#### QUARTERLY REPORT ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1901.

##### To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending September 30, 1901:

##### Breakwater at Pier "A," N. R.

Under resolution of the Board of January 16, 1900, the work of constructing a permanent breakwater south of Pier "A" has been in progress. The plan of using upper course of concrete blocks was abandoned and concrete placed in situ in forms substituted therefor. Five timber forms varying in length from 24 to 43 feet (aggregating the length of 158 feet on centre line of breakwater) were built at the Fifty-seventh Street Yard, weighted with concrete in bottom corners and set by derrick on the lower course of concrete blocks. The concrete was placed in these forms by derrick with bucket to about the level of the bed of the A B course granite. Base boards were placed on both sides of the forms of the stretch running along Pier "A," and on the inside of the stretch running south of Pier "A," to form face of concrete from low water to bed of coping. Regular granite masonry was laid on outside of the stretch running south of Pier "A," and concrete brought up in forms according to plan to level of bed of coping. Fifty-three lineal feet of wall was built with granite facing on one side and 65 lineal feet of wall with concrete facing on both sides. Total number of batches of concrete placed, 1,323, and of batches of mortar placed for facing, 128. Base blocks were made at the Fifty-seventh Street Yard, and set on the pile foundations, completing the base course along the stretch running south from Pier "A."

##### Pier, new 23, N. R.

The Board, by a resolution passed the 17th of May, 1901, authorized the extension of this pier at the outer end, and work has been in progress.

##### Between Piers, new 23 and 24, N. R.

A new fender system has been placed along the front of the bulkhead between these two piers by the West Shore Railroad Company, under a permit from the Board.

##### Pier, new 24, N. R.

The Board, by a resolution passed June 7, 1901, authorized the extension of this pier at the outer end, and the work has been completed.

##### Pier, new 29, N. R.

A shed has been erected on the bulkhead north of this pier by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, under permit from the Board.

##### Desbrosses Street Section, N. R.

The wall at this section, which has been in course of building by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company under permit from the Board of Docks, has been completed. The old ferry structures were removed, and the new ferry building placed in accordance with the agreement with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

##### Pier, new 37, N. R.

Under resolution of the Board of June 27, 1900, the outer end of this pier has been extended, and the work completed.

##### Pier, new 38, N. R.

The outer end of this pier is being extended under resolution of the Board, June 27, 1900.

##### Pier, new 40, N. R.

A shed has been erected on the pier by the Atlantic Transport Company, under a permit from the Board. The work has been completed.

##### Improvement of Water-front, Between Piers, new 47 and Gansevoort street, N. R.

The bulkhead of this section was practically completed for the full length of the section during a previous quarter, and during the present quarter some slight work of maintenance was done, including the removal of shops and erecting of a fence.

##### Chelsea Section, N. R.

On the 28th of December, 1900, the Board authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets. The work of dredging certain locations has been in progress during the quarter. Pier, old 58½, and Pier, old 59, have been removed. The ferry-rack and bulkhead platform at West Thirteenth street has also been removed and a fence erected along the bulkhead.

##### Pier, Thirtieth Street, N. R.

A contract has been awarded for extending and repairing this pier, and the work is now in progress.

##### West Thirty-fourth Street, N. R.

A contract, No. 700, has been awarded for the erection of a freight-shed on this pier, and the work is well under way.

##### West Forty-seventh Street, N. R.

Earth-filling is being placed in this locality under order of the Board.

##### Pier, West Fifty-second Street, N. R.

An extension is being built to the outer end of the pier, under resolution of the Board, February 8, 1901.

##### Pier, West Fifty-seventh Street, N. R.

This pier is being repaired and extended by the force of the Department, under resolution of the Board, June 27, 1900.

##### West Fifty-ninth Street Section, N. R.

The Board, by a resolution passed on the 27th of June, 1900, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall or river-wall, in the vicinity of Fifty-ninth street, on the North river, and the construction of a new pier at the foot of the street. Work on the wall has been in progress, and an approach is being built to the pier at the foot of Fifty-ninth street. A contract, No. 697, was awarded for erecting a freight-shed on the pier, and the work has been completed.

##### Pier, Ninety-sixth Street, N. R.

A contract, No. 706, has been awarded for the erection of a pier at the foot of this street, and the work is now in progress.

##### Claremont Section, N. R.

The Board, by unanimous resolution passed on the 6th of November, 1900, authorized the construction of a bulkhead-wall in the vicinity of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets on the North river. The work on this section has made substantial progress during the quarter.

##### Pier, One Hundred and Thirty-first Street, N. R.

A contract, No. 704, was let for the building of a new pier at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, and the work is rapidly approaching completion. The inner end of the pier is being built by the Department force.

##### EAST RIVER.

##### Broad Street Section, E. R.

By unanimous resolution of the Board of the 22d of December, 1899, there was authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall between Whitehall street and Pier, new 7, on the East river, and the construction of two new piers. Substantial work has been done during the quarter on this section, and the bulkhead-wall is completed for a large distance of the way. Filling has been placed behind the wall and arrangements have been made for paving and superintending same over a portion of the section.

##### Fulton Section, E. R.

The Board, by resolution passed 26th of April, 1901, authorized the construction of a bulkhead-wall in the vicinity of Fulton street. Pier, old 21, has been removed and the necessary examinations of the river bottom has been made preparatory to the construction of the wall.

##### Pier, new 12, E. R.

Pier, old 15, has been removed to make way for the proposed new pier to be built at the foot of Wall street, and to be known as Pier, new 12. A contract, No. 714, has been let and work on the pier is in progress.

##### Pier, new 16, E. R.

A contract, No. 706, has been let for the construction of this pier and work is in progress.

##### Catharine Section, E. R.

The work on this section has been temporarily suspended, and no work done during the quarter. The wall has been completed as far as practicable until further property has been acquired.

##### Market Section, E. R.

The Board, by a resolution of the 23d of February, 1900, authorized the construction of a bulkhead or river wall in the neighborhood of Market street, and substantial progress toward completion has been made. About 65 linear feet of wharfage room has been made during the quarter.

##### Piers, new 29 and 30, E. R.

Piers, old new 29, old 38 and old 39, having been removed to make way for the construction of Piers, new 29 and 30, a contract, No. 698, was let for the construction of two new piers during the previous quarter, and during the present quarter the work has been completed.

##### Rutgers Section, E. R.

At this section the work of finishing off the wall has been in progress during the quarter. Filling has been placed behind the wall, and a marginal street is being paved along the section.

##### Freight Shed on Pier, new 33, E. R.

A freight shed is being erected on Pier, new 33, East river, under Contract No. 699.

##### Pier, Fourth Street, E. R.

The outer end of this pier is being extended by the force of the Department under resolution of the Board, December 14, 1900.

##### Pier, Fifth Street, E. R.

The Board, by a resolution passed the 26th of April, 1901, directed the removal of the old pier and the construction of a new pier in place thereof. The old pier has been removed, and a contract prepared for the erection of a new pier.

##### East Twenty-third Street Section.

By resolution of the Board work on this section has been divided into two parts known as sections A and B. The work has been in progress on both of these divisions during the quarter, and about 273 linear feet of new wharfage room made. Earth-filling has been placed behind



the bulkhead-wall and is being graded. Sewer foundations have been placed and the old ferry structure at the north side of East Twenty-third street and at the south side of East Twenty-fourth street have been removed. A portion of the marginal street between East Twenty-first street and East Twenty-third street is being paved with asphalt. Sewer openings were constructed through the bulkhead-wall at the foot of East Eighteenth street, and the gap in the sewer connected with the old sewer. Between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets the necessary piling for a temporary sewer-box was placed connecting the brick sewer terminating at the old crib-bulkhead at the foot of Twenty-second street with the opening in the bulkhead at the foot of Twenty-first street.

A foundation for coal subway is being built between the old and new bulkheads for the Consolidated Gas Company.

#### *Recreation Ground Between East Seventeenth and East Eighteenth Streets.*

The Board, by resolution passed on the 31st of May, 1901, directed that the new-made land between those two streets be regulated and graded for use as a recreation ground. The work was begun during the previous quarter, and substantial progress has been made during the present quarter. About 520 lineal feet of foundation for fence has been placed. Drainage pipes have been put in and about 600 lineal feet of curb for walks set. A pavilion has also been placed in the recreation ground.

#### *East Thirty-eighth Street Section, E. R.*

The Board, by unanimous resolution passed on the 4th of May, 1900, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall in the vicinity of East Thirty-eighth street. Work has been in progress from time to time during the quarter. A pile foundation is being prepared for the outlet tunnel pipe of the General Tunnel Engineering Company at their cost and expense.

#### *Between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth Streets, E. R.*

The foundation for pipes in this locality has been made ready and cleared of stone, sand and mud for and on account of Ryan & Parker.

#### *East Seventy-fourth Street Section, E. R.*

The Board having authorized the construction of a section of the wall at this locality by a resolution passed May 11, 1900, the work of construction has been in progress during the quarter. Loose stone and other material found on the rock bottom after dredging were removed by the pump. Concrete was made and placed in bags on the rock bottom.

Rock in front of the bulkhead between Seventy-fourth and Seventy-fifth streets was removed for and at the cost and expense of the Manhattan Elevated Railroad Company.

#### *One Hundred and Thirty-second Street and Park Avenue, H. R.*

Filling is being deposited along the water-front of these premises by Frank Buckley, under permit of the Board. This work, commenced on November 15, 1899, has been completed.

#### *One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, West of Gerard Avenue, H. R.*

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by Jordan L. Mott, under permit of the Board.

#### *One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street, East Side of H. R.*

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by John Cromwell, under permit of the Board.

#### *One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street and Harlem River.*

Filling is being deposited north of Railroad avenue in accordance with plans submitted by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under permit of the Board.

#### *One Hundred and Forty-seventh to One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, H. R.*

Filling is being deposited to grade between the above streets by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company in accordance with plans submitted and under permit of the Board.

#### *Between Lincoln and Third Avenues, H. R.*

Two coal pockets are in course of erection between the above avenues by S. Trimmer & Sons, under permit of the Board.

#### *Between Third and Lincoln Avenues, H. R.*

A temporary wall structure, together with certain other improvements, is being erected at the above premises by Terry & Trench Construction Company, under permit of the Board.

#### *Morris Heights, H. R.*

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity and retaining structure to hold the same erected by the Gas Engine and Power Company, Charles L. Seabury Company, Consolidated, under permit of the Board.

#### *Oak Point, Bronx River.*

Filling is being deposited, and certain other improvements are being made, by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company, under permit of the Board. This work was begun in 1891, and is now temporarily suspended.

#### *Westchester Creek, Fort Schuyler Road.*

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by J. S. Bush, under permit of the Board. The work was begun in 1900, and is in progress from time to time.

#### *Barretto's Point, Long Island Sound.*

Foundation piles were driven, and the boat-house and float placed in this vicinity, by the Young Men's Christian Association, under permit of the Board.

#### BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

##### *Sheepshead Bay.*

The Manhattan Hotel and Land Company are pumping and depositing sand at Manhattan Beach.

##### *Emmons Avenue and Twenty-second Street.*

Sand is being removed from the flats, and filled in lot in this vicinity, by William Esmark, under permit of the Board.

##### *Coney Island.*

Two jetties are being constructed at the foot of Henderson Wharf by Messrs. A. D. Bushman and others, under permit of the Board.

##### *Between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh Streets.*

The water-front in this vicinity is being improved by the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company, under permit of the Board.

##### *Fifty-fifth Street, Brooklyn.*

An approach over the present grade at Fifty-fifth street has been built by the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company, under permit of the Board, and a new pier and return is being erected by the same company.

##### *Between Fifty-fourth and Fifty-fifth Streets.*

Coal pockets are being erected, with the necessary dock and cribwork foundations, by the Kings County Gas and Illuminating Company, under permit of the Board.

##### *Between Fortieth and Forty-first Streets, Brooklyn.*

The pier is being constructed by the Bush Company (Limited), under permit of the Board.

##### *Conover Street, Brooklyn.*

A basin is being constructed near the foot of this street by H. B. Kirkham & Son, under permit of the Board.

##### *Newtown Creek, Brooklyn.*

The bulkhead-dock on the north side of the creek is being constructed, under permit of the Board.

#### BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

##### *North Street, Port Richmond.*

The dock at the foot of this street was extended by William J. Quinlan, under permit of the Board.

##### *Burlee Dry Dock, Port Richmond.*

A new dock was built by the Burlee Dry Dock Company, under permit of the Board.

##### *Sharp Avenue, Port Richmond.*

A new bulkhead was built and filling placed at the foot of the avenue by Donovan Brothers, under permit of the Board.

##### *New Dorp Beach.*

A new pier was erected in this vicinity by Edward Hett, under permit of the Board.

#### PAVING MARGINAL STREET, N. R.

Asphalt pavement has been laid at various places along the North river, under Treasurer's Orders therefor. Granite pavement has been laid at various places along the water-front, under Treasurer's Orders. Pavements along the North river water-front, between Pier "A" and West Fifty-seventh street, and between Fifty-seventh and One Hundred and Fifty-eighth streets, has also been kept in repair.

#### PAVEMENT ON THE EAST RIVER.

Pavement has been repaired from time to time along the East river water-front as required.

#### TIMBER BASIN, NORTH RIVER.

At the timber basin timber has been received under Treasurer's Orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained in good order and condition.

#### PILE BASINS ON THE NORTH RIVER.

Pile basins between One Hundred and Fifty-third and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth streets and between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets, on the North river, have been maintained in good order and condition.

#### BASIN FOR STORAGE OF OLD MATERIAL, BROOKLYN.

At this basin old material has been rafted and cared for.

#### DEPARTMENT YARDS AT WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH AND EAST TWENTY-FOURTH STREETS.

At the Department yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of material and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

#### RECREATION BUILDINGS.

Recreation buildings on the North and East rivers have been maintained and cared for. Repairs and painting have been done.

#### FLOATING PROPERTY.

All the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and has been repaired from time to time.

#### SURVEYING PARTY.

Surveys of the water-front and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx, have been made. An extensive survey of the water-fronts of the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress. All the lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given as required.

#### DREDGING.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or by private parties.

#### REPAIRS.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order or permit from the Board of Docks. Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit from the Board of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

#### DRAUGHTSMEN.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water-front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work. The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 1,660 linear feet. The wharfage room destroyed by the City in preparing for new improvements is 1,600 linear feet. The areas of the City's piers has been increased 39,600 square feet. The total increase of wharfage room made by private parties is 2,900 linear feet.

#### HEARINGS.

*Teller Avenue, Acquiring Title, from One Hundred and Sixty-fourth to One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street.*

Petition of A. Newbold Morris, No. 19 East Sixty-fourth street, and others, was read and, on motion of Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for Teller avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to East One Hundred and Seventieth street, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Sheridan Avenue, Acquiring Title, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth Street to Belmont Avenue.*

Petition of A. Newbold Morris and others, was read and, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for Sheridan avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to Belmont avenue, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Findlay Avenue, Acquiring Title, from East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street to East One Hundred and Seventieth Street.*

Petition of A. Newbold Morris and others was read and, on motion of Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for Findlay avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to East One Hundred and Seventieth street, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*College Avenue, Acquiring Title, from One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street to East One Hundred and Seventy-second Street.*

Petition of A. Newbold Morris and others was read and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for College avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to East One Hundred and Seventy-second street and Teller avenue, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Dawson Street, Sheet Asphalt, from One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Street to Longwood Avenue.*

Petition of F. H. Doole, Jacob Munck, P. J. Muhlfeld, and about twenty-five others, was read and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that Dawson street be paved with sheet asphalt, from One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to Longwood avenue, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*East One Hundred and Thirty-seventh Street, Granite Paving, between Brook Avenue and Southern Boulevard.*

Petition of William Derr, F. Vollmer, Charles Boyce and others, was read and, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that East One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, between Brook avenue and Southern Boulevard, be paved with granite blocks, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*East One Hundred and Seventieth Street, Granite Paving, between Bristow Street and Prospect Avenue.*

Petition of John Allan and others was read and, on motion of Alderman Geiger, it was

Resolved, That the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements that East One Hundred and Seventieth street be paved with granite blocks, between Bristow street and Prospect avenue, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the said Board of Public Improvements.

*Clinton Avenue Protest Against Asphalt Paving, the Section between Crotona Park, North, and East One Hundred and Eightieth Street.*

Protest of Arthur D. Clarke, Herman G. Eilers, James Carlon, William F. Volkmar, Charles Munde, P. Gessler, Michael Murray, August Staiber, William McClenahan, Henry Schlobohm, Francis Conlon, George Kuntz, Ed. J. Woolock, Mrs. F. Walter, John P. Clark, Eliz Megronigle, Gottfried Oethinger, August Danneman, George E. Schroth, Catherine Wayner, William J. McKenna, Richard M. Goff, Herman Ruf, William J. Lee, James Hartnell, A. F. Greers, Frank Ramsteke, Theresa Ramsteke, Joseph E. Ramsteke, Edwin E. Bedell and Ed. Whalen, was read.



President Haffen and Councilman Hottenroth compared the names with the petition in favor of the paving with asphalt of this avenue, and found that some of the names on the protest were also on the petition favoring the asphalt paving.

On motion of Alderman Geiger it was

I would say further in this matter that I believe there was some party at the hearing who requested that the proposed change be extended northward on Morris Avenue to the upper end thereof, and in view of that request I have looked over the grades on that whole section and beg to submit a sketch or blue print which corresponds with the grades proposed in the petition and simply extends the changes northward and provides for connection with Jerome Avenue from Morris, which, according to the present adopted grades, is impossible. I think when the change is made that the whole section covered by my sketch should be included.

Your Honorable Board is therefore respectfully requested to inquire as to the cause of such delay and to take such action as might hasten the completion of the work and thus give relief to the district. **Hon. JAMES H. MALONEY, Deputy Commissioner of Highways:**

DEAR SIR—A resolution for regulating, etc., Boston road, from Tremont avenue to Bronx (or One Hundred and Eighty-second) street, has been passed by the Municipal Assembly, and it has occurred to me in preparing the plan for this work that the sidewalks thereof should be fixed at the width of fifteen feet on each side, with area and courtyard privileges restricted to such width as is allowed in the general ordinances for a street having sidewalks fifteen feet in width. My reason for suggesting this is that the sidewalks on this street under the general ordinances would be nineteen feet wide leaving the roadway but forty-two feet in width; the total width of the street being eighty feet. The fact that the elevated structure, now being constructed by the Rapid Transit Commission, traverses this street, and in all probability trolley tracks will be laid thereon in the near future, makes it apparent that a roadway of forty-two feet in width will not be sufficient to properly accommodate the traffic. If the sidewalks are made fifteen feet it will leave fifty feet for the roadway, which will be the same as Third avenue. In conclusion, I would suggest that this matter be referred to the Local Board.
