount of work that will be made on the department's account to insure thorough protection over a territory in those boroughs and the maintenance of its buildings, one of New York's most industrial districts.

It is proposed to employ an additional supervisor, two plan examiners, two clerks, a messenger, two or three regular inspectors and a lawyer, the present force being entirely inadequate to cover the large territory comprised in the Boroughs of Queens and Brooklyn. The result of our inspection shows nearly 45,000 acres, the largest the structures in the department's jurisdiction a great deal.

Within this territory there is a vast number of hotels and places of public resort, of which very few are constructed with any regard to building regulation. The most of them are very temporary, the buildings being rapidly replaced with fire-escapes, and made to suit in nearly all of the public conveniences to local taste. Should a fire occur in any of these buildings, loss of life would be certain to follow. The Department of Buildings should have at its command a force of men sufficient to protect all these interests and to compel compliance with the building laws, especially where the inhabitants are such as to endanger life. Instead of this, the present force is barely able to inspect all the new work which is going on.

It must be kept in mind that full territory to be covered in making inspections would constitute an important factor in the preparation of the amount necessary to maintain the department in these boroughs.

Your attention is invited to the conditions that at present prevail in the building districts, comprising the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Richmond. Even now, as to the past, many contractors, masons and other smaller groups take it upon themselves to formulate plans and specifications for the erection of buildings. Many of the residents of this section, owing to the absence of any building department or board of inspection prior to the creation of the present City of New York, are ignorant of what is required by the Department of Buildings, as well as the Commissioners of Buildings in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Richmond. In particular, let it be constantly a subject open to all in an advisory capacity and public information leading toward the education of the people in these boroughs upon the subject of the laws, rules and regulations governing the erection and alteration of buildings.

The Board of Building, in the preparation of this estimate have been in most the admissions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and have excluded every item of expense not absolutely necessary, and the figure obtained, in our judgment, we believe is in consonance with the best efficient service.

There is no increase asked for except in the appropriation for the publication of the CITY RECORD, which has increased during the year in such an extent that, after eight months, nearly sixty per cent. of the appropriation has been expended, and for the next four months, which are certain to be as long as any six months payment. I estimate that the cost of the same will exceed the amount appropriated by \$7,000, and this amount will have to be included in the appropriation for 1898; hence, the appropriation asked for publication of the CITY RECORD for 1899 (and this amount) is \$50,000.

This estimate is made upon the assumption that the prices for printing the CITY RECORD will not exceed those of the present contract.

The supplies furnished departments in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx can easily be compared with those of previous years, but those departments, costs, etc., in the remaining boroughs have been regulated by me after investigation, and in such instances, I have reduced the same in (in my judgment) the actual compensation of the officers presenting the same.

I anticipate an increase in either appropriation at the end of the year. If there is, it will be very small. I have no way of estimating the entire cost of printing the minutes of the following departments and boards: The Council, Board of Aldermen, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Department of Parks, Fire Department, Board of Public Improvements—which are contracted for by the page. This condition also applies to the work done for the Corporation Counsel, which is also contracted for by the page. The total cost of this work will not be known until the end of the year, but from bills rendered to date it will, without question, greatly exceed the cost of last year. The following will show the cost, as compared with that of last year, except in the case of the Council and the Board of Public Improvements, which did not exist at that time, and the Fire Department, whose minutes have been printed only since July 1. The Board of Aldermen has increased from 31 to 60 members:

The work for the Corporation Counsel to September 1 amounted to, in the year 1897, \$8,000, in the year 1898, \$9,500.

The unusual work done by this office from January 1 cannot be realized except by consulting the Requisition Books. Up to September 1, the Department of Finance has had books amounting to \$10,000, while its average for several years has been less than \$5,000 per year. This condition applies also to the cost of printing. The Department of Health has had books in 1898 amounting to \$10,000, while the cost for several years has averaged but \$4,000.

The cost of printing for the Second Division, Board of City Magistrates (13 courts), has been \$12,500, which is an entirely new expenditure for this year. Every department in the new boroughs has been reorganized completely, retitled, with blank books, printing and stationery, and with our present system we hope to be able to fill all requisitions promptly during the coming year and to supply any (necessary) printing, etc., caused by new legislation, within the amount asked for.

With the exercise of the same care and diligence in handling the requisitions, there is no doubt, in my judgment, that this office can be run next year and the expenses kept within the appropriation asked for.

All the above is respectfully submitted for your consideration.

Hon. Bird S. Collier, Comptroller of The City of New York:

DEAR SIR—The Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, herewith presents an estimate of the amount required to conduct the business of the Commission for the year 1899.

The business of the Commission has been largely increased by the consolidation under the Charter, and so a greater extent than was at first estimated. It will apparently be absolutely necessary to have an appropriation of \$92,244 to properly conduct the business of the Commission during the year 1899.

The Commission was unable to establish its regulations until March 5, 1898, and could not proceed with examinations until such regulations were in force. The old New York, Brooklyn and Long Island City each had its separate set of rules which did not apply to The City of New York, as constituted by the Greater New York Charter. After the promulgation of its regulations, this Commission commenced to hold examinations, but was again delayed by the passage of the law of March 31 (chapter 180, Laws of 1898). The Commission was unable to resume operations until an opinion was rendered by the Corporation Counsel as to the effect of this law upon the Civil Service Regulations of New York City. The conduct of examinations, to any extent, was thus practically suspended until July.

In consequence of these delays this Commission has had scarce more than three full working months, and thus the balance left over from the appropriation for the year 1898 is accounted for. Examinations are now being held for all positions, and experience shows the absolute necessity of the additional force referred to in the accompanying statement.

I would further state, that a considerable proportion of the amount required is composed of items which are subject to variation, it being impossible to anticipate the number and character of

the examinations to be held during the year, and the amount of expert assistance which may be required to properly conduct the same. For this reason, it has been the custom of your Honorable Board to make our appropriation in a lump sum, and I respectfully request that such custom be continued.

The total sum applied for by Brooklyn in the borough of Queens is \$84,360. Last year the Board asked for \$26,640, but no allowance was made for the borough, except one-quarter of \$4,200 for soundings.

CORONER'S OFFICE, MANHATTAN, NEW YORK, September 10, 1898.

To the Board of Estimate and Appropriation, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN.—The Board of Estimate of the Borough of Manhattan submits for your consideration the proposed statement of salaries and expenses required for the Coroners' office for the year 1899. Said statement contains in general column the amount appropriated for the year 1898 and the amounts required for 1899 & 1898.

There is an increase in the amounts required for 1899 over the amounts appropriated for 1898. This increase is in the salaries and contingent expenses of the Coroners, and in the salary of the Clerk of the Board of Coroners. The increase in the salary of the Coroners, we believe, is reasonable and just, in view of the amount of work and the character of the work performed by them. The work of the Coroners is hard and increasing every year. It requires his attention day and night, and requires an hour a day, responsibility and labor of the most exacting kind.

Attempts have been made to minimize the work of the Coroners of this borough by comparing it with the work performed by the Coroners of other boroughs. Such a thing is hard to believe. It is impossible to believe that a person who knows anything about the City of New York does not know that the Coroners of this borough, in the performance of their duties, must meet with conditions that are not to be found in any other borough—conditions that create responsibilities and dangers that the Coroners of other boroughs are rarely called to perform. Such a person knows that in this borough the industrial conditions and the social conditions, good and bad, are different from what they are elsewhere. Such a person knows that it is in this borough that the vicious class, and the class known as "transient," spend their time, commit their crimes, cause their own deaths or the deaths of others, and that there must necessarily be, from the very condition of things, even in proportion to population, more murders, suicides and malignant causes—deaths on the streets and in the houses, more deaths by gas, electricity and by the use of explosives, more deaths by the negligent use of medicine and by the criminal negligence of physicians, midwives and rugrats, than there are in any other borough. Figures are not needed to prove this. These are facts that are known to every person familiar with the statistics of The City of New York.

Deaths in other boroughs occur under ordinary circumstances or under circumstances easily foreseeable, and the identity of the dead person is known. In the Borough of Manhattan it is different, where the majority of deaths are "unknown" and surrounded by uncertainty. It takes the most careful investigation to prove the identity of the dead person and to prove the cause of their death. The investigation of one death of this character consumes more time and labor than the investigation of ten deaths under ordinary circumstances would consume.

The Coroners of this borough do not measure their work by the number of deaths referred to them, although the number exceeds that of any other borough, but by the responsibility and the amount of labor involved in the investigation of each death.

The Coroners of this borough investigate more deaths and perform many times more actual labor, both mental and physical, than the Coroners of any other borough, and for that reason, to be fair and just, they are entitled to more compensation.

The appropriation for 1898 reflected the salary of the position of Clerk of the Board of Coroners from \$5,500 to \$5,000.

The salary of said position was \$5,500 a year for the twenty years preceding the year you received it; it was so when the work of the office was not, either in amount or in responsibility, one-third of what it is now, and in all that time it was not even suggested by a Coroner or by a member of the Board of Estimate and Appropriation, or by any person, good or bad, to reduce

it; on the contrary, all sides were disposed to recognize the justice of increasing it in proportion to the increased work of the office. When we consider the amount of work, and the character of the work that necessarily falls to the duty of the incumbent of said position, we feel it a duty to ourselves and to the public service to request that the salary of said position be raised to what it was before you reduced it.

In preparing the annexed statement we have acted on the request of the Comptroller to co-operate with your Board in securing "the utmost economy in the administration of City affairs," and in so doing we have reduced every item of expense "to the lowest amount consistent with efficient service."

"The coroners in each borough shall have an office in said borough."¹¹ Laws of 1897, chapter 378, section 157.

The increase required for contingent expenses is absolutely necessary in order to enable the Coroners to hire and furnish a proper office in which to transact their business. At present we are in a small room about 28 feet by 14 feet, with one window in the corner; little light and no ventilation; health of the occupants positively endangered; no privacy of any kind; between 75 and 100 persons, including jurors, witnesses, complainants, etc., visit us every day. A Sanitary Inspector from the Department of Health reports that the place is unfit for occupancy. We know that we must be brief here. Kindly refer the matter to some member of your Board and have them look at our present quarters.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York.

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Coroners of the Borough of Queens appeal before their estimate for their office for the year 1899.

AS TO THE CORONERS' SALARY.

We have asked for an increase, as will be observed, for the following reasons: Our Borough has the largest territory of any of the boroughs in the city. It not only has an extensive waterfront, which produces a number of floating bodies, but contains also all the cemeteries, which furnish a number of suicides and other cases involving coroners' services. From January 1, 1898, up to and including August 1, 1898, we have had 324 cases, while the Borough of The Bronx has had 216 cases and Richmond 182 cases, which we respectfully submit entitles us to the increased salary asked for, which will put us on an equality with the Coroners of The Bronx. We are compelled to hold inquests and impanel juries all over the borough, as it is utterly impossible to try the cases at the Coroners' office, which is in the borough centre, and the railroad facilities are very meagre and require long delays in taking trains and involves the hiring of conveyances, all of which consume a large amount of time and expenditure.

The borough has no morgue where the Physicians can hold autopsies, so that we are compelled to ship bodies to the nearest and most accessible undertaking establishment. These undertakers receive no recompence for their services in many cases, and we are compelled to use personal influence in order to have the bodies properly taken care of until the City undertaker can be notified.

It will thus be seen that in the exercise of the duties of our office our services are very much more employed than those of any other Coroners in the city, and we submit that our compensation should be increased from \$4,000 to \$6,000.

AS TO THE CORONERS' EXPENSES.

We have stated the extent of territory in our jurisdiction and that we are obliged to travel greater distances to attend to in cases we must, in many instances pay for conveyances to reach territory not on the line of the railroad, and almost four times greater territory than that comprised in the Borough of The Bronx.

We ask that our expenses be fixed at the same amount as that appropriated for the Coroners of The Bronx.

AS TO PHYSICIANS' SALARIES.

The salary fixed in 1898 for the Physicians was \$1,500, and out of this they must pay their own expenses. They have to travel long distances to examine bodies and perform autopsies, and these appear at the inquest, and are frequently called before the District Attorney a number of times, for which they receive no extra compensation and have to pay their own traveling expenses.

We therefore ask for an increase in their salaries so as to cover their expenses.

AS TO CLERK.

He has to keep all the books, being eight in number, and has a great deal of work to perform. We have therefore asked for an increase in his salary.

AS TO ASSISTANT CLERKS.

Said Assistant Clerks were appointed by this Board on the 1st of January, 1898, and have been performing the duties appertaining thereto since then, having received no recompence for their services, as no provision for such Clerks has been put in the Budget of 1898 as yet, but for which we have petitioned your Honorable Board; you have referred it to the Comptroller for investigation, and to whom we have obtained a held, under date of August 24, 1898, to which we would respectfully refer your Honorable Board.

AS TO THE STENOPHAGHER.

We have asked for an increase in his salary for the reason that his time is taken up at inquests in the evening and in the late during the day making copies of the proceedings, and it is his duty also to travel to all parts of the borough to be present at inquests, and no provision was made for his traveling expenses.

We therefore respectfully submit that the increase in the appropriation asked for, for the above-stated, be allowed.

The compensation for Jury Notice Servers for Special Jurors, and the supplies for the Special Commissioner of Jurors, are required by chapter 378, Laws of 1896.

NEW YORK FREE CIRCULATING LIBRARY.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—The petition of the New York Free Circulating Library respectfully shows to your Board:

First—That the said New York Free Circulating Library is a corporation duly organized and incorporated by a special act of the Legislature of the State of New York.

Second—That the said corporation owns in The City of New York three library buildings, which are of the value in land, building and books of about \$1,000,000 apiece; that they have the free use forever of another building, No. 415 Second Avenue, which is worth about the same sum, \$100,000; that beside this the corporation rents six other branches, and that these branches are situated in convenient places for free distribution of the books to the people of The City of New York; that the corporation owns nearly 150,000 volumes, and that all of this property, land, building and books, representing an outlay of nearly half a million dollars, has resulted from private benefaction, not one penny thereof having been given from public funds, and the corporation with this property is engaged exclusively in the free circulation of books, which books are taken by the people of The City of New York to read at their homes; that by means of the traveling library branch, now located at No. 135 Second Avenue, this corporation placed in the hands of the teachers of the public schools during the last year over 50,000 books, which were read by the scholars, thus materially increasing the advantages of the public schools. Beside this, the same branch loaned books to twenty-two of the fire companies in The City of New York, and, with the proper assistance from the City, this work in the schools and in the Fire Department and among all of the people of The City of New York can be largely increased.

Third—That the said New York Free Circulating Library is now by law subject to the inspection of the Board of Regents, and is registered by them as maintaining a proper standard of reading; that the said Board of Regents has issued a "certificate of approved circulation," which is hereto attached, showing that the circulation of books upon which your Honorable Board is entitled to appropriate money under the Laws of 1893, chapter 378, is 1,000,000 volumes; and that the appropriation which can be made under said law, and which may not exceed 10 cents per volume, amounts to an aggregate sum of \$100,000, and that by an amendment made to this law by the Legislature of the State of New York, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is allowed to make this application of money in The City of New York.

Fourth—That our corporation, the New York Free Circulating Library, is in great need of funds, not only to meet the imperative demands made upon the branches already established, but also to extend the work of the corporation so as to furnish free reading to the people in parts of the city not yet reached. In furtherance of this purpose, the corporation is now buying a new branch in West One Hundredth street, between Amsterdam Avenue and the Boulevard, and that the money required for the purchase of the land, the erection of the building and the equipment with books has been given as a free gift by private generosity; this corporation never asking any assistance from the City, except for the purpose of meeting the current expenditures necessitated by the large free circulation of books.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that you Honorable Board may make this corporation the full allotment, which, under the laws above stated, it is authorized and empowered to make.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The Aguilar Free Library Society hereby applies for an appropriation of forty-six thousand dollars, pursuant to chapter 378, paragraph 37, of the Laws of 1892.

The Aguilar Free Library Society is duly incorporated under the Laws of this State, and owns real estate in The City of New York, the value of which is far in excess of twenty thousand dollars. It also owns over fifty thousand volumes and maintains four libraries, namely, at No. 197 East Broadway, No. 113 East Fifty-ninth street, No. 616 Fifth street, and No. 176 East One Hundred and Tenth street, and these libraries are open daily for the free circulation of books among the inhabitants of The City of New York.

During the year ending June 30, 1898, the number of volumes actually withdrawn from the Aguilar Free Library by the inhabitants of The City of New York, for use at their homes, was over four hundred and sixty thousand volumes.

The Aguilar Free Library is subject to the inspection of the Regents of the University of the State of New York and registered by them as maintaining a proper standard.

The Regents have executed a certificate of approved circulation which is hereto attached, showing that the circulation of books upon which your Honorable Board is entitled to appropriate

money under the Laws of 1892, chapter 378, paragraph 37, is in excess of four hundred and sixty thousand dollars.

The appropriation to which, under such certificate, the Aguilar Free Library is entitled, is forty-six thousand dollars (\$46,000).

The Aguilar Free Library is in great need of the full amount of the appropriation asked for, for the reason that during the past year the library at No. 113 East Fifty-ninth street has been enlarged, and additions made to the library at No. 616 Fifth street. A new building is in course of construction for the library now at No. 176 East One Hundred and Tenth street. This library is situated in the midst of a very densely populated section of the city and has outgrown its present quarters. This enlargement of the society's work necessitates the outlay of a large amount of money for new quarters, for the purchase of books and the employment of an increased force of librarians.

The advice of the directors has been to equip the library with the best and most useful books and also to cooperate with the public schools and other institutions, and to bring the library near to the working people of the city. In consequence, the library shows the remarkable average circulation of every volume nearly ten times during the year.

We append, herewith, estimate of expenses for the year 1898, and the present salary list.

WEBSTER FREE CIRCULATING LIBRARY.

Estimate of the Amount of Expenditure of The Webster Free Library for the Year 1898.

The Webster Free Library is a library maintained for the welfare and free use of the public in The City of New York. It is subject to the inspection of the Regents of the University of the State of New York, and registered by them as maintaining a proper standard. The Regents certified that the number of books circulated during the year 1897, of such a character as to merit a grant of public money, was about 38,000. The amount granted on the basis of this estimate by the Board of Estimates and Apportionment in 1897, for the year 1898, was three thousand eight hundred (\$3,800) dollars.

The aggregate circulation for the year ending June 30, 1898, was 45,258.

A similar certificate from the said Regents is presented herewith, showing that the number of books circulated during the year 1898, of such a character as to merit a grant of public money, is 42,000. The appropriation to which, under such certificate, the said library will be entitled, will be four thousand three hundred (\$4,300) dollars, for the expenses of the year 1898.

The circulation of the library has very much increased, especially among the children attending the public schools. We have conferred with their teachers and have selected books adapted to their needs, and are thus performing an important public function which in Boston and many other cities is performed entirely at the public expense.

The library is now open on Sunday for an hour and a half, and on all legal holidays for the usual hours. We have started a small free circulating department for our adult Bohemian readers, with books in their language. It is, we believe, the only provision for free Bohemian literature in the State. This new department was opened to supply a demand, as we are in the heart of the Bohemian district.

We have during the past year added a regular reading room, supplied with books and periodicals, which is open to the public during all hours when the library itself is open, and which is

greatly appreciated in the neighborhood. And we have introduced the open shelf system, which has also been very acceptable to our readers.

Estimate of the Amount of Expenditure of the University Settlement Free Library for 1899 et al.

The University Settlement Free Library exists for the free use of the people of the lower East Side. It is situated in a densely populated district near three schools, and its rooms are often crowded to suffocation with the pupils of these and more distant schools, who come here for their supplementary study books, as well as for their other reading. Many working boys, studying at night, after their day's labor is over, for Regents' examinations, depend upon this library for all their text books.

It contains 4,157 volumes, and is near no other public library. The circulation for the year ending June 30, 1898, was 40,480 volumes, which shows that each book was used 11.9 times. This record brings us among the first libraries in the State in the per cent. of volumes circulated.

Moreover, we expect, about the first of the year, to move into new quarters, which will be larger and more convenient, and where we will have greater expense for books, service, and the accommodation of readers. We, therefore, ask your Honorable Board for the sum of \$4,600, to which, under the Regent's certificate appended, we are, according to the law, entitled.

We herewith present a statement of the estimated expense of the year 1899, based upon the expectation that we will receive \$4,600:

We, the undersigned, hereby respectfully make application on behalf of the Library of the Young Women's Christian Association of The City of New York, asking that the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) may be apportioned to its use from the City Treasury for the year 1899, the amount asked being based upon the Regents' certificate of an approved circulation of sixty thousand volumes per year (certificate hereto appended).

This is asked on the following grounds:

This library has been maintained by the above-mentioned Association for twenty-eight years as a free circulating library for self-supporting women and girls (and those preparing for self-support) without distinction of race, color or creed; it now consists of about twenty-five thousand volumes, selected with special reference to the needs of its readers for advancement and improvement in their various lines of work, as well as for needed recreation and diversion.

The library also includes a reading-room for periodicals, a reference room, a collection of art studies to loan, and a collection of cheer pictures to loan among the sick.

The library, including all the departments, is open daily, from 9 A.M. to 9:15 P.M., and conforms in all respects to the standard required by the University of the State of New York. The Young Women's Christian Association of The City of New York provides, rent free, in its building at No. 7 East Fifteenth street, large and commodious rooms built specially for this library, and furnishes heat, light, care and repairs. Until the aid from the City Treasury was granted, the Association also paid all salaries, bookbinder's bills, and other expenses, but was unable to spare from its other important work any money for the purchase of new books. This very important item had to be met by gifts and other variable and unreliable means, and the growth and development of the library were thereby much hindered.

The amount received from the City Treasury has been spent for the salaries of the Librarian and three Assistants, and for the necessary binding of books and periodicals, and the entire balance then remaining has been applied to the purchase of books, by which means the library has received a great increase of usefulness to its readers. The appropriation now asked for the year 1899 is to be used for the same purposes, and the amount is based upon section 37 of chapter 378, Laws of 1892, New York.

This is the only help asked of the City or received from it for the Association's extensive work for women in art, business and industrial classes, boarding homes, employment bureau, entertainments, safe-room, etc.

It is earnestly prayed by the undersigned and the association of benevolent workers which they represent, that their petition may be granted and that the full amount asked, being the amount allowed by law and authorized by the Regents' certificate herewith, may be appropriated; also that the said appropriation may be paid quarterly to Mary T. Cockcroft, Treasurer of the Young Women's Christian Association of The City of New York, at No. 7 East Fifteenth street, in said city.

That it is a Library Association, duly incorporated under the Laws of 1798, its charter having been amended by chapter 217 of the Laws of 1871. Said Library owns real estate in The City of New York, being the real estate occupied by it at No. 52 West One Hundred and Twenty-third street, in the Borough of Manhattan. That it owns over 24,000 volumes of books, and maintains its association as a free library for the circulation of books among the inhabitants of The City of New York.

That it has equally circulated in the twelve months ending June 20, 1898, more than 105,000 volumes, to be read by the people at their homes, and that no charge was made in any case for such loaning.

That the Harlem Library is now subject to the inspection of the Regents, and registered by them as maintaining a proper standing, and that the Regents have issued a "Certificate of Approved Circulation," which is hereto annexed, showing that the circulation of books, upon which your honorable Board is entitled to appropriate money under the statute, is 105,000 volumes, and that the appropriation which may be made under the statute, which may not exceed ten cents per volume, amounts to \$10,500, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is allowed by law to make this appropriation of money in The City of New York.

That this corporation is in great need of funds, not only to meet the imperative demand for the extension of reading facilities to the people of the city, but to be able to properly carry on the present work. That this library is one of the oldest in the city. That in 1897, for the first time, it was made free, and that its circulation has by reason of such action been phenomenally increased, while its means for conducting the work have necessarily diminished, it now receiving no funds from borrowing members.

The full appropriation asked for (and which the law authorizes you Board to make), \$10,500, is not more than enough to meet current expenses and to provide for the continually increasing demands upon the library.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays that your Honorable Board may make to this corporation a full allotment, which under the law, it is authorized and empowered to make.

GENTLEMEN—The petition of the Cathedral Free Circulating Library respectfully shows to your Board:

First—That the said The Cathedral Free Circulating Library is a corporation incorporated by the Regents of the University of the State of New York and formed under chapter 378 of the Laws of 1892 of the State of New York.

Second—That the said Library has the leasehold of the premises situated at No. 123 East Fifteenth street, New York City, valued at about twenty-two thousand dollars (\$22,000), owns about twenty-seven thousand volumes and maintains said building as a library with all proper appurtenances for the free circulation of books to and among the inhabitants of The City of New York, but principally among that large population residing between Forty-second and Fifty-ninth streets on the north and south and Second and Tenth avenues on the east and west. It is particularly noted that a large number of its patrons are students of the College of The City of New York and the Normal College, and that it has extended its work during the past year to many places other than those mentioned in The City of New York, where the results have proved the necessity of the step, and proposes to continue on the same line during the coming year, spreading out its work wherever good in said direction can be accomplished; it maintains at considerable expense a large and exceedingly well selected reference library for which it receives no compensation; it has a fully equipped reading-room open all day, and possesses many special departments especially useful to the student class of our city who are unable to obtain the same use of books elsewhere.

Third—That in the year ending June 30, 1898, said Cathedral Free Circulating Library loaned to the individuals in The City of New York upwards of 141,000 volumes to be read by them at their homes, and that no charge of any kind was made in any case for the loan of the same, and that this library has received no appropriation for the use of any of the said volumes during that period.

Fifth—That said library is in great need of the full appropriation for the reasons that the demands on the library are steadily and greatly increasing; that, therefore, additional facilities for patrons are urgently needed and must be procured and the purchase of a great many additional books and the employment of additional librarians and employees are rendered absolutely necessary, which, together with the rest of the building, the necessary repairs and improvements, the keeping up of the serials and magazines, the repairing and rebinding of much handled volumes, wages of boys and other employees, the salaries of the librarian and assistants, bills for lighting, cataloguing, miscellaneous expenditures for printing, postage, paper, etc., on a most conservative and economical estimate will amount, during the year 1898, to fourteen thousand nine hundred and fifty dollars (\$14,950).

Wherefore, your petitioners pray that your Honorable Board may appropriate to The Cathedral Free Circulating Library the full amount of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000).

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with a request from your Honorable Body, the Board of Directors of the Brooklyn Public Library most respectfully submit the following statement of the expenses incurred in conducting the Brooklyn Public Library and Reading Rooms from December 20, 1897:

According to your request we specify each item of expense, but would call your attention to the fact that it is the aim of the Public Library Directors to establish similar branches in various parts of the city, and to that end we appeal to your Honorable Body to grant the full appropriation authorized by law, that new branches may be started.

In order that you may comprehend something of the plans for the extension of library work for 1899 for which the appropriation is asked we include estimates for different sections of the city where the citizens have already taken steps toward establishing libraries and reading-rooms, and for which they have asked the aid of the Brooklyn Public Library.

In considering the appropriation for the Public Library, we ask you to consider the needs of this great city.

The amount authorized, \$40,000, is not sufficient to carry on the work as it should be done in Brooklyn, but it will aid in making a creditable beginning.

Chicago has thirty delivery stations from one to seven miles from the central library.

Boston has fourteen stations and eight branches.

Jersey City has eleven stations.

Brooklyn, covering as it does such an extensive territory, should have a branch in almost every ward where books may be easily accessible to the people.

Section 3, chapter 441 of the Laws of 1892, under which the Brooklyn Public Library is incorporated, reads as follows:

Section 3.—"For the purpose of maintaining said library and reading room, the city of Brooklyn is hereby authorized through its proper boards and officers to annually levy a tax not less than \$40,000 in any one year, and the amount of said sum shall be estimated, determined, imposed and collected in the same manner as are other taxes in said city."

The Board of Directors of the Brooklyn Public Library most respectfully ask for the full appropriation thus authorized, for the purpose of maintaining the libraries and reading-rooms already established, and to conduct new branches according to the following estimate.

GENTLEMEN.—In accordance with the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Trustees of the Public Library of Long Island City respectfully submits herewith the estimate of the expenses of said Library for the year 1898.

The consolidation of the several adjoining towns and villages with former Long Island City, forming the Borough of Queens, has opened the Library to a largely increased number of residents who have availed themselves of the privilege, increasing the circulation and forcing extra labor on the Librarians; and the appropriation for 1898 being limited, additional help could not be

engaged. A printed catalogue will be issued about November 1, 1898, through which it is anticipated that the circulation will be yet more largely increased.

The residents of Astoria and Blissville sections have for some time past been urging that branches be opened in those locations. The Astoria Branch is now being arranged for and will probably be opened by October 1, 1898, but the Trustees have not yet been able to set aside sufficient funds for a branch at Blissville.

It is the object and desire of the Board that this Library shall become the Public Library of the Borough of Queens, and ultimately to open and establish branches at Woodside, Corona, Elmhurst, Flushing and in other sections sufficiently settled to warrant the expense.

There will be no balance from the appropriation of 1898 that can be made available for 1899, and the expenses for 1899 have been cut as low as possible consistent with the increased demands that have been made on this Library.

DEAR SIR.—In reply to your favor of the 6th instant permit me to say that I did not send the inclosed certificate with the estimate, because, as you will see from the inclosed letter from Mr. Eastman, he did not regard the Long Island City Public Library as subject to the law which provides for subsidies for libraries not owned by the public but maintained for its welfare, and the Trustees of the Library coincide with him in this opinion.

The following extract is from the Laws of New York, 1892, chapter 378, section 37:

"By similar vote money may be granted toward the support of libraries not owned by the public, but maintained for its welfare and free use, provided that such libraries shall be subject to the inspection of the Regents and registered by them as maintaining a proper standard, that the Regents shall certify what number of the books circulated are of such a character as to merit a grant of public money, and that the amount granted yearly to libraries on the basis of circulation shall not exceed ten cents for each volume of the circulation thus certified by the Regents."

You will perceive immediately that the law does not apply to this library at all, for the latter is owned entirely by the public, and has no other means of support than the public appropriation.

New York City has never heretofore owned a public library, but has paid subsidies to very many. The New York Free Circulating Library, with all its branches, is a private corporation with other income than the subsidy which it receives from the City by virtue of the law quoted above, but there is nothing in this law, or in any other known to me, which prevents the City authorities from appropriating as much money as they please for any municipal department.

Otherwise, if the circulation were always taken as a basis for the appropriation, it would obviously be impossible for a library ever to be established by the City authorities, which is not the case, as you will readily see by reading section 36 of the same chapter. Naturally the expenses incident to organizing, equipping and getting a library into running order are proportionately greater during the first years of its existence than they will be in the future, and the circulation during these first years is no measure of the amount of work that has been done, nor of the expenditures that have been necessitated.

It is therefore no exaggeration to say that it would prove a deplorable calamity in this community if the amount of the appropriation were cut down to ten cents per volume of the approved circulation of 1897.

This is the only institution of its kind and extent in the whole Borough of Queens, and I trust, therefore, that you will use your best efforts to prevent a crippling of its powers for the distribution of knowledge by a reduction in the grant of money by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—Application is hereby made on behalf of the Flushing Free Library for an appropriation under the Laws of 1892, chapter 378.

The Flushing Free Library is duly incorporated under the Laws of the State and owns real estate in The City of New York at the intersection of Main street and Jamaica avenue in Flushing, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, at which place it maintains, and has maintained for many years, a free library open daily for the free circulation of books among the inhabitants of The City of New York.

During the year ending April 30, 1898, the number of volumes actually withdrawn from the Flushing Free Library by the inhabitants of The City of New York for use at their homes was over 10,000.

The Flushing Free Library is subject to the inspection of the Regents of the University of the State of New York and registered by them as maintaining a proper standard.

The Regents have executed a "Certificate of Approved Circulation," a copy of which is filed with this application, showing that the circulation of books upon which your honorable body is entitled to appropriate money under the Laws of 1892, chapter 378, paragraph 37, is in excess of 18,000.

The appropriation to which the Flushing Free Library is entitled, as evidenced by said certificate of approved circulation, is \$1,800.

The need of an appropriation for the Flushing Free Library is unquestioned; while heretofore it has always been supported by private contributions, received from time to time, the very great increase in its circulation during the past three or four years has made its continued proper support from such sources impossible; prior to the consolidation of Flushing with The City of New York the necessity of seeking public support has been recognized, and now that Flushing has ceased to exist in its corporate capacity but continues as before to have the same local needs, the necessity for this appropriation is vital to the continuance of this library for the public use.

Moreover, the need for a library in the locality where the Flushing Free Library is situated is obvious. This library is, we believe, the only free library in the entire borough outside of what was Long Island City (eight miles distant). Our building is situated at the most central and convenient and accessible site in a large tributary area, being just across the street from the principal railroad station connecting with the adjacent neighborhoods of Murray Hill, Bayside, etc., and at the intersection of the trolley car lines from Newtown, Elmhurst, Corona, College Point, etc., all parts of the Third Ward, besides being in the most central and convenient place for the people who reside in what was formerly the Village of Flushing.

The loss of this library would be most severely felt in the community, and the importance of maintaining and improving it in the future as the only institution of the kind in such a large area, with a tributary population already of over 20,000 and which is growing rapidly, must appear all clear to your honorable body that no further argument seems necessary here.

We therefore respectfully submit the matter to your consideration.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—I herewith send my estimate for the year 1899. During the early part of this year, I submitted my estimate for 1898 with memorandum. Inasmuch as the very same arguments apply to the situation of affairs in my office to-day as applied then, I take the liberty of quoting from that memorandum, premising that I have noted the desire expressed by the Deputy Comptroller that all estimates should be reduced to the lowest amounts consistent with efficient service. If I were not thoroughly convinced that the good of the public and justice to the people employed in the Surrogate's office would be subserved by my demands, I would be the last public official in the county to pay for the increases and additions I now do.

I have asked for an increase of \$2,000 for Mr. Carroll, my Chief Clerk and Clerk of the Surrogate's Court. In relation to this amount, I quote from my memorandum: "This, of course, is the most important position in my office, and must be filled by a lawyer and one of

ability; a man of sound judgment and executive force, and one in whom the Surrogate has the most implicit confidence. Through my own personal choice and selection, I was fortunate in securing the services of such a man in the person of Mr. Joseph W. Carroll, the present Chief Clerk. His services are fully worth \$7,000 and he should not be asked to serve for any less. Although the position is designated as Clerk, yet, as some members of your Board well know, he is really an Assistant to the Surrogate, and, as a lawyer, he should be compensated in accordance with the importance of his position in its relation to legal matters. I do not wish to make any comparison, but, taking as a standard the salaries paid to lawyers who give up their entire practice and devote their whole time to the duties of their positions, I think that the Board of Estimate should allow this increase. The reputation of the office largely depends upon him and I refer, without hesitation, to the members of the bar of the First and Second Judicial Districts and to the public at large for a confirmation of what I have said in Mr. Carroll's behalf."

II. I have asked that the salaries of Mr. Bergen, Administration and Guardian Clerk, of Mr. Osborn, Accounting Clerk, and of Mr. Duffy, Assistant to the Chief Clerk, be raised to \$3,000 each. In relation to this item, I quote from my memorandum: "The increase asked for in the salaries paid to the Administration and Guardian Clerk, Accounting Clerk, and Assistant to the Chief Clerk is fully warranted by the nature of the duties performed by the gentlemen who fill those positions. These Clerks are charged with original responsibility and have, in my judgment, been underpaid. Apart from generalization, individually they are entitled to consideration."

"Mr. Joseph W. Duffy, the Assistant to the Chief Clerk, who also acts as Probate Clerk, is a faithful and painstaking official, and occupies a very responsible position. He has had long experience in the office and his varied and multifarious duties are always performed to the entire satisfaction of the Court.

"Mr. Edward J. Bergen, the Administration and Guardian Clerk, has been employed in the office over fourteen years. He is thoroughly competent and responsible in every way, and it would be a distinct loss to the office should he leave it. His salary is lower now than that of many men in mere clerical positions in other departments of the government who have hardly any responsibility. Mr. Bergen is a lawyer."

III. I have asked for an increase of \$200 for Col. E. R. Dickinson, the Stenographer. In connection with this demand, I quote from my memorandum:

"As to Edward H. Dickinson, the Stenographer, his duties demand and receive at his hands the greatest punctuality, accuracy and thoroughness; they are very serious and require from him the closest attention, on account of the provisions of the Code peculiar to testimony taken in the Surrogates' Courts. The amount asked for is \$1,000, which is the amount given by the Legislature at its last session to the Stenographers of all the courts of record in Kings County, except the Surrogate's Court. Besides Col. Dickinson, unlike the other Court Stenographers, has no office facilities furnished him by the County, and is at personal expense for office hire to properly do his work."

IV. With regard to the \$200 asked for Mr. Kays, I again quote from my memorandum: "As to the increase of \$200 in the salary of one of the Recording Clerks, I would say, that the position is now filled by Mr. Martin R. Kays, who was recently promoted to more work but not to more pay. When he assumed the duties of his new position, I told him that his services there were worth \$1,500, and I promised him that I would lay the matter before the Board of Estimate at the proper time, and I do so now. His position is distinctly different from that of a Recording Clerk as we understand it in this office. He is the Clerk in charge of all real estate records, recording all papers in real estate proceedings and all orders of advertisements for debts, and at the present time draws and records all the papers of administration and guardianship and keeps the indices in the books thereof. It would be an injustice to ask him to do an increased amount of and more varied and difficult work without a corresponding increase of compensation."

V. I have asked for an increase of \$600 for Mr. Bellman, the Interpreter and Clerk. In relation to this request I again quote from my memorandum:

"As to Mr. Peter Bellman, the Interpreter and Clerk, I would say, that his work in the Surrogate's Office occupies his entire time, for, besides being Interpreter, he does clerical work of the most varied nature. He has charge of all orders for copies of the records and of the comparison and putting together of all said copies of the inventories and accounts of guardians; of the arranging of papers on the probate of wills. His long experience in this kind of work has rendered him peculiarly competent and accurate, and he certainly should receive more compensation for his services. His salary as Interpreter is \$1,200, and as Clerk, \$600. I think that \$600 should be added to his salary as Clerk, making his total salary \$1,800."

VI. I have asked for an increase of \$300 for Mr. O'Brien, one of my Court Officers. The reasons are as follows: Mr. O'Brien is the Senior Court Officer in my Court. Unlike Court Officers in other courts of record, he is on duty continuously, whether the court is in session or not. He is in constant attendance in the office, and constantly employed, really performing clerical work and entirely satisfactorily. I think that, in justice, his salary should be increased from \$1,200 to \$1,500.

Thus far I have been dealing with increases of salary. I have also asked for money for new positions as follows: Assistant to the Administration and Guardian Clerk, Superintendent of Records and Supplies, and six Recording Clerks. These positions are absolutely necessary for the proper conduct of the business of the office.

Take for instance the position of Administration Clerk, with absolutely no assistance. When he is at luncheon, or, for any reason, away from his desk, the economy of the office is disturbed, some of the other Clerks being required to neglect their duties to perform his. He certainly should be supplied with a Clerk to relieve him when absent and to attend to petty details, so that he may give his uninterrupted attention to the important duties of his position. A fair salary for such an assistant would be \$1,200.

I quote from my memorandum as to the Superintendent of Records and Supplies:

"As to the Superintendent of Records and Supplies: This position is asked for for this reason: There is nobody now to compare the records except the Recording Clerks themselves; the system in vogue here, on account of lack of the closest supervision, has given me considerable anxiety. The Recording Clerks, those who record wills and decrees on accountings, should be constantly under the supervision of a competent head. All comparisons of papers should be made with him and the care and custody of the wills while being recorded should be his. In other words, this branch of the office should be in a department under a Superintendent, and, as he has to deal directly with most of the supplies of the office, it would be my idea to put all the supplies under his supervision, thus greatly facilitating their proper care and distribution."

The last item is the six additional Recording Clerks. The recording business of this office is increasing and has been increasing for years, but the number of Recording Clerks has remained the same; and the result is that the recording of wills and decrees on accountings has fallen behindhand to such a degree as to somewhat inconvenience the public. Every greatly need these Clerks and hope your Honorable Board will grant me them.

As to the contingent fund: \$1,000 is a very modest amount for this large office. I was allowed \$500 for the six months up to January 1, 1899, so that the sum asked for the year 1899 is the same in proportion as already granted.

I will appear before your Honorable Board whenever my presence is desired.

The reasons I ask for the above increase in the amount of salaries and for the new appropriations are as follows:

The Clerk of the Surrogate's Court, William Finley, is one of the poorest paid men in the State of New York. Not only are his duties laborious, but his position is a very responsible one, and the responsibility is continually increasing with the rapidly increasing population of our county. He is a thoroughly competent man for the position, he having filled it during the seventeen years of my service as County Judge and Surrogate. I can assure you that the amount of salary asked for him, viz., \$3,000, is not only reasonable, but is only just and fair for the services of so valuable an employee, and I respectfully urge that it be fixed at that amount.

Thomas Kenny, Jr., the Stenographer of the County Court and Surrogate's Court, is one of the most competent men in his profession, he having been complimented for his accuracy in reporting by many of the leading members of the New York Bar. His position is a most important one, and when it is taken into consideration that we have four Stenographers in this county, viz.: two in the Municipal Courts and two in the City Magistrates' Courts who draw salaries of \$2,000 each, I think the amount asked for Mr. Kenny is a modest sum, and I respectfully urge its adoption by your Board.

The increase I ask for my other two Clerks, viz.: C. Livingstone Bostwick and Joseph E. Mallins, is only fair and just, and proportionate to the value of the service performed by them.

The appropriation asked for a Court Crier and Attendant is necessary and important. No appropriation was made for this officer last year, as it was overlooked at the time my requisition was put in, and shortly after the old man who had filled the position for many years died, since which time we have been struggling along as best we could, the Sheriff of the County acting as Court Crier without compensation, as provided for by section 92 of the Code of Civil Procedure.

I would respectfully urge the appropriation asked for, to wh \$180, which is at the rate of \$15 per month for a Janitor of the court-rooms at St. George, as during the past year I have had to look after these rooms myself, which I do not think I am called upon to do. Prior to January 1, 1898, I had the use of rooms for holding Court in the Edgewater and New Brighton Village Halls. These halls became the property of the City on January 1 and were taken for the use of the Municipal and City Magistrates' Courts. On December 31, 1897, the Board of Supervisors of Richmond County leased for my use and for the use of the Supreme Court Special Term a suite of rooms in the First National Bank Building at St. George, but made no provision for the care of these rooms, and it is for this purpose the above appropriation is asked.

The item of \$600 for record books, stationery, etc., is estimated. No appropriation was asked heretofore, as I had provided myself prior to January 1 with sufficient supplies for my office to last until the present time.

There remains to my credit, unexpended from my appropriation for 1898, two hundred and fifty dollars, but I shall shortly need supplies for my office which I will ask to be provided for out of this unexpended balance.

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with section 230 (paragraph 12) and section 1503 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, I have the honor to submit the following Departmental Estimate of the amount necessary in order to conduct the business of the office of District Attorney in and for the County of New York for the year 1899, with a detailed statement of the objects of such expenditure, and a statement of the salaries of each of the officers, clerks and other employees in said office, as follows:

For salary of the District Attorney (section 1503 of the Consolidation Act of 1882).	\$12,000.00

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In consequence of an opinion of the Counsel in the Corporation, dated May 27, 1898, the amount necessary in the purchase of used books, printed forms, lithographed letter-heads, envelopes, etc., for the District Attorney's office, which have heretofore been procured through the office of the City Record, must now be included in this Departmental Estimate.

In comparing, therefore, the current expenses of this office for the present year, 1898, with the estimate made for the ensuing year, 1899, this sum of \$7,250, included in above estimate, which has heretofore come from a source extraneous to the District Attorney's office, to wit, the office of the City Recorder, must now be deducted in this Departmental Estimate.

My predecessor, in consequence of the enormous increase in the business of this office, found it necessary to add to the professional staff of Deputy Assistants on a temporarily reduced scale of compensation without proportionate necessary increase in the number of employees to aid them in performance of their duties.

On June 14, 1898, upon paper presentation of a detailed statement, your Board concurred in the submitted proposed re-arrangement of the submitted list of this office on its existing basis, but the approximation that made was for only one-half of the year, which will explain the difference in approximation between those and others in the particular.

As an offset to any unusual expenditures, it is proper to add that in the present year, under my administration at this office, I have collected and turned over to the City Chamberlain on an estimated average amount of \$20,667.42 and hope before the close of the year 1859 to add considerably to this amount, which is very much the largest sum of the kind collected in many years.

That your Honor may realize the amount of business now conducted through this office, arose from the very large number of civil, criminal, appearances in Magistrate's Courts, investigations by orders of Court, coroner's inquests, extradition requests, reports to Governor on applications for pardons, expels or suspensions on public business and examination and approval of bail bonds,

GENTLEMEN—The Children's Fold of The City of New York respectfully applies for the usual appropriation by your Honorable Board in its behalf, viz., seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000) for the ensuing year, reference being had to paragraph 5 of subdivision 22 of section 230 of the Charter of The City of New York, chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, and begs to submit a statement in regard to its work, as follows:

This institution was organized and incorporated upward of twenty-five years ago. Until the time of his death (about 1894), the Rev. Thomas M. Peters, D. D., was the President. He was widely known as connected with charities affecting children.

The objects of the institution are the maintenance, training and education of destitute children. The antecedents of these children are especially inquired into by the institution for the purpose of determining whether they are destitute and proper objects of charity. An examination of like character is conducted by the Commissioner of Charities of this city, and all children for whose support any portion of the City's appropriation is drawn have first been received and accepted as City charges by the Commissioner of Charities, or committed by magistrates.

The institution is under the supervision of the State Board of Charities, and its work has been universally commended, and in particular by the Department of Charities of this city. A list of its trustees is appended.

It has under its care some seventy girls in its house on One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, near St. Nicholas avenue, this city, and about one hundred boys at Mount Pleasant, Westchester County, New York. We have there two cottages in which are maintained these one

handicapped boys; also a chapel and school-house, superintendent's and reception house, and an infirmary, with wash and fields for the boys' playground. This plant has been paid for. The moneys received from the City have been expended solely towards the maintenance of the children.

The policy of keeping the boys in cottage families of from forty to sixty each and in the country has proved to be wise. Since the boys have been removed from the city to the country their general health has much improved (we have not had a case of serious illness among them for nearly three years), and they leave us better fitted in consequence to battle in the world.

The cost of this maintenance during the last fiscal year averages \$125 per child at Mount Vernon, and \$115 at the Girl's House or One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, toward which we receive \$100 per child from the City.

No trustee or officer of the institution receives any compensation for his services.

We annually make up the difference between the amount granted to us by the City and the actual expense of conducting the institution.

We respectfully request, therefore, that the same appropriation which has heretofore been made (\$100 per child, \$17,000) may, in the discretion of the Board, be deemed proper to be made for the coming year.

The hospital is entitled to receive eight thousand dollars under the provisions of chapter 424 of the Laws of 1893, but this amount being inadequate, as explained in the letter which accompanies this, we beg that you will grant the increased amount asked for.

GENTLEMEN.—In conformity with the request contained in the circular of the Comptroller dated July 22, 1898, the undersigned beg leave to submit to your Honorable Body the estimate of the amount necessary for the support of the Sloane Maternity Hospital for the year 1899.

This institution has received from the City, for the past five years, the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) annually, by virtue of an act of the Legislature (see chapter 424, Laws of 1893). In addition, the Hospital receives from an Endowment Fund the sum of \$12,500, making a total income amounting to \$20,500. This has not been sufficient to meet our expenses during the year 1897, nor, in fact, for previous years. The deficiency occurring each year has had to be made up by private contribution.

In April, 1897, a large and important addition to the Hospital was completed, the original building having proved too small to accommodate the patients applying for admission. We had often been compelled to put up beds in our halls to avoid turning away women brought to the Hospital in labor by ambulance. The addition referred to enabled us to increase the number of our beds from 45 to 150, and while our expenses have greatly increased our income has remained the same.

During the year 1897 there were 1,907 women confined in the hospital, and for the current year we estimate that the number of confinements will not be less than 1,200. In the past month (July) the number reached 112. The majority of our patients are poor and deserving, and but for our care they would necessarily become a charge upon the City, as the Department of Charities and Correction can vouch for, since our reports are examined by them. Our quarterly statement, as sent to the Comptroller, embraces only the names of those who are entitled to receive aid from the City, the Inspector of the Department of Charities and Correction carefully excluding all others.

The total amount of expenditures for the care and support of the 1,200 women treated in the hospital for the year 1897 was \$30,808.57, or about \$25,500 in excess of our income. For the present year our expenses will exceed \$35,000, and we will require at least that amount for the year 1899. Should your Honorable Body grant us the additional appropriation asked for we should even then be short of our requirements to the extent of about \$6,500. It does not seem right or just that we should receive so much less than other institutions engaged in similar work, and be obliged to trust to private benevolence each year to make up our deficiency.

Our hospital is pronounced by every one who has inspected it as the best of its kind in this or any country. It was built and equipped at a very large expense by private beneficence, and therefore has not cost the City anything. None of the physicians, either the house staff or the attending physicians, receive a dollar from the hospital. All our money is spent for the care of our patients.

The City has no lying-in hospital, except one on Blackwell's Island, and as very many of the patients we receive are taken suddenly ill they could never reach that isolated spot.

It seems, therefore, eminently proper that, as the City is unable to provide for these poor women in a hospital of its own, it should, at least, pay a thoroughly equipped hospital (erected at private expense) for the care of them.

It can be demonstrated that an institution, with a suitable building and partly endowed, can take care of these cases of confinement at a less cost to the City than if the City assumed care of them.

In view of these facts, we would respectfully submit to your Board our claim for an increase of our allowance for the year 1899 to \$16,000.

By chapter 263 of the Laws of 1871, section 3, the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York are directed to levy and collect, by tax upon the taxable property of the City and County of New York, the sum of \$5,000 and pay the same over to this corporation, to be applied to the purposes and objects of said corporation. The late Counsel to the Corporation, Francis M. Scott, furnished an opinion last year to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the intent and effect of chapter 354 of the Laws of 1895 is to make discretionary all mandatory laws adopted before January 1, 1895, imposing upon said Board the duty of making appropriations of the nature therein described, and that as to all such appropriations said Board is now vested with discretionary power. Notwithstanding this opinion of the learned Corporation Counsel, your Honorable Board appropriated \$5,000 for the year 1898, and we respectfully ask that for the coming year 1899 the same sum be appropriated for The Shepherd's Fold as has been heretofore annually appropriated for the objects of that corporation, viz., the sum of \$5,000. Some objection was urged before your Honorable Board to the appropriation of public funds for the benefit of work of The Shepherd's Fold, on the ground that The Shepherd's Fold should not be considered as a private institution, inasmuch as it had depended for the support of its work chiefly on the money derived from the City. With respect to this contention, I ask leave to submit the following facts: The Shepherd's Fold and also The Children's Fold are two charitable institutions closely allied to The Sheltering Arms, and are under the management of the same Board of Trustees, as above set forth, and they form one group of charitable institutions for the care and maintenance of indigent children. The houses of The Children's Fold and of The Shepherd's Fold are at Mount Vernon, New York, where the majority of the children in their care are kept, and these houses are located on land belonging to The Sheltering Arms, and held on lease from the latter institution. The connection between the three institutions is therefore of the very closest kind, and while organically separate, they are practically one body, carrying on the same work in different directions. The Sheltering Arms has always been widely and most favorably known as a charitable institution of the first order, and moreover, is one which has never asked for or received pecuniary aid from the City. Its expenses during the last fiscal year amounted to \$20,000, which were wholly derived from private sources. The Children's Fold expended in its work last year \$12,512.73, of which \$16,000 were derived from appropriations from the City. The Shepherd's Fold received from the City in appropriations for the year \$5,000 and expended \$6,857.50, therefore, the total expenses of these three allied institutions, for the year, amounted to \$45,370.75, of which \$21,000.75 only were derived from the City.

The Shepherd's Fold are now taking care of about forty-eight children. It is true that the houses in which these children are cared for are located beyond the city limits, and in the country; but all the children cared for come from the city, and it is respectfully submitted that it is not only an advantage to the children, but to the city at large, that they should be thus cared for in the country.

Each one treated by the Society is carefully investigated and no case is relieved unless absolutely destitute.

The Society now assumes charge of some three thousand poor women every year, treating them in their own homes and in its hospital. More than five per cent. of the total number of births in this city are cared for by this Society.

The work of the Society has greatly increased, nearly four hundred applicants applying in a single month for aid and treatment. We estimate for the current year that this number will be larger.

Our expenses amount to about \$32,000 per year; we receive from an endowment fund \$14,000, leaving \$18,000 to be provided for.

The hospital is open night and day, with an ambulance ready at a moment's notice.

Its inmates are chiefly the sick and wounded picked up in the streets at the call of the police.

The nature of the injuries are fractured skulls, broken limbs, stab wounds, contusions, poisonings and sunstroke cases, and every other disease or accident requiring immediate medical or surgical aid.

During the coming year, basing the calculations on the work done from January 1 to June 30, 1898, the following business will be transacted:

The number of patients that will be admitted to the hospital during the year 1899 will not be less than 950.

The number of days' treatment of patients admitted to the hospital will be about 22,000.

The number of in-patients acceptable to the Commissioners of the Outdoor Poor will not be less than 650.

The number of days these accepted cases will remain in hospital will not be less than 15,100.

The number of cases brought in or who come to the hospital for treatment of wounds, etc., but who are not kept in the wards over night, and are not therefore chargeable against the City, will not be less than 2,250, and the number of visits they will make for continued professional service, will be about 6,000.

The ambulance calls will aggregate about 1,100.

The Dispensary, which is open daily for outdoor patients, relies almost entirely upon the contributions of the benevolent for its support, and is not included in any of the above statistics.

The Laws of 1895, chapter 829, section 10, allowed at the rate of \$1 per diem for each indigent patient accepted by the Commissioners of Outdoor Poor, the amount being limited to \$12,000.

Under a recent resolution the hospital has been the recipient of \$7,500 per annum only.

As may be seen by the above figures, a balance of \$24,141 must be collected to meet the expenditures.

DEAR SIR.—Replies to your circular letter of July 22, 1898, our Board of Directors respectfully represent that our hospital has received annually from the City the sum of \$4,000 as part compensation for the support and medical treatment of those unable to provide for themselves hospital care. Under section 229, article 23 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is empowered to make such an appropriation, the consideration

being that the hospital contract to render medical aid to the poor, etc. I hardly need to say that this amount does not go very far towards defraying the expenses of medical treatment, nursing and maintenance of the poor we annually care for, but it greatly aids and encourages the charitably disposed to make liberal contributions to make up our deficiencies.

Our expenses for providing hospital treatment for the poor for the year 1897 I cannot estimate at less than \$15,000, basing my calculation on previous years.

Total expenditures of 1897, consisting of expenses of maintaining the hospital, including salaries and wages, provisions, light and fuel, medicine, and appliances, as well as incidental expenses, amounted to \$14,349.49.

Taking into consideration the growth of the institution and of expenditures from year to year, owing to the increasing demands made upon it, they expect that the expenses will be from three to four thousand dollars more the coming year than the past. We therefore request the stated appropriation of \$2,000, as provided in section 330 of the Greater New York Charter.

The salaries paid include the services of a superintendent, housekeeper, cook, laundry and kitchen help, as well as an engineer and fireman.

The total receipts for 1897 amounted to \$12,114, which included the following appropriations:

5. The number of homeless and needy mothers, with nursing infants, who were in the institution during the year, from September 1, 1897, to September 1, 1898, was 55, and the number of months said mothers resided there during the year was 349.

6. Computing these numbers in accordance with the terms of the statute above-mentioned, it would seem that the institution was entitled, during that year, to receive for—

4. The number of homeless and needy mothers with nursing infants who were in the institution during the year 1897 was 30, and the aggregate number of months said mothers resided there during the year was 165.

5. Computing these numbers in accordance with the terms of the statute above mentioned, it would seem that the institution was entitled during that year to receive

—and it is estimated that for the ensuing year at least as many will be taken care of.

CHAPTER 503.
An Act to change the name of the "Brooklyn Throat Hospital" became a law April 22, 1898, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The name of the Brooklyn Throat Hospital, a charitable corporation, organized under chapter three hundred and nineteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and forty-eight, entitled "An act for the incorporation of benevolent, charitable, scientific and missionary societies," and the acts amendatory thereof, the certificate of incorporation of which was filed in the office of the secretary of state on the twenty-sixth day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-nine, is hereby changed to the "Williamsburgh Hospital," and, as such, shall enjoy and exercise all the rights and powers that it has heretofore possessed and be subject to the same liabilities, obligations and duties as if this act had not been passed, including the rights and powers, liabilities, obligations

and duties appertaining to said Brooklyn Throat Hospital, under the provisions of chapter three hundred and seventy-eight, laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, being the Greater New York Charter. In addition to the powers already possessed by such corporation, it may furnish medical and surgical treatment for all diseases.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

In making this request, which is \$5,000 in excess of the amount granted by your Board for the year 1898, I desire to say that in replying to the request of the Comptroller to state the amount of money received by us from Long Island City for the year 1897, I made a serious mistake by giving only the amount received and made no mention of the amount owing for the same year.

The total amount received for 1897 was \$9,930, which was only payment for eight months, the City at the same time owing this hospital \$5,364.76 for four months (manner of payment has been \$1 per day for surgical cases, and 70 cents per day for medical patients).

Adding the amount received to the amount owing would for 1897 make a total of \$15,304.76; this would naturally prove that the sum of \$11,200 is not sufficient to meet the wants of this hospital.

The bills for the fore part of this year would have been very much larger but for the reason that for four months the patients which we should have received were sent to Flatbush instead, because of the reason given by Commissioner Sims that he had no funds from which to pay us.

However, since receiving the appropriation of \$11,200 for 1898 patients have been received in abundance, and as a proof that our bills are on the increase I would quote the amount for the month of July, which is \$1,392.60. If this average continues, the sum of \$15,000 will be fully required for the coming year.

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with your request of date July 22, 1898, I now respectfully submit an estimate of the amount required for the care and support of the inmates of the institution, as provided by law, in and for the year 1899.

This institution has six departments and one sub-department, all under one charter and administration. They are as follows: St. John's Hospital and Order of Trained Nurses, The Home for the Aged, The Orphan House, The Orphans' Press, The Atlantic Avenue Dispensary, The Home for the Blind.

The following is our estimate of total expenditure:

St. John's Hospital and Order of Trained Nurses,	\$35,000 00
Orphan House,	10,000 00
Home for the Aged	11,500 00
Sisters' House	500 00
Orphans' Press	9,000 00
Atlantic Avenue Dispensary	2,200 00
Home for the Blind	4,000 00

It may be proper to here remark that the work of these departments is substantially the same as last year, except that it has largely increased in the hospital and to a less degree in the other departments.

In 1897 the institutions cared for the following number of nearly persons the stated number of days:

St. John's Hospital, 727 persons, 21, 65 days.
Home for the Aged, 63 persons, 18,843 days.
Orphans' Press and Orphan House, 117 persons, 17,975 days.

Home for the Blind, 12 persons, 4,000 days.

Atlantic Avenue Dispensary, 8,800 patients were treated at Dispensary 12,358 times, and 531 patients were treated at their homes 504 times; therefore the total number treated by the Dispensary was 9,322, 12,862 times.

These institutions, with the exception of the Home for the Blind, have been accustomed to receive appropriations from the City of Brooklyn, in which they are located. The amount thus received by the foundation in 1897 amounted to \$10,072.22. Of this sum \$4,000 was for St. John's Hospital, an annual appropriation under act of Legislature.

This appropriation is continued under the present Charter of The City of New York (title 5, section 230).

\$1,500 was for the support of the ambulance of St. John's Hospital in amount of \$100 a month. Our bills were presented monthly and paid by the City Treasurer, on the authorization of the Health Department. We understand this arrangement to be substantially continued.

\$1,500 was for the Atlantic Avenue Dispensary.

This appropriation was increased to \$2,000 annually by title 5, section 231 of the Charter.

The remainder of these appropriations in 1897 and in previous years was:

First. Toward the maintenance of the school in the Orphan House, under the control of the Board of Education.

Second. An allowance in consideration of the care of the sick in the hospital and dispensary and the orphan and the aged in their respective homes.

We are not able to say by what laws these appropriations were authorized, but suppose continuance of such support during the year 1898 to be provided for by title 5, section 230, subdivision 4 of the Charter.

In addition to the above statement, covering, we hope, the points in your letter, we beg leave to call for a definite amount appropriation for the Home for the Blind; and also an allowance proportioned to the number of its inmates and the number of days' care given to them, as in the case of the other institutions.

This is now well understood by this institution late in 1896. Its nucleus was a small house for blind women, which had been conducted for a few months, near the Village of Maspeth, by several ladies, who, however, had not much knowledge of affairs or business, so that the home was rung to pieces.

We consider it because we know of the unusually worthy character of the inmates, and also desire to realize that it was high time something should be done for blind women in Kings and Queens Counties.

This is the only distinct provision made for them, aside from the Almshouse. It is not difficult for blind women to become educated, but it is exceedingly difficult for them to get a living otherwise.

At present the Home has twelve inmates and occupies a rented house in Maspeth, Borough of Queens. It is our intention to put up an appropriate building and to take a larger number as soon as means can be obtained.

This new work is an additional burden, which may be too heavy unless we can have some public assistance.

We therefore ask you to grant this Home for the Blind a sum corresponding to amount to that which is given to the similar Industrial Home for the Blind in Brooklyn, which undertakes to do for men what our Home will do for women.

That sum is named in the Charter of New York as \$2,500.

Our Home was brought into working form too late for authorization of such appropriation in the Charter.

We have three conferred with His Honor the Comptroller, and understand that it is with his approval that this application is made.

LONG ISLAND COLLEGE HOSPITAL—STATEMENT AND PETITION TO THE BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK FOR THE YEAR 1898.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN.—In compliance with the request of the Honorable the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated July 22, 1898, the Long Island College Hospital respectfully submits the following:

The Long Island College Hospital is a corporation duly organized under the provisions of chapter 20 of the Laws of 1858 of the State of New York, and acts ancillary thereto, and maintains in the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, in The City of New York, a general hospital for the treatment of medical and surgical cases; that as departments thereto, but under the same corporate name and management, it maintains the Maternity of the Long Island College Hospital and the Dispensary of the Long Island College Hospital (incorrectly termed the Long Island Dispensary in the law referred to below).

By section 230 of the Greater New York Charter it is provided (paragraph 23): "The board of estimate and apportionment are hereby authorized in their discretion to include in their annual statement and estimate the following specified sums of money for the respective purposes herein stated, viz.:"

To be paid to the Long Island College Hospital. \$4,000 00

To be paid to the Long Island College Dispensary (the Dispensary of the Long Island College Hospital). 1,500 00

To be paid to the Maternity of the Long Island College Hospital. 2,500 00

Such several sums of money is to be paid to the several institutions in consideration of their continuing to render and rendering medical and surgical aid and treatment to the poor of the County of Kings who may apply to them therefor; such contract to be in writing, executed on behalf of the City by the Mayor and Comptroller, and also by the executive officers of said associations respectively, and to be approved by the Council to the Corporation of the City, to be filed annually on or before the 1st day of May in the office of the City Clerk.

That such contract, in writing, was duly executed on or about March 7, 1898, by the Mayor and Comptroller on behalf of the City, and by the executive officers of the Long Island College Hospital on behalf of the Long Island College Hospital, the Maternity of the Long Island College Hospital, and the Dispensary of the Long Island College Hospital, was duly approved by the Council to the Corporation, and duly filed before the 31st day of May, 1898, in the office of the City Clerk.

That during the past year the Long Island College Hospital (including the Maternity of the Long Island College Hospital and the Dispensary of the Long Island College Hospital) has rendered, free of charge, medical and surgical aid and treatment to the poor of Kings County who applied to it therefor; that the number of such persons treated in the general hospital of the Long Island College Hospital (exclusive of the Maternity and the Dispensary) was 1,105, who remained in the hospital 22,500 days; that the number of such persons treated in the Maternity of the Long Island College Hospital was 240, who remained in the hospital 4,149 days; that the number of such persons treated in the Dispensary of the Long Island College Hospital was 21,814, who made 53,877 visits; that such persons were without any means to pay for their board and treatment, so that they would otherwise have become a charge upon the City.

That during the present year the number of persons applying for medical and surgical aid and treatment, it is estimated, will be as large as, if not larger, than that of the past year.

That the Long Island College Hospital is without any endowment and is wholly dependent

upon its current receipts to meet its current expenses which, in the past year, amounted to \$46,281.30.

Wherefore the Long Island College Hospital respectfully petitions your Honorable Board to include in your statement and estimate the sum of \$4,000 to be paid to the Long Island College Hospital; \$1,500 to the Dispensary of the Long Island College Hospital, and \$2,500 to the Maternity of the Long Island College Hospital.

GENTLEMEN.—Pursuant to chapter 235 of the Laws of New York, 1896, and amendment thereto, and title 5, chapter 378, Laws of New York, 1897, we beg herewith respectfully to submit the estimate of the several amounts which, in our judgment, will be necessary for the suitable conduct of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys for the year 1898. This estimate is based on an average daily attendance of two hundred boys, the estimate for the current year having been based on one-half that number, which has been slightly exceeded.

There are in the school at the present time (August, 1898) one hundred and thirty (130) children, so that we deem our estimate of the average number to be provided for in 1898 is considerably under the number that might be expected, but our present limited accommodations will not permit of the care of a larger number; and while we have made an estimate, through the Department of Public Buildings and Lighting, for such additional accommodations as are so manifestly necessary, we do not know that such accommodations will be provided in time for occupancy during the following year, and, therefore, limit our estimate in accordance with our present facilities.

The figures submitted represent the amount appropriated by the State, and apportioned by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to the entire City of New York for the year 1898, in order to take advantage of which the laws require that the City should appropriate in addition a similar sum. The apportionment by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction of State Library money applicable to the year 1899 will not be made for some time yet. It is therefore impossible to anticipate the exact sum which it is necessary to appropriate under the circumstances. The figures for 1898 are therefore submitted in the belief that they will nearly equal the probable apportionment by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. If such be the case, it will be necessary to request a small transfer in order that the City shall receive the full benefit of the State apportionment.

Manhattan and The Bronx has three High Schools, Brooklyn has four, Queens has eleven schools and classes, and Richmond has some schools and classes which are registered by the Regents.

These buildings will accommodate the school children for 1800, and do away with the annexes, which are unsuitable for school purposes, and withal wasteful from every point of view. The Superintendent estimates that there are at least, with all the annexes, at present 3,000 children without school accommodation in Long Island City alone, and no buildings suitable for annexes; those now in use are very unsatisfactory.

The fact that the City's bonded indebtedness appears to have reached its limit at this time precludes the issue of any School-house Bonds heretofore authorized by special acts of the Legislature. The necessity for additional school-house accommodations is apparent to a greater or less extent throughout each of the boroughs contained within The City of New York; therefore it has been deemed expedient to include, as one of the items of the Special School Fund, the amount of \$9,473,630, as representing the immediate needs of the City.

Under the provisions of sections 1050 and 1060 of the Charter, it appears to be proper to present this item to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and Municipal Assembly, to be included in the tax levy of 1899. In connection with this matter, the Committee desires to call attention to the fact that the existing conditions in relation to the City's bonded indebtedness are similar to the conditions prevailing some fourteen or fifteen years ago. At that time the difficulty was overcome in the case of School-homes Bonds by including in the tax budget an amount sufficient for the necessities for school accommodations existing at that time. Subsequently the master of the City's bonded indebtedness was elucidated, and the City Treasury was re-balanced by the sale of School-homes Bonds to the extent of what had been paid out of account of the tax levy.

In view of the fact that it is believed that the present difficulty in relation to the issuing of bonds will be settled or overcome by the middle of the year 1899, the Committee deems it proper to call attention to the precedent which occurred in the past, with the hope that it may be of some use and assistance in obtaining money for the purpose of providing school accommodations for the waiting masses.

In the schedules submitted in relation to the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx relative to accommodation for elementary schools, particular attention is called to the fact that the buildings and improvements contemplated therein are confined to sites and school premises at this time in possession of the Board of Education and awaiting development. In several instances bids have been invited and already accepted, and if provision be made, work could be commenced at the beginning of next year. Schedules are also submitted showing the actual requirements for additional school accommodations in the Borough of Queens. In the case of the Borough of Richmond an item of \$150,000 has been inserted tentatively, though actual locations and descriptions cannot be given at this time. In regard to the matter of High Schools in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, the Legislature authorized by special act the issue of \$2,500,000 of bonds for the establishment of four High Schools. Sites have been chosen, condemnation proceedings instituted and plans and specifications prepared for the building, all of which matters are now in abeyance, while the demand for this form of education still increases.

The increase requested is slight, and is mainly due to the fact that the contracts for fuel have been let in bulk, covering all boroughs, by which method considerable saving has been effected. The increase in Manhattan and the Bronx is for extra weighbars and moving scales, in view of the increased distances to be covered, owing to recent annexation of territory north of the Harlem. The increase of \$2,000 in Brooklyn is intended to cover the purchase of coal scales and the cost of moving them from place to place; also, repairs, etc. The system of weighing coal outside the school-house doors, in vogue in the former City of New York, is found to be beneficial, and is, therefore, extended to Brooklyn.

The increase over the appropriation for 1898 is \$79,720, and may be accounted for by stating that the sum allowed for 1898 was intended to cover the cost of administrative expenses for the last half of the year. Owing to the fact that the practical organization of the several bureaus of the Department did not occur until July 1, 1898, and also the fact of the inadequate facilities for conducting business, occasioned by the very limited available space at the Hall of the Board of Education, many appointments have remained in abeyance, through sheer lack of room in which to place the necessary employees. This fact has involved extra labor on the part of many, in order that delay should not occur in the regular matters of business routine. The increase over 1898 salaries of \$26,930, referred to in the foregoing schedule is, therefore, in part only apparent, by reason of the fact that the appropriation for the present year has not been wholly used, for the reasons hereinbefore stated. Arrangements in regard to additional space are now in progress, whereby it will be possible to employ the necessary additional assistance. On the basis of the appropriation of \$62,520.26 for six months of 1898, the annual rate would necessarily be \$125,-040.32; and, deducting the last-mentioned sum from \$142,240 (the amount of the estimate for 1898), the true increase will be found to be \$17,199.48, which amount is intended to cover the cost of additional help to be employed in the year 1899, and for some small increases to the salaries of a few worthy employees.

Under the provisions of the Greater New York Charter and the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, it appears that the Corporate Schools throughout the city are entitled to participate in the school money comprised within the General School Fund in like manner and degree as the Public Schools of the city. Under this construction of the law, the Corporate Schools of the former City of Brooklyn will be entitled to receive a larger share of school moneys than they have heretofore received. The School Board for the Borough of Brooklyn has tentatively submitted the sum of \$105,000, said amount being considered necessary to meet such share in the General School Fund as the Corporate Schools of the Borough of Brooklyn are entitled to receive under the Charter as construed by the Corporation Counsel.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith statements showing in detail the amounts necessary to be included in the Budget for 1899, for interest on the city debt, for the redemption of the city debt, and for Sinking Fund instalments payable in 1899.

These amounts may be summarized as follows:

For interest on the city debt outstanding on October 10, 1898,	\$9,278,385.04
For interest on funded debt to be issued after October 10, 1898, and during the year 1899,	1,277,393.70

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In addition to these detailed statements I also present a statement of all bonds maturing during the year 1899, and payable from the Sinking Funds or from assessments; and statements showing, item by item, the detail of the manner in which Sinking Fund instalments have been calculated.

The item of \$9,412,950.00 for redemption of the city debt includes the redemption of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$7,175,850.88, for deficiencies in the tax levies of the several municipal corporations consolidated into the present City of New York available for the Budget of 1898. This is an unusual item, due to the financial scheme of the Greater New York Charter, and will not appear in any future budget.

I have not included in the item for the redemption of the city debt the amounts necessary to redeem \$2,715,000 Six Per Cent. Water Bonds of the City of Brooklyn maturing July 1, 1899, nor \$500,000 Special Assessment Bonds of The City of New York for the Park Avenue Improvement maturing November 1, 1899. Neither of these issues is redeemable from taxation. The water bonds of the City of Brooklyn are payable from the Brooklyn Water Sinking Fund, which will not, however, possess sufficient cash to redeem the same. These bonds will, therefore, have to be refunded pursuant to the provisions of section 235 of the Charter.

The Fourth Avenue Improvement Bonds of The City of New York are payable from assessments to be levied for said improvement. No assessment has been levied for this purpose, however, and these bonds will have to be refunded as was done in 1897, pursuant to the advice of the Corporation Counsel.

I also present a statement showing the amount necessary to be raised for account of the Fund for Street and Park Openings, the aggregate amount thereof being \$7,145,062.00.

This exceptionally large amount is due to the inability of the City to issue lawfully, within constitutional limitations, bonds for the payment of awards chargeable against the Fund for Street and Park Openings. The figure above stated includes awards in the Elm street proceeding which, with interest, amount to \$5,068,521.58, and awards in the fourth section of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, amounting to \$323,034.39, three-quarters of which, or \$392,275.84, would ordinarily have been paid for by the issue of funded obligations.

From the total deficiency balance of the Fund for Street and Park Openings of \$7,145,062.06 mentioned above, however, it will be possible to deduct the sum of \$2,696,548.50 being the amount of Corporate Stock authorized to be issued for the payment of that portion of the Elm street widening assessment levied against the city. It will be possible before the end of the year to invest this amount of surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund in these bonds. This leaves as the net amount to be included in the Budget for the Fund for Street and Park Openings, \$4,448,513.56, of which \$3,664,248.89 is of an extraordinary character, and of which at least \$2,700,688.50 will be hereafter returned to the City Treasury by assessments to be collected.

The amounts to be inserted in the Budget on account of the foregoing items, viz.: interest, redemption and instalments of the city debt, and the Fund for Street and Park Openings aggregate \$27,925,353.64, which is \$13,024,573.40 in excess of the aggregate of the corresponding items in the last Budget.

Or this increase of \$13,024,573.40 all but \$2,064,473.53 is attributable to the abnormal conditions resulting from consolidation, which will not occur again in the future, shown as follows:

The remaining increase of \$9,151,473.53, while it results from conditions which cannot be either abated or compared with similar conditions likely to prevail in future budgets, is, nevertheless, due to causes wholly beyond the control of the present financial officers of the city as shown by the following statement:

Increase on amount required for interest on Revenue Bonds due to the fact that next year such bonds will have to be issued in anticipation of the tax levy of the new city, instead of being based on the tax levy of the City of New York as formerly constituted.

Increase on amount required to be raised for interest on bonds to be issued before January 1, 1900, due to the necessity for paying for a number of parks which have been in process of condemnation for the past four years, for issuing bonds to liquidate contract liabilities incurred prior to January 1, 1898, and for providing for work on the new East River Bridge, and for new school houses.

For two new annual Sinking Fund instalments required by the Charter

For increase in Sinking Fund remaining of the City of Brooklyn, due to an increase having been made for bonds issued in 1897 after the passage of the Budget for 1892.

For interest and principal of a portion of the debt of the County of Queens which did not have to be provided for in the Budget of 1898.

For increase in the amount required for the Fund for Street and Park Openings (other than for amounts shown as stated above), being wholly for purposes incurred prior to January 1, 1898.

For sums of amounts required for interest on the city debt (other than as stated above), being what may be called normal increase, and representing the excess of the annual required for interest on bonds issued during the current year over and above the amount no longer required for interest on bonds that have been redeemed during the current year.

Excess of the amounts required for redemption purposes in 1898 over amounts acquired in 1897 (other than as stated above).

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sens—I am in receipt of a communication from Charles V. Ader, Esq., Clerk to your Board, inclosing a copy of a resolution adopted by you on September 22, 1808, and which is as follows:

"Whereas, It is provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter, that the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses in the several counties wholly or partly included within The City of New York, shall be provided for by the laying of taxes upon each of said counties, to the end that they shall similarly bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county or part of county for County or Municipalities from city purposes, thereby making it necessary that all County charges shall be stated separately in the budget for
the year.

"Whereas, For many years prior to January 1, 1898, county expenses in the County of New York were not separated from the expenses of The City of New York, and so many cases should exist as to whether expenses to be provided for in the budget for 1899 will be classified as city or county expenses;

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at his earliest convenience, in regard to each of the items authorized in the Departmental Estimates for 1890, stating which shall be regarded as city and which as county charges, to the end that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly and lawfully classify the same in the estimates for the year (Signed.)"

If it were necessary to comply with your request by following its exact terms, I fear it would be impossible for me to give you the information sought for before your Board has closed its hearings upon the budget.

The difficulty was not always solved by ascertaining whether the item in question was originally a county charge, because there have been changes of administration which have made many county charges a charge upon the city, and also there have been in the former city, as there are in the present city, a number of charges upon the city which in other parts of the State are

To comply with your request I have examined the estimates of the departments considered by you and have divided them into schedules, as appears in the papers annexed to this communication.

I have placed in Schedule "A," under the heading of the various counties, all the items contained in the estimates mentioned which I think are county charges.

I will, therefore, ask you to use the schedules in question as an answer to your communication, and I will now consider some items in the two schedules as to which I desire to state my

Commissioner of Juries for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.
I have placed this item among the county charges of New York County, for although it is in

I have placed this item among the county charges of New York County, for although it is in form a provision for the expence of a burrough office, yet the office is a local one, having no reference whatever to the government or administration of the city or the burroughs in question. It was originally classed as a county charge, and I do not think it would be fair to compel the other

And I lay special stress upon the nature of the duties of the office in determining whether or not it is a city or a county one.

Court of General Sessions.
The Court of General Sessions is a purely local court, with a county jurisdiction, it being in

The following expenses : Fees of Grand and Party Jurors, and Expenses of Juries ; Fees of Stenographers ; Fees of Witnesses on behalf of the People ; Office Contingencies and Rent of Telephones ; Disbursements and Fees of Commissions (section 658, Code of Civil Procedure), and Library Funds, form a part of the expenses of the Court and, as given on page 633 of the "Esti-

While it is perfectly easy to decide, under the Military Code, that the expenses of the armories are a County charge, yet the Armory of the First Naval Battalion presents a somewhat difficult

As I understand it, the headquarters of the Battalion are on board the New Hampshire, which lies within waters which form part of the County of New York, and under the Military Code this ship is considered as the Armory of the Battalion (Military Code section 142).

I have held, in accordance with the undoubted fact, that the Supreme Court expenses form a

County Treasurer of Kings County.

I do not know whether the omission of this official was intentional, but think it well to call your attention to the fact that it is not contained in the estimates.

If inserted, the charge for his services is, of course, a county charge of Kings County.

College of the City of New York and Normal College.

These institutions have been placed among the city charges because the citizens of the present city have an undoubted right to make use of their advantages, as will be seen by an examination of the sections of the Charter relating to them.

The City Court of New York.

This court never was a county court and never had any relation to the county organization; it was distinctively a part of the city and not county system.

The Inferior Local Courts.

The civil and criminal courts of inferior jurisdiction, namely, the Municipal Courts, the Courts of Special Sessions and the City Magistrates' Courts are, I think, clearly to be classed among the charges upon the city.

While in each case the jurisdiction of a particular court may not extend to the whole city, yet these courts form part of one system covering the entire city and having no relation whatever to any county organization.

The fact that a particular court has jurisdiction in one part of the city and not in another does not make it a part of the county system any more than the fact that the city departments are in some cases divided as to jurisdiction in the different boroughs, so that the Park Commissioner in one borough has no jurisdiction in another. And what may be taken as a fairly reliable test, these courts are mentioned in the Charter, for it will be found that almost every department, or board, or organized body exercising jurisdiction of whatsoever nature within the city, mentioned in the Charter, is distinctly within the city, and not within any county organization.

Free Libraries.

There are in the estimates before your Board a great number of free libraries asking an appropriation.

I do not think that the appropriations to these institutions can be said to be county charges.

While the libraries in question are situated in different counties, yet they are free to the use of any of the citizens of the city, irrespective of the particular county in which he resides, and it would be, I think, not only bad law but bad policy to class these institutions among the county charges.

Charitable Institutions.

A question of very great importance is that connected with charitable institutions receiving aid from the city.

In all the counties of the state, except those embraced within The City of New York, assistance rendered to the poor is distinctly a county charge.

But, in the present city, a department of the City Government is charged with the special duty of exercising public charity, and the head of that department, the Commissioners of Public Charities, are most distinctly City officials.

As the charable system of the city is a city and not a county charge, there exists logically no reason why the appropriations to special institutions should be left as a charge upon the counties.

There are, as I have already pointed out, certain charitable institutions which form an exception to the rule here laid down, and which are, I think, county charges.

These have all been enumerated in this opinion.

I believe that the foregoing answers the request received from your Board, but if it does not, I will be glad to consider such other matters as you may present to me.

You will, of course, understand that the enumeration of county and city charges given in the annexed schedule, only embraces those contained in the "Estimate" of the departments above referred to.

There are doubtless other charges which must be inserted by your Board in the Budget, but they are not embraced within the question asked by you.

Hon. BIRD S. COOK, Comptroller:

Sir—I am in receipt of your communication bearing date October 16, in which you state that my communication of the 17th instant, addressed to the Board of Estimates and Apportionment relative to the question of what should constitute county, as distinguished from city charges in the Budget, has been referred to you.

You further state that as I pointed out in that communication there are a number of items which appear in the Budget which have not been printed in the Book of Departmental Estimates, and concerning these you have requested my further advice.

The items in question are ten in number and I will enumerate these in connection with the answers to your questions in regard thereto.

1. Code of Commitments of Insane Persons (not criminals) chapter 545, Laws of 1890. The statute referred to is the Insanity Law.

The provisions of that statute which control are those contained in sections 64, 66 and 67 with which we read section 671 of the Charter, and the Insanity Law should, of course, be construed in connection with chapter 13 of the Charter with reference to the Department of Public Charities.

Without elaborating my answer to this question, as you have requested me to render an opinion as soon as possible, I will state that having regard to the provisions of the Insanity Law and of the Charter, I think that these costs are a city and not a county charge.

2. Fees of Clerk of Court of General Sessions.

Under the reasoning of my opinion cited by you these are county charges.

3. Corporation advertising. Section 1526, Charter.

This is a city and not a county charge.

While the provision of the section in relation to corporation advertising relates only to the Borough of Brooklyn and is for the benefit solely of certain newspapers therein, the advertisements in question are in connection with the administration of the city and not of the county, and are, therefore, city charges.

4. Allowances to veteran associations for Decoration Day observances. Chapter 13, Laws of 1897.

5. Observance of Memorial Day, Kings County. Chapter 538, Laws 1895.

6. Observance of Memorial Day, New York County.

7. Kings County Volunteer Firemen's Association. Chapter 658, Laws 1895.

I think that items 4 to 7 inclusive, are all city charges, and I draw this conclusion from the terms of the acts under which they are authorized in relation to items 3, 5 and 6, and as item 7 is of the same character as the ones just mentioned, it should also be placed as a city charge.

8. Offices of the Registers of New York and Kings Counties.

These are clearly County offices.

9. Expenditures made necessary for the preparation of public records under chapter 467 of the Laws of 1890.

Under my former opinion these are county charges.

10. In accordance with the decision of the Board of Estimates and Apportionment provision will be made for supplying the Supreme Court, and many courts and officers in the several counties with printing, stationery and black books, through the medium of the Board of City Record, the appropriations for each county to be kept separate.

Under this last question you request to be advised whether the fact that the Board of City Record is a branch of the City Government will prevent these charges as being classed as county charges.

The answer to this question must be that the fact that the instrumentality through which provision is made for supplies that are essentially county charges is a branch of the City Government does not in any way change the character of the items or make them city charges.

The items in question, therefore, remain county charges.

I would also call your attention in connection with your communication to the provisions of chapter 439 of the Laws of 1892, "An Act for the Care and Reformation of Females and Concerning the Public Interests in the City of Brooklyn and County of Kings."

This act provides for certain appropriations to the Wayside Home, No. 352 Bridge Street, and the Roman Catholic House of Good Shepherd at Rockaway and Hopkinson avenues in the former City of Brooklyn, County of Kings.

I would advise you that the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this act are county charges upon the County of Kings.

I think the foregoing answers the questions asked in your communication.

Sir—I am in receipt of your communication bearing date October 22, calling my attention to the estimate of the New York Institution for the Blind, on page 695 of the book of Departmental Estimates for the year 1898.

You request my opinion as to whether the expenses of this institution chargeable against The City of New York, should be regarded as city or county charges, and in this connection you call my attention to the provisions of chapter 166 of the Laws of 1870.

In reply to your communication I have to say that, from chapter 166 of the Laws of 1870, it clearly appears that the estimate of the New York Institution for the Blind is a county and not a city charge.

Hon. BIRK S. COOPER, Comptroller:

Sir—I am in receipt of your communication, bearing date October 26, in which you call my attention to sections 226, 269, 269, 280 and 1503 of The Greater New York Charter, and request my opinion upon the following points:

1. Has the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the power to make, and should that Board make, a Budget of county expenses for the year 1899, as well as city expenses?

2. If that Board should make such budget estimates for county, as well as city expenses, do I advise a classification thereof, which will show the items relating to each county separately under a general heading, such as "County of Kings," with separate headings for the items at each county, and one grand total for the whole budget?

3. I am requested to draft a form of resolution, to be used in passing the budget.

The questions suggested in your communication are of the very greatest importance, but in view of the necessity for an immediate answer, I must return my comments somewhat briefly.

The answer to your first question must, I think, be in the affirmative.

It cannot be maintained that the provisions of the Charter upon the subject clearly and definitely point out the procedure to be followed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, regarding its action as to county charges.

It would be possible, from the provisions of the Charter, to spell out two different theories.

Under the first theory, and the one which I think is the correct one, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment includes in its Budget for the expenses of the year the county charges to be apportioned.

If this is the first instance, as regards these charges, as it was in relation to the charges upon the City itself, making reasonable provision for county expenses, where there is no statute fixing the amount thereof, and where there is a section inserting the statutory amount in its estimate, and the Budget of county charges is sent as part of the General Budget to the Municipal Assembly, together with the Budget of city charges.

The other theory is, that no action is required by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in regard to county charges, while it is making up the Budget, and that these charges are to be submitted by the Comptroller and sent by him to the Municipal Assembly for its action.

Exactly what action can be taken by the Municipal Assembly if this theory is followed, is a question upon which I am not much clear.

The practical effect, however, of such a course would be most unfortunate for the City's financial interests. Sir, under this theory, the only action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in relation to the funds provided by the section 1503 of the Charter, would be a formal examination of these at the time when their payment is due, and an appropriate disapproval of the same.

As some of these items are made county charges by statute which do not fix their amounts, it is to be feared that the second theory, if carried into practice, would open the door to very grave abuses, which need not be more particularly pursued at this place.

Coming from these general considerations to an examination of the Charter provisions, I will attempt to explain why I think the first theory above set forth is the correct one.

In the first place, it is to be noted that the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is clearly called for, in relation to any expense which is payable out of the City Treasury, except in special cases otherwise provided for.

Section 1503 of the Charter is as follows:

"Section 1503. It shall be the duty of the heads of all departments of said city, and of all boards and officers charged with the duty of maintaining or securing supplies, payables out of the moneys raised by tax in said city, to regulate such expenditures for any purpose or object, that the same shall not in any one year exceed the annual appropriation by the board of estimate and apportionment for such purpose or object, and no charge, claim or liability shall exist or arise against said city for any sum unappropriated for the several purposes."

Under the provisions of this section, I think county charges are included in the "obligations payable out of the money raised by tax in said city," and that by the enactment of this section, as part of the Charter, is formed a new provision of the Consolidation Act, has been intended so as to include obligations of other character payable out of the City Treasury.

I think, however, that we cannot interpret the section, and every presumption is in favor of such an interpretation.

While sections 269 and 280 are not very artificially worded, I do not think that the conclusion must flow from their language that the restraint is to be submitted by the Comptroller to the Municipal Assembly preventing the including of county charges in the annual Budget, or an examination of the section shows that the Comptroller's statement eliminates considerably more than the Budget itself, including an estimate of the probable amount of taxation, etc.

I am not prepared to say that in case of the omission or removal of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to include the county charges in the annual Budget, that the Comptroller would not be legally entitled to act in such case and sending to the Municipal Assembly a separate statement of the county charges, but that such is his duty in any event, and without regard to the action of the Municipal Assembly, I should be very unwilling to hold, unless the provisions of the Charter were more specifically than they are on the subject.

I am forced in my conclusion by an examination of section 1503 of the Charter, which it appears follows:

"Sec. 1503. The salaries of all county officers in the counties of New York, Kings and Richmond shall, unless otherwise provided by law, be fixed by the board of estimate and apportionment, subject to approval by the municipal assembly, and all county charges and expenses and salaries of county officers in said counties and each of them shall be paid by the board of estimate and apportionment, and shall be paid by The City of New York, in the same manner as the salaries of city officers and city charges are paid; but nothing in this section contained shall be construed as to any way changing or modifying the provision contained in section 269 of this act, to the effect that the same necessary to defray the salaries of county officers and to pay county charges and expenses in said counties shall be levied and assessed upon the property of said three counties, respectively, so that each shall ultimately bear and pay all its own county charges."

I think that under this section, as with the ones I have already referred to, the proper construction is, that it is the duty of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to make the county charges part of its Budget.

The second question in your communication is as to the form of the Budget.

I think that it is preferable to make a classification, which will show separately the items and totals chargeable to each county, as, while from both city and county, from part of the general expenses made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, they do not stand upon the same footing, and they are paid in different ways.

I think, therefore, that clearness would be promoted by separating the county from the city charges, under a form of resolution which I give herewith.

Your third request is to draft a form of resolution to be used in passing the Budget.

I think the resolution should be in the following form:

"Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 269 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the aforesaid vote of all the members thereof hereby resolve that the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, being, first, the amount estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, and, secondly, the amount estimated to be required to pay the State tax and charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-three million five hundred and six thousand seven hundred and fifty-seven dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$93,506,757.98), as follows:—"

As you will see from an examination of the proposed resolution, it makes the county charges a part of the General Budget to be raised by taxation, but prevents any confusion between the city and county items.

It seems to me that under this form of resolution, it would be perfectly safe and much more preferable to separate the county from the City charges in the Budget.

As I have already said, I am forced to be very brief in my answer to your communication, as you inform me that immediate action by the Board is necessary.

Sir—I am in receipt of your communication, bearing date October 26, transmitting a resolution which you have received from the State Comptroller, certifying the amount which should be apportioned in the Budget for 1899, on account of the county expenses of Queens County, as required by section 1503 of the Charter, at the sum of \$235,392.91.

You also transmit, for my information, a report made to you by one of the expert accountants, in which he incorporates the budget of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Queens.

In view of the provisions of law embodied in the Act of 1898, creating the new County of Nassau, you request me to advise you whether the amount, as certified by the Comptroller, should be included in the Budget for 1899.

You readily repeat an immediate answer to your communication.

In view of the request for an immediate answer, I cannot avail myself with saying that I do not think the Act of 1898, creating the new County of Nassau, should prevent the insertion in the Budget for 1899 of the county expenses of Queens County, as certified by the State Comptroller, and I think the county expenses in question should be included in the Budget for 1899.

That the said sum of \$181,000 be certified to the said Comptroller of the State of New York at the amount of the county charges and expenses for the year 1899, which would be equitably borne by that part of the County of Queens situated within The City of New York and that he be requested to repeat the said amount to the Comptroller of said City.

Resolved, That the following amounts be certified by the Clerk of this Board to the Comptroller of the State of New York, as the amount of money to be raised by assessment and tax in the County of Queens at present constituted for its proportion of the State tax for the current year, for its county charges and expenses during 1899, as audited and allowed by the Board of Supervisors thereat at the annual audit of 1898, for the amount of the interest on Queens County Bonds growing due in 1899, and for the interest on certificate of Queens County Court Fund Loan, respectively, as follows:

That the said sum of four hundred and seventy-one thousand and forty-eight dollars and seventy-nine cents be certified to said Comptroller of the State of New York, in order that he may apportion the same and determine the amount of tax for state purposes which should be paid by that part of the County of Queens included in The City of New York, and transmit his statement of such amount to the Comptroller of The City of New York, for levy and collection by said city; and the amount of the county charges and expenses of school which should be equitably borne by that part of the County of Queens situated within The City of New York, and report the amount thereof to the said Comptroller of The City of New York, to be levied and assessed by the municipal assembly of said city upon that part of the County of Queens included within said city to be collected by said city."

It was also

Resolved, That certified copies of the foregoing resolutions be forwarded to counsel and to the Comptroller of the State by the Clerk of this Board.

In pursuance of section 1503 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1898, no tax was decided as by the Board of Supervisors to be levied for the purpose of providing the foregoing items of appropriation, and section 1503 of the said chapter provides that:

"The comptroller of the state shall have power and he is hereby authorized to determine on or before the first day of October in each year the amount of the county charges and expenses which should be equitably borne by that part of the county of Queens situated within the city of New York as hereby constituted, and to report the amount thereof to the comptroller of the said city. The amount so determined by the comptroller of the state shall be levied and assessed by the municipal assembly of said city upon that part of the county of Queens included within said city."

Section 1503 further provides that—

"It shall be the duty of the comptroller of the state, on or before the first day of October in each year, to compute and apportion the amount of tax for city purposes which should be paid by that part of the county of Queens by this act included in The City of New York, and to transmit a statement of such amount to the comptroller of The City of New York for levy and collection for the said city."

It will be noted that the sum total appropriated to provide for the expenses of the County of Queens for the year 1899, and which said amount is to be wholly charged against the Borough of Queens, amounts to \$174,900, and the sum total to be apportioned by the State Comptroller between the Borough of Queens and that part of the County of Queens situated without the corporate limits of The City of New York is \$471,328.79. In this latter is included an item of \$102,320, for interest on Queens County bonds, and I desire to call attention to the fact that no provision has been made for the retirement of \$15,000 Queens County Funding Bonds of issue July 1, 1892, and in which said amount the principal on these bonds becomes payable on July 1, 1899. From information gathered I understand that the said principal maturing on July 1, 1899, was called to the attention of the Board of Supervisors, who, however, failed to place it in the budget, but said, if no other way was found it could be taken from the Contingent Fund. The Contingent Fund appropriation of \$102,000, to provide for anticipated expenses of 1899 is wholly chargeable against the Borough of Queens. While the principal of any issue of Queens County bonds maturing and to be retired should be apportioned as is the interest against the Borough of Queens, as now constituted, and that part of the county lying without the corporate limits of The City of New York, the Supervisor in the Budget appropriations made no provision whatever for the retirement of \$10,000 and \$9,000, principal maturing on July 1, 1899, respectively, of the Jericho Turnpike Improvement Bonds and Flushing Highway Improvement Bonds.

Exhibit "A" herewith appended and forming part of this report, gives copies of sections from the resolutions authorizing the issue of these bonds and clearly indicate that beginning with July 1, 1897, \$10,000 should have been retired annually of the Jericho Turnpike Improvement Bonds and \$9,000 annually of the Flushing Highway Improvement Bonds. No provision whatever has been made for the retirement on July 1, 1899, of these bonds.

Exhibit "B" which is also submitted herewith and forming part of this report, sets forth in detail the interest accruing during 1899 on the several issues of Queens County Bonds, the sum total of which, viz.: \$102,320 agrees with the amount placed in the budget by the Board of Supervisors.

The apportionment of the expenses to be borne by the Borough of Queens and the towns situated without the Borough, according to the statement of the Clerk to the Board of Supervisors, has not yet been received from the State Comptroller.

I understand that a meeting of the Board of Supervisors will be held on Tuesday or Wednesday of this week and I will then ascertain as to whether said apportionment has been received and, if so, report accordingly.

IN THE MATTER OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF SECTION 901, CHAPTER 378 OF THE LAWS OF 1897.

HON. BIRD S. COLE, Comptroller:

SIR—I acknowledge the receipt of your letter of September 26, 1898.

I understand that you wish to be informed whether the construction of section 901 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, providing against double taxation in the year 1898, in the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, but making provision in the same section for the equalization of taxation in the year 1899, in the event that the amount levied or collected from any borough, outside of what, at the date of the passage of the act in question, constituted The City of New York, and available to the uses of the Greater New York, as created by the Charter, should be more or less than its due proportion of the expenses for the year 1898 of the Greater New York, is to be construed so as to require the Municipal Assembly to equalize, by boroughs, or by cities, towns, villages and school districts within the limits of the municipal and public corporations included within the territorial limits of the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond.

Section 901 reads as follows:

"See 901. Inasmuch as the amounts due in the way of taxes for state and municipal purposes for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight will have been levied in the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond prior to the first day of January, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, but not in the city of New York, now, in order to prevent double taxation of property outside of the limits of the present city of New York for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, it is hereby provided that in said year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, the balance so caused to be raised by tax shall be raised exclusively from property within the limits of the corporation heretofore known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York; but it is further provided that in case it shall transpire that the amount levied or collected from any borough outside of the present city of New York and available to the uses of the city as constituted by this act, for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, shall be more or less than its due proportion of the expenses for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight of the city as constituted by this act, then such excess or deficit shall be equalized and adjusted in the budget of the following year, to the end that each borough shall bear its fair proportion of the expenditures of the city for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight. The Municipal Assembly shall have full power, by appropriate ordinances, to enforce this provision, and is hereby invested with power to make such equalization and adjustment by different rates of taxation or otherwise in the several boroughs, to the end that, taking the years eighteen hundred and ninety-eight and eighteen hundred and ninety-nine together, each borough shall pay its proper proportion of the general expenses of the city for both years."

I think it entirely clear that it was the purpose of this section to have the tax procedure applied by borough divisions and not otherwise.

To reply to your request for advice, I advise you that the Municipal Assembly is required to equalize any excess or deficit and adjust such excess or deficit in the Budget by boroughs, and not by other territorial or corporate limits.

You will observe that by the provisions of section 901, the Municipal Assembly is invested with full power to make such equalization and adjustment by any procedure that it may deem most expedient and fitted to the ends in view.

I call your attention to this provision, because I do not feel called upon to advise you whether, as suggested in your letter of this date, the Municipal Assembly is required to fix one rate of taxation for each borough, or fix one rate of taxation for the whole of the Greater New York, with supplementary rates for purposes of equalization and adjustment for the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, or proceed by any other particular method.

The Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

I am in receipt of a communication from the Clerk of your Board, dated October 7, 1898, requesting an opinion as to the power of the Board to make an appropriation for the Botanical Gardens, the same having been included in the Departmental Estimate for 1899 by the Department of Parks.

Chapter 285, Laws of 1897 created the corporation known as the New York Botanical Garden. Section 5 of said act provided that when a certain sum of money was raised by the said corporation, the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks were authorized and directed to erect a suitable building for a Botanical Museum and Herbarium. The funds necessary for this purpose were to be provided by the Comptroller on the request of the Commissioners of Public Parks, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment having authorized the expenditure.

Section 6 of the said act which has not been repealed reads as follows:

"The grounds set apart as above provided shall be used for no other purpose than authorized by this act; for police purposes and for the maintenance of proper roads and walks, the said ground shall remain subject at all times to the control of the said board of the department of parks; but otherwise, after the suitable laying out of the same, and the construction of proper roads and walks therein by the department of parks, the said grounds and buildings shall be under the management and control of the said corporation."

Section 5 was amended by chapter 103, Laws of 1894, and this last act was subsequently amended by chapter 717, Laws of 1896, which provides as follows:

And the said board of commissioners (department of public parks) is hereby authorized and directed to construct and equip within the said grounds so allotted, according to plans approved by them and the said board of managers a suitable fireproof building for such botanical museum and herbarium, with lecture rooms and laboratories for instruction, together with other suitable buildings for the care and culture of tender or other plants, indigenous or exotic, at an aggregate cost not exceeding the funds hereinabove authorized to be issued by the city of New York; the use of said buildings upon completion to be transferred to said corporation for the purposes stated in this act. And for the purpose of providing means therefor, it shall be the duty of the comptroller of the city of New York, upon being thereto requested by said commissioners, and upon being authorized thereto by the board of estimate and apportionment, to issue and sell at not less than their par value bonds or stock of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, in the manner now provided by law, payable from taxation, aggregating the sum of \$500,000, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and to be redeemed within a period of time not longer than thirty years from the date of their issue."

Section 613 of the Greater New York Charter provides:

It shall be the duty of the commissioner of the Borough of The Bronx to maintain the New York botanical garden and the buildings appurtenant thereto. * * * Out of the moneys annually appropriated for the maintenance of parks, each commissioner may apply such sum as shall be fixed by the board of estimate and apportionment for the keeping, preservation and exhibition of the collections placed or contained in buildings or institutions now situated or hereafter erected in the parks, squares or public places under the jurisdiction of such commissioner."

I am not sure that I understand the precise question presented by the request of Mr. Alder, but I assume it is as to whether the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should make an appropriation directly to the New York Botanical Garden or simply include a sufficient amount therefor to the Park Department.

The item which appears in the estimate of the Commissioner of the Borough of The Bronx is "For Maintenance Botanical Garden as per section 613, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, for six months, \$30,000."

This item is based upon the detailed figures given at page 230 of the "Estimates of the Departments," etc., contained in a communication from N. L. Britton, Esq., Director-in-Chief of the New York Botanical Garden.

It is evident, from an examination of these papers, that the duty of your Board is confined to making an allowance for such sum as it deems necessary to the Department of Parks (Borough of The Bronx) for the maintenance of the New York Botanical Garden, the request of the Commissioner and of Mr. Britton being the same, namely, that the amount shall be allowed to the Department of Parks.

SIRS—I am in receipt of a communication from Mr. Charles V. Ades, Clerk of your Board, stating that he is directed by you to request my opinion in regard to the estimate of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for the year 1899, in regard to the following point:

Whether the Charter requires the system of cleaning streets by the departmental force hereinbefore adopted by The City of New York to be extended to the boroughs of the city, other than the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, upon the expiration of contracts for cleaning the same in force on January 1, 1898.

The contract for cleaning the city of Brooklyn expires in March, 1899, and the Commissioner has divided his estimate on the basis of cleaning the streets by contract for a quarter of the year, and by the departmental force for the other three quarters.

In view of the necessity of an immediate reply to this communication, I state my conclusions briefly, without elaboration, and these are, that in view of the sweeping provisions of section 539 of the Charter, the theory adopted by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning is correct, and by virtue of the section cited the system of cleaning streets by the force of the departmental force adopted

by The City of New York, must be extended to the boroughs of the city, other than the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, upon the expiration of contracts for cleaning the same in force on January 1, 1898.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

SIRS—I am in receipt of a communication from Mr. Charles V. Ades, Clerk of your Board, dated October 12, 1898, stating that at an executive session thereof held on that day, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Clerk of this Board be directed to request the Corporation Counsel to report at his earliest convenience in regard to the application of the County Clerk of Kings County, stating whether the items therein included should be allowed by this Board."

No inclosure is sent in this communication, but I understand that it refers to the estimate of the County Clerk of Kings County, which appears on page 625 of "Estimates of the Departments," etc., which is now before your Board.

Upon an examination of that estimate, I find that the items are in themselves properly allowable to the County Clerk, but I have no knowledge by facts from which I can ascertain whether or not the amounts asked for are proper.

I assume that the charge "For Expert, \$5,000" refers to the person appointed under chapter 602 of the Laws of 1895, in reference to which appointment you continued me same that day.

I then suggested that the appointment of this expert to perform wholly unnecessary duties, while undoubtedly legal, was a most reprehensible act on the part of the Legislature, and I see no reason to change my opinion.

However, as the creation of the office is legal, a salary will have to be provided for its occupant, in connection with which you may think it worth while to consider the provisions of section 5 of the act in question, which are as follows:

"Section 5. The salary of such clerk shall be a county charge and shall be fixed by the board of supervisors or such other body as is vested with authority to appropriate money for such purpose."

The next item of the County Clerk's estimate, "For Postage for Expert, \$100," it seems to me should be a subject for investigation, inasmuch as it assumes that the alleged expert has to write five thousand letters a year, which I very much doubt.

DEAR SIR—In accordance with the letter of President Groat of October 6, and after an inspection of the premises, I find that the vacant lot on the south side of Thirteenth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, known as Lot No. 50, Block 151, Twenty-second Ward Map, is about five feet above the grade of the street, and should be dug down to避 a nuisance. Estimated cost, \$250. Assessed value of lot, \$200.

Hamilton avenue—Flagging sidewalk on the west side of Hamilton avenue, between Prospect avenue and Gowanus Canal, in front of lots known as Nos. 14 and 15 to 20 inclusive, also 25 to 36 inclusive, Block 71, Twenty-second Ward Map.

Reports from the Department of Highways. (See Minutes of June 24, 1898.)

Following opinion from the Corporation Counsel:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,
NEW YORK, October 27, 1898.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROAT, President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

SIR—I have received your communication, which reads as follows:

"Petitions have been received here to compel the flagging of sidewalks on Hamilton avenue, in this borough, opposite the property owned by the House of the Good Shepherd. Under title 22, section 32, page 353 of the Charter of the City of Brooklyn, 1805, the owner of this property claims exemption from assessments (chapter 353, Laws of 1888). I find that section 905 of the Charter of the present City of New York (chapter 378, Laws of 1897), continues existing and valid exemption from taxation."

"I shall be obliged if you will advise me whether or not the House of the Good Shepherd is now exempt from assessments for local improvements, such as the flagging of sidewalks opposite its property. The note 'D' to section 905 of the present Charter seems to indicate that it is not."

In reply thereto, I would say that on February 11 last I rendered an opinion to Hon. James Mullen, Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Borough of Brooklyn, in which I held that it was the general intent of the Charter to continue the immunity from taxation secured by the Charter of the City of Brooklyn to such institutions as were granted that immunity prior to consolidation. This opinion specifically applied to water rates. And I further held that such charges were taxes within the meaning of section 905 of the new Charter. This section reads as follows:

"905. Nothing in this chapter shall affect any existing and valid exemptions from taxation heretofore created by law respecting any property, real or personal, within the limits of The City of New York as constituted by this act."

Your inquiry relates to an assessment for flagging sidewalks. By section 32, title 22 of the Charter of the City of Brooklyn, it is provided that "The real property situate in the county of Kings, now owned or which may hereafter be owned by any hospital, orphan asylum, house of industry or other charitable corporation, society or institution, which has for its object the reformation of offenders, the care, support or education of the sick, the infirm, the destitute, the deaf, the dumb or the blind, shall be and hereby is declared discharged and exempt from all taxes and from all assessments laid or made for local improvements, and sales thereunder, and from all such assessments hereafter, so long as the same shall be owned by any such corporation, society or institution aforesaid." * * * "The ratable amount of any assessment which shall be laid or made hereafter for any local improvement which would have affected any real property exempted under this section, if such exemption had not been made, shall be a charge upon the city of Brooklyn and be paid out of the assessment fund of said city." Under the opinion above cited it is clear that no assessment for local improvement is included under the word "taxation" as used in the new Charter. It is also clear that the House of the Good Shepherd is included in the class of institutions so exempted.

The note to which you refer (Note "D," section 905) would not seem to apply to this case, because assessments for local improvements are specifically mentioned in section 32 above cited.

I advise you, therefore, that the House of the Good Shepherd is now exempt from assessment for local improvements, and therefore from an assessment for flagging of sidewalks, which is a local improvement. The ratable amount of any such assessment which could lawfully be laid against the property of such institution if it were not for the exemption granted, should be ascertained and the amount thereof paid by The City of New York.
